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2 Understanding JD Edwards EnterpriseOne

Understanding This Guide

This guide is designed to direct you through a basic *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* installation. It is not a substitute for the database administration manuals provided by your Relational Database Management System (RDBMS) vendor, the network administration manuals provided by your network vendor, or the installation and configuration manuals for third-party products used with *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne*.

Tip: All links in this guide are "live" (clickable) in the HTML version of this document.

This guide is designed for management information system (MIS) managers and installers. It outlines the procedures for installing *Release 9.2*. To successfully follow these procedures you must understand:

- Hardware and software requirements
- Database setup and management
- Enterprise platforms and operating systems

At a minimum, review these guides before beginning:

Understanding the Installation and Upgrade Process

This documentation explains the process used to install *Release 9.2* software which consists of these steps:

- Install the Deployment Server (see *Concurrent Installation* below for concurrent operations)
- Install the Platform Pack (see *Concurrent Installation* below for concurrent operations)
- Set up the installation plan by running Installation Planner
- Run the Installation Workbench
- Install the *HTML Web Server*

Note: A *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne HTML Web Server* is mandatory to run web-enabled *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* applications, which includes all end-user applications and selected tools applications. This guide only describes the definition of the *HTML Web Server* in regards to the Installation Planner and the Installation Workbench. The installation of the *HTML Web Server* itself is not covered by this guide. Separate guides describe the separate installation process for the *HTML Web Server* on the supported platforms using Server Manager. Topics relating to the *HTML Web Server* other than installation using Server Manager are covered in platform-specific reference guides. Such topics include the installation and configuration of the underlying application servers. - Install the Development Clients for developers and system administrators

Concurrent Installation

You can concurrently install the Deployment Server, the Platform Pack, and the *HTML Web Server* assuming the installation programs are run on different machines. This can decrease the overall time it takes to complete the installation.

For a detailed diagram of the complete set of steps and possible concurrent operations, advanced or expert users can refer to the Appendix of this guide entitled: *Concurrent Installation Options (Advanced or Expert Users Only)*.

Recommended Configurations

You can set up your *Release 9.2* configuration in many ways. You should follow the typical setup and naming conventions whenever possible, unless there is a strong business case that supports the need to change.

Understanding the Deployment Server Installation

The Deployment Server is the focus of the *Release 9.2* installation process. The installation program for the Deployment Server copies the *Release 9.2* software and a language, if applicable, from the installation image to the Deployment Server. From the Deployment Server, the *Release 9.2* software is distributed to one or more Development Clients. Since the Deployment Server and Platform Pack have separate Installers, they can be running concurrently which decreases the overall installation time (assuming the Installers are run on different machines).

The Deployment Server installation program updates the Microsoft Windows registry with information about the *Release 9.2* installation and languages, if applicable.

New for Tools and Applications Releases for 9.2, the Deployment Server installer no longer delivers any standard full packages (for example, DV920FA). Further the install no longer attaches and renames tables for package specs. However, the installer still delivers the `PACKAGE\data` and `PACKAGE\datacomp` directories.

Understanding the Platform Pack Installation

Rather than transferring all the software from the Deployment Server, the Platform Pack installs the code and database directly to the Enterprise Server. This more direct installation method increases performance during this part of the process. It is especially beneficial in situations in which the Enterprise Server is connected to the Deployment Server using a wide area network (WAN). Since the Deployment Server and Platform Pack have separate Installers, they can be running concurrently which decreases the overall installation time (assuming the Installers are run on different machines).

However, new for Tools and Application Releases for 9.2, customers must build a full package after the Platform Pack completes. Customers will not be able to build an update package out of the box. This is due to changes in Server Only Package Build, which was introduced with Tools Release 9.1.5).

Note: Although the Platform Pack will no longer deliver packages, it still delivers the Package Repository and the package definition records because these are needed in order to run services. The Platform Pack will not deliver the source and include files (for example, obj and lib) for the package. The directories are delivered in the path code on the Deployment Server, just not as a package.

Understanding the Installation Planner

Installation Planner is an application that runs on the Deployment Server. It is used to configure the environments for all machines within the enterprise. It also is a system administration tool that stores all information about the installation plan in a set of preloaded tables in the Planner data source. The purpose of the Installation Planner is to help you set up the installation plan using step-by-step options.

This section discusses these topics:

Managed Processes

Installation Planner manages these processes:

- Language setup
- Location setup
- Deployment Server Setup
- Enterprise Server setup
- HTML Web Server setup
- Additional server setup

This includes setup to servers such as a Database Server.

- Data source setup

This includes setup for both Enterprise Server-specific and shared environment data sources.

Data Sources

Note: Languages are installed using the Installation Planner from the Language installation image. To install additional languages, you perform the language-specific procedures after you have executed the initial installation described in this guide. For additional details, refer to *Creating a Language Only Installation Plan*.

Some data sources remain the same between releases:

- Business data
- Control tables

Other data sources are release specific:

- System and data dictionary
- Server map

The server map is machine-specific and release-specific if separate environments are maintained.

Environment Setup

This includes all environments for a typical customer configuration, and creation of a new environment, such as PD920. This process ensures that the Object Configuration Manager (OCM) mappings are correct and the new environments point to the correct path codes. This could include creating custom environments and path codes.

Understanding Installation Workbench

Installation Workbench runs the plan created during Installation Planner. It functions as a central point for all the processes required to install environments. Some of the processes that install environments might require procedures to be performed manually. However, Installation Workbench assures that procedures are performed in the proper order, and insulates you as much as possible from platform-specific environment setup.

Understanding the Development Client Installation

The JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Development Client contains components that run as standard Microsoft Windows applications (for example, Solution Explorer, Forms Design Aid (FDA), and Report Design Aid (RDA)) and components that run in a web browser.

Note: This document uses the following terminology when discussing JD Edwards EnterpriseOne clients:

- Web Client

Components that run in a web browser.

- Development Client

Composed of standard Windows components and Web Client.

The Web Client part of the Development Client runs inside an Application Server. The supported Application Servers are:

- Oracle WebLogic Server (WLS)
- IBM WebSphere Application Server (WAS) Express or WebSphere Application Server for Developers.

For Oracle WebLogic Servers, you should install the supported version as indicated by the Certifications for the Development Client. The version of the Web Client that is installed on WLS is WLSH4A.

For WebSphere Application Servers, you can choose to use WAS Express or WAS for Developers as the Application Server for the EnterpriseOne Web Client. Both products are similar; either one may be manually installed before installing the Web Client for WAS. Whereas WAS Express requires a licensing fee to IBM, WAS for Developers is free.

The version of the Web Client that is installed on supported application servers is referred to by either of these names:

- HTML for Applications
- WLS4A (WebLogic Server for Applications)
- H4Ax (where the "x" denotes the version of WAS Express or WAS for Developers; for example, for WAS 8.5 the version of the Web Client is H4A85).

Note: Beginning with JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Tools Release 9.2, the Oracle Application Server (OAS) and the companion OH4A web development feature are not supported. They are functionally replaced by the Oracle WebLogic Server (WLS) and the companion WLSH4A web development feature, respectively.

The *Development Client Installation Guide* describes how to install Web Clients for both Application Servers: WLSH4A and H4Ax. In addition, it covers the installation of Oracle WebLogic and WAS Express or WAS for Developers.

The first time setup of the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Development Client installer and installation package on an EnterpriseOne Deployment Server is described in a separate guide entitled: *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Deployment Server Reference Guide*. This setup on the Deployment Server must be done before a user can install a JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Development Client. The installation package specifies the components to install and may or may not include the Web Client feature for Oracle WebLogic or IBM WebSphere.

Customers must conform to the supported platforms for the release as detailed in the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Certifications. Understanding Machine Names

Due to underlying requirements in the machine name tables, you must ensure that all machines names in the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne environment conform to specific rules. Whenever you manually enter a machine name in JD

Edwards EnterpriseOne, or whenever a machine name is programmatically determined, it is important to note that the machine name:

- Is case-sensitive
- Cannot exceed 15 characters
- Must be alphanumeric only and cannot contain any special characters, such as underscores or hyphens

Any machine whose name does not conform to these rules cannot be used in the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne environment.

Using Support

Tips

This documentation contains tips containing information that can make the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* setup process easier. Tips information is helpful but optional.

Fonts and Type Styles

Special fonts and type styles are used in this guide. Nearly all of the commands in this guide are case sensitive. Enter them exactly as written. In addition, all of the commands described illustrate the recommended directory structure. If your machine's directory structure is different, modify the commands to match your directory structure.

Italic type style designates variables used in the guide. For example, for the variable *deployment_server* in a command, substitute the actual name of your *Deployment Server*. Also, the names of other *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* guides are in italic type style. For example, *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Tools Package Management Guide*.

Courier font indicates explicit file names, commands, or other information that must be typed into the system. For example, a common file name used by *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* is an initialization file called the `JDE.INI`.

Working With the Customer Checklist

The *Release 9.2* support structure consists of components such as databases, operating systems, and hardware. To install *Release 9.2* successfully, set up the support structure before starting the installation process.

The tasks in this section are designed to prepare the customer's system for the installation process. Some of the tasks, such as checking that the appropriate hardware and software are available, can take some time to complete. Other tasks are quick and easy.

This checklist helps to organize the required preparation:

- Review *Environments Overview*.
- If the installation involves a secondary language, review *Language Process Overview* in this chapter.
- Assess the network.
- Verify that the Deployment Server hardware and software meet minimum technical requirements.
- Verify that the Enterprise Server hardware and software meet minimum technical requirements.
- Verify that the Development Client hardware and software meet minimum technical requirements.
- Verify that *HTML Web Server* hardware and software meet minimum technical requirements.
- Verify that the Deployment Server disk space meets minimum technical requirements.
- Verify that the Enterprise Server disk space meets minimum technical requirements.

Environments Overview

The *HTML Web Server* (J) environments have the same mappings as the regular environments with the exception of logic, all of which is mapped to run on the Enterprise Server.

Each environment shipped with *Release 9.2* has a specific use. The following sections explain each environment in more detail.

Understanding Environments

The *Release 9.2* software includes several environments that represent the typical customer configuration as defined in the Installation Planner. These environments are preset to make the installation process as easy as possible. This section contains additional information about these environments and their role in the installation and upgrade process.

Follow the setup recommendations and naming standards described in this guide to minimize confusion when communicating with those outside of your implementation team. In addition, future upgrades are simpler if you use *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* naming conventions. If you customize your configurations during the process, you should change only the descriptions provided with the typical setup.

JD Edwards EnterpriseOne provides the following preset environments:

- Deployment (*DEP920*)
- Planner (*JDEPLAN*)
- Prototype (*PY920*)
- Pristine (*PS920*)
- Development (*DV920*)
- Production (*PD920*)
- HTML Web Environment (all J* environments)

Planner Environment

The software installation and upgrade process includes a planning stage called the planner environment. Using this approach you can define the main components of your software configuration without affecting the production environment.

Every environment must have an associated pathcode and a set of OCM mappings. The planner environment uses a planner pathcode, which is shipped with the software, and a set of OCM mappings, which point to a planner database. All pathcodes share a complete set of runtime central objects on the Deployment Server.

Planner Pathcode

Release 9.2 provides a full set of runtime objects, which are used during the installation process. The software stores these objects on the Deployment Server in the planner directory. The planner pathcode contains the only complete set of runtime central objects on the Deployment Server, which are shared by all pathcodes.

The planner pathcode includes preloaded packages used during the update specification merge process. A package indicates the necessary objects for a Development Client, a point-in-time snapshot of the central objects on the Deployment Server, and where the installation program finds them.

Planner Database

All information created and updated during the planning stage is saved in these Oracle tablespaces:

- JDEPlan920
- JDECTL920
- JDEDD920
- JDSYS920

- JDEVL920
- JDEOL920
- JDEData920

When using the planner environment to change your configuration:

- Planner database tables are updated with the change.
- A plan is defined and run to move the change to the production environment.

When using the deployment or production environment to change your configuration after finishing the process:

- Production environment tables in the System pathcode are updated in real-time.
- Planner database tables are not updated.

For the deployment and production environments, OCM and data source information comes from the planner database.

You should use the production environment system (technical) tables to make changes to environments, pathcodes, packages, and OCM.

Pristine Environment

Use the pristine environment (*PS920*) to test pristine (un-customized) objects with *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* demonstration data or for training classes. The pristine environment is also used to run Table Conversion processes during an upgrade. This environment is required to compare modified objects to pristine objects. When encountering a software problem that *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* Global Support cannot duplicate, they will ask you to sign on to the pristine environment to duplicate the problem. Routinely, either monthly or quarterly, refresh the data for this environment from the JDEPLAN environment on the Deployment Server.

You should apply all software updates, ESUs, and Service Packs to the Pristine environment.

Deployment Environment

Use the deployment environment to run package builds on the Deployment Server. The deployment environment uses the planner pathcode and has OCM mappings to the production environment system tables and local data. Only one deployment environment is required because all environments created by the installation process share common data sources.

The deployment environment uses system information, such as environments, packages, and user profiles. The OCM mappings and data source information are supplied by the planner database.

Development Environment

The development environment is for development objects (*DV920* pathcode). Log on to this environment to modify and test objects before transferring them to the prototype environment (*PY920*) pathcode. After transferring the objects into *PY920* , build and install a full or partial prototype package (for example, *PY920FA* or *PY920PA*), and then log on to the prototype environment for additional testing. The Development environment is delivered with *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* Demonstration data.

Prototype Environment

The prototype environment is the staging environment for production. Constants tables and master tables, such as company constants, fiscal date patterns, and item master are populated with production data during the prototype process. Copy the tables to the production environment before going live.

After running Installation Workbench, no business data exists until it is entered. When appropriate, refresh the data this environment uses from your production environment (*PD920*)

Production Environment

Production users have a tested and released package on their system. Batch applications can run on the Enterprise Server.

Additional Considerations

Additional considerations include:

Cluster Software Options

When using cluster software, additional issues exist that must be taken into consideration before installing *Release 9.2* .

Web-Based Options

The *HTML Web Server* installation enables the use of Web-enabled functions in *Release 9.2* .

Language Process Overview

There are two methods to install languages:

Method 1 -- You can install languages are installed using the Installation Planner. The Language installation image is required to implement this functionality. If you install additional languages, you will perform the procedures after you have executed the initial installation described in this guide. For additional details, refer to the chapter *Creating a Language-Only Installation Plan* in this guide.

Method 2 -- You can use the latest version of Change Assistant to obtain the languages from the Update Center and automate the steps of Method 1. For additional details, refer to the chapter *Installing Languages Using Change Assistant on JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* in this guide.

This Language Process Overview section is provided in this guide for reference purposes. The language installation process automatically copies the text from a language database to the production *Release 9.2* database and merges the alternate language text with the original English base. These automated processes are described throughout this guide. When installing language for the first time, a language-only plan may be chosen after completing the initial plan.

Language Architecture

The software language architecture incorporates multinational language functionality for international customers. The software specifies the language preference for forms and reports. For example, users who share the same environment may want to view the same text in multiple languages, such as French, Spanish, and English. All language text is stored in a central location and deployed to the individual Development Client.

JD Edwards EnterpriseOne provides all software with a base language of English. The package build process enables the building of packages for multiple languages. Multiple languages can be installed using the processes outlined in this guide. Language text is accessed by the language preference code settings in the user profile associated with the alternate language installed.

Base Language

Release 9.2 language support works in conjunction with the English base language. The base release contains English and must be installed before creating custom modifications to include changes or additions to the translated text. All control files must also have an English record prior to adding an alternate language text record.

Alternate Language Components

An alternative language component is not included in this release; you must build the language package.

An alternate language includes major components whereby language text is stored in the Central Objects, System, Control Table, and Data Dictionary data sources. The data is loaded to the Deployment Server during the installation and copied to the Central Objects and the other data sources through the language installation process.

For *Release 9.2*, *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* is shipped with 21 languages. Single-byte languages run on single-byte or double-byte operating systems, but double-byte languages must run on double-byte operating systems.

Instructions in this guide explain how to set up these features.

Language Preference Codes

The language preference codes are the standard language codes used throughout the software. The Language Preference Code field, located in the *Release 9.2* user profile, determines which language is displayed on forms or reports. All users are assigned a language preference code within the user profile.

A blank language preference code specifies the base language of English. Alternate language records always have a value in the language preference code.

The alternate language text tables contain language preference codes. The tables contain several records for each item, such as a user defined code value as well as possible multiple records for a code value, with each code representing a different language.

If the language preference code does not have a corresponding translated language record, the base English record is the default record.

Certain database tables, such as the Business Unit Master, AAls, Account Master, and Item Master, also contain the language preference code in an additional description table. This information is not translated in the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* demonstration data.

Release 9.2 applications support the use of languages. Refer to the individual applications to set up and use multiple languages.

Database Character Set and Code Page Considerations

Data within a database is defined by a set of parameters. Each character within the database is identified by a specific language preference code value. A collection of characters within a defined database is called a character set or code page. A character set or code page setting is a scheme for encoding character data. Every character is defined by a unique hexadecimal value. These values can change between databases and languages. Every language is represented by at least one character set. Some character sets may contain multiple languages.

For example, the Western European character set contains all characters common to the Western European languages (Aa - Zz) and all special characters unique to specific languages, such as ' , ' , and ' . Asian character sets are specific to one language.

The software uses code page conversions to control the consistent or desired display of data. A code page conversion adjusts the hexadecimal values of different characters so that the appearance of text on the desktop is the same with different code pages.

When installing or upgrading the database, set up the code page for the language before loading your language specifics for *Release 9.2* .

Unicode

Unicode specifies that the data stored in the data source is in Unicode format. For installs, all data sources default to Unicode.

Note that the code page still must be set to the correct value even though the data sources may all be Unicode. The Unicode flag only indicates what column type is used to store character data in a Unicode database.

Code Page Settings

You should use the code page settings in this guide. The correct code page should be set when the database is created.

Oracle Code Page Settings

Both the NLS_characterset and NLS_LANG environment variables need to be set correctly.

Additionally, the Oracle character set for the database needs to be set correctly depending on the language used as listed in this table:

Tier	Language	Code Page Setting
1	English	WE8MSWIN1252
1	French	WE8MSWIN1252

Development Clients and Deployment Server

Code page settings for individual languages are specified in Microsoft Windows System locale. Verify that the Deployment Server code page is set correctly prior to upgrade.

National Language Support

National Language Support (NLS) is a set of common standards that enable data to be entered, displayed, stored, retrieved, and printed in multiple languages, in different databases, and on different platforms.

NLS is information that requires the set up of code pages and the `JDE.INI` for the Enterprise Server and `JDE.INI` for the Development Clients. By using NLS standards, *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* maintains consistent data within all databases and hardware platforms. The same database can store alternate language text, relying on NLS standards to manage the text storage and retrieval. *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* uses NLS, on all supported platforms, to interact with any computer system (hardware and software) within your own environment.

For the Development Client to reflect the language installed on the Deployment Server, perform the tasks for both the Enterprise Server and Development Clients to verify and modify the `JDE.INI` settings. These procedures are described throughout this guide.

Single-Byte and Double-Byte Considerations

Many single-byte languages support either national code pages or multinational code pages. The double-byte languages support specific individual national code pages by language.

Single-byte character sets use a collection of phonetic characters that require one byte to create a single character. Conversely, the double-byte character sets use ideographic characters and require two bytes to create a single character.

Single-byte languages can generally be run on single-byte or double-byte systems. Double-byte languages, such as Japanese, Chinese, and Korean, must run on machines configured to support a double-byte system. For example, a double-byte SQL Server or Oracle database is required for Chinese and Japanese languages.

The software can perform a Query By Example (QBE) on any character. However, when using a double-byte language, this process may not necessarily use an understandable collating sequence, although it can still use QBE for any double-byte column.

The following table shows the languages that the software supports and the LocalCodeSet values set in the `JDE.INI` for each platform:

Font Considerations

JD Edwards EnterpriseOne includes standard language fonts in a separate file. Some languages (such as double-byte) require special fonts to display and print correctly. The software stores the font settings in files according to language. Individual users can choose fonts by language for forms, grids, and reports.

User Display Preferences

User display preferences are individually defined sets of *Release 9.2* characteristics that are stored in the user profile. The software uses these preferences to determine how menus and forms are presented to individual users and where language is to be used in *Release 9.2* for that user. After user display preferences are set up for a given user, the values remain the same on any Development Client that the user accesses. Refer to the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Tools Runtime Administration Guide* for information about modifying user profiles.

3 Before You Begin the Installation or Upgrade

Before You Begin the Installation or Upgrade

You should complete the tasks in this chapter before you begin the actual installation process.

Technical Considerations for Applications Upgrade to a 64-bit version of 9.2

This section guides you through the technical considerations before upgrading to the 64-bit versions of JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Applications and Tools Releases or migrating from JD Edwards World to JD Edwards EnterpriseOne.

Note that 64-bit processing is implemented with Applications Release 9.2 and Tools Release 9.2.5. From Tools 9.2.6.1 only 64-bit is supported.

If you are starting with the 9.2 GA Applications Platform Pack CDs, you must use the Applications 9.2 GA Deployment Server CDs. Similarly, if you use One-Click or IBMi Code Current, the One-Click version must match the corresponding version of the Deployment Server CDs.

Note: The considerations described in this section do not replace those in the Upgrade Guides and the *Implementing 64-bit Processing with a 32-bit Deployment Server in JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* learning path.

This section contains the considerations for the following migration paths:

- Upgrade from Xe / ERP8
- Upgrade from 8.9 / 8.10 / 8.11
- Upgrade from 8.12
- Upgrade from 9.0 / 9.1

This section also includes Spec Merge considerations for all From Releases.

After performing the applications upgrade as described in this guide, you must follow the instructions in these learning paths if applicable to your environment:

- *Implementing 64-bit Processing with JD Edwards EnterpriseOne:* This learning path guides you through the steps required to update your existing JD Edwards EnterpriseOne 9.2 32-bit installation to Tools Release 9.2.6 or later with 64-bit processing.
- *Implementing 64-bit Processing with a 32-bit Deployment Server in JD Edwards EnterpriseOne:* This learning path guides you through the steps required to update your existing JD Edwards EnterpriseOne 32-bit installation to Tools Release 9.2.5 or later and implement 64-bit processing with a 32-bit Deployment Server.

Note: The process described in the above learning path only applies through EnterpriseOne Tools Release 9.2.5.x. Beginning with Tools Release 9.2.6, a 32-bit Deployment Server is no longer supported.

JD Edwards EnterpriseOne One-Click Provisioning is only available on these platform and database combinations, for both Oracle Cloud Infrastructure and on-premises:

- Oracle Linux with Oracle database
- Microsoft Windows with Oracle database
- Microsoft Windows with SQL Server database

The equivalent installation for IBM i is IBM i Code Current. For other platforms or databases, you must use the 9.2 GA CDs followed by the upgrade and the migration to 64-bit. See details for each from release below.

Note: Releases through Xe and 8.11 cannot upgrade directly to a 64-bit version. After you have upgraded and run all conversions, you can upgrade to a 64-bit Tools Release. Do not switch the Deployment Server to 64-bit unless you have completed your final Spec Merge. You can re-run Table Conversions after switching your Deployment Server to 64-bit.

Note: You need to run the TL92x ASI again after upgrading the Tools to 9.2.6.x 64-bit. Many steps are conditioned on which Tools Release you are running. Follow the *Implementing 64-bit Processing with a 32-bit Deployment Server in JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* learning path for details.

Note that if you have to start with the 9.2 GA Install CDs, you must use the 9.2 GA Deployment Server CDs. Similarly, with One-Click and IBM i Code Current, the Deployment Server CDs must match the version of One-Click and IBM i Code Current.

Review the Upgrade Advisor: JD Edwards (JDE) EnterpriseOne 9.2 (Doc ID 2320843.2) which contains the latest advice from My Oracle Support.

Upgrade from Xe or ERP8.0

Before upgrading from Xe or ERP8.0 to 9.2, you must consider the following:

- Tools Release 9.2, 64-bit (Release 22) cannot access Xe specifications. Therefore, the spec merge will not bring forward your custom objects, and the Compare Tools will not work. You must complete the Applications upgrade to 9.2 with Tools Release 9.2.5.x, including bringing forward your Customizations, before switching to 64-bit.
- Table Conversions work in 64-bit. Therefore, if you are performing repeated data only upgrades, you can migrate to 64-bit during that process.
- Workflow tables also contain specifications and you cannot bring custom workflows directly from Xe after migrating to 64-bit. Workflows are moved forward during the TC Workbench.

Note: One-Click and IBM i Code Current only support 64-bit versions, which do not work for the Xe to 9.2 upgrade.

Follow these steps to upgrade from Applications Release Xe or ERP8.0

1. Install 9.2 GA CDs.
2. Install the latest 32-bit Tools Release – currently 9.2.5.5.
3. Install the latest Planner Update.
4. Install the Server Manager Console and the Server Manager Agent.
5. Install the latest Tools Rollup ESU.
6. Install the latest Tools ASI 9.2.x. This step applies the Applications and DLL changes on the Deployment Server needed for compatibility with Tools Release 9.2.5.x.
7. Follow the instructions in this guide for completing the upgrade.
8. You cannot switch the Deployment Server to 64-bit until run the final spec merge on the last path code. After the Deployment Server has been switched to 64-bit, you cannot go back to 32-bit. You can do repeated data upgrades with a 64-bit Deployment Server.
9. You must run the Tools Release 9.2.x ASI again after upgrading the Tools Release to 9.2.6.x 64 bit. Many steps are conditioned according to the Tools Release that you are running. When switching to 64-bit, follow the *Implementing 64-bit Processing with a 32-bit Deployment Server in JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* learning path.

Upgrade from 8.9, 8.10, or 8.11

Before upgrading from 8.9, 8.10, or 8.11, you must consider the following:

You must first upgrade to Applications Release 9.1 and bring forward any custom objects. There is no upgrade path from 8.9, 8.10 and 8.11 to 9.2 (Table Conversion Schedule and Control Table Merges are not available). Table Conversions must be completed in 9.1, as the Table Conversions for 9.1 to 9.2 upgrade will not work on tables in a previous layout. After this process the 9.1 to 9.2 upgrade converts the tables to the current format.

Note: Release 9.2, 64-bit Tools code (Release 22) cannot access 8.9 – 8.11 specifications. You must bring forward all custom objects during the 9.1 upgrade.

Follow these steps to upgrade from Applications Release 8.9, 8.10, or 8.11

1. Install 9.1 GA CDs.
2. Install the latest 32-bit Tools Release, which is currently 9.2.5.5.
3. Install the latest 9.1 Planner Update.
4. Install the Server Console and the Server Manager Agent.
5. Install the latest Tools ASI 9.2.x. This step applies the Applications and DLL changes on the Deployment Server needed for compatibility with Tools Release 9.2.5.x.
6. Follow the instructions in this guide for completing the upgrade.
7. You can't switch the Deployment Server to 64-bit until you run the final spec merge on the last path code. After the Deployment Server has been switched to 64-bit, you cannot go back to 32-bit. You can do repeated data upgrades with a 64-bit Deployment Server
8. You can now perform a Simplified Upgrade or a Traditional Upgrade to 9.2.
9. Use One-Click to deploy IBM i Code Current or use 9.2 GA CDs if your platform is not supported for One-Click. Follow the instructions in the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Applications Release 9.2 Upgrade Guide* to upgrade from Applications Release 9.1 to 9.2 for your platform or database.

Upgrade from 8.12

Before upgrading from 8.12, you must consider the following:

One-Click and IBM i Code Current are not intergrated with upgrade logic in them. If you use One-Click, you must export, save, or detach the Business Data and Control Tables of your 8.12 instance, then detach / drop the 9.2 version of these and attach / import / restore your 8.12 version.

Note: Tools Release 9.2, 64-bit (Release 22) can access 8.12 specifications.

Follow these steps to upgrade from Applications Release 8.12:

1. Install 9.2 GA CDs.
2. Install the latest 32-bit Tools Release (Release 22). The delivered DLLs in PLANNER path code are 32-bit.
3. Install the latest Planner Update.
4. Install the Server Manager Console and the Server Manager Agent.
5. Install latest Tools Rollup ESU.
6. Install the latest Tools ASI 9.2.x. This step also applies the Applications and DLL changes on the Deployment Server needed for compatibility with Tools Release 9.2.5.x.
7. For the GA CD install, build a package in PS920 before starting the upgrade. This step loads the files in the DB repository for PS920.
8. At this point you can migrate the Deployment Server to 64-bit if you want or wait until the Upgrade is finished. Follow the instructions in the *Implementing 64-bit Processing with a 32-bit Deployment Server in JD Edwards EnterpriseOne learning path*.
9. Follow the instructions in this guide for completing the upgrade.

Upgrade from 9.0 or 9.1

Follow these steps to upgrade from Applications Release 9.0 or 9.1

1. Install One-Click if it is supported for your platform or database. Otherwise, use GA CDs. Use the JDE_9.2_Simplified_Upgr_Migration_Utility to move your data to the cloud. If you use IBM i Code Current or deploy 9.2 (using One-Click) onto the same machine where you have the 9.1 or 9.0 data, be aware that the One-Click or Code Current logic is not designed for an upgrade. You must export or save your Business Data and Control Tables before you start. Then when the One-Click or Code Current process ends, drop the tables and delete the library for your Business Data and Control Tables and restore your backup or import the data you exported.
2. If you use GA CDs (AIX, Solaris, HP-UX), follow these steps:
 - a. Install the latest 32-bit Tools Release. This release is required for compatibility with the PLANNER path code.
 - b. Install the latest Planner Update.
 - c. Install the Server Manager Console and the Server Manager Agent.
 - d. Install the latest Tools Rollup ESU.
 - e. Install the Tools ASI 9.2.x. This step applies the Applications and DLL changes on the Deployment Server needed for compatibility with 9.2.5.x.
 - f. Build a package in PS920 before starting the upgrade. This step loads the files in the DB repository for PS920.
 - g. If you perform a Simplified Upgrade, download the scripts and create a standard package (for example, DV920FA) in your target Central Objects. This step is needed for the Table Conversions. Search on Bug 33784730 in Update Center.
 - h. If you perform a Simplified Upgrade, change the spec.ini file in your target path code on the Enterprise Server to look similar to the spec.ini file in PS920 except with your path code and your standard package. For example, DV920 and DV920FA. (The layout of the path code folders changed with 9.2.6).
3. If you use One-Click, check that the scripts have created a standard package in your target Central Objects, for example, DV920FA.
4. Follow the instructions in this guide for completing the upgrade.
5. Before building the package, make sure SY920.F00942T.EMDBSRCFLG is set to 2. The One-Click images do not ship the source on the Deployment Server CDs. The only source on the Deployment Server will be your custom BSFNs that were copied forward during the spec merge. Never set SY920.F00942T.EMDBSRCFLG to 0.
6. If you use GA CDs and you are on 9.2.5.x 32-bit, follow the *Implementing 64-bit Processing with a 32-bit Deployment Server in JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* learning path.

Table Conversion Considerations for All From Releases

Note: Turn on UBE and Table Conversion Engine logging before submitting any Table Conversions to the server. In the jde.ini file on the server, change the [UBE] and [TCENGINE] sections as shown below:

[UBE]
UBESaveLogFile=1

[TCENGINE]
TraceLevel=1
```

Follow these steps for Simplified Upgrade with Tools Release 9.2.6.x:

With 9.2.6.1 there was a change to the folder structure of the path code on the Enterprise Server. This change breaks Table Conversions with Simplified Upgrade, as you cannot access the new table specifications on the server.

For One-Click, JDE_9.2_Simplified_Upgr_Migration_Utility downloads have a fix for the issue.

If you perform a Simplified Upgrade starting with the GA Installation CDs, you must download the scripts to create a standard package in the path code you are upgrading. Search for Bug 33784730 on Update Center.

In either case, verify that the `spec.ini` files on the Enterprise Server for your target path code are correct. They should not point to PS920FA. They should look similar to the `spec.ini` file in the PS920 path code, but should point to the path code (for example, DV920FA in DV920).

Follow these steps to perform Table Conversion:

1. If you start from the GA Install CDs, download the scripts to create the standard package in your target path code, for example, DV920FA in DV920. After you install the GA CDs, run the scripts and verify that the package repository tables (for example, DV920.F98710DV920FA) were created.
2. On the Enterprise Server, review the `spec.ini` file in your target path code and verify that it looks similar to the `spec.ini` file in PS920. Also, it must point to the package repository you just created. For Simplified Upgrade, the GA Platform Pack lays down a different `spec.ini` file, which is not applicable for Tools Release 9.2.6.
3. The GA CDs are 32-bit. After you implement 64-bit on the Deployment Server, you must copy the bin64 from PLANNER to each of the path codes. Additionally, you must copy the 64-bit `g1b1tb1`, `dddict`, and `ddtext` files from `PLANNER\spec` to each path code's `spec` directory. Without these files, no Table Conversions (including *ALTER in ESUs) can run.

Verifying Software and Hardware Requirements

Certain minimum hardware and software requirements must be met to run *Release 9.2* on various operating systems and servers. Verify that the Deployment Server, Enterprise Servers, and Development Clients meet the hardware and software requirements.

Because the software and hardware requirements change rapidly as manufacturers constantly update their products, requirements are not provided in this documentation. Refer to [Accessing Certifications](#).

Note: Make sure that you have taken and installed the latest Planner Update ESU from the Oracle JD Edwards Update Center. Failing to do so may prevent proper installation of the software. Additionally, a new compiler requirement is added for *Release 9.2*. Before you run the Deployment Server or Platform Pack installer, you should install a Microsoft Visual C++ compiler on any machine on which the installer will be run. The MTRs list supported C++ compilers on Microsoft Windows-based machines. Refer to [Accessing Certifications](#)

Verifying the Disk Space Requirements

The amount of disk space you need for *Release 9.2* software on the Deployment Server and Enterprise Server depends on many variables according to platform and database. For the Deployment Server, all disk space must be available on one drive *except* if you use the Remote Share option. With the Remote Share option, there must be enough room on one

remote share for all the path codes. For Enterprise Server installation, multiple foundations during the install are not supported. There must be enough space on one disk drive for all logic components.

During the install you *cannot* choose to have Printqueue and build areas installed onto another location. Additionally you must have sufficient disk space on either the Enterprise Server or a separate Database Server for the scripts and dump files and the database components. If you are manually running the database scripts, can edit the scripts to put the actual database components (that the scripts create) onto other drives.

After you have completed an installation, you can manually relocate some components of the Enterprise Server on different drives, such as printqueue location, build areas, package location, and BI-Publisher storage. Additionally, when using multiple foundations it is possible to use different drives for each set of JD Edwards EnterpriseOne pathcodes. However, it is important to note that for purposes of the initial installation, having the correct amount of space available, but not on a single drive, is not adequate. Up-to-date disk space requirements are listed in the *Release 9.2 Minimum Technical Requirements*. Refer to *Accessing Certifications*.

Note: While the disk space tables accurately represent the disk space requirements, the actual requirements for an installation will be greater due to the requirement for temporary space.

Overview of the Deployment Server

The Deployment Server for JD Edwards EnterpriseOne must reside on an Intel x86-based computer running Microsoft Windows. The JD Edwards EnterpriseOne software installation and upgrade programs enable you to create and maintain installation plans and deploy *Release 9.2* to the Enterprise Servers and Development Clients.

The Deployment Server installation program is based on the Oracle Universal Installer (OUI). You can use the OUI to install the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Deployment Server fully on a local machine, or you can install the Deployment Client portion on a local machine and the Deployment Server portion on a remote machine.

This installation includes attaching and importing the Planner tables into the local database on the Deployment Server.

For Release 9.2, only the Oracle Enterprise Edition (OEE) database is supported as the local database on the Deployment Server.

Note: The Deployment Server requires the Microsoft Visual Studio 2013 Run Time. Refer to the section of this guide entitled: [Working with Microsoft Windows Visual Studio and Windows SDK](#).

A local Oracle database must exist before you can run the OUI-based Deployment Server installer. The JD Edwards program called InstallManager is used to start the installation of the local Oracle database.

No separate end-user licensing is required for installation of the local Oracle database. It should be noted, however, that the installed Oracle database is not fully functional relative to the commercial versions of the Oracle databases that are available.

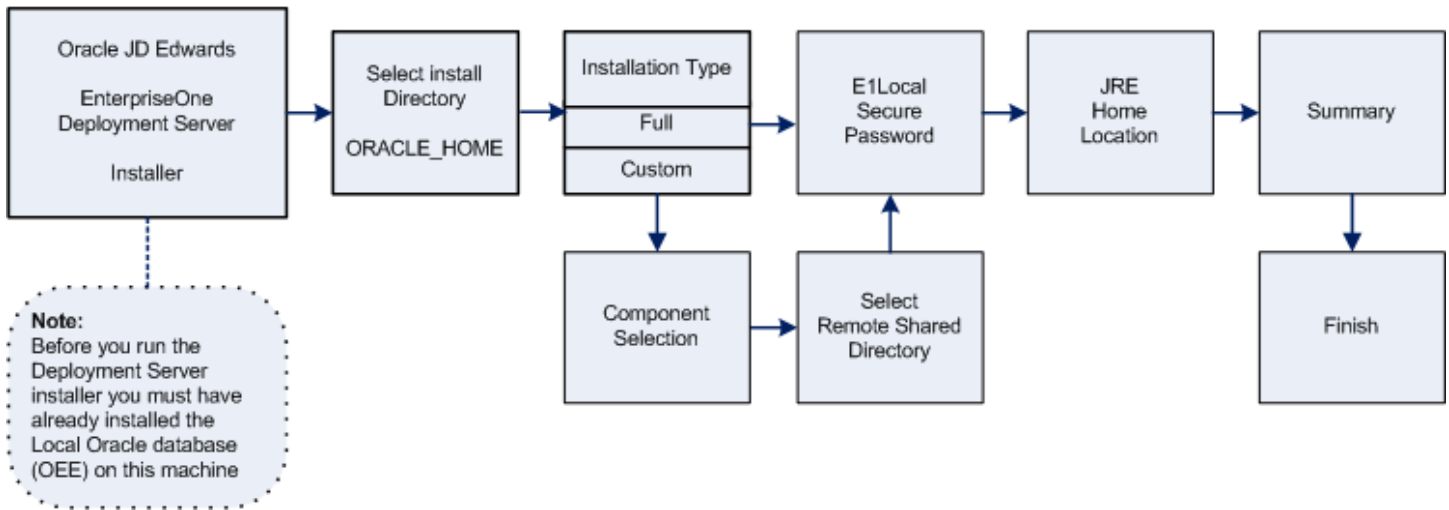
If you are planning on using an existing machine with an existing installation of JD Edwards EnterpriseOne, it is recommended that you use SnapShot to preserve your existing release environment. Refer to the **Caution** in the section of this chapter entitled: [Prerequisites](#).

Understanding Destination Paths

Each Oracle product that is installed on a machine has what is termed an **Oracle Home** directory or path. This is a directory that contains all the files associated with the product. This path has a name as well. You can specify a name that is intuitive so you do not have to remember the path.

When you install the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Deployment Server, you specify an **Oracle Home** and name for that installation as well. For example, you may enter `c:\JDEdwards\E920` as the Oracle Home path and **JDE DEP920_HOME** as the Oracle Home name. Following this example, your **Oracle Home** on the Deployment Server would be:

Local Oracle Database Considerations

The Deployment Server installer includes the Oracle 12c database for local use by the Deployment Server. The installation includes GUI tools for database administration.

CAUTION: Because the Deployment Server installer must have access to a local Oracle database, you must install the 32-bit database client prior to installing the Deployment Server. Refer to the section of this chapter entitled: *Installing a 32-Bit Oracle Database Client*.

EnterpriseOne Oracle Database Import/Export Application P96717

Best practices in *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* environments are to never directly modify an EnterpriseOne database outside of EnterpriseOne. You should always use the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne application P96717 to perform the following Oracle database actions:

- Import Tablespace
- Export Tablespace
- Create Tablespace
- Drop Tablespace

Best Practices for Oracle Database Performance

You should always verify that your Deployment Server machine meets the MTRs (refer to *Accessing Certifications*). The local Oracle database performs best on hard drives that are not fragmented or full. Additionally, the following table lists some guidelines for minimum configurations.

Local Database Name	<p>Ensure that any reference in data sources and .ini files refer to the local database name in the <i>exact</i> mixed case, which is:</p> <p>E1Local</p> <p>Failure to use the exact mixed case will lead to decreased performance of <i>JD Edwards EnterpriseOne</i> on the Deployment Server.</p>

Installing the Local Oracle Database on the Deployment Server

If you have not already installed the database engine and a database called **E1Local** does not exist on your Deployment Server, use the procedures in this section to install these requisite components before installing the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Deployment Server. If the local database engine is already installed and an **E1Local** database exists, do not reinstall the database engine; go to the section entitled: *Understanding the Deployment Server Installer*.

If you want to install the local database under the default location (that is, `c:\oracle`), and the default Oracle Home Name (that is, **E1Local**), you can run `InstallManager` to do so. Refer to *Using InstallManager to Install a Local Database*.

If you want to install into another directory or define a different Oracle Home Name, you must run the database installation program `OEE12Setup.exe` from a command prompt and provide one or more arguments. Refer to *Running OEE12Setup.exe from the Command Line*.

This section discusses these topics:

Oracle Database 12c Considerations

Starting with Oracle Database 12c, Oracle supports the use of an Oracle Home User who will own the install of the database. This user must **not** have Administrator (admin) rights. Note that in this context, the user is the local Microsoft Windows user, not a database user.

This section discusses these topics:

- *Manually Creating Oracle Home User*

Prerequisites to Running the OEE12Setup.exe Program

The `oee12setup.exe` program is used to install the local Oracle database. This program is called from the InstallManager program when you click on this link:

EnterpriseOne Database Engine

Optionally you can also manually launch the `oee12setup.exe` program to perform optional functions. In either case (InstallManager or manually), prior to running the `oee12setup.exe` program, ensure that this Microsoft Windows System Variable either does not exist, or if it does that it points to a valid JDK:

JAVA_HOME

Otherwise, the `oee12setup.exe` program will fail to execute and return an error stating the JDK is invalid.

Note: For instructions on launching InstallManager to install the local Oracle database with default parameters, refer to the section of this chapter entitled: *Using InstallManager to Install a Local Database*. For instructions on manually launching the `oee12setup.exe` program to install the local Oracle database with optional parameters, refer to the section of this chapter entitled: *Running OEE12Setup.exe from the Command Line*.

Specifying the Oracle Home User and Oracle Base Directory

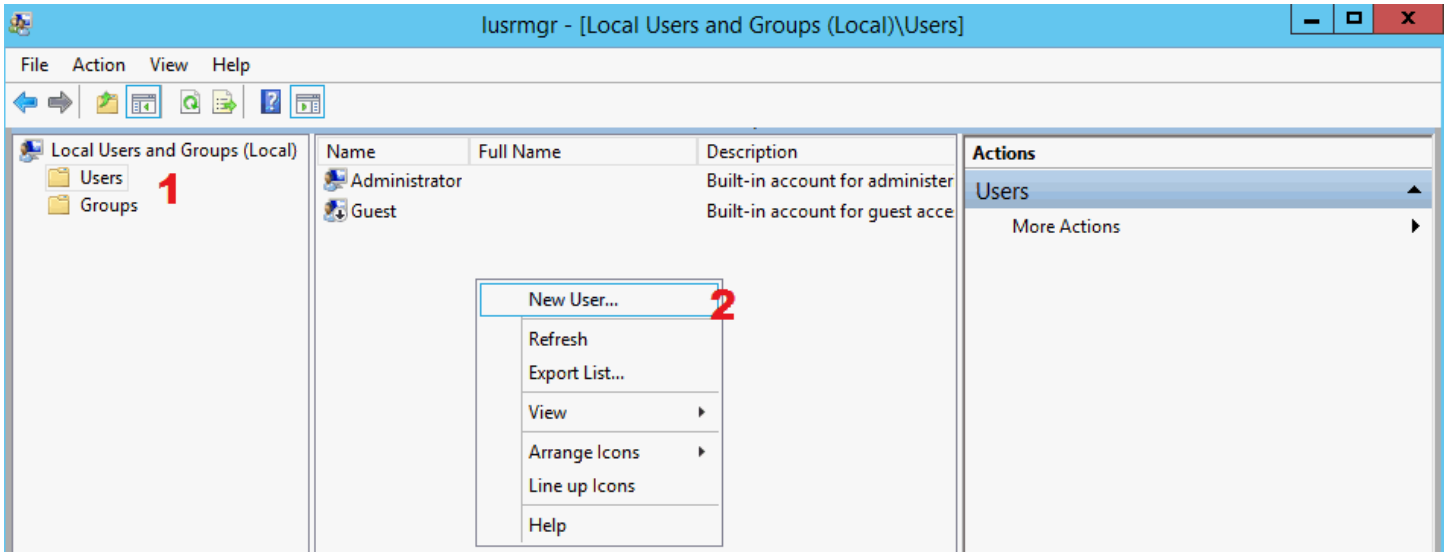
When you launch the `oee12setup.exe` program with no switches (this is the default operation when launched from the link on InstallManager) an `oee12setup.exe` GUI is displayed prompting for Oracle Home User login and Oracle Base Directory information. This data entry GUI is also displayed when `oee12setup.exe` is run certain combinations of command line switches as described in the following section entitled: *Running OEE12Setup.exe from the Command Line*.

Manually Creating Oracle Home User

If you cannot use the `oee12setup.exe` program to create the Oracle Home User, you can create the user manually using the steps described in this section.

To create a Microsoft Windows user, launch **Local Users and Groups** management console using this navigation:

Control Panel > Administrative Tools > Computer Management > System Tools > Local Users and Groups



1. On Local Users and Groups (Local)\Users, in the left pane, select **Users**.

2. Right click and select **New User**.

- o *User name:*
Enter a name for the user. For example, **e1dbuser**.

4. Click the **Create** button.

Using InstallManager to Install a Local Database

1. Obtain the appropriate disk images from Oracle Software Delivery Cloud for the local database you wish to install on your Deployment Server.

2. Log on to the Deployment Server as a user with Administrator rights.

CAUTION: Ensure that the Administrator account name that you use does not contain any special characters.

3. If you have not already done so, expand all disk images to be under a common directory called Disk1 on your Deployment Server.

Tip: Refer to the preceding *Tip: Installation Methods* for a list of various installation methods.

CAUTION: For Microsoft Windows, if you are using a physical DVD and the installation starts automatically, you must cancel this process and start the installation manually.

4. Right-click on the `InstallManager.exe` program (either in Disk1 or on your Deployment Server) and select **Run as Administrator**.

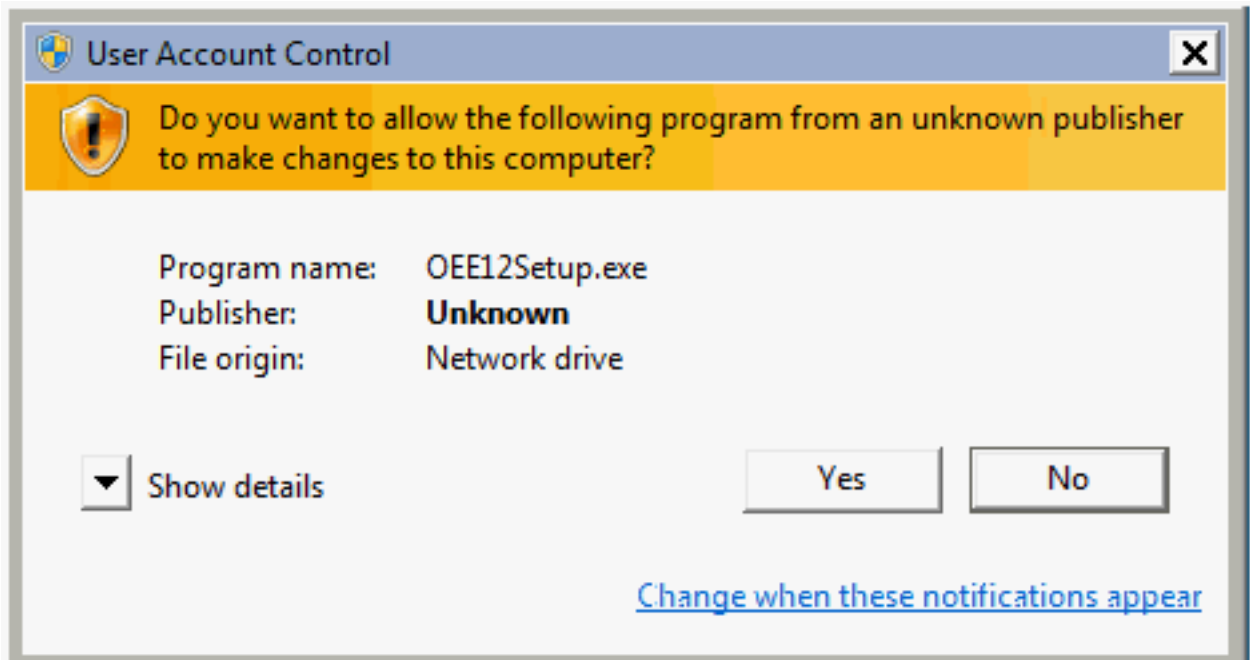
CAUTION: For Microsoft Windows, you must right-click on the executable and select **Run as Administrator** from the drop-down. Likewise, if you have a shortcut assigned to `InstallManager.exe`, you must either configure the shortcut to always run as administrator or right-click the shortcut and choose **Run as Administrator**.



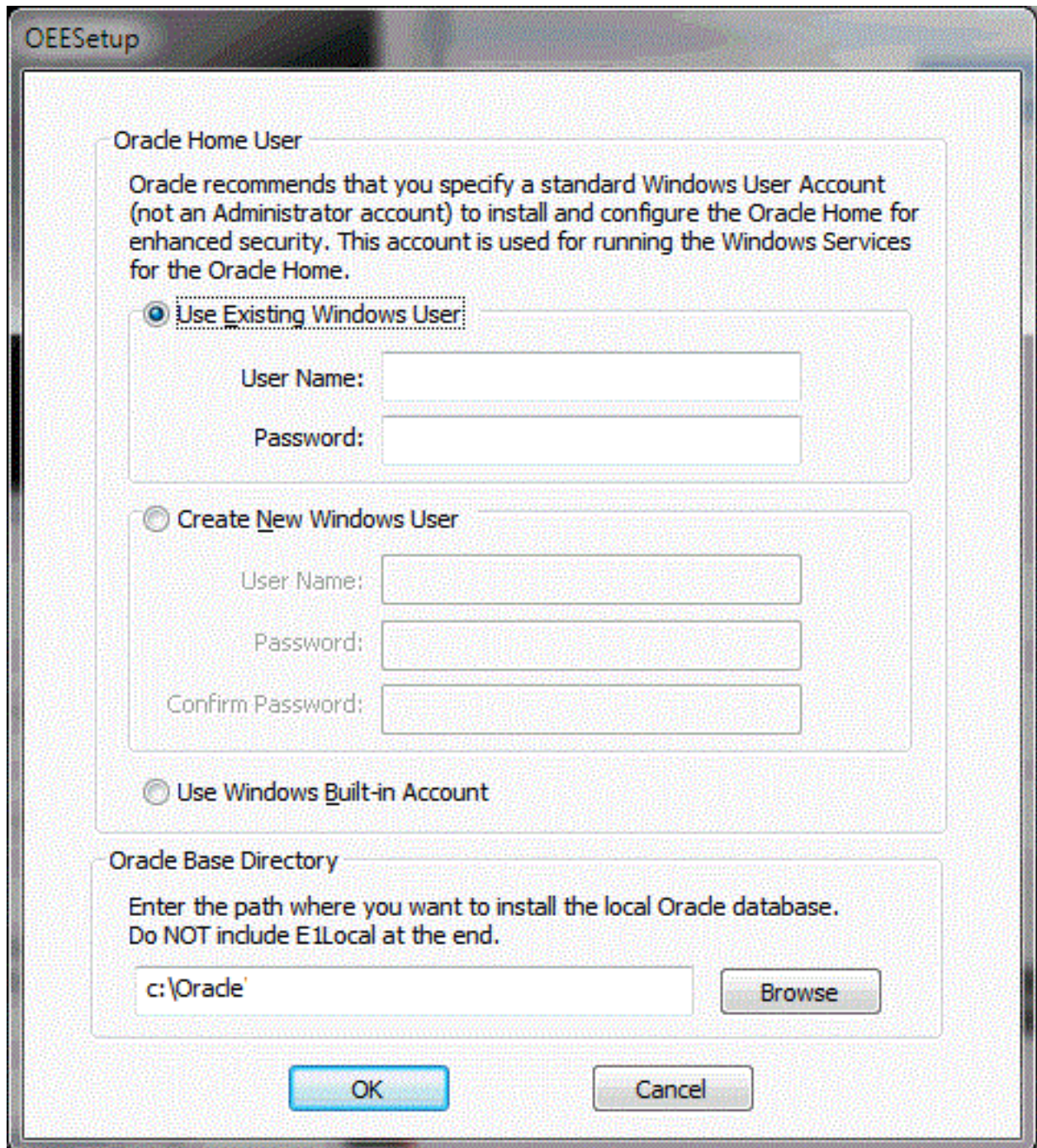
5. On JD Edwards Install Manager, select this link to install the local Oracle database:

[EnterpriseOne Database Engine](#)

Tip: If you received an error indicating an invalid JDK, refer to section entitled: *Prerequisites to Running the OEE12Setup.exe Program* at the beginning of this section.



6. On User Account Control, click the **Yes** button to launch the `oee12setup.exe` installer.



7. On OEESetup, in the Oracle Home User section, you must select an Oracle Home User. For security purposes, Oracle recommends that you specify a standard (that is, non-Administrator) Windows User Account. The

`oEE12Setup.exe` program will not allow you to specify an account that has Administrator privileges. Valid choices are:

- o **Use existing Windows User**

Choose this option if you want to use an existing account for a Windows user. This user must not have Administrator privileges. You must specify a valid **User Name** and associated **Password** for the user.

For instructions on how to manually create an Oracle Home User, refer to the section entitled: *Manually Creating Oracle Home User*.

- o **Create New Windows User**

Choose this option if you want `oEE12Setup.exe` to create an account for a Windows user without Administrator privileges. You must specify a valid **User Name** and associated **Password** and **Confirm Password** for the user.

Note: OEESetup Fails to Create the User. If the `oEE12Setup.exe` program fails to create the user it might be because the password does not meet the password complexity policy requirements of your computer. You can try again with a more complex password, or exit. If you are unable to create the user using the `oEE12Setup.exe` interface, you should try to create it manually and rerun `oEE12Setup.exe`. Refer to the next section entitled: *Manually Creating Oracle Home User*.

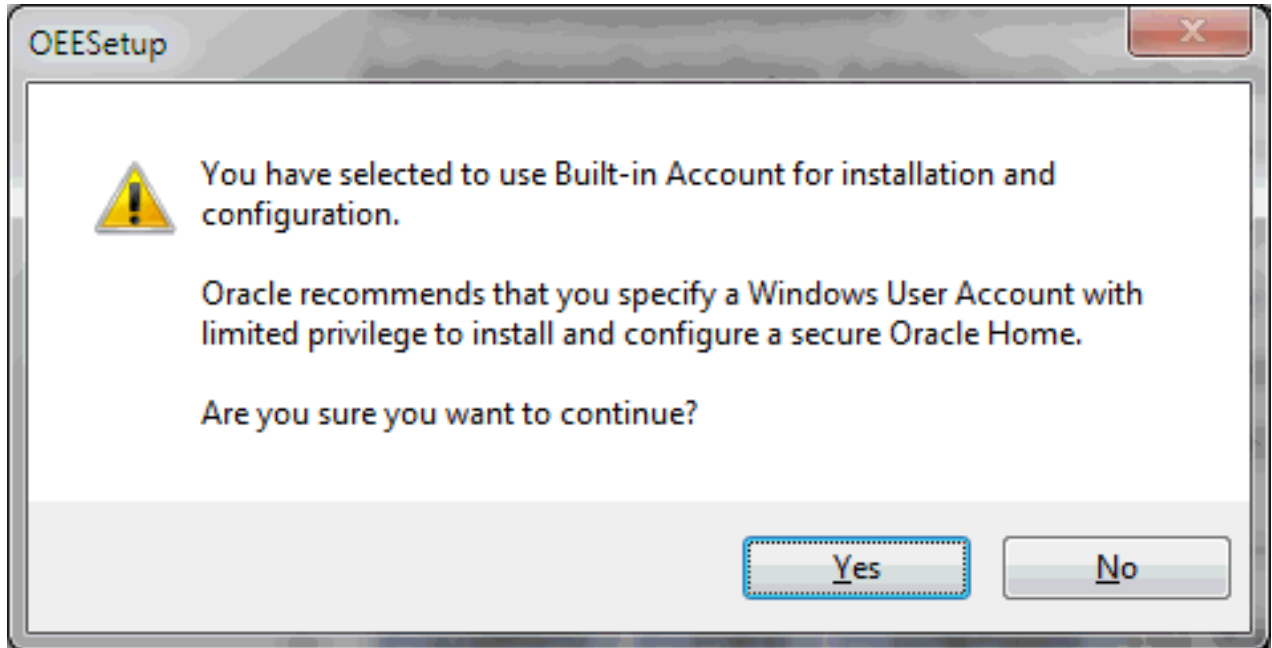
Tip: Password Complexity Policy. The Administrator user of the Microsoft Windows machine determines the password complexity policy for each machine. Additionally, such policies vary according to the server or client version of Microsoft Windows. The `oEE12Setup.exe` program cannot programmatically determine and return these policy requirements. Therefore it is beyond the scope of this documentation to guide the end user to determine the exact policy requirements for user names and their associated passwords.

- o **Use Windows Built-in Account**

This selection is equivalent to legacy JD Edwards EnterpriseOne functionality for releases prior to Tools Release 9.2.

CAUTION: For strongest security, Oracle recommends that you do not use the Windows built-in user account. To provide optimal security, you should install and configure with a Windows User Account with limited privileges. For additional details on the Oracle policy regarding **Supporting Oracle Home User on Windows**, refer to this link: http://docs.oracle.com/database/121/NTQRF/oh_usr.htm

If you choose this selection, you are presented with the following dialog where you must confirm that you understand the security impact of this selection.



Click the **Yes** button to confirm and continue, or the **No** button to exit the `oEE12Setup.exe` program.

8. On OEESetup, in the Oracle Base Directory section, enter the path where you want to install the local Oracle database. You can accept the default location or specify a location. If you accept the default location (which is `c:\oracle`), some auxiliary files are installed in that location while the local Oracle database itself is installed in the following location:

`c:\oracle\E1Local`

CAUTION: Do **not** install the Oracle Database 12c into an existing Oracle Base directory. For example, do **not** install into this directory if it already exists: `c:\oracle`. If you attempt to install to an existing Oracle directory, the `oEE12Setup.exe` installer will likely fail. Later releases of this installer may be able to programmatically resolve this issue.

CAUTION: Do not include the string `E1Local` in the path. For example, if you specified `c:\oracle\E1Local` as the base install path, the local Oracle database would be installed in this location: `c:\oracle\E1Local\E1Local`. Such an installation would not be functional with JD Edwards EnterpriseOne.

9. On OEESetup, click the **OK** button to accept the selected values. If the values are valid the `oEE12Setup.exe` program proceeds to install the local Oracle database.

CAUTION: Do not install into an existing Oracle Base directory at this time, for example, `c:\oracle`. (This base directory is the parent of the **E1Local** directory which actually contains the database.) Select a new base directory for the installation (for example, `c:\oracle2`) if `c:\oracle` already exists. If you attempt to install to an existing Oracle directory, the OEE installer will probably fail until the installer is corrected in a later release of the database.

CAUTION: You must reboot your machine before continuing with the installation of the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Deployment Server as described in the section in this guide entitled: *Understanding the Deployment Server Installer*.

Running OEE12Setup.exe from the Command Line

This section describes the command line arguments for `OEE12Setup.exe` that can be used to set these default parameters to install the local Oracle database:

- Oracle Base Directory
- System password
- Use the Microsoft Windows built-in user account to install

Depending on which switch or combination of switches are used, running `OEE12Setup.exe` from the command line will prompt for additional user input by displaying the `OEE12Setup.exe` GUI. The following command line scenarios will cause the `OEE12Setup.exe` to display the GUI:

- The Windows built-in account is specified and the Oracle Base Directory is specified but is invalid or empty. The GUI prompts for a valid install directory.
- The Windows built-in account is not specified and the Oracle Base Directory is not specified, invalid, or empty. The GUI prompts for the Oracle Home User and/or the Oracle Base Directory as necessary.

There are two scenarios in which the install is silent (that is, the `OEE12Setup.exe` GUI is not displayed):

1. The only switch specified is to use the Windows built-in account. In this case the default installation directory is assumed, which is `c:\Oracle`.
2. The switch to use the Windows built-in account is used in combination with the switch and valid argument that specifies a valid Oracle Base Directory.

Locating and Running the OEE12Setup.exe Program from the Command Line

1. If you downloaded the `OEE12Setup.exe` installer and have not already done so, expand all disk images to be under a common directory called `Disk1` on your Deployment Server. If you are using the `OEE12Setup.exe` installer provided by your EnterpriseOne administrator, determine where the installer's directory is located.

Tip: Refer to the preceding *Tip: Installation Methods* for a list of various installation methods.

CAUTION: You cannot run `OEE12Setup.exe` if you are logged in as an Administrator. For optimal security, you should install and configure with a Windows User Account with limited privileges. For additional details on the Oracle policy regarding **Supporting Oracle Home User on Windows**, refer to this link: http://docs.oracle.com/database/121/NTQRF/oh_usr.htm

2. Open a command prompt window.
3. From within the command prompt window, change directory (`cd`) to the directory that contains the extracted contents of the `OEE12Setup.exe` installer. For example:

```
\\DeploymentServer\OneWorld Client Install\ThirdParty\ORACLE
```

CAUTION: Be sure you use the correct set of files for the Oracle 12c local database as described below. The OEE installer for OEE 11g was called `OEESetup.exe` and was accompanied by 15 "cab" files named `E1Local1.cab` through `E1Local15.cab`. The OEE installer for OEE 12c is called `OEE12Setup.exe` and has 20 "cab" files called `E1Local12c.cab` through `E1Local12c20.cab`.

Use an OEE12Setup.exe Command Line Switch to Change the Default Installation Directory

Run the `OEE12Setup.exe` program with the `-i` switch to specify the installation directory. The syntax is:

```
OEE12Setup.exe -i<OracleBaseInstallPath>
```

where the `-i` switch tells `OEE12Setup.exe` where to install the local database **E1Local**.

For example:

```
OEE12Setup.exe -ix:\oracle\JDE
```

where "x" is the drive letter. Do not include a space character between the switch and the argument.

If both this switch and the `OracleBaseInstallPath` argument are omitted, the local database will be installed under the default location. If you specify the `-i` switch without the `OracleBaseInstallPath` argument or if the specified directory is invalid, the `OEE12Setup.exe` GUI displays and prompts for this value.

Tip: Do not include `E1Local` as part of this path.

Tip: If you received an error indicating an invalid JDK, refer to section entitled: *Prerequisites to Running the OEE12Setup.exe Program* at the beginning of this section.

Use an OEE12Setup.exe Command Line Switch to Set the System Password

Run the `OEE12Setup.exe` program with the `-p` switch to set the system password. The syntax is:

```
OEE12Setup.exe -p<SystemPassword>
```

where the `-p` switch tells `OEE12Setup.exe` the value to set for the system password.

For example:

```
OEE12Setup.exe -pMyPassword
```

Do not include a space character between the switch and the argument.

If you specify the `-p` switch without the `<SystemPassword>` argument, no operation occurs.

Tip: If you received an error indicating an invalid JDK, refer to section entitled: *Prerequisites to Running the OEE12Setup.exe Program* at the beginning of this section.

Use an OEE12Setup.exe Command Line Switch to Install as the Built-in User

CAUTION: For strongest security, Oracle recommends that you do not use the Windows built-in user account. To provide optimal security, you should install and configure with a Windows User Account with limited privileges. For additional details on the Oracle policy regarding **Supporting Oracle Home User on Windows**, refer to this link:

http://docs.oracle.com/database/121/NTQRF/oh_usr.htm

Run the `OEE12Setup.exe` program with the `-b` switch to install the local Oracle database as the Microsoft Windows built-in user:

```
OEE12Setup.exe -b
```

where the `-b` switch tells `oEE12Setup.exe` the value to install the local Oracle database using the Microsoft Windows built-in account.

Tip: If you received an error indicating an invalid JDK, refer to section entitled: *Prerequisites to Running the OEE12Setup.exe Program* at the beginning of this section.

Installing a 32-Bit Oracle Database Client

You must install a 32-bit version of the Oracle database client and then copy the resulting `tnsnames.ora` file to a subdirectory under the database client installation directory.

Note: 64- vs. 32-bit Oracle database drivers. Because JD Edwards EnterpriseOne is a 32-bit program, it needs to load 32-bit Oracle database driver DLLs; however, you must install a 64-bit Oracle database in the section of this guide entitled: *Installing the Local Oracle Database on the Deployment Server*. Therefore, you also need to install 32-bit Oracle database driver DLLs. These 32-bit DLLs are provided by a 32-bit Oracle database client.

To install a 32-bit Oracle database client:

1. Download the 32-bit Oracle 12c database client from the Oracle Software Delivery Cloud located at this link:

<http://edelivery.oracle.com>

2. Install the database client.

CAUTION: Important Installation Note: When installing Oracle the database client, be sure to select **Administrative** on the **Select Installation Type** screen.

CAUTION: Working with the PATH Environment Variable. Refer to the following step for important instructions on working with the PATH environment variable as it relates to the Oracle database and the Oracle database client.

3. After you installed the Oracle database, the installer placed the path to the database (for example, `c:\oracle\11local\bin`) at the start of the Windows PATH environment variable. Then when you installed the 32-bit

Oracle database client, the installer placed the path to the database client (for example, `c:\oracle\product\12.1.3\client_1\bin`) at the start of the Windows PATH environment variable.

When EnterpriseOne runs, it looks for database drivers in each directory from start to finish in the PATH. The first occurrence of a driver DLL that EnterpriseOne finds will be loaded. This means that the path to the 32-bit Oracle database client must come **BEFORE** the path to the 64-bit Oracle database.

If you followed the recommended installer order and installed the 64-bit database and then the 32-bit database client in that order, the order in the PATH should be correct. However, if you installed them in the opposite order, you need to correct the order in the PATH.

To reverse the order of the 64-bit database and 32-bit database client paths in the Windows PATH, follow these steps:

- a. From the Start button, select Control Panel and then System.
- b. On the left side of the window that comes up, click Advanced system settings.
- c. Click the **Advanced** tab.
- d. Click the **Environment Variables...** button.
- e. In the **System variables** box, highlight the variable path. and click the **Edit...** button.
- f. In the **Variable value** field, cut the 32-bit database client's path including the trailing semicolon. For example:

```
c:\Oracle\product\12.1.3\client_1\bin;
```

- g. Paste the client's path and semicolon at the start of the Path value.
 - h. Click the **OK** button.
 - i. Click the **OK** button to exit from the **Environment Variables** window.
 - j. Click the **OK** button to exit from the **System Properties** window.
 - k. Close the **Control Panel** system window.
4. There is a known issue with the Oracle 12c 32-bit database client programs that import (`impdp.exe`) and export (`expdp.exe`) JD Edwards EnterpriseOne data and spec databases during installation of the Deployment Server. To work around the problem, you can force the system to use the `impdp.exe` and `expdp.exe` in the Oracle 12c 64-bit database `\bin` folder for importing and exporting data. This resolves the issue because the 64-bit version of these files do not exhibit the known issue that is observed with the 32-bit version.

After you install the 32-bit database client, you must either delete or rename these files (so they are not executable) within the `\bin` folder of the 32-bit client:

- o `impdp.exe`
- o `expdp.exe`

For example, you could change the extension on these files (so they are not executable) using these commands:

```
cd <32-bit_db_client_install_dir>\bin
rename impdp.exe impdp.exe.bak
rename expdp.exe expdp.exe.bak
```

5. After you install the Deployment Server, you can copy this `tnsnames.ora` file that the installation delivered:

From:

```
\\<deployment server name>\<release>\client
```

To:

```
<32-bit Oracle Client Install Dir>\network\admin
```

Working with Microsoft Windows Visual Studio and Windows SDK

As with previous releases of JD Edwards EnterpriseOne, you must install specific versions of the Microsoft Visual Studio runtime libraries or the Visual Studio product itself before you can run the installer for the Deployment Server. Visual Studio runtime libraries provide the support files for C and C++ based programs to run. The Visual Studio product includes these runtime libraries as well as a compiler and linker which can be used to build JD Edwards EnterpriseOne installable packages.

JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Tools (foundation) and Applications (business functions) are built with different releases of Visual Studio; hence, they each require specific installations of the Visual Studio runtime libraries or product.

- As of the GA release of JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Tools Release 9.2, the required version of Visual Studio runtime libraries is 2010. (The full licensable Visual Studio product is not needed for the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Tools Release because customers do not rebuild this JD Edwards EnterpriseOne component.)
- As of the GA release of JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Applications Release 9.2, the required version of Visual Studio runtime libraries and product is 2013.

Tip: The net of this discussion is that for a typical Deployment Server installation, both versions of Visual Studio runtime are required at a minimum (VS/2010 and VS/2013). Further, if package builds will occur on the Deployment Server then the full licensable product version of Visual Studio and, if required, the freely-available Windows SDK as specified in Oracle Certify for the applicable EnterpriseOne Applications Release are also required.

You should check Oracle Certifications for the most current specifications for supported releases of Visual Studio for your Tools Release and Applications Release. Refer to [Accessing Certifications](#) in this guide.

The Visual Studio runtime libraries (which are partial products with no development tools) for each supported release of Visual Studio are freely available from the Microsoft Download Center. The complete Visual Studio product (which includes the runtime and the compiler and associated tools) must be purchased and licensed from Microsoft.

Note: Only 32-bit versions of Visual Studio runtime libraries are supported for use with JD Edwards EnterpriseOne. Note these Microsoft product attributes:

- The Microsoft Download Center designates 32-bit versions of software with the term **x86**.
- The Visual Studio product comes with both 32- and 64-bit versions of the runtime libraries.
- When searching the Microsoft Download Center for a particular product, you may need to use these search terms: **Visual Studio** or **Visual C++**.

As of the GA of Tools and Applications Release 9.2 these versions and their associated links and navigation are valid:

Visual Studio 2010 Redistributable

Tip: Some Microsoft Windows systems may already have Visual Studio installed, either manually or by some other Microsoft product installation. Users can determine if this version already exists in Control Panel > Programs and Features > Microsoft Visual C++ 2010 x86 Redistributable.

Microsoft Windows Internet Protocol Version 4 (IPv4)

The JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Deployment Server requires Microsoft Windows Internet Protocol Version 4 (IPv4) for connectivity. It cannot function using IPv6.

If your Deployment Server is not working as expected, use this procedure to determine if the problem is due to your Windows machine using IPv6 and if so, to remedy:

1. After installing the local Oracle database, use a text editor to open the `log.xml` file which is typically located in this directory

`C:\Oracle\diag\tnslsnr\[MACHINE NAME]\listener>alert\.`

2. Examine the contents of the `log.xml` file for indicators that the machine is using IPv6 addresses.

IPv6 addresses can be distinguished by alphanumeric digits separated by colons, rather than periods as in IPv4 addresses.

One example is if you see `host_addr='::1'>`. This indicates an IPv6 address, which in this case is the machine's local loopback address, whose equivalent IPv4 address is 127.0.0.1.

Another example that indicates the use of IPv6 is if this string exists:

```
host_addr='fe80::7045:1aba:cb6d:1b50%13'
```

3. If you see references to IPv6 addresses in the logs after installing the Oracle local database, then you may need to deinstall the Deployment Server and Oracle database as described in the chapter of this guide entitled: *Uninstalling the Local OEE from the Deployment Server*.

Also, you may possibly need to perform additional cleanup for the Oracle Database as described in the section of this guide entitled: *Manual Cleanup of a Uninstalled Oracle Database on the Deployment Server*.

4. After the deinstall and cleanup is complete, you must apply a software patch from Microsoft to disable IPv6 before reinstalling the Oracle local database and EnterpriseOne Standalone or Web Development Client. The Microsoft patch for disabling IPv6 is at the following link:

On the above Microsoft web page, click the link labeled **Disable IPv6** (Microsoft Fix it 50409).

5. After you apply the Microsoft patch to disable IPv6, you can reinstall the Oracle database and EnterpriseOne Standalone Client using the procedures in this guide.

MICROSOFT DISCLAIMER ON DISABLING IPV6

Important: Internet Protocol version 6 (IPv6) is a mandatory part of Windows Vista and later versions. We do not recommend that you disable IPv6 or its components, or some Windows components may not function. For more information, see the "What are Microsoft's recommendations about disabling IPv6?" question in IPv6 for Microsoft Windows: Frequently Asked Questions at this link:

Install the Java Runtime Engine (JRE)

Beginning with Tools Release 9.2, you must have a 32-bit JRE installed prior to running the Deployment Server installation program. The installer prompts you for the location of the preinstalled JRE. It programmatically verifies that the JRE is a 32-bit version. The installer then copies that JRE from the specified location to a location expected by JD Edwards EnterpriseOne runtime processes. Refer to Oracle Certifications for supported JRE versions.

Working with JDBC Drivers on the Deployment Server

The Deployment Server requires database-specific JDBC drivers for several purposes as described below. This section describes:

- *Obtaining the JDBC Drivers*

- *Copying the JDBC Drivers to the Deployment Server*

Obtaining the JDBC Drivers

Based on the database being used on your JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Enterprise Server, you should obtain the required java-based JDBC driver files from your database vendor. Access the current Minimum Technical Requirement (MTR) listing from My Oracle Support for the proper JDBC driver files to obtain. For help with locating MTRs, refer to *Accessing Certifications*. Place the driver files in the location specified in the section of this guide entitled: *Copying the JDBC Drivers to the Deployment Server*.

In addition, for JD Edwards EnterpriseOne *Release 9.2*, all installations of the Oracle database on the Deployment Server require a driver for local database connectivity on the Deployment Server (required to build and deploy ESUs) and to perform installations of the Development Client). You can locate the Oracle database driver in these locations:

- Oracle Enterprise Edition Database (on your *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* Enterprise or Database Server)

Your installation of an Oracle 12c database product includes the Oracle JDBC driver(s). Typically the driver is located in this directory of your Oracle 12c installation:

```
\jdbc\lib
```

- Oracle Technology Network (OTN)

<http://www.oracle.com/technetwork/indexes/downloads/index.html>

You cannot have multiple Oracle JDBC driver files (such as `ojdbc.jar`, `ojdbc5.jar` and `ojdbc7.jar`) in the same folder (`\misc`) or else the drivers will conflict, which will cause access failure to the Oracle database on your Enterprise Server. The Oracle JDBC driver (for example, `ojdbc7.jar`) is added to the `\misc` folder by the Deployment Server installer.

Note: You must manually copy the driver files from the installed location to the location specified in the section of this guide entitled: *Copying the JDBC Drivers to the Deployment Server*.

Copying the JDBC Drivers to the Deployment Server

CAUTION: This step must be done before starting the installer, as one of its first steps the installer attempts to load all jar files needed for the process.

After you have obtained the JDBC driver(s) from the database vendor(s), you should copy the driver file(s) (and, if applicable, any associated license files) in this directory on the Deployment Server:

```
x:\DepSvr\Disk1\DeploymentServer\Misc
```

where "x" is a drive name, and

where "DepSvr" is the name of your Deployment Server, and

where `\DepSvr\Disk1\DeploymentServer\Misc` contains the Deployment Server install image.

You must supply this directory location and name when you run the Deployment Server Installer.

Install the Deployment Server using the Oracle Universal Installer (OUI)

This section describes these topics:

- *Obtaining and Preparing the Deployment Server Install Image*
- *Prerequisites*
- *Working With the OUI Installer to Install the Deployment Server*

Obtaining and Preparing the Deployment Server Install Image

You install the Deployment Server Install image from DVD images obtained from the Oracle e-delivery web site:

<http://edelivery.oracle.com>

To install from images downloaded from the Oracle e-delivery web site:

1. Create a parent download directory on a disk with at least 15 GB free space. For example:

```
c:\DepSvr\Disk1
```

2. Download the source DVD images for the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Deployment Server into the directory you created in Step 1.
3. You must use either the 7-Zip or WinZip program to unzip each of the DVD images into the directory you created in Step 1 (to verify successful extraction see **Caution** below).

Note: During the extraction if you receive a message indicating that `..\META-INF\MANIFEST\MF` already exists, at the prompt you can choose either Ignore or Replace.

CAUTION: You cannot use the built-in Microsoft Windows Explorer functionality to extract the zip files otherwise the result is an incomplete install image. You **must** use WinZip or 7Zip. To verify a successful extraction, check the file size of `SPEC_MASTER.DBF`. This file should be 1.75 GB.

After unzipping all DVD images, you should have a structure that looks like this:

```
c:\DepSvr\Disk1\  
    DeploymentServer\  
    Install\  
    META-INF\  
    Misc\  
    stage\  
    InstallManager.exe  
    InstallManager.htm  
    InstallManager.ico  
    ONEWORLD.ICO  
    OracleLogo.gif
```

README.TXT

CAUTION: The directories contained on the Disk2, Disk3, Disk4, Disk5, and Disk6 images are all at the same hierarchal level as the `\Disk1\DeploymentServer` directory. When your unzip operation is complete, all the files must be in the same structure as the `\Disk1\DeploymentServer` directory. You should not have either a Disk2, Disk3, Disk4, Disk5, or Disk6 directory.

Prerequisites

Before you run the OUI Deployment Server installer, shut down all programs running on the Deployment Server that could cause DLL conflicts (such as Microsoft SQL Services, Internet Explorer, Microsoft Word, or Adobe Acrobat). You can restart these programs after you finish installing the Deployment Server.

CAUTION: If you are planning on using the same Deployment Server machine for multiple releases of JD Edwards EnterpriseOne, and you already have a release previous to Applications Release 9.2 installed on the machine, you should use SnapShot prior to installing the Applications Release 9.2 on the Deployment Server. The SnapShot program is a JD Edwards utility and its use is documented in the guide entitled: *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Development Client Installation Guide for Oracle WebLogic Server (WLS) and WebSphere Application Server (WAS) Express*. While only a single instance of an Applications release can be "active" on a Deployment Server at one time, by using SnapShot you can preserve and switch between complete configurations for various releases of JD Edwards EnterpriseOne. An example of one use for this functionality is if you need to apply an ESU to a previous Applications Release of JD Edwards EnterpriseOne. SnapShot preserves the directory structure that supports the various pathcodes, which may or may not be installed:

```
Z:\JDEdwards\E920
    \PLANNER (9.2 objects, JDEPLAN920 etc)
    \DV920
    \PD920
\E910
    \PLANNER (9.1 objects, JDEPLAN910 etc)
    \DV910
```

Working With the OUI Installer to Install the Deployment Server

This section describes these tasks:

- *Understanding the Deployment Server Installer*
- *Understanding EnterpriseOne Files Location*
- *Before Launching the Deployment Server Installer*
- *Running the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Deployment Server Installer*
- *Updating the Enterprise Server Port Number in the jas.ini File*
- *Examine the Local Database Installer Logs*

Understanding the Deployment Server Installer

A local Oracle (OEE) database engine and a database called E1Local must already exist on this machine. If not, use the procedures in the preceding section entitled: *Installing the Local Oracle Database on the Deployment Server*.

Tip: Installation Methods

You can install the Deployment Server using any of these methods:

- Directly from the Deployment Server installation DVD.
- From a copy of the Deployment Server installation DVD that exists on a hard disk drive.
- From a downloaded and unzipped image of the installation DVD that was obtained from the Oracle E-Delivery web site.

CAUTION: Microsoft Windows 2012. If you are running the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* Deployment Server on a Microsoft Windows 2012 platform, you must be signed onto the machine as administrator. Additionally you must run all *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* installers and processes **'as Administrator'**. Due to the security model on Microsoft Windows 2012, failure to run the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* processes **'as Administrator'** will likely result in random and unpredictable failures in the processes at run time.

CAUTION: Remote Desktop. If you are using Remote Desktop to connect to the Deployment Server, you must use the `/admin` argument to launch Remote Desktop. For example: `c:\WINDOWS\system32\mstsc.exe /F /admin`. If you do not run Remote Desktop with the `/admin` argument, Microsoft Windows blocks several important installer functions although Microsoft Windows reports success to the installer. For example, some registry entries will be missing and the Share for the Deployment Server will not be correctly created.

The Oracle Universal Installer (OUI) process creates temporary files during the install. By default these are placed on the c: drive of your Windows-based Deployment Server. You may need a sizable amount of free space on your c: drive in order to complete the installation successfully.

Microsoft Windows 2012

For Microsoft Windows 2012, pay special attention to the various **Cautions** in the steps in this chapter.

This table lists the mandatory and optional components of the Deployment Server installation.

Server	Mandatory Component	Optional Components
Deployment Server	Deployment Client EnterpriseOne Files	Development environment Prototype environment Pristine environment Production environment

The installation process for the Deployment Server performs these functions:

- Installs the objects from the DVD images.
- Creates the path code directory structures (such as *PS920* and *PD920*) based on your selections.
- Updates the Microsoft Windows Registry.

Note: You can run the Deployment Server and the Platform Pack installation concurrently (assuming the installation programs are run on different machines).

After verifying the support structure as shown in the section of this guide entitled: *Obtaining and Preparing the Deployment Server Install Image*, you can install the Deployment Server. This process installs the Deployment Server from DVD images.

Note: You must install the Deployment Server locally; you cannot install the Deployment Server from a remote machine. However, you can choose to install JD Edwards EnterpriseOne files and environments on a remote machine using a mapped drive. Prior to installing to a remote machine, you must have already setup the drive with network mapping.

Understanding EnterpriseOne Files Location

The software component called *EnterpriseOne Files* is a pre-defined grouping of files that can be installed on your local machine or a mapped network drive. It includes EnterpriseOne system files and pathcodes for these four (4) environments:

- Development
- Prototype
- Pristine
- Production

By default the installer assumes the local machine is the Deployment Server. As such it provides a default value for your *Oracle Home* path.

You cannot change this local path value after the installation is complete; it must remain whatever value you specified at the time of installation.

Optionally you can choose to install EnterpriseOne (E1) Files to a remote machine as the Deployment Server. If you do so, the installer creates a unique "planner client" on the local machine that contains only the Planner pathcode. You should only set up one "planner client" machine to do the Deployment Server jobs such as applying software updates, running installation plan, and so on.

Using a Remote Machine as the Deployment Server

If you intend to use a remote machine as the Deployment Server, prior to running the Deployment Server installer you must first map a network drive using this procedure:

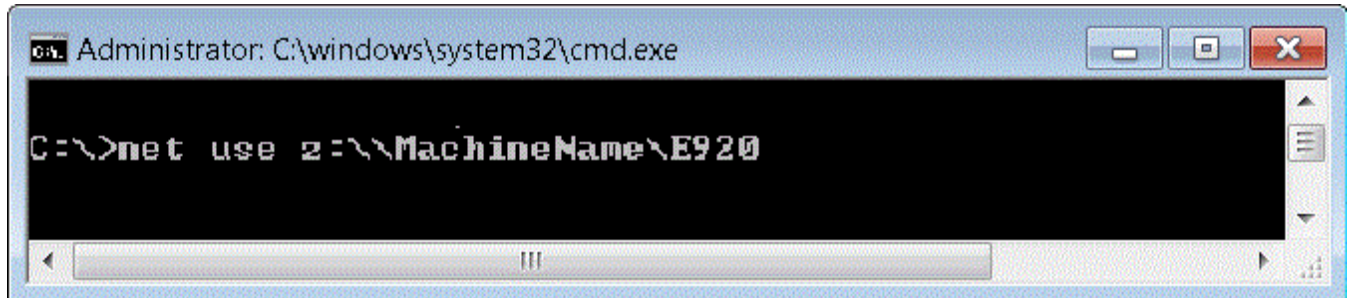
1. On the remote Deployment Server, create a folder as the target location in which the installer will place the EnterpriseOne (E1) files. For example:

```
E:\JDEwards\E920
```

2. Using the example above, share the target folder `E920` with full permissions.

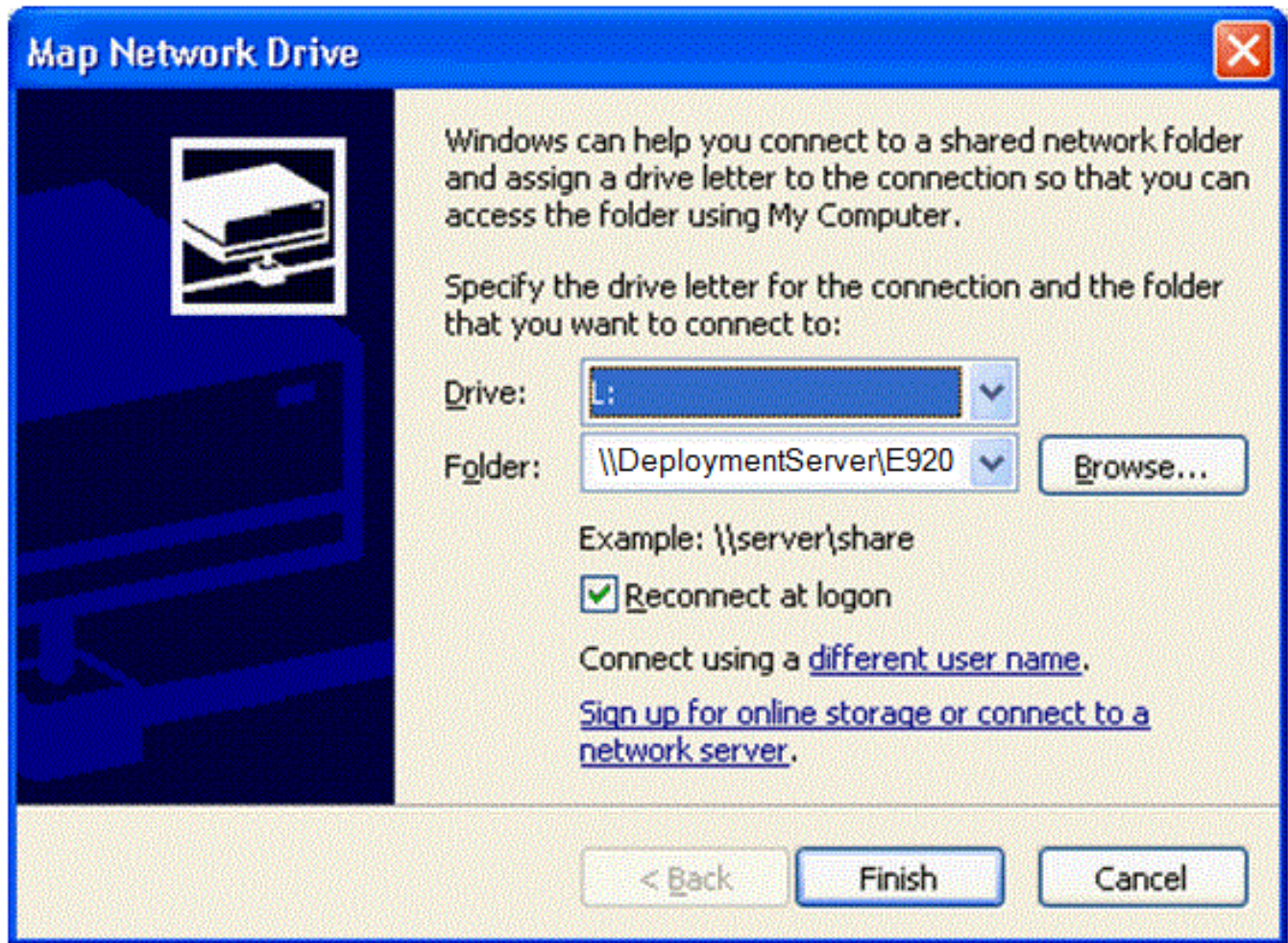
- CAUTION:** Because the Deployment Server installer must be run as an Administrator, you must also map a network drive as an Administrator.

Start a Command Prompt as Administrator and map a network drive on the local machine to the remote Deployment Server machine. For example, map `z:\` to `\\Remote_Deployment_Server_Machine_name\E920`



- Tip:** You can verify that the drive is being mapped as an Administrator by confirming that **Administrator:** is displayed in the title bar of the Command Prompt window.

The below screen shows a sample of a properly mapped network drive for the remote Deployment Server:



Note: In a later separate process described in *Running the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Deployment Server Installer*, when you are prompted by the installer for the location of the remote Deployment Server, in the location field you can browse to or enter the mapped drive including the drive letter designation. Using the example described previously in this step, the value would be the z: drive. Using the above screen shot as an example, the value would be the L: drive. The same installer validates the location that you enter for the remote location. If the mapping to the remote location is not valid or the directory specified in Step 1 above does not exist on the remote machine, the installer will not continue.

Note: The installer validates the location. If the mapping to the remote location is not valid the installer cannot continue. Likewise the directory specified in Step 1 must exist on the remote machine or else the installer cannot continue.

Before Launching the Deployment Server Installer

Before you launch the Deployment Server installer, you should obtain the JDBC drivers for the Enterprise Server database and also for your local Oracle database. You can place the JDBC drivers in the DVD images directory on your

Deployment Server either before or after running OUI to install the Deployment Server; however, it is preferable that you copy the drivers before running OUI. For instructions on obtaining and placing the requisite JDBC drivers, refer to the section *Working with JDBC Drivers on the Deployment Server*.

Note: The Deployment Server OUI installer delivers the requisite JDK/JVM.

Running the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Deployment Server Installer

CAUTION: Before you run the Deployment Server installer, you must have already installed a supported JRE on the Deployment Server. This JRE is required for the runtime of JD Edwards EnterpriseOne on the Deployment Server. Refer to the section of this guide entitled: *Prerequisites*.

Use the procedure in this section to install the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Deployment Server.

1. Log on to the Deployment Server as a user with Administrator rights.

CAUTION: Ensure that the Administrator account name that you use does not contain any special characters such as ampersands, asterisks, or underscores.

2. Locate the disk 1, which is either a physical disc or disc image directory, for the Deployment Server installation DVD.

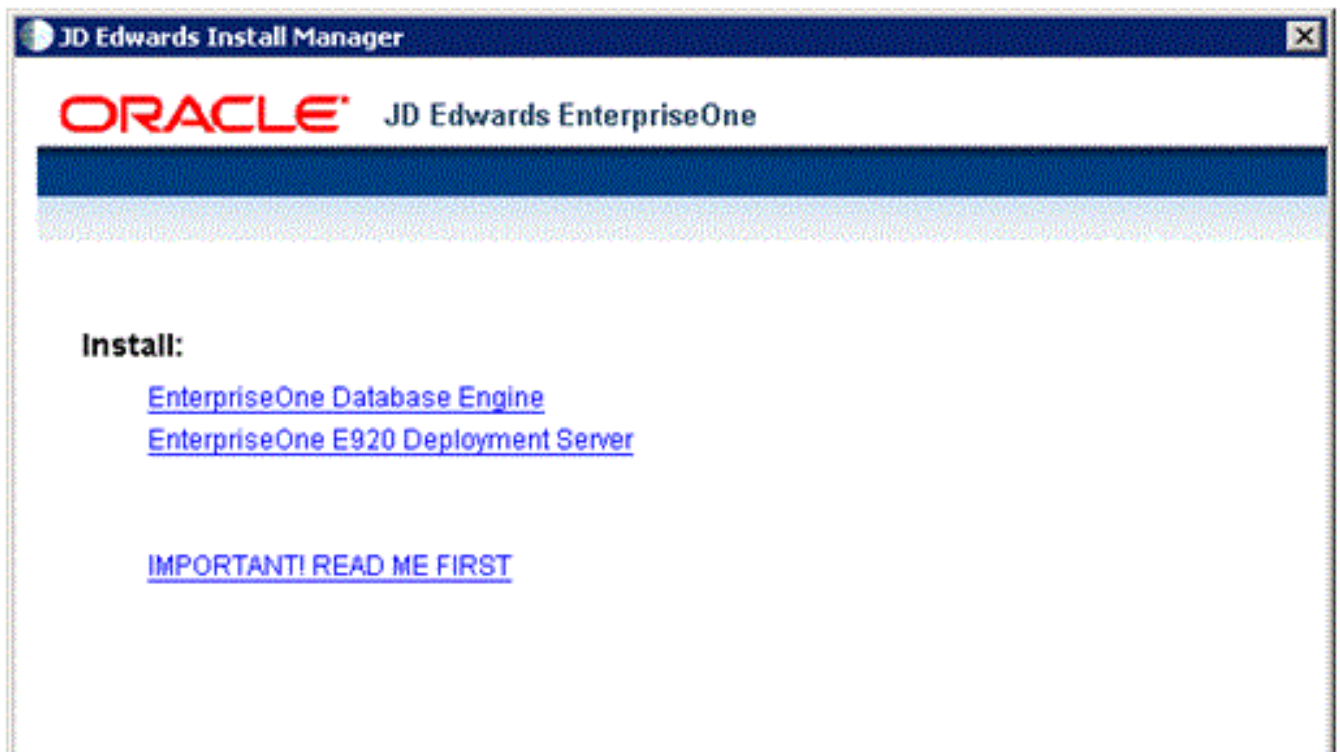
Tip: Refer to the preceding *Tip: Installation Methods* for a list of various installation methods.

CAUTION: Microsoft Windows 2012. For Microsoft Windows 2012, if you are using a physical DVD and the installation starts automatically, you must cancel this process and start the installation manually.

CAUTION: Microsoft Windows 2012. For Microsoft Windows 2012, you must right-click on the executable and select **Run as Administrator** from the drop-down.

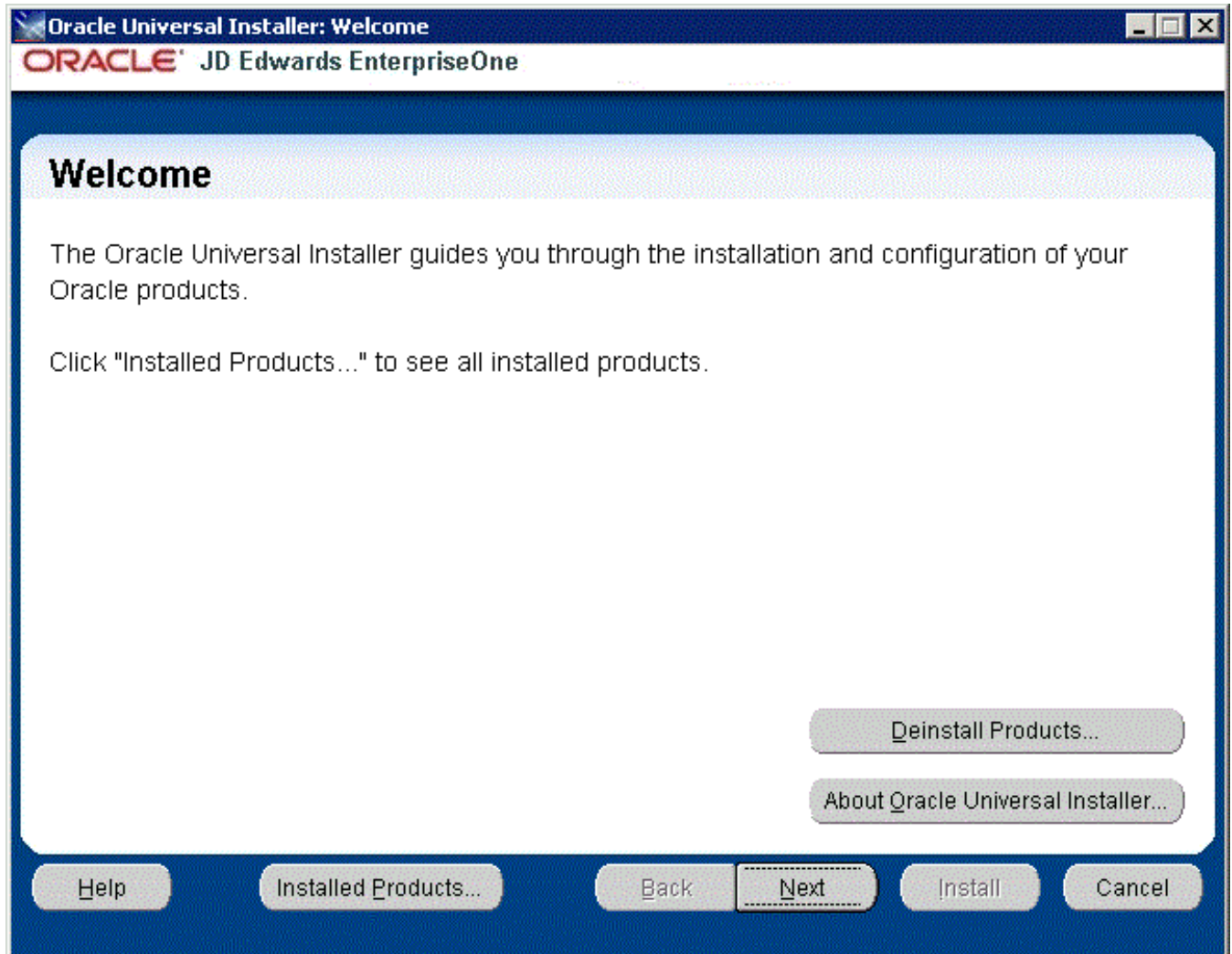
3. From disk1, execute the `InstallManager.exe` file from the root folder. For example:

```
\Disk1\InstallManager.exe
```

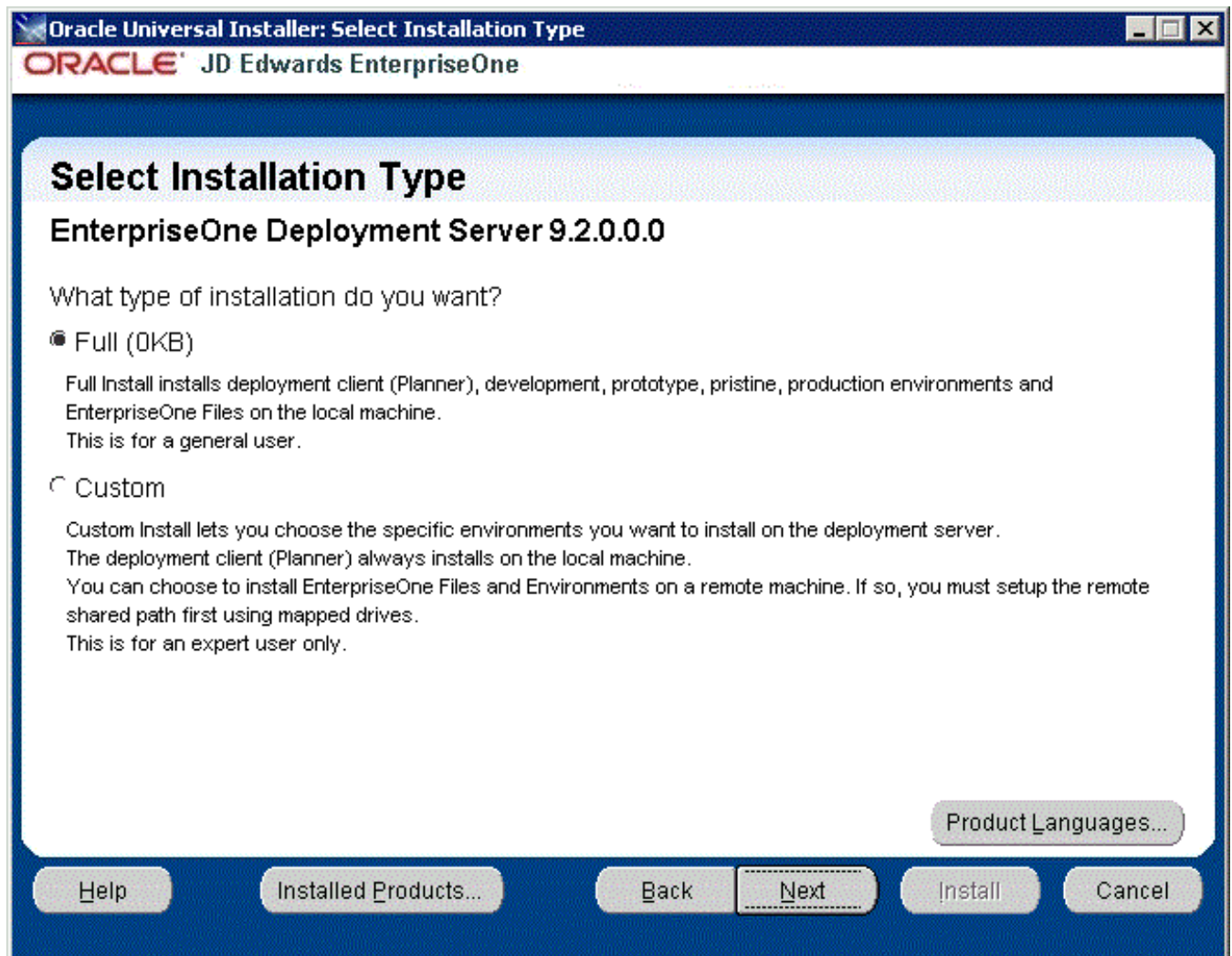


4. On JD Edwards Install Manager, select this link:
[EnterpriseOne E920 Deployment Server](#)

5. After the OUI installer is launched, a command window is briefly displayed and then it is closed and the Welcome screen is displayed.



6. On Welcome, select the **Next** button.



7. On Select Installation Type, select the appropriate radio button for these installation types:

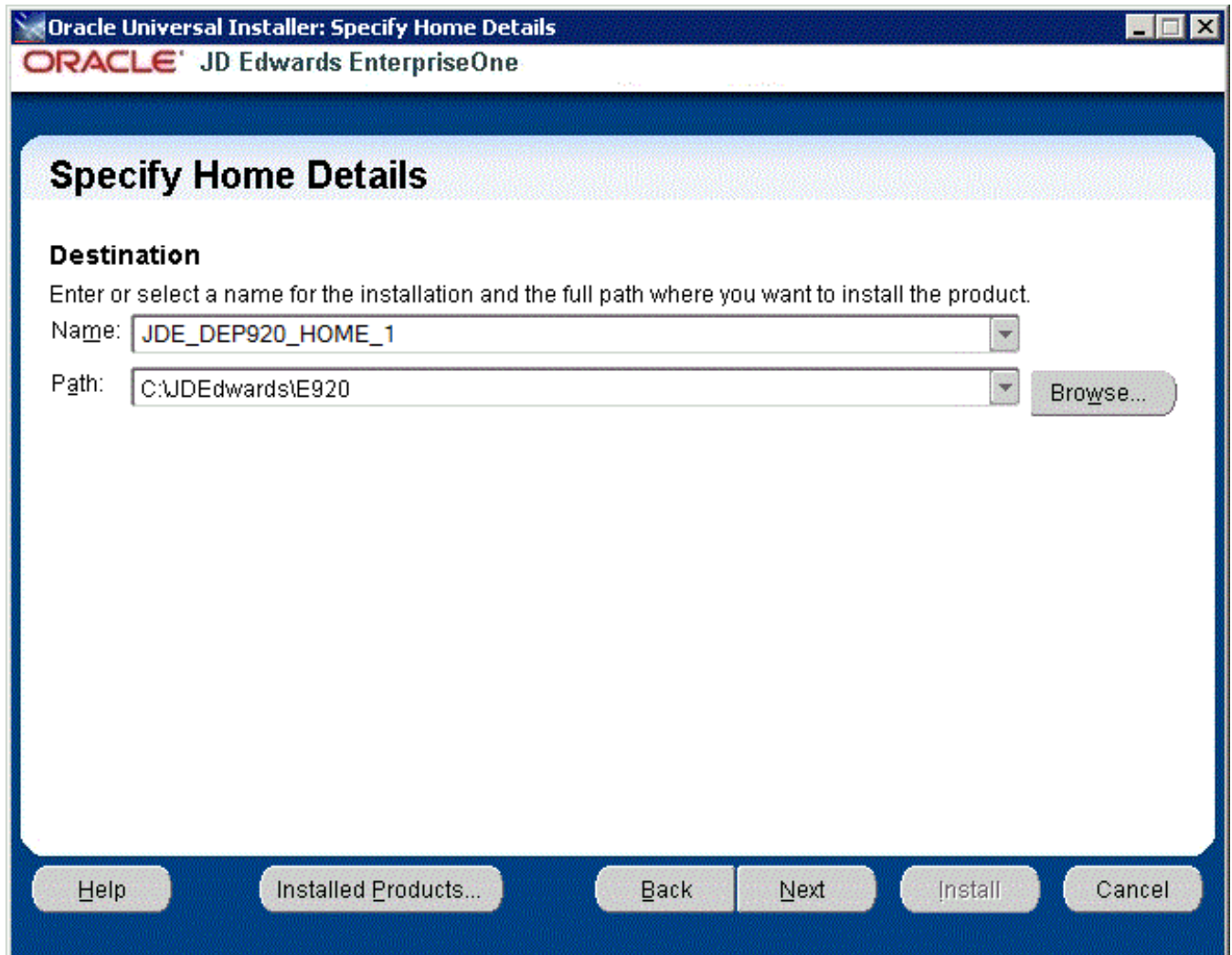
- o **Full**

The **Full** selection installs the Deployment Client (Planner), Development, Prototype, Pristine and Production pathcodes and also installs JD Edwards EnterpriseOne files on the local machine. This selection is recommended for the general user.

- o **Custom**

The **Custom** selection lets you choose the specific environments you want to install on the deployment server. The deployment client (Planner) is always installed on the local machine. You may choose to install JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Files and environments on a remote machine. In that case, first you need to setup a mapped drive as described in the section of this guide entitled: *Understanding EnterpriseOne Files Location*. This selection is only recommended for an expert user.

8. After you have selected an installation type, select the **Next** button.



9. On Specify Home Details, you must specify an Oracle Home path and a name for that path.

Tip: For more information about Oracle Homes and recommendations for naming the Oracle Homes for the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Deployment Server, see the section in this guide entitled: *Understanding Destination Paths*.

Each Oracle product that is installed on a machine has what is termed an **Oracle Home** path. This path contains all the files for each Oracle product. This path has a user-specified name as well.

On Specify Home Details, complete these fields:

Field	Description
<i>Name</i>	<p>Enter a name for the Oracle Home for the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Deployment Server. For example:</p> <p>JDE_DEP920_HOME_1</p> <p>Tip: Although the default path provided by the OUI installer includes the suffixed "_1" string, Oracle recommends you remove that suffix string and make the path simply:</p> <p>JDE_DEP920_HOME</p>
<i>Path</i>	<p>The path you enter here is for the Oracle Home path where the E1 Deployment Server will be installed. For example, the path might be:</p> <p>C:\JDEdwards\E920</p> <p>Do not specify the same <i>Oracle Home</i> name or path into which you installed the local database; however, you can specify a path that is a subdirectory of the database's Parent Oracle Home.</p> <p>For local installation, you must use the default value. For remote installation, this value must be the letter designation of the mapped drive. For additional details, refer to the section of this chapter entitled: <i>Understanding Destination Paths</i>.</p>

10. Select the **Next** button.

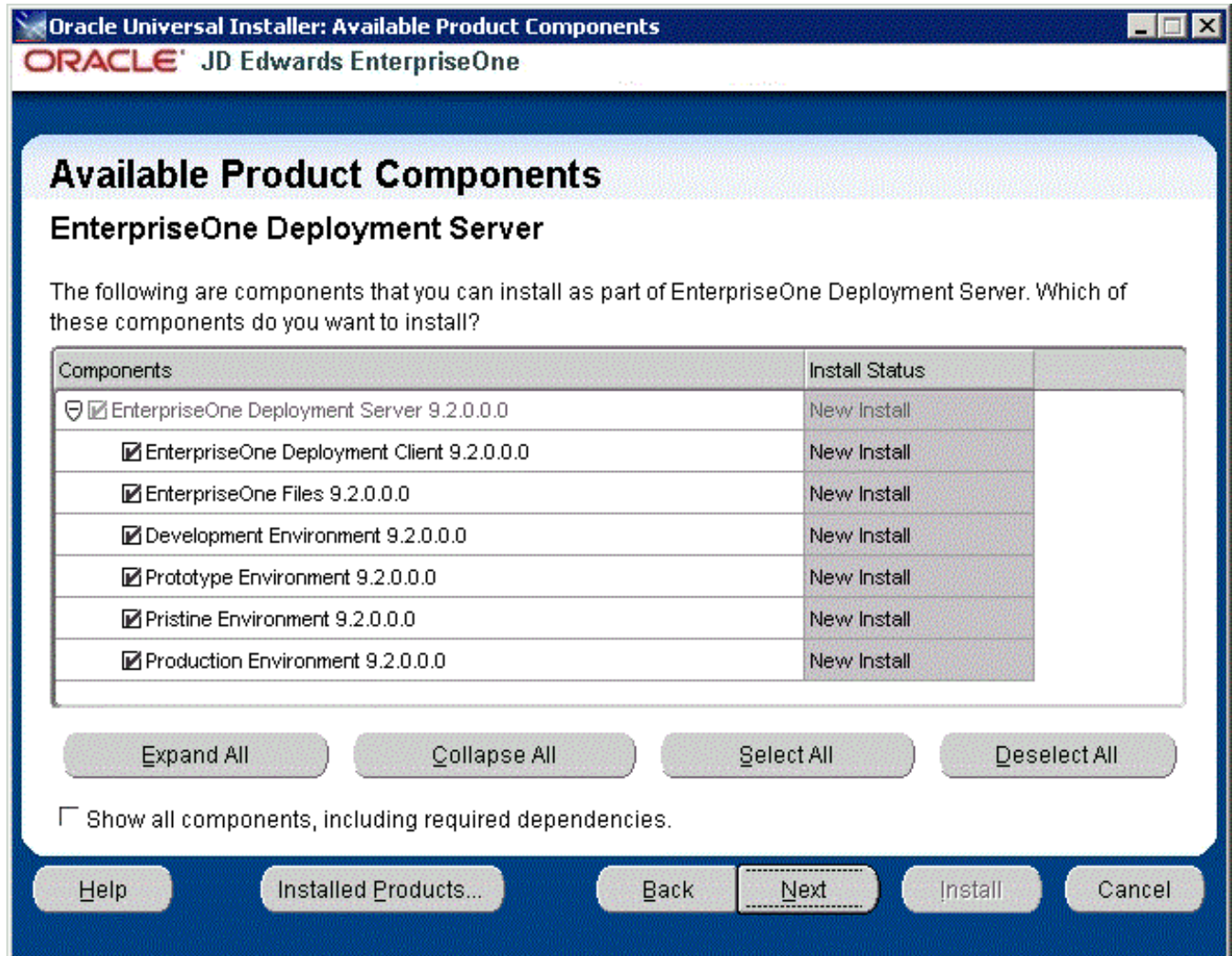
The installer checks the specified target drive to ensure there is sufficient disk space to complete the installation. If the installer detects insufficient disk space it displays the following error:



If you receive the above error, you must click the **OK** button and restart the installation to a target drive with sufficient disk space.

11. Select the **Next** button.

Tip: If you chose **Full** installation on the preceding screen (Select Installation Type), you can skip directly to Step 18 located later in this task to complete the Deployment Server installation. If you chose **Custom** installation on the preceding screen (Select Installation Type), proceed with the following steps.



Note: The Available Product Components screen and subsequent screens until the Summary are displayed if you chose **Custom** installation on Select Installation Type in Step 7.

12. On Available Product Components, EnterpriseOne Deployment Server, enable the checkboxes to select these features components you want to install:

- o **EnterpriseOne Deployment Client**

The selection for EnterpriseOne Deployment Client is mandatory in order to select other components. If you do not select this component, you cannot select any other components. This installs the planner pathcode and databases on the local machine. You will be given an option to install other components on a remote share.

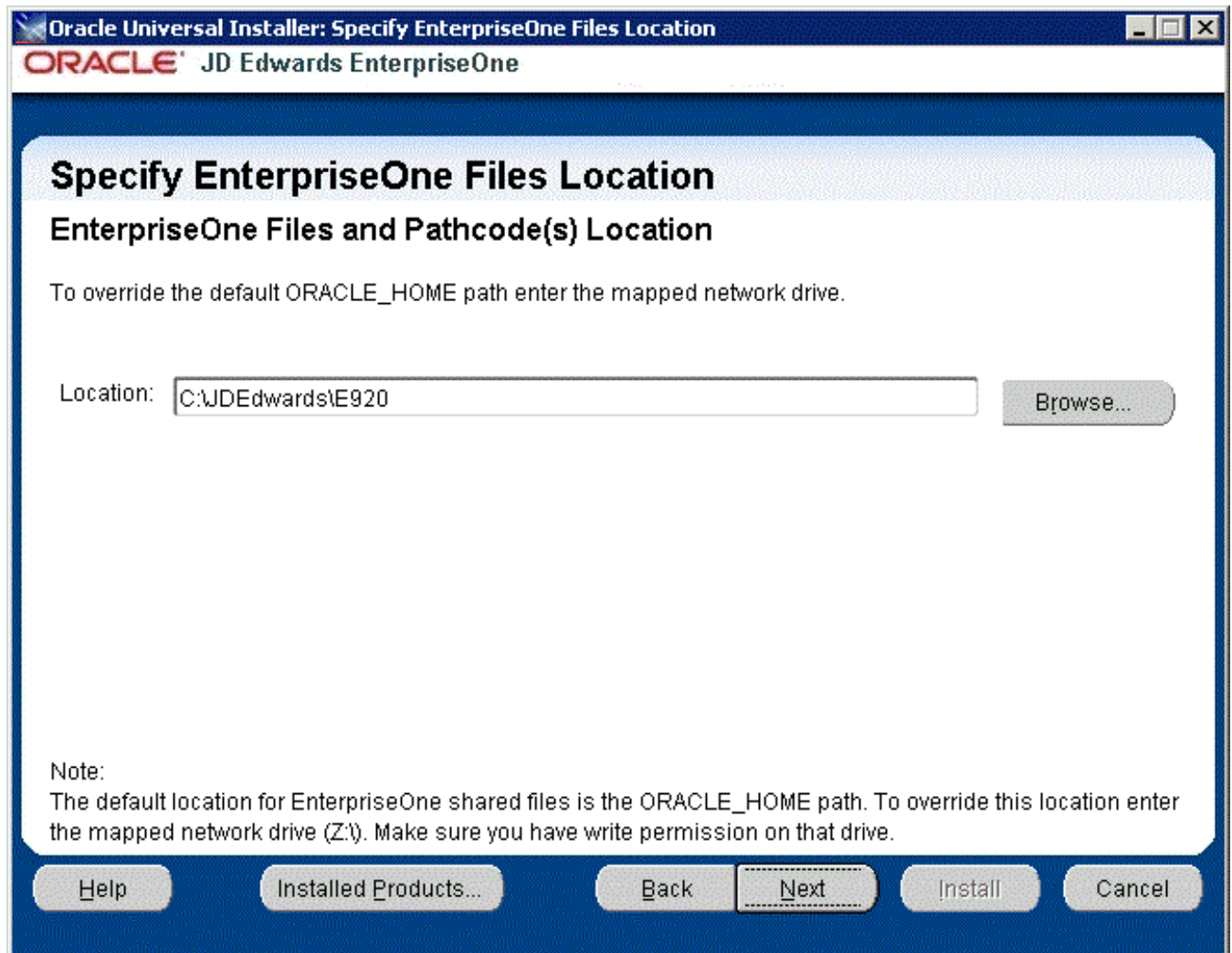
- o **EnterpriseOne Files**

The selection for EnterpriseOne Files includes mandatory system files. If you do not select this component you cannot select any other environment components. Likewise, if you re-run the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Deployment Server Installer to add an environment it will check to ensure that

these files are already installed and you will not be given an option to install the environment on a machine, drive, or directory that is different from that which contains the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne files.

- o **Development Environment**
- o **Prototype Environment**
- o **Pristine Environment**
- o **Production Environment**

Tip: You can use the **Select All** button to select all components.



13. On Specify EnterpriseOne Files Location, you can accept the default local value or enter a mapped network drive.

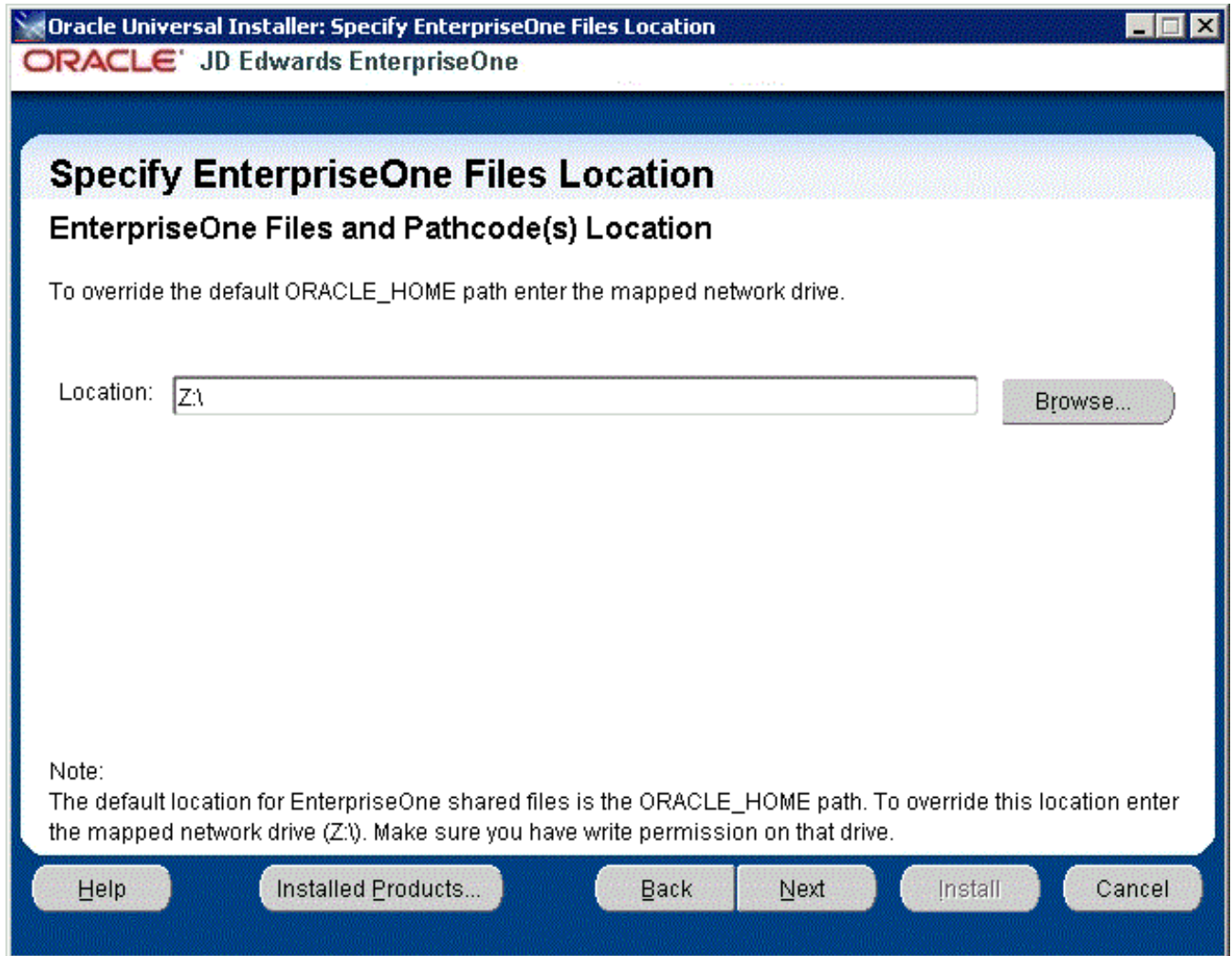
The installer provides a default value which is your *Oracle Home* path. For example:

```
c:\JDEdwards\E920
```

If you prefer to install JD EnterpriseOne Files to a remote Deployment Server, you can specify a mapped drive. For example:

```
z:\
```

The following screen shot shows an example of how to properly specify a previously defined mapped drive.



For more on the proper use of mapped drives and network drives, refer to the following **Caution**.

CAUTION: You *cannot* enter a network path such as: `\\machine_name\network_share`. If you enter a network path instead of a mapped drive, the installer will give an error. When you click Browse to select the drive, if the mapped remote drive is not listed, perform these steps:

- a. Start a Command Prompt session by right clicking and selecting **Run as Administrator**.

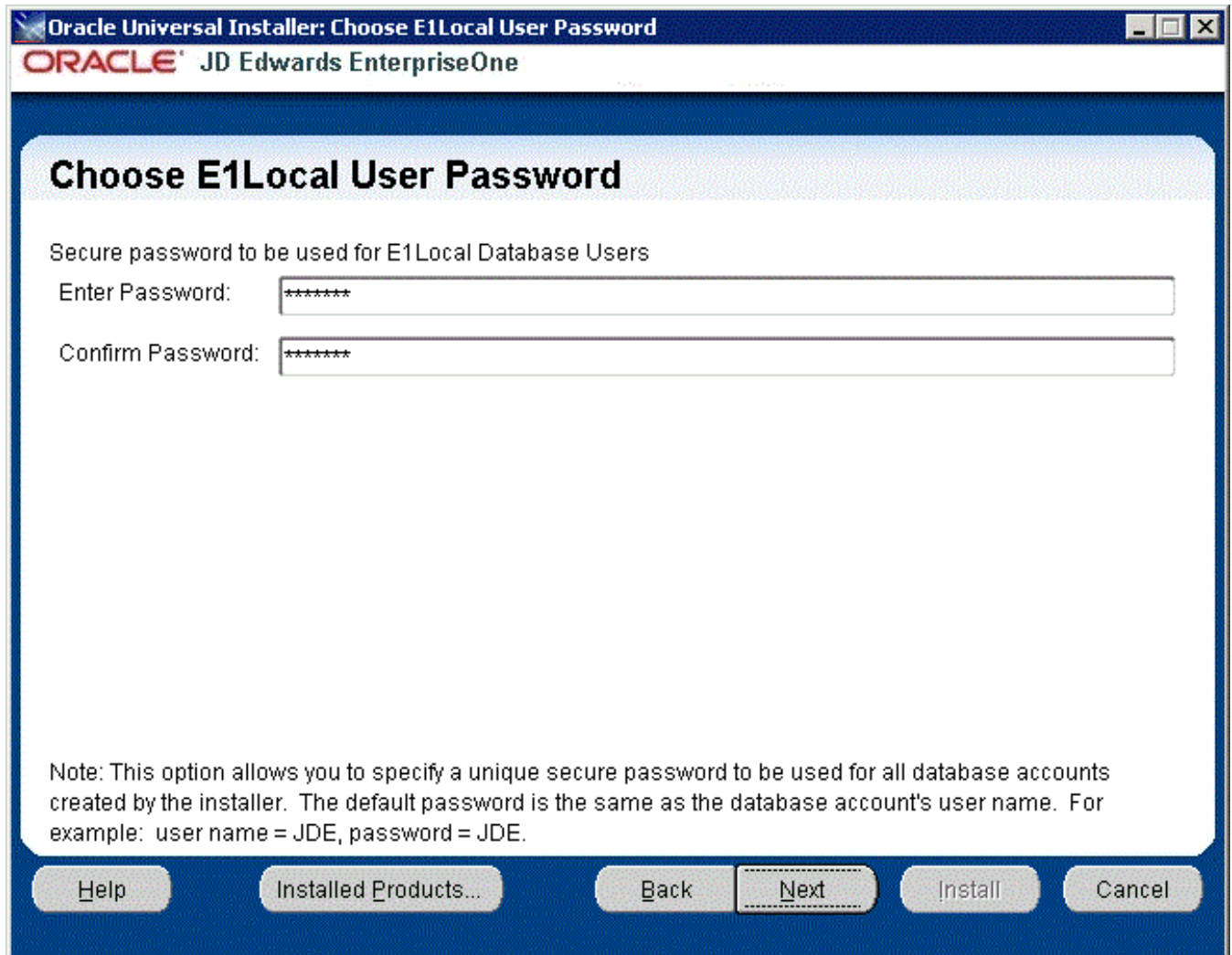
This command prompt opens on the Microsoft 2012 Server with **Administrator:cmd** in the header.

- b. In the command window, type this command:

```
net use z: \\<MachineName>\<SharedPath>
```

where **z:** is the drive on which you mapped drive exists.

14. Select the **Next** button.

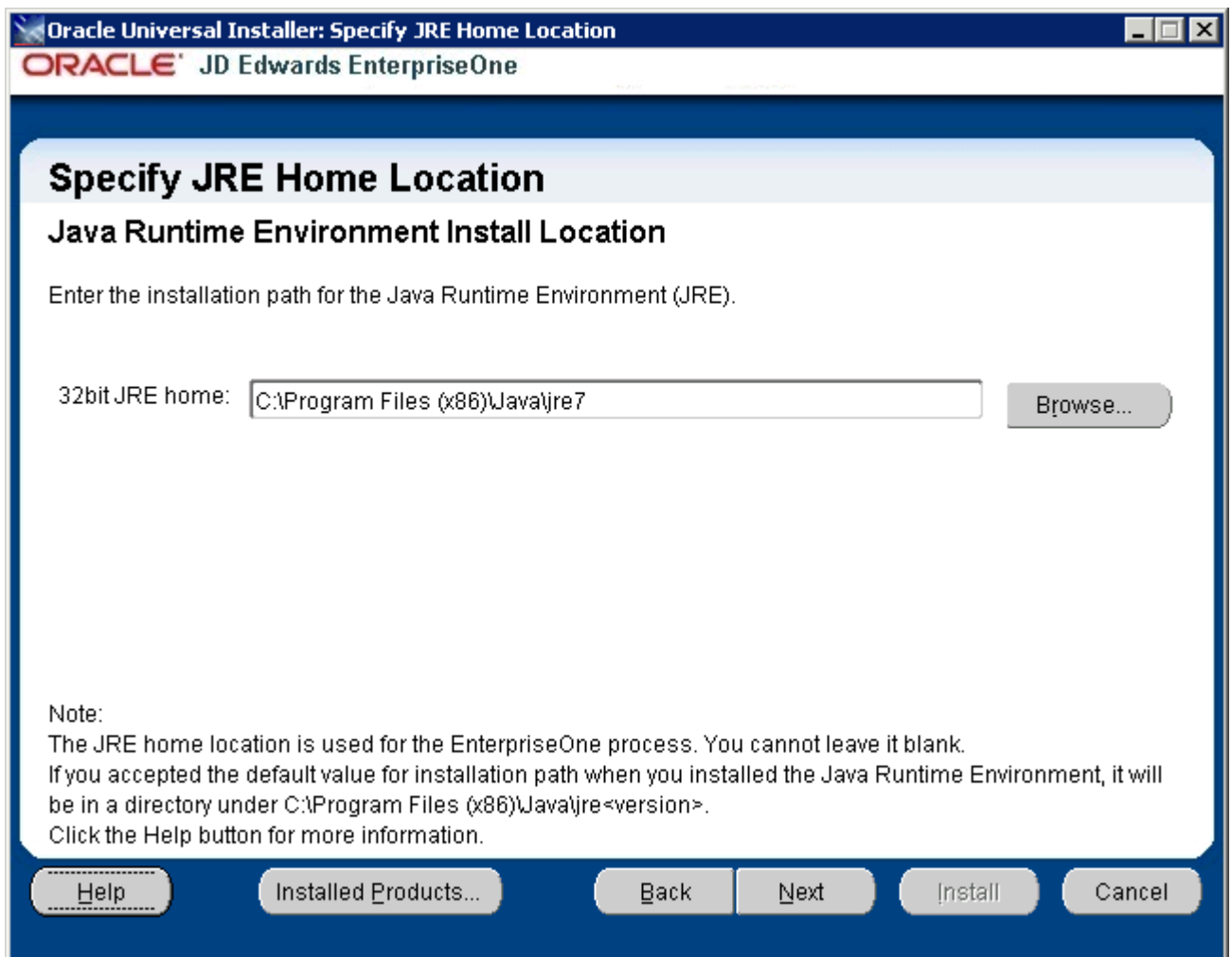


15. On Choose E1Local User Password, you can specify a secure password to be used for the E1Local Database Users on the Deployment Server. This unique password will be used for all database accounts created by the Deployment Server installer.

The default password is the same as the user name of the database account. For example, if the user name of the local database account is JDE, the default password is JDE.

If you do not specify a E1Local user password, by default the installer will use this value: **DEFAULT**. You cannot leave this field blank.

If you change the password, make sure you sign into JD Edwards EnterpriseOne as JDE with the new changed password. You must also make sure to match this new JDE password on the Enterprise Server and/or Database Server for use during the Platform Pack installation.



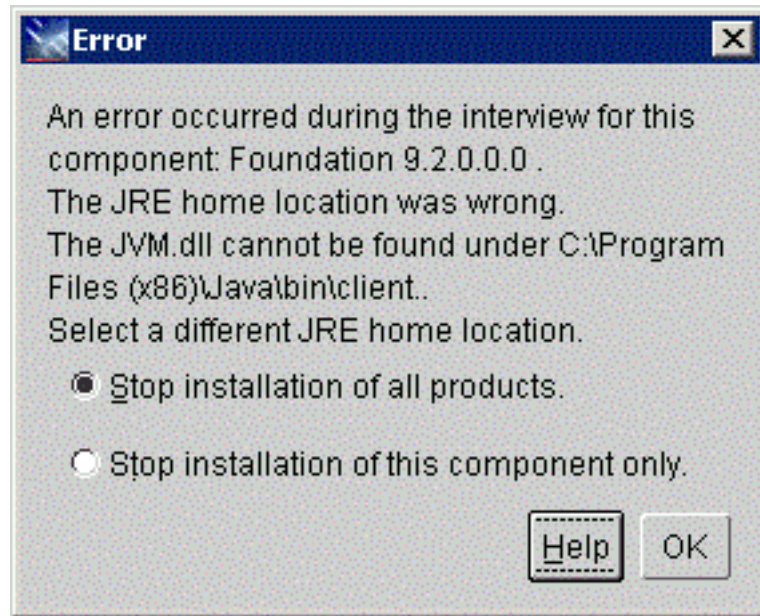
16. On Specify JRE Home Location, enter the installation path for the Java Run Time Environment. You must either enter a path or click the **Browse** button to select a path to the root directory of a JRE installation, which is usually the directory containing the `\bin` and `\lib` directories for the JRE.

Note: The JRE Home Location is required for use by JD Edwards EnterpriseOne processes. You cannot leave it blank. If you accepted the default value for the installation path when you installed the Java Runtime Environment, it will be in this directory: `c:\Program Files (x86)\Java\jre<version>` For additional information, click the **Help** button on this screen.

CAUTION: Ensure the JRE version level you specify here is supported by the Oracle Certification for the Deployment Server running JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Release 9.2 and greater. Also for JD Edwards Release 9.2, only 32-bit versions of the JRE are supported. The installer verifies the bitness of the JRE you specify here.

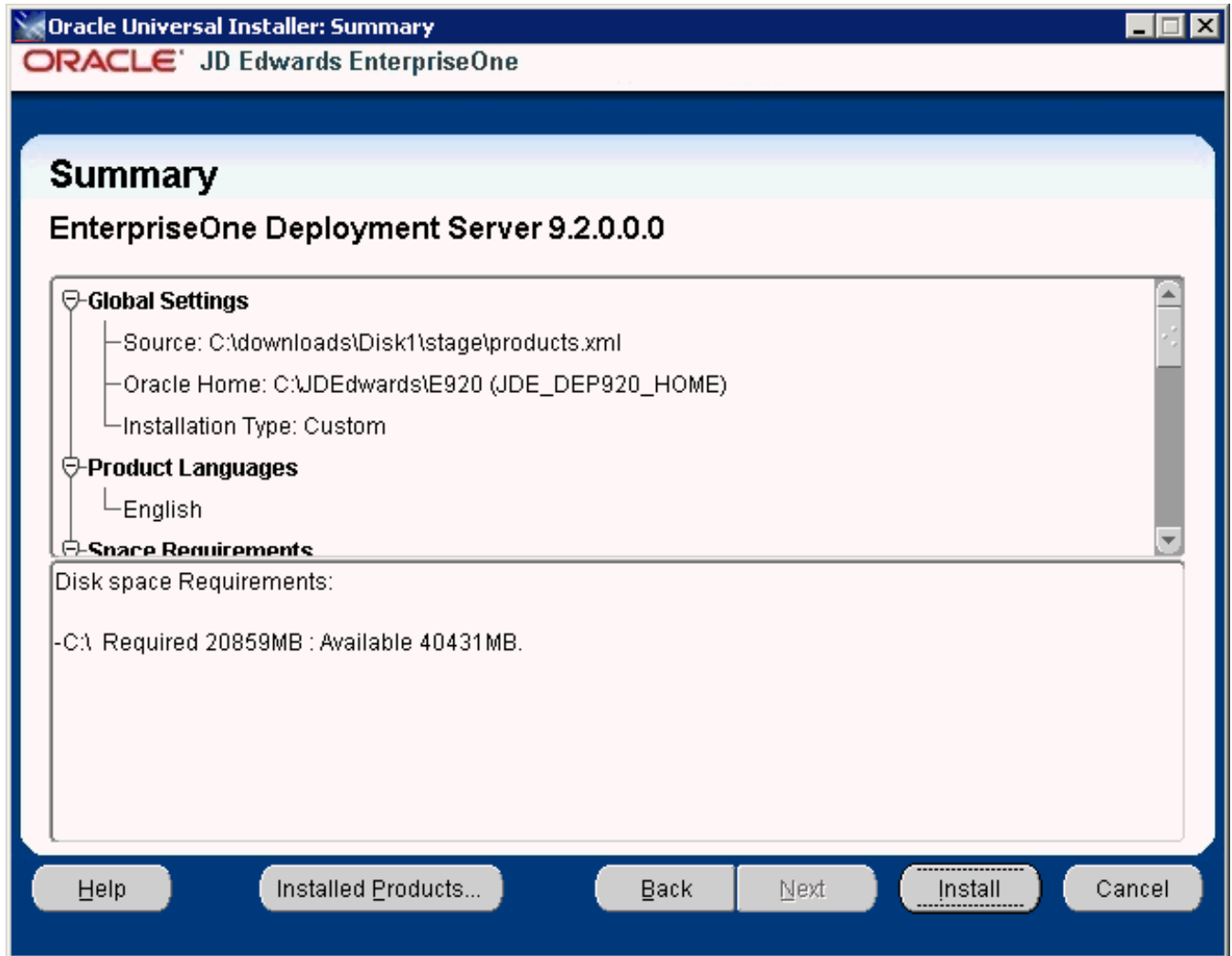
17. Select the **Next** button.

The installer validates the specified location for the JRE. If the location is invalid (as indicated by the presence or absence of the expected `JVM.dll`), the following error message is displayed:



If you received an error indicating an invalid JRE location, click the **OK** button and specify a valid value.

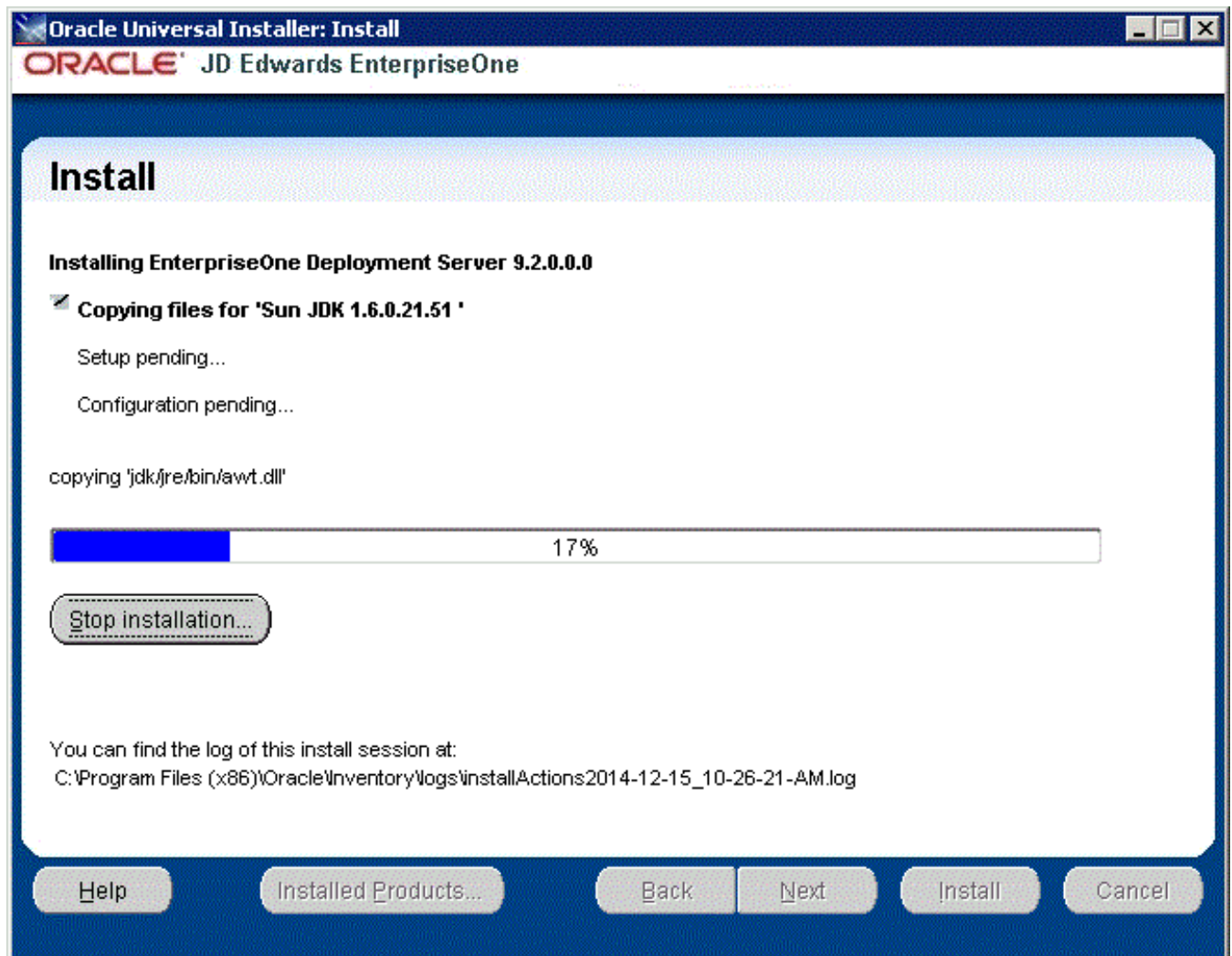
If the value you selected for the JRE location is valid, the installer proceeds and display the Summary screen. Below is a sample Summary from a Custom installation type.



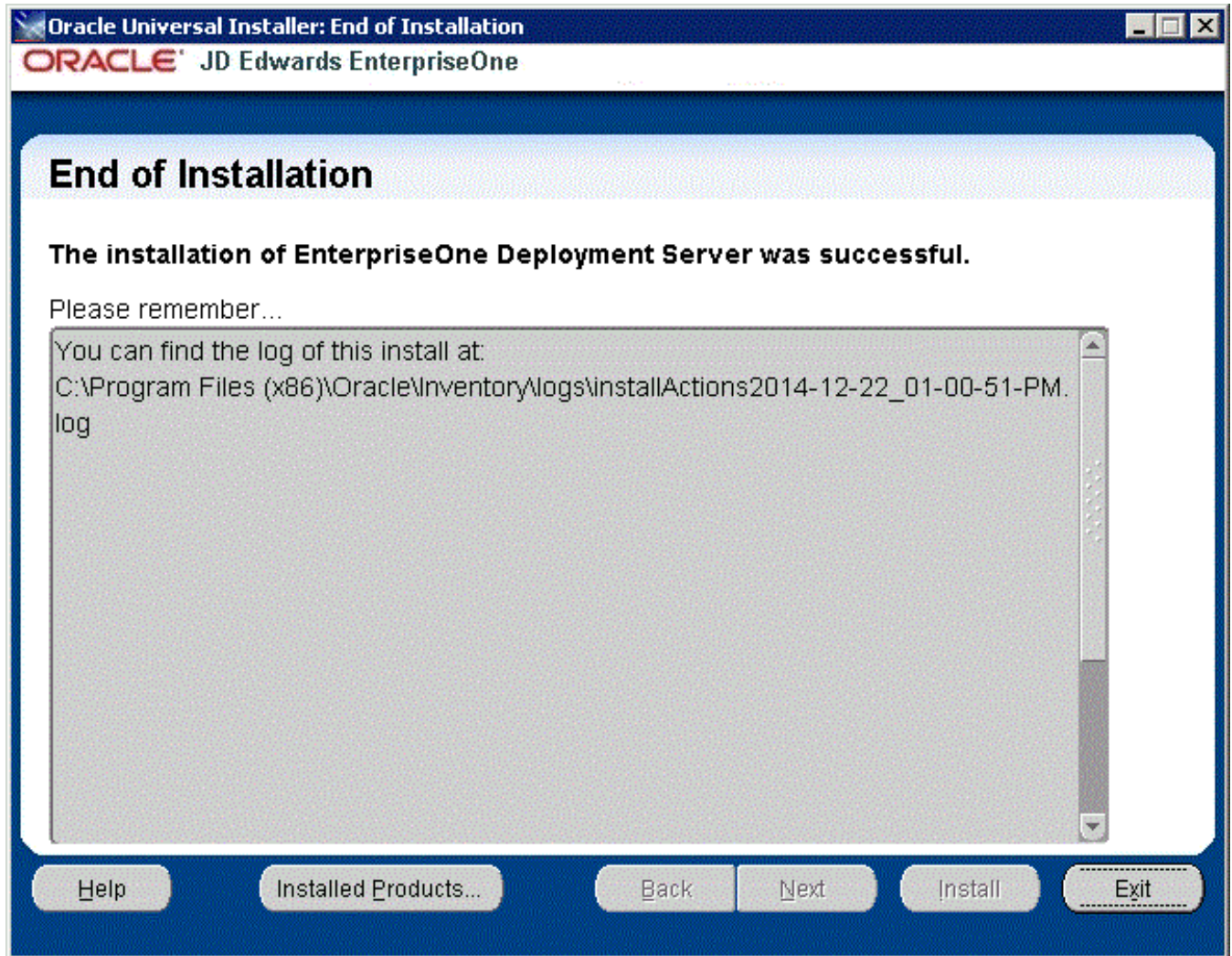
18. On Summary, verify the list of items to be installed is correct.

If there is insufficient disk space to complete the installation on the Deployment Server target machine, an error message is displayed.

19. Click the **Install** button.



The JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Deployment Server Installer displays a panel showing the ongoing status of the installation.



20. When the installation of the Deployment Server finishes, the **End of Installation** screen is displayed.

CAUTION: *Examine the Installer Logs.* Even though the screen indicates that the installation was successful, you should always check the logs before you attempt to run the Deployment Server. The file is named `log.txt` and is located in the Deployment Server installation directory. For example: `c:\Program Files (x86)\Oracle\Inventory\logs\InstallActions\installActionsyyyy-mm-dd_hh-mm-ssPM.log` For additional details on log file names and location, refer to the section of this chapter entitled: *Oracle Database Installer Logs*.

21. On End of Installation, select the **Exit** button.

Updating the Enterprise Server Port Number in the jas.ini File

After the Deployment Server installer completes, it delivers a `jas.ini` file in the following directory:

```
X:\E920_1\system\JAS\webclient.ear\webclient.war\WEB-INF\classes
```

You must verify that the `jas.ini` file on the Deployment Server in the above location is set to the correct `serviceNameConnect` port address for JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Tools Release 9.2.x, which *must* be **6017**. This setting is shown below:

```
[JDENET]
# Enterprise Server JDENET port
serviceNameConnect=6017
```

Additionally, in the same `jas.ini` file, ensure the `serviceNameConnect` port value setting for the HTML Server (also known as JAS) is set to a different value than that specified for the Enterprise Server. For example:

```
# JAS Server JDENET Listening port
serviceNameListen=6016
```

Examine the Local Database Installer Logs

Even though the screen indicates that the installation was successful, you should perform the following checks to verify that the database truly installed correctly:

1. Examine the log file

- The log file is in this folder:

```
C:\Program Files\Oracle\Inventory\logs
```

- The log file name is named:

```
cloneActionsyyyy-mm-dd_hh-mm-ssAM|PM.log
```

where the syntax is:

- `yyyy` is the year
- `mm` is the month
- `dd` is the day of the month
- `hh` is the hour
- `mm` is the minutes
- `ss` is the seconds
- `AM|PM` is either AM or PM
- For additional details on log file names and location, refer to the section of this guide entitled: *Oracle Database Installer Logs*.

2. Verify that the Oracle database services exist and are running

- a. From the Microsoft Windows Control Panel, navigate to Administrative Tools > Services.
- b. In the list of Services, look for these services:

OracleE1LocalTNSListener

OracleServiceE1LOCAL

- c. If either of the above services is missing, it indicates that there was a problem in completing all the installation and configuration steps. You should examine the logs specified in the table in the section of this guide entitled: *Oracle Database Installer Logs*.

To remedy you will probably need to deinstall the database engine using the steps in the section of this guide entitled: *Using the OUI Installer to Uninstall JD Edwards EnterpriseOne from the Deployment Server*, reboot the Deployment Server machine, and then reinstall the Oracle database.

Generate a Site Key

Important: As a Post Deployment task for the Deployment Server, you must generate a Site Key prior to running the Platform Pack to create an Enterprise Server.

Starting with EnterpriseOne Tools Release 9.2, the EnterpriseOne encryption system uses a Site Key to add a higher level of security for sensitive data stored in configuration files and databases. The Site Key is combined with other values to create an AES key. The encryption system then uses the AES key to encrypt individual data items. Encryption using AES is the industry-standard for achieving a highly secure encryption.

The Site Key values are not stored in the program code. Because Site Keys are stored and encrypted in the `JDE.INI` file, each customer has their own Site Key, which provides a higher level of security.

CAUTION: You must set a Site Key value before Site Key can begin encrypting your sensitive data that are entered through Server Manager.

For details on using Site Key with JD Edwards EnterpriseOne, refer to the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Tools Security Administration Guide* in the chapter entitled: *Encrypting Sensitive Data in EnterpriseOne*.

Adding Additional Environments (Rerunning the Deployment Server Installer)

CAUTION: If you want to add an additional environment that you did not install when you first ran the Deployment Server Installer, you must re-run the installer from the **original disk image**. You cannot re-run the installer using the OUI-based installer.

To rerun the Deployment Server Installer, follow the instructions in the preceding section of this chapter entitled: *Working With the OUI Installer to Install the Deployment Server*

Using Server Manager to Install the Tools Release

Although the process to install the Deployment Server itself remains via an OUI installer, for Release 9.2, you must use Server Manager to install or change a tools release on the Deployment Server. The following list of procedures are fully documented, where:

- Installation procedures are provided in the *Server Manager Installation Guide*.
- Configuration instructions are provided in the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Server Manager Guide*, which is located in the both the *Installation* and *Upgrade* libraries for JD Edwards EnterpriseOne on the Oracle Technology Network (OTN) at this link:

https://docs.oracle.com/cd/E61420_01/doc.92/e61438/toc.htm

Tip: The links to the Server Manager Guide that are provided in the below steps are "live" only in the HTML version of this guide.

1. Install a Management Agent on the Deployment Server. This should be the Tools Release 9.2 version of the Microsoft Windows version of the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Management Agent.

Refer to the *Server Manager Installation Guide*.

Note: The installer for the Management Agent requires a 32-bit JRE.

If you are installing the base Tools Release 9.2, you can use the same JRE that you used to install the Deployment Server using the OUI installer, which is described in the section of this guide entitled: *Running the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Deployment Server Installer*.

If you are installing a Tools Release Greater than the Base Release, ensure that the requisite JDK on the Deployment Server meets the version requirements as specified in Oracle Certifications. If you need to upgrade the JDK, you should do so before you use Server Manager to deploy the new Tools Release. If an upgraded JDK version is applied on the target machine, it must be manually copied to the `..\system\jre` folder on the Deployment Server for use by the Tools Release for JD Edwards EnterpriseOne.

2. Register the Deployment Server to the Server Manage Console.

Refer to this chapter in the Server Manager Guide:

Register a JD Edwards Deployment Server as a New Managed Instance

3. Obtain and deploy the Tools Release software component for the Deployment Server.

Refer to this chapter in the Server Manager Guide:

Managed Software Components

Note: Changing Tools Releases on the Deployment Server From a Release Prior to Release 9.2. When you use Server Manager to install the Software Component for a Tools Release prior to 9.2 on a Deployment Server, these two directories (which are the entire contents of the Tools Release portion of the Deployment Server) are backed up in a `.jar` file:

- `\System`
- `\OneWorld Client Install`

Therefore, when you use Server Manager to change a Tools Release prior to 9.2 on the Deployment Server, only those directories are restored. For Tools Release 9.2 and greater, the Server Manager install of the Tools Release performs differently because the contents are already stored in a `.jar` file where they can be extracted. In all cases, whenever Server Manager installs or changes a Tools Release, additional special files such as certain `.ini` and `.html` files are backed up. To fully preserve a Deployment Server, you should manually perform a full backup of the machine.

Installing the Latest Planner Update and Running the Special Instructions

CAUTION: You must start Change Assistant **as Administrator**. Right-click on the shortcut and select **'Run as Administrator'** from the drop-down.

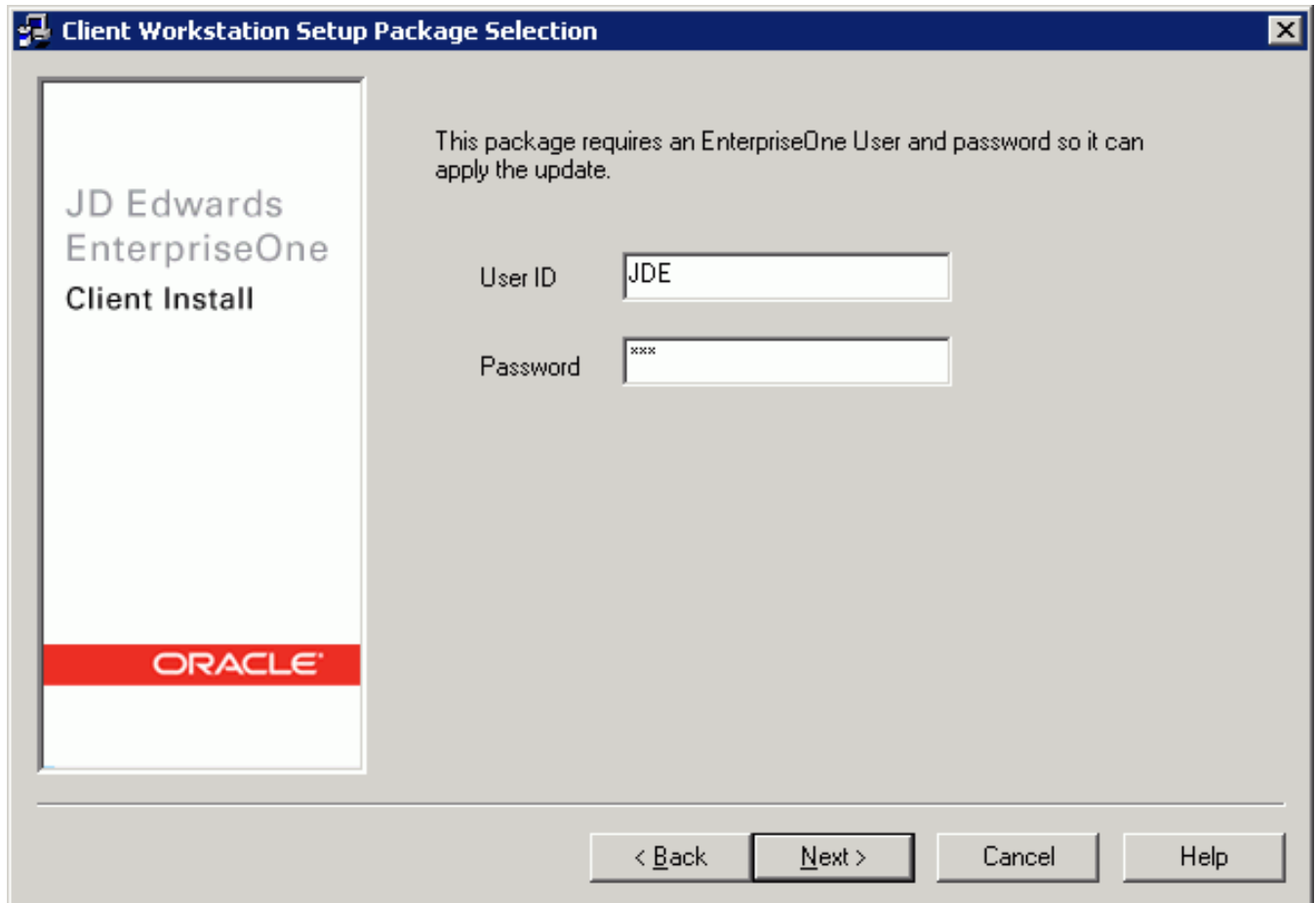
Note: The order in which the following Tools Release and updates are applied is very important. Do not deviate from the order described in these procedures.

CAUTION: As part of the local database installation, which is bundled with the Deployment Server Installer, the password for the **SYSTEM** and **SYS** for Oracle database user accounts on the E1Local database is encrypted. If you reset this password, several JD Edwards EnterpriseOne functions will fail. If you should inadvertently reset the password, you can encrypt it again to the expected default password. Refer to the section of this guide entitled: *Oracle Enterprise Edition*.

To install the latest planner update:

1. From My Oracle Support, download the latest planner update for your Tools Release to the Deployment Server.

2. Right click on the self-extracting executable and click on **Run As Administrator** and follow the on-screen instructions to install the planner update on the Deployment Server.



3. You must enter a valid *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* user and password to initialize the Planner.

The shipped values are JDE for the user and JDE for the password.

Note: The above login screen is displayed so the Planner Update can update the metadata specifications on the Deployment Server.

4. When the installation finishes, view the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* Deployment Server Setup form to confirm that the installation was successful.

Tip: If the folder into which you expanded the Planner Update is empty, you should run the self-extracting executable (*JMnnnnn.exe*) again. When the Welcome screen comes up, click on Cancel to quit.

5. Follow the steps in the Special Instructions, which are contained within an HTML file that is shipped with the Planner Update. The special instructions file is in this directory with this file name:

```
x:\download_directory\planner_update_id\ E920 SpecialInstructions.htm
```

where `download_directory` is the directory where you downloaded the Planner Update.

CAUTION: Every time you apply a new Planner Update you must run both of these:

- o `SpecialInstrs.bat`
- o `R98403XB XJDE0002`

5 Working with the Platform Pack

Understanding the Platform Pack

The Platform Pack installs these major components:

- *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* Server code
- *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* database files

Note: Assuming the installation programs are run on different machines, you can concurrently install these JD Edwards EnterpriseOne servers:

- Deployment Server
- Platform Pack on Enterprise Server and/or Database Server
- HTML Server

This can decrease the overall time it takes to complete the installation.

Note: To reinstall any Enterprise Server components, refer to *Rerunning the Platform Pack Installer*.

This table lists the mandatory and optional components of the Platform Pack installation:

Server	Mandatory Component	Optional Components
Enterprise Server	<i>JD Edwards EnterpriseOne</i> Foundation	ES Production ES Prototype ES Development ES Pristine
Database Server	System Database	Production Databases Prototype Databases Development Databases Pristine Databases

New for Tools and Application Releases for 9.2, customer must build a full package after the Platform Pack completes. Customers will not be able to build an update package out of the box.

Note: Although the Platform Pack will no longer deliver packages, it still delivers the Package Repository and the package definition records because these are needed in order to run services. The Platform Pack will not deliver the source and include files (for example, obj and lib) for the package. The directories are delivered in the path code on the Deployment Server, just not as a package.

Prerequisites to Running the Platform Pack

This section describes this prerequisite:

- *Install the Java Runtime Engine (JRE)*

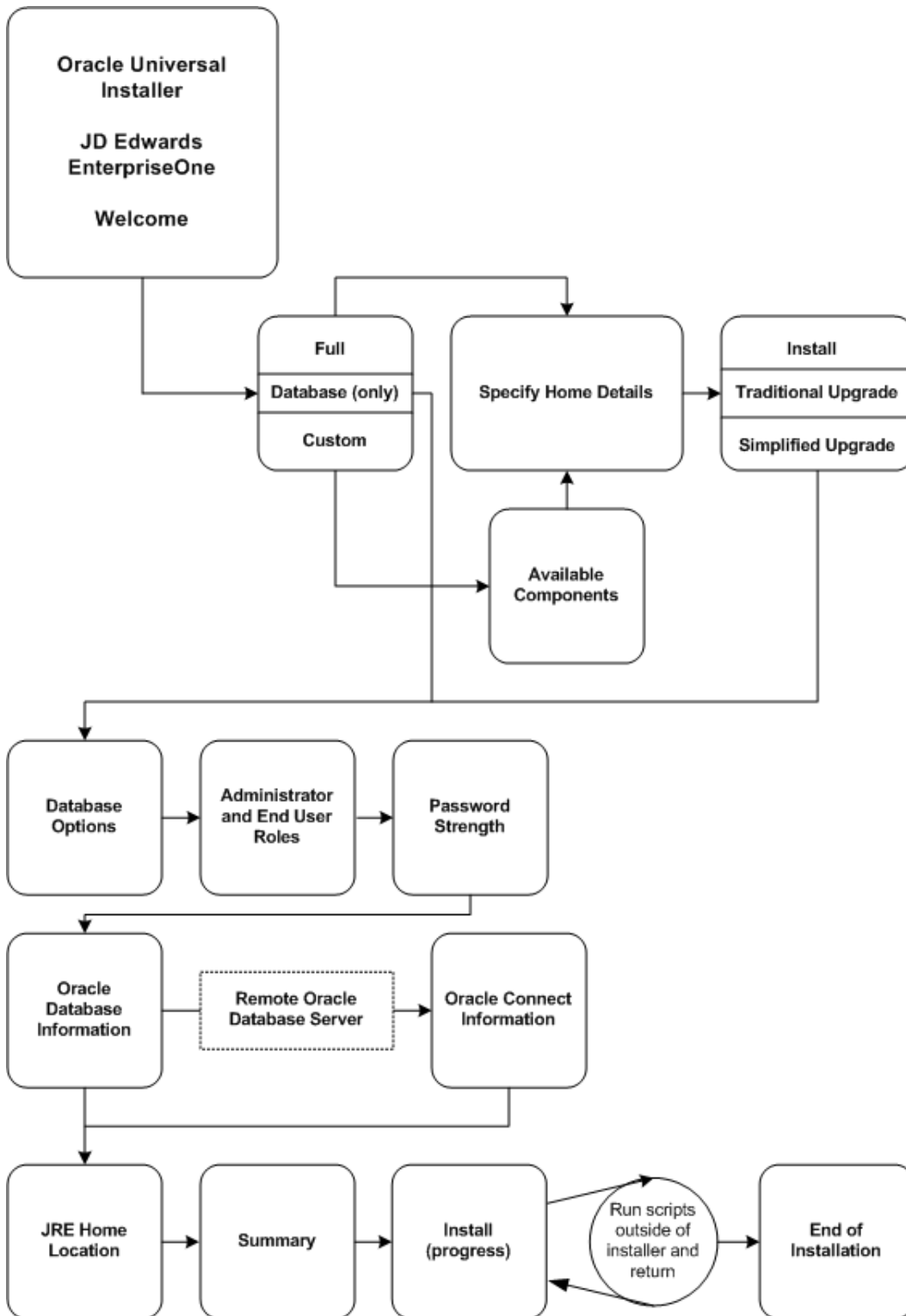
Install the Java Runtime Engine (JRE)

Beginning with Tools Release 9.2, you must have a 32-bit JRE installed prior to running the Platform Pack installation program. The installer prompts you for the location of the preinstalled JRE. It programmatically verifies that the JRE is a 32-bit version. The installer then copies that JRE from the specified location to a location expected by JD Edwards EnterpriseOne runtime processes. Refer to Oracle Certifications for supported JRE versions.

Platform Pack Process Flow

The Platform Pack installation process installs *Release 9.2* system and path code files.

The diagram below illustrates the process flow for the Oracle Universal Installer for the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Platform Pack.



Increasing Maxfiles Limits

In order to install the Unix Platform Pack, you must increase the number of files that can concurrently be open.

Note: These are minimum values. If your current kernel settings are higher than these settings, do not change them. Otherwise record the current settings for these values so you can reset them after completing the Platform Pack install.

HP/UX

Make the following changes using a HP/UX system editor such as SAM or SMH.

```
maxfiles=1024
```

```
rmaxfiles_lim=2048
```

Oracle Solaris on SPARC

Make the following changes in `/etc/system`:

```
rlim_fd_cur=1024
```

```
rlim_fd_max=2048
```

IBM AIX on POWER Systems

Make the following changes to the `/etc/security/limits` file:

```
nofiles=1024
```

```
nofiles_hard=2048
```

Linux

On the Enterprise Server, edit the `/etc/security/limits.conf` file and look for the entry for `nofile`. If it is missing or set lower than below, change it to match below:

```
# Following increases number of concurrent open files for EnterpriseOne
*          soft          nofile          1024
```

Note: Once you have made changes to the `/etc/security/limits.conf`, in order for the changes to take effect you must either reboot the machine or run the `sysctl -p` command.

Increasing Semaphores on Oracle Solaris 10 or 11

To increase semaphores on Solaris 10 or Solaris 11:

Note: This procedure is only applicable to Oracle Solaris on SPARC platforms.

1. On the Enterprise Server that is running Solaris, log in as root.
2. Issue this command:

```
projmod -K 'process.max-sem-nsems=(privileged,2048,deny)' default
```

This command changes the default project to allow semaphore arrays with up to 2048 elements. For further information, see the Solaris documentation *System Administration Guide: Solaris Containers-Resource Management and Solaris Zones*.

Increasing Semaphores on Linux

Tip: This procedure is only applicable to Linux platforms.

Linux Versions Prior to Linux 7

1. On the Enterprise Server that is running Linux, log in as root.
2. Using any text editor, edit the `/etc/sysctl.conf` file and search for this entry:

```
# semaphores: semmsl semmns semopm semmni Added for EOne
kernel.sem = 1024 32000 100 142
```

3. If this entry is missing or your existing values are lower than the above, change them to the above.

Note: Once you have made changes to the `/etc/sysctl.conf` file, in order for the changes to take effect you must either reboot the machine or run the `sysctl -p` command.

Oracle Unbreakable Linux Version 7.x

1. On the Enterprise Server that is running Linux, log in as root.
2. Using any text editor, edit the `/usr/lib/sysctl.d/00-system.conf` file and search for this entry:

```
# semaphores: semmsl semmns semopm semmni Added for EOne
kernel.sem = 1024 32000 100 142
```

CAUTION: Another variant of this file, which is `/etc/sysctl.conf`, is used with previous releases of Linux and may be present on some versions of Oracle Unbreakable Linux 7.x. However this file will most likely be deprecated in future releases. Therefore users of Oracle Unbreakable Linux 7.x are advised to only use the `/usr/lib/sysctl.d/00-system.conf` file.

3. If this entry is missing or your existing values are lower than the above, add the entry or change the values to the above.

Note: Once you have made changes to the `/usr/lib/sysctl.d/00-system.conf` file, in order for the changes to take effect you must either reboot the machine or run the `sysctl -p` command.

Loading LDAP-UX Libraries for HP-UX Itanium

Tip: This procedure is only applicable to HP-UX systems running on the HP-UX Itanium platform.

When installing on the HP-UX Itanium platform, LDAP-UX Integration for HP-UX libraries must be installed prior to installing JD Edwards EnterpriseOne. These libraries must be obtained from Hewlett Packard.

Additionally, you must add the directory path for the 32-bit LDAP-UX libraries to the EnterpriseOne user's `SHLIB_PATH` environment variable. For example, assuming the LDAP-UX libraries are installed in the default location, the following line should be added to your EnterpriseOne user's `.profile`:

```
SHLIB_PATH=$SHLIB_PATH:/opt/ldapux/lib/hpux32
```

Understanding the Oracle Installation

Prerequisites for the Oracle Database Installation

Before beginning the steps in this section:

- Install Oracle according to Oracle's Optimal Flexible Architecture rules.
- Verify that you have an acceptable SQL environment (such as SQL Plus) in which to run the provided scripts.
- Log on as a user with database administrator privileges.
- If installing a language, verify that the code page settings are accurate.

Pluggable Databases in Oracle 12cR1 and Higher

In order to install JD Edwards EnterpriseOne into pluggable databases in Oracle 12cR1 and higher, the `tnsnames.ora` file used by the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Platform Pack installer must be configured to run against the PDB (pluggable database) instead of the CDB root (container database). Consider these factors:

- The `tnsnames.ora` file must include a connection to a PDB, which includes the PDB-unique Service Name and the Connect String.
- The PDB connection can exist alone or alongside a CDB connection within the `tnsnames.ora` file.

If you do not make this configuration change, the Platform Pack installer will fail if it runs against the container database, because the root (container database) is not designed for use as the production database.

CAUTION: For a fully functional JD Edwards EnterpriseOne system, in addition to configuring the Oracle database client on the Enterprise Server to connect to the PDB, you must also ensure the same configuration is made for the Oracle database client on the Deployment Server.

Verifying Code Page Settings for Oracle

Release 9.2 requires that the national character set of an Oracle database be set to AL16UTF16. Make sure AL16UTF16 is chosen for a new Oracle database install. This setting cannot be changed after the database is created without potential data loss depending on what it's being changed to and from.

The correct code page parameters must be set in the Oracle database and on the operating systems; the setting is the same for Microsoft Windows or UNIX. These settings apply to the Oracle database and the Oracle client:

- **NLS_NCHAR_CHARACTERSET**

This parameter must always be set to AL16UTF16 for all languages (the only alternative is AL32UTF8, which is not supported by JD Edwards EnterpriseOne).

JD Edwards EnterpriseOne uses this parameter for columns such as NCHAR, NVARCHAR2, and NCLOB. JD Edwards EnterpriseOne requires that content stored in these columns is in fact in AL16UTF16.

- **NLS_CHARACTERSET**

This setting defines the database character set. This setting is determined at database creation time. This setting depends on the language you want to use. For example, most Western European languages use the setting WE8MSWIN1252

This setting only affects your specified language. If all your data sources have the Unicode box checked, this setting will never be used.

JD Edwards EnterpriseOne uses this parameter for columns such as CHAR and VARCHAR2.

- **NLS_LANG**

This sets the locale. The value can be changed by setting the NLS_LANG environment variable on UNIX and the registry on Microsoft Windows.

CAUTION: Set the NLS_CHARACTERSET and NLS_NCHAR_CHARACTERSET parameters for the appropriate language before loading your central objects specification objects for *Release 9.2* .

To verify the code page settings for Oracle:

1. Verify the code page setting of the Oracle database by executing this single-line SQL command from SQL Plus:

```
SELECT VALUE FROM NLS_DATABASE_PARAMETERS WHERE PARAMETER = 'NLS_CHARACTERSET' ;
```

2. Verify the Unicode code page setting of the Oracle database by executing this single-line SQL command from SQL Plus:

```
SELECT VALUE FROM NLS_DATABASE_PARAMETERS WHERE PARAMETER = 'NLS_NCHAR_CHARACTERSET' ;
```

If the setting is incorrect, set the NLS_NCHAR_CHARACTERSET value to AL16UTF16, using the Oracle documentation to change the setting.

3. Set up NLS_LANG parameter for Oracle.

For *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* environments with languages to function properly, the NLS_LANG parameter must be set correctly for Oracle. These settings must be set for your Oracle client Development Clients and Oracle database server.

CAUTION: Remember to add a period before the NLS_LANG variable value for the given code page.

Running the Platform Pack Installer

CAUTION: If you are installing the Enterprise Server and the Database Server on different machines, you cannot run the installer on the Enterprise Server and install the Database Server remotely. You must copy the installer images to the Database Server and run the installer on that machine. For the Enterprise Server only, you will need the image for disk1. For a Database Server, you will need the disk1 image plus the database disk images.

Note: On the Linux platform, you must install the Korn Shell (ksh) scripting language because all the database install scripts use this language. If ksh is not installed in the `/bin` directory, you must create a link to the install location within the `/bin` directory. For example, if your ksh is installed in `/usr/local/bin`, run this command: `ln -s /usr/local/bin/ksh /bin/ksh`

CAUTION: Beginning with Tools Release 9.2, you must have a supported JRE already installed on the target Enterprise Server for which you are installing JD Edwards EnterpriseOne system code. The Platform Pack installer prompts for the location of the preinstalled JRE and upon execution copies the JRE to the location where it is accessible by the runtime of JD Edwards EnterpriseOne. The Platform Pack installer determines whether the JRE Home Location is valid and whether the JRE is a supported version. This JRE must be a 32-bit version.

To run the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* Platform Pack Installer:

1. Create a folder into which you will copy the .zip file of the Platform Pack image. In addition to the Platform Pack image, you will copy one .zip file image of the Oracle database into this same directory. The directory can be any name but cannot contain spaces or special characters in the directory path. For example, the folder might be named:

```
/u01/UnixPPack
```

CAUTION: Do not extract the database files into a directory other than the same base directory for the Platform Pack installation. You cannot end up with a functional installation with a structure such as: `/u01/UnixPPack/ORCL/ORCL`

2. Extract the two zip files within the root of the folder created above. Using the example in this guide, a **correctly** extracted structure is:

```
drwxrwxrwx 12 oracle oinstall      4096 date/time .
drwxr-xr-x  8 root   root         4096 date/time ..
drwxrwxrwx  7 oracle oinstall      4096 date/time ini
drwxrwxrwx  4 oracle oinstall      4096 date/time install
drwxrwxrwx  2 oracle oinstall      4096 date/time log
drwxrwxr-x  2 oracle oinstall      4096 date/time ORCL
drwxrwxrwx  2 oracle oinstall      4096 date/time output
drwxrwxrwx  3 oracle oinstall      4096 date/time PS910
drwxrwxrwx  4 oracle oinstall      4096 date/time queues
drwxrwxr-x  2 oracle oinstall      4096 date/time scripts
drwxrwxrwx 14 oracle oinstall      4096 date/time stage
drwxrwxrwx 12 oracle oinstall      4096 date/time system
-rwxrwxrwx  1 oracle oinstall 236094108 date/time system.jar
```

Note: The byte counts in this example will likely not match those of your unzipped files.

3. In the above extracted structure, locate and execute the `runInstaller` file under the `/install` subdirectory.

CAUTION: You **must** sign on as the Oracle instance owner in order to run the `runInstaller` file. You cannot run a OUI installer as root. The installer requires that you are signed on as the Oracle database user, even if you are only installing the Logic portion of the Platform Pack. You must install the Oracle database client software and sign on as the owner of that install when running the Platform Pack. The Installer uses information about this account to configure the `enterpriseone.sh`. If you sign on as any other user, you will see errors during the install and will need to manually configure the database variables in `enterpriseone.sh`. Before running the OUI installer, ensure that the `ORACLE_HOME` and `ORACLE_SID` environment variables are set. Also ensure that the `ORACLE_HOME/bin` is present in the **PATH** environment variable.

Note: The Oracle Universal Installer takes a few minutes to start up.

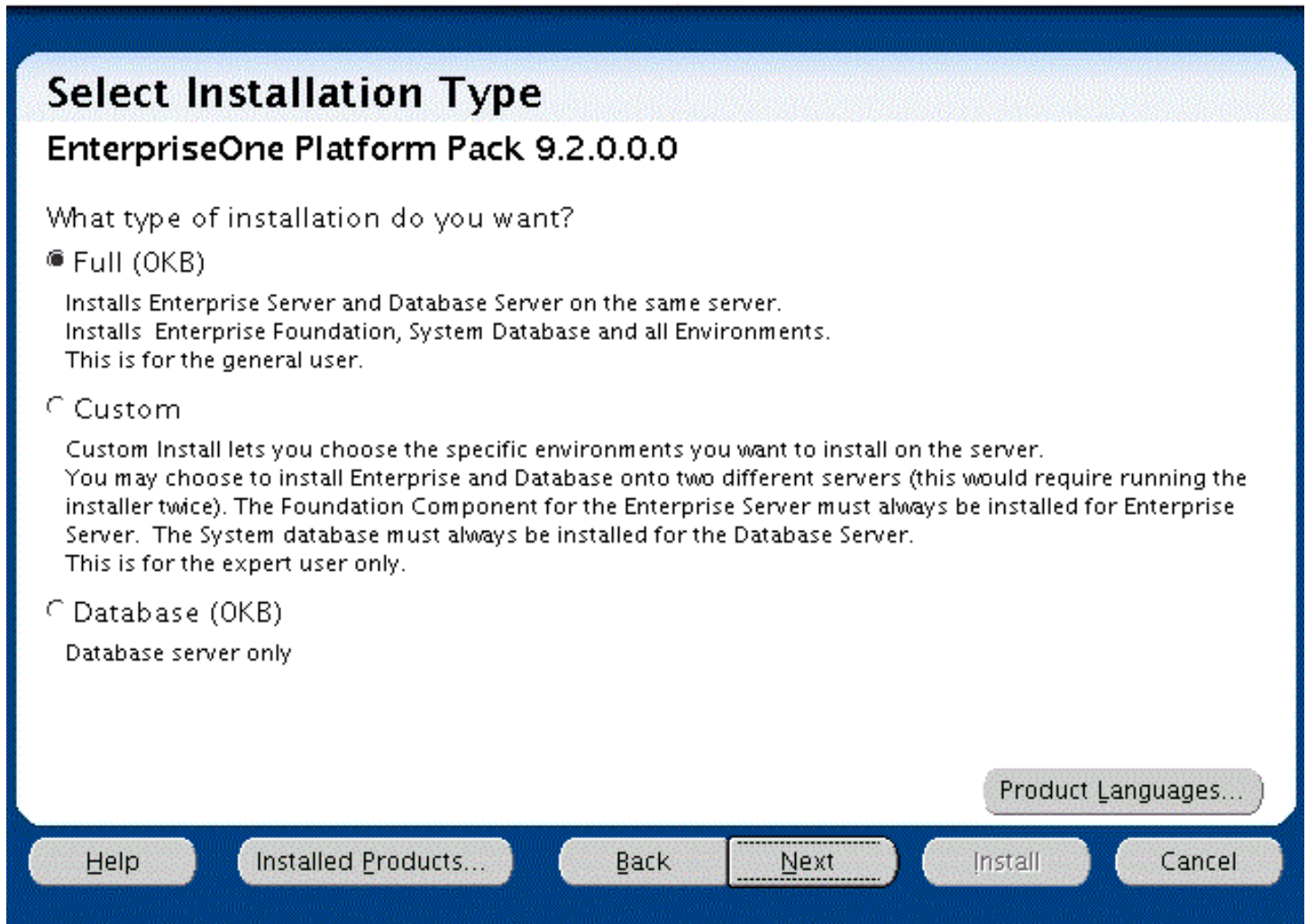

Tip: Database only. If you want to install the database only for a non-OVM configuration, you should use the **Custom** option and deselect the logic components.

7. On Specify Home Details, complete these fields:

CAUTION: Do not accept the default value for this field. If any Oracle product is already installed, the installer automatically populates this field with the existing ORACLE_HOME values, which will be incorrect for JD Edwards EnterpriseOne.

Enter a unique name for the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Platform Pack installation. For example:

JDE_PPack_920_HOME

CAUTION: Due to Java file and directory naming conventions, the directory name you specify here cannot contain special characters or blank (space) characters.

- o *Path*

CAUTION: Do not accept the default value for this field. If any Oracle product is already installed the installer automatically populates this field with the value corresponding to the home for the ORACLE_HOME of the installed product, which will be incorrect for JD Edwards EnterpriseOne.

Enter the mount point where you want the files installed on your Enterprise Server.

`/u01/jdedwardspack/e920`

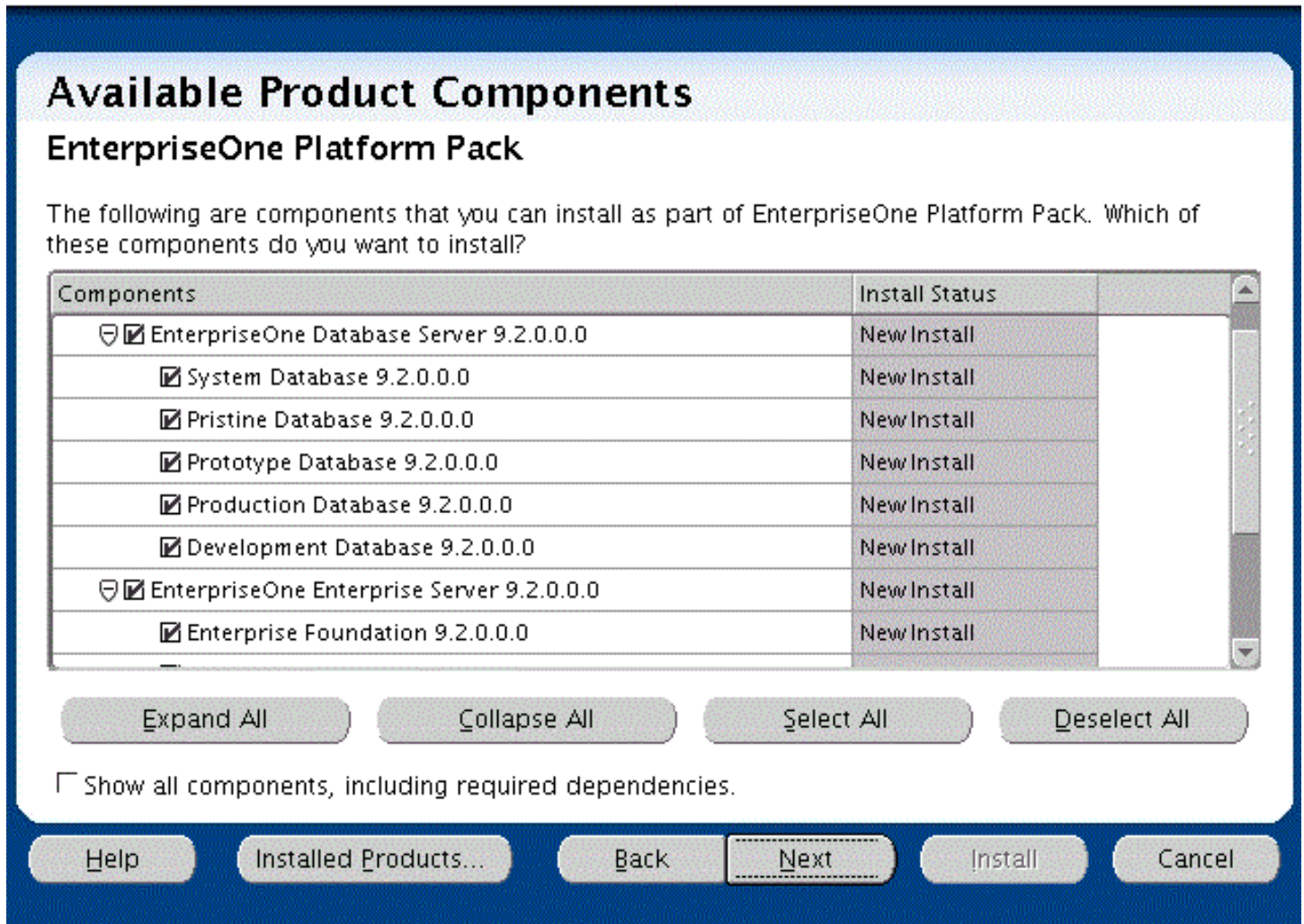
CAUTION: Make sure to choose a disk or drive with enough space to accommodate required space for the mandatory logic server components and optionally the database components. If desired, later in the installation you can specify to install the database artifacts (such as tablespaces and tables) on a different disk and/or machine.

10. On *Would you like to Install or Upgrade EnterpriseOne?*, choose whether you want to install or upgrade *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* . The list below describes each run mode.

- o **Install**

- Install EnterpriseOne**

- In this mode, the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* Platform Pack Installer checks for the existence of *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* business data and control tables; if either exists, the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* Platform Pack Installer aborts. This prevents the inadvertent overwriting of existing critical business data

and control tables. If the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* Platform Pack Installer does not detect pre-existing *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* data or control tables, the installation process continues normally.

CAUTION: You should always back up all databases that you want to preserve.

- **Traditional Upgrade**

Traditional Upgrade EnterpriseOne

In this mode, the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* Platform Pack Installer checks for the existence of *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* business data and control tables which are prerequisites to an upgrade of *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne*.

In this Upgrade mode, the installer replaces all objects in the selected pathcodes.

CAUTION: You should always back up all databases that you want to preserve.

- **Simplified Upgrade**

Simplified Upgrade EnterpriseOne

Note: The Simplified Upgrade is only available when upgrading from JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Applications Releases 9.0 Update 2 or 9.1.

As with the Traditional Upgrade, in this mode the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* Platform Pack Installer checks for the existence of *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* business data and control tables which are prerequisites to an upgrade of *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne*.

The Simplified Upgrade does not deliver Central Objects, except for PS920. The existing Central Objects are preserved and the data sources are configured to point to existing prior release path codes, which can be either from JD Edwards Release 9.0.2 or 9.1. The installer delivers logic objects and path codes for each environment that is selected for the upgrade.

For example, if you run a Simplified Upgrade from DV900 to DV920, the DV900 Central Objects do not match those that are required for Applications Release 9.2. The Central Objects - DV920 points to DV900. The process ensures that an attempt for an object match on these objects does not occur until you run the Spec Merge. The Platform Pack requires the 9.2 table definitions in order to run the TC Workbench (which runs before Spec Merge). Therefore the Platform Pack installs a second spec.ini (Simplified_spec.ini) which points **ALL** pathcodes to PS920FA

If you choose a Simplified Upgrade, the Platform Pack renames the existing `spec.ini` to another name (for example, `spec.bak`) so that it can rename the file for Simplified Upgrade, which is

`simplified_spec.ini`, to `spec.ini`. If you build and deploy a new PS920 package before upgrading DV, you will need to update the `spec.ini` in DV920 to point to the new PS package. For example, PS920FB.

If you choose to upgrade the Pristine and Development environments, the installer delivers databases for these path codes:

- PS920
- PS920CTL
- PS920DTA
- SY920

For the database, the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* Platform Pack Installer performs the same as a Traditional Upgrade in terms of delivering the entire database for the Pristine environment. However, unlike the Traditional Upgrade, the Simplified Upgrade does not deliver Central Objects for other environments.

Note: For Simplified Upgrade, for all databases, these users are created by the Platform Pack but they are not used:

- DV920
- PD920
- PY920

CAUTION: You should always back up all databases that you want to preserve.

Note: The Secure Password is used for all database users created by the installer. The default password is the same as the database user name. For example: user name = JDE, password = JDE.

By default, the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Platform Pack Installer automatically detects and populates this field with the machine name on which it is running. The JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Platform Pack Installer validates the Database Server name and compares it against the name of the local computer. If these values are different (for example, if you manually change the value of this field), the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Platform Pack Installer assumes the Database Server is either a clustered or remote server. If you have selected to install databases, and the database server name that you entered cannot be validated, a warning dialog is displayed with resolution instructions. Refer to the section of this chapter entitled: *Warning - Database Server Name Does Not Match*.

For additional details on all Platform Pack error conditions, refer to the section of this chapter entitled: *Troubleshooting Platform Pack Installation*.

CAUTION: If you are installing the Enterprise Server and the Database Server on different machines, you cannot run the installer on the Enterprise Server and install the Database Server remotely. You must copy the installer images to the Database Server and run the installer on that machine. For the Enterprise Server only, you will need the image for disk1. For a Database Server, you will need the disk1 image plus the database disk images.

- *Secure Password*

CAUTION: In order to ensure data security, Oracle strongly recommends that you change this to a secure password.

If you wish to change the default password that the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne installer uses when creating Oracle users, you can enter a value for the Secure Password that conforms to the password

policy of your operating system. The maximum length of the Secure Password is 10 characters and cannot contain any of these special characters: @ \$ / \

CAUTION: The non-encrypted value for the Secure Password is stored in the `ORCL_set.sh` file. This password is used to load the database components. Oracle strongly recommends that you erase this value once the database scripts have run successfully. **Note:** If you subsequently add an additional database component, you must set the value in the `set` script back to the Secure Password before running the scripts or the OUI installer (which calls the scripts) for the additional components.

Note: If you do not change the default value (DEFAULT), the system creates a password for each user where the password is the same as their user ID. For example, if a user ID is JDE, then by default the system creates a corresponding password of JDE for that user.

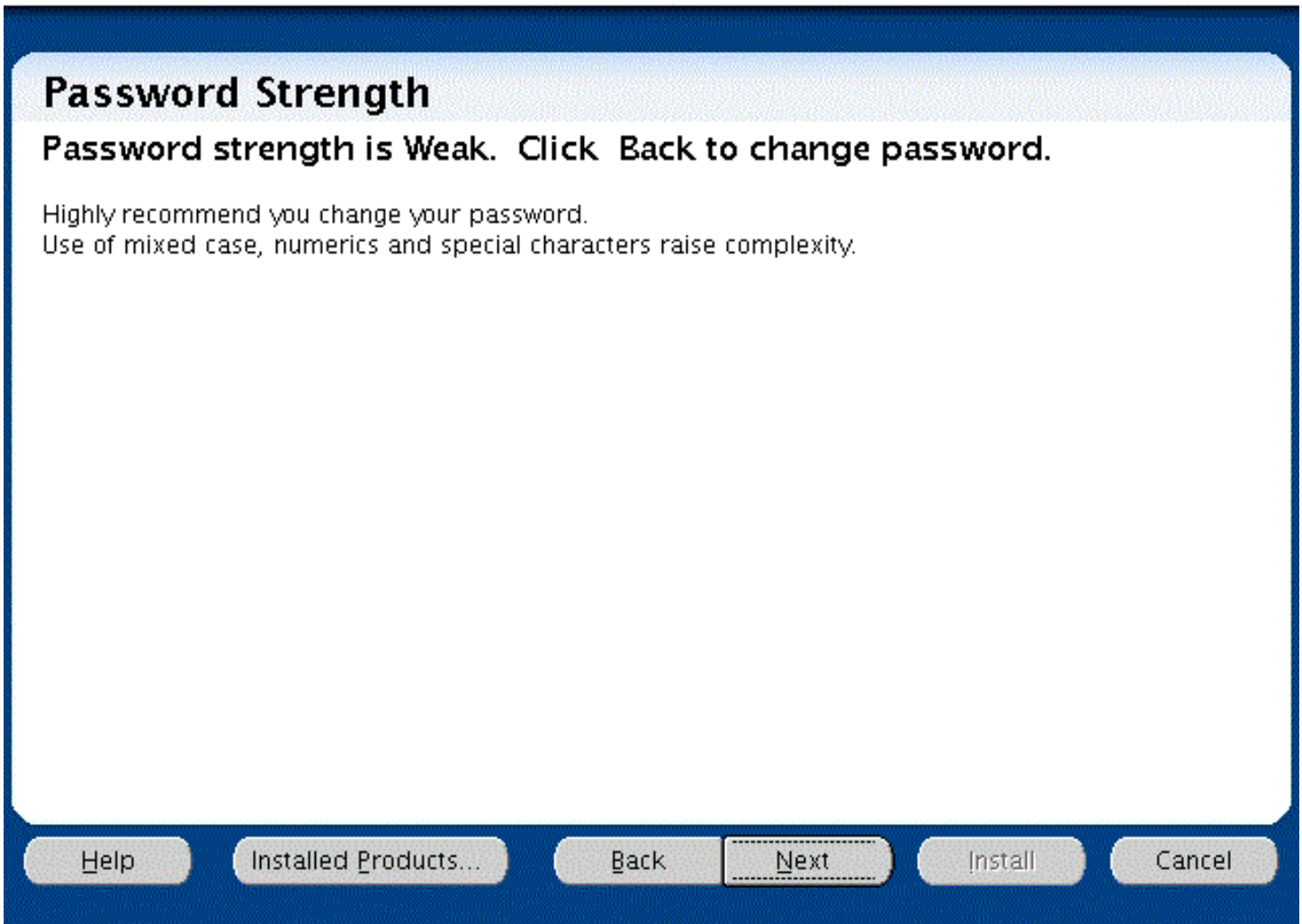
CAUTION: When you change the default password in the Platform Pack installation for your Enterprise Server, you must also manually change the `[DSEPWD]` section in the `jde.ini` on the Deployment Server and specify the new secure password that you are using. If you fail to synchronize these database password settings, the various Installation Workbenches will not be able to connect to the database. For additional details on working with the `[DSEPWD]` section of the `jde.ini` file, refer to the section of this chapter entitled: *Working with Database Security*.



Note: You must specify the SYSADMIN user as *system*. The Oracle portion of the install will fail if you supply *sys* or any other user that must connect with "as SYSDBA".

- o *Connect String*

Enter a valid value for your Oracle connect string. You may need to obtain this value from your Oracle DBA. You cannot proceed with the installation until this value can be validated by the JD Edwards

EnterpriseOne Platform Pack Installer; that is, the Installer will not allow you to proceed if it cannot connect to the database.

The value **system** (or equivalent) identifies the system administration user for your Oracle installation. This user must have full DBA privileges which are standard for Oracle installations. The OUI installer uses the Oracle export / import tool (data pump).

CAUTION: Unlike versions of the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Platform Pack installer for Oracle databases which were previous to Release 9.1 and greater, you *cannot* use the value **sys** here. Oracle recommends you use the default value of **system**.

- *SYSADMIN Password*

Enter a valid password for the system administration (SYSADMIN) user under which you will be installing the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Oracle databases.

CAUTION: The non-encrypted value for the **SYSADMIN Password** is stored in the ORCL_set.sh ORCL_set.bat file. This password is used to load the database components. Oracle strongly recommends that you erase this value once the database scripts have run successfully. **Note:** If you subsequently add an additional database component, you must set the value in the set script back to the **SYSADMIN Password** before running the scripts or the OUI installer (which calls the scripts) for the additional components.

- *Have you pre-created the tablespaces?*

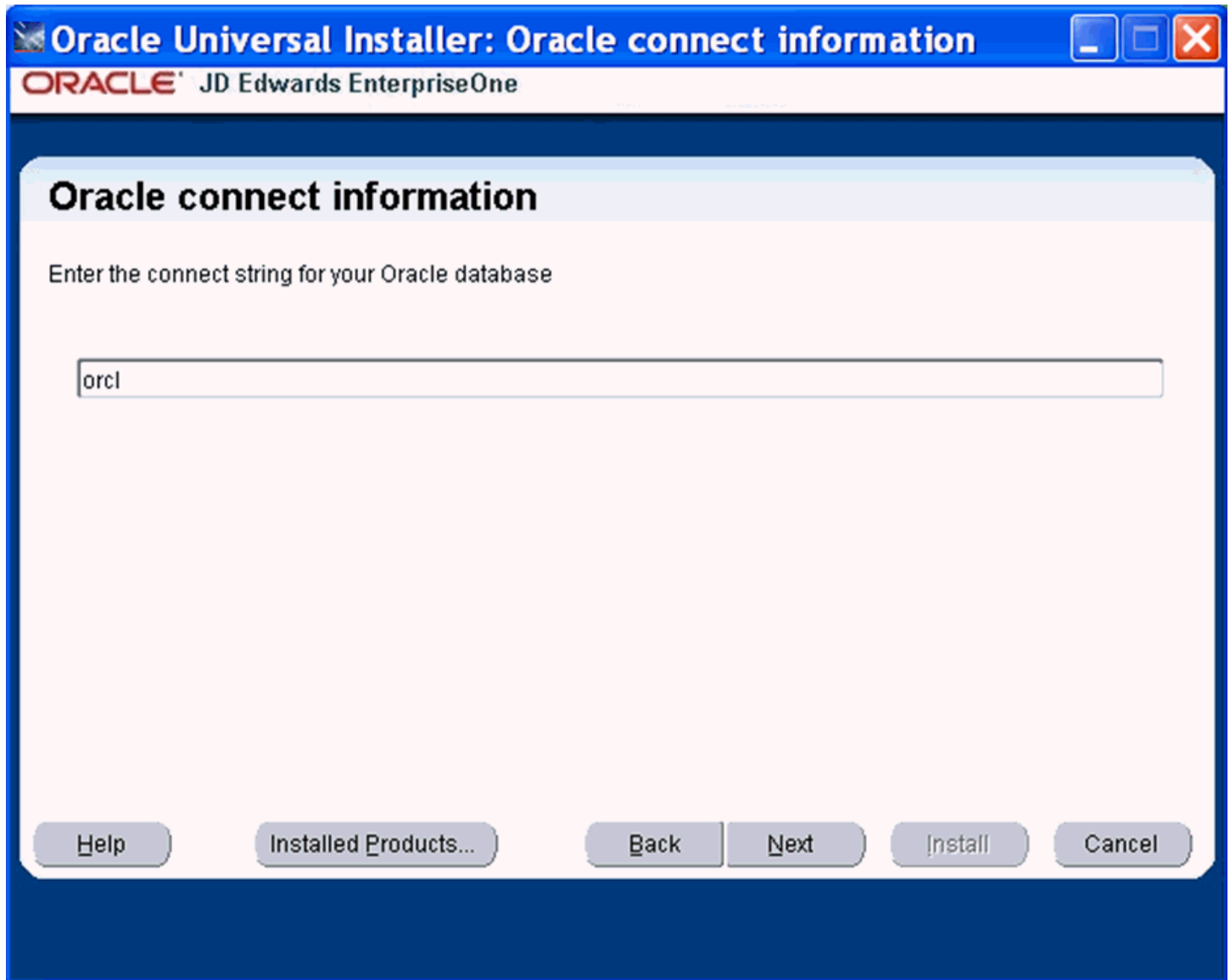

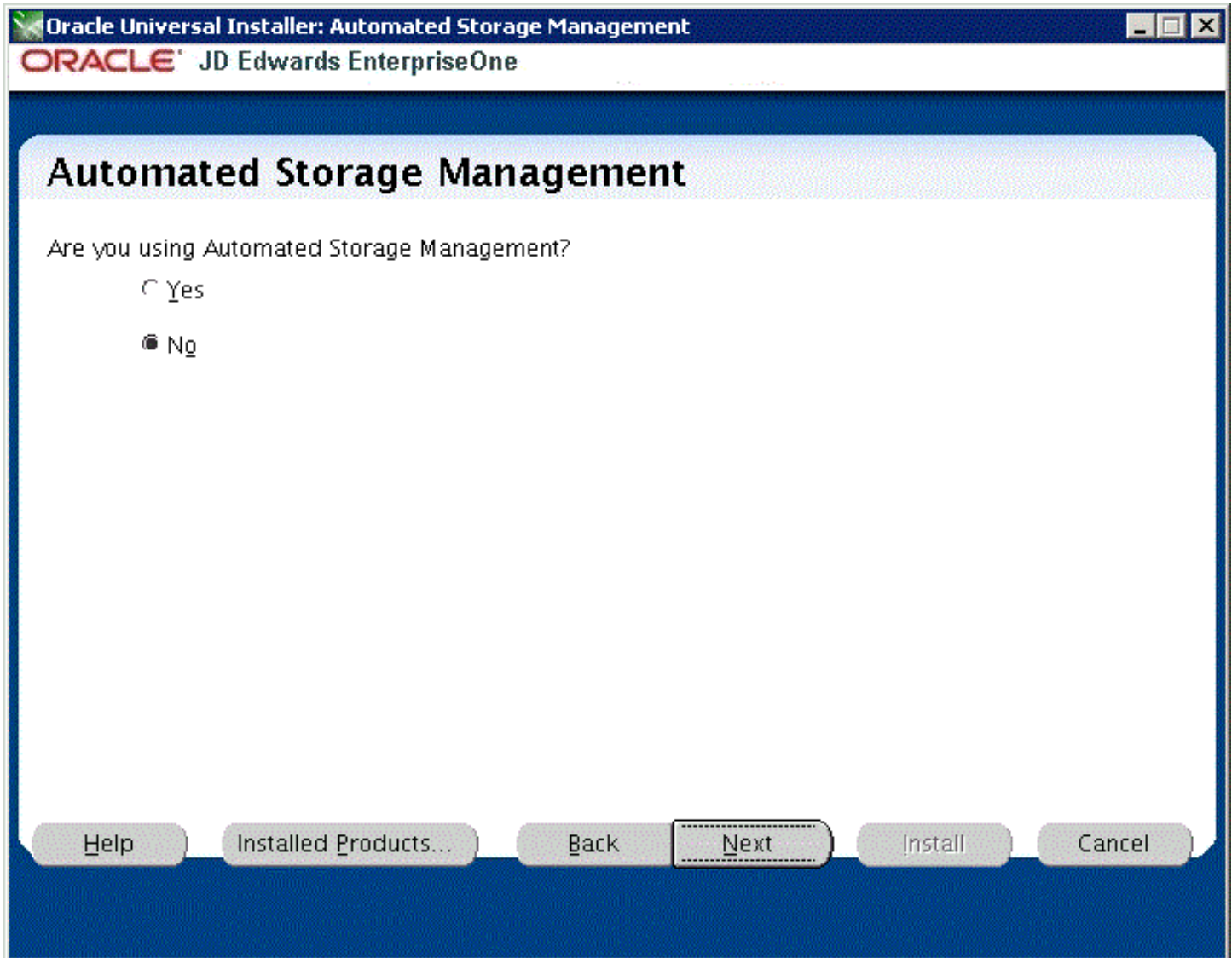

23. On Specify JRE Home Location, enter or browse to the location of your 32-bit Java Runtime Environment (JRE). In order to proceed, you cannot leave this value blank and you must specify an existing valid location and the

JRE in that location must be a 32-bit version. If you accepted the default value for installation path when you installed the Java Runtime Environment, the location will be in a directory under:

```
c:\Program Files (x86)\Java\jdk<version>
```

```
/usr/java/jdk<version>/jre
```

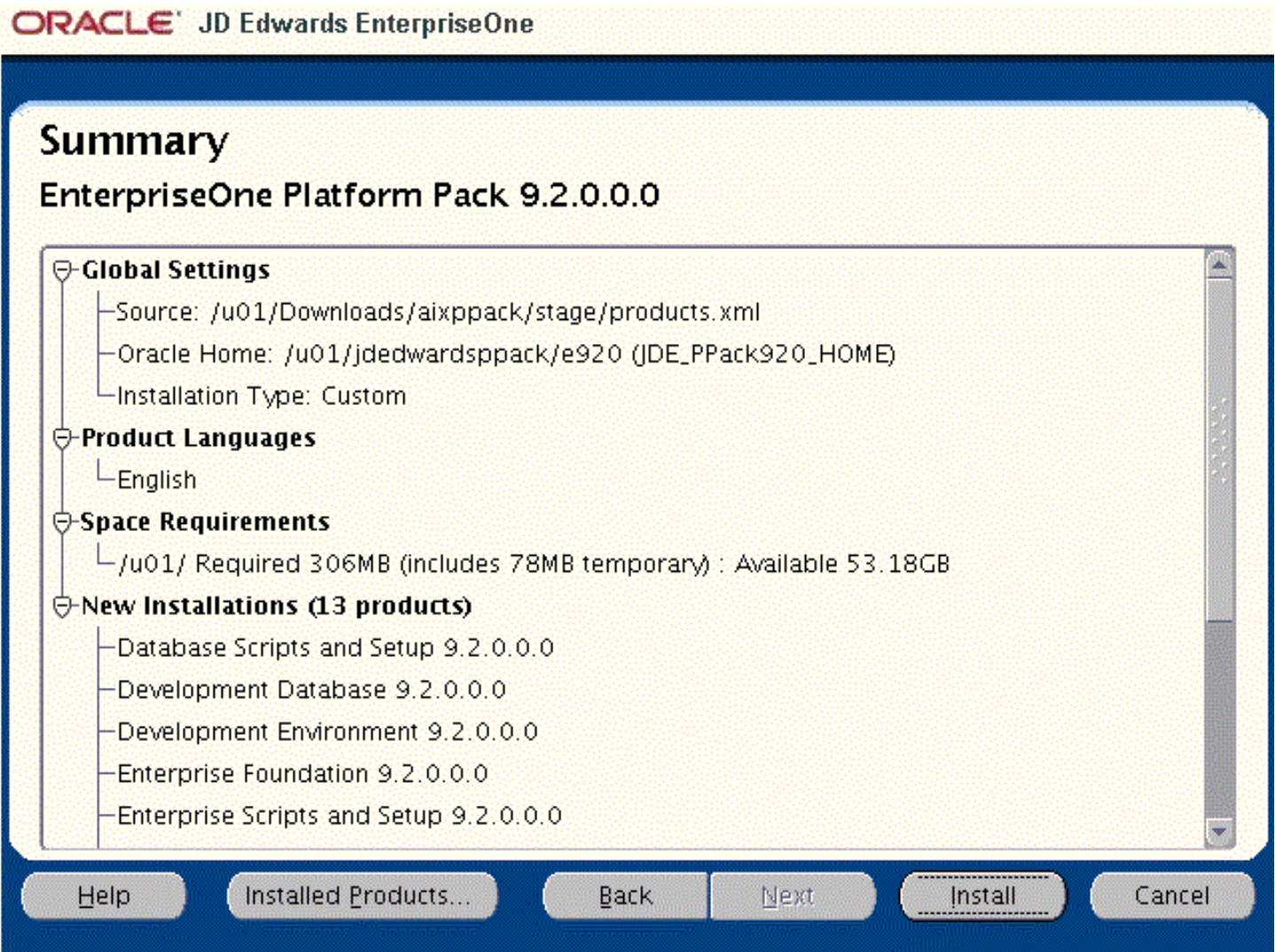
or

```
/usr/lib/jvm/java<version>/jre

The installer validates the specified location and copies the JRE to a location where it can be used by the runtime processes of JD Edwards EnterpriseOne.

CAUTION: This JRE is a prerequisite to installing JD Edwards EnterpriseOne. Because JD Edwards EnterpriseOne running on an Enterprise Server as a 32-bit application, the pre-installed JRE for use by JD Edwards EnterpriseOne on the Enterprise Server must be a 32-bit version. Refer to the Oracle Certifications for JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Enterprise Servers for additional details and supported vendors and releases of JREs for your platform and operating system.

24. Click the **Next** button.

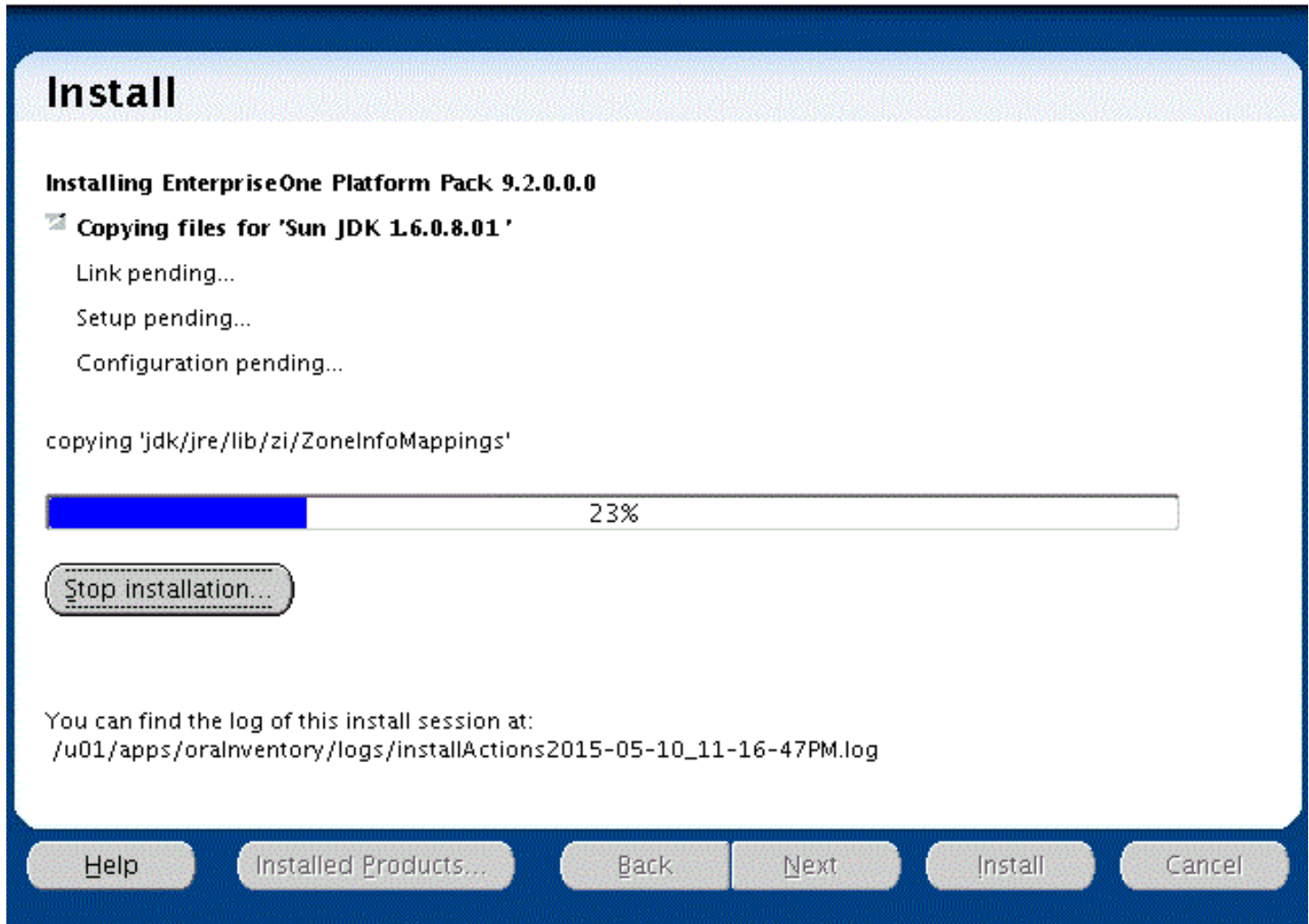

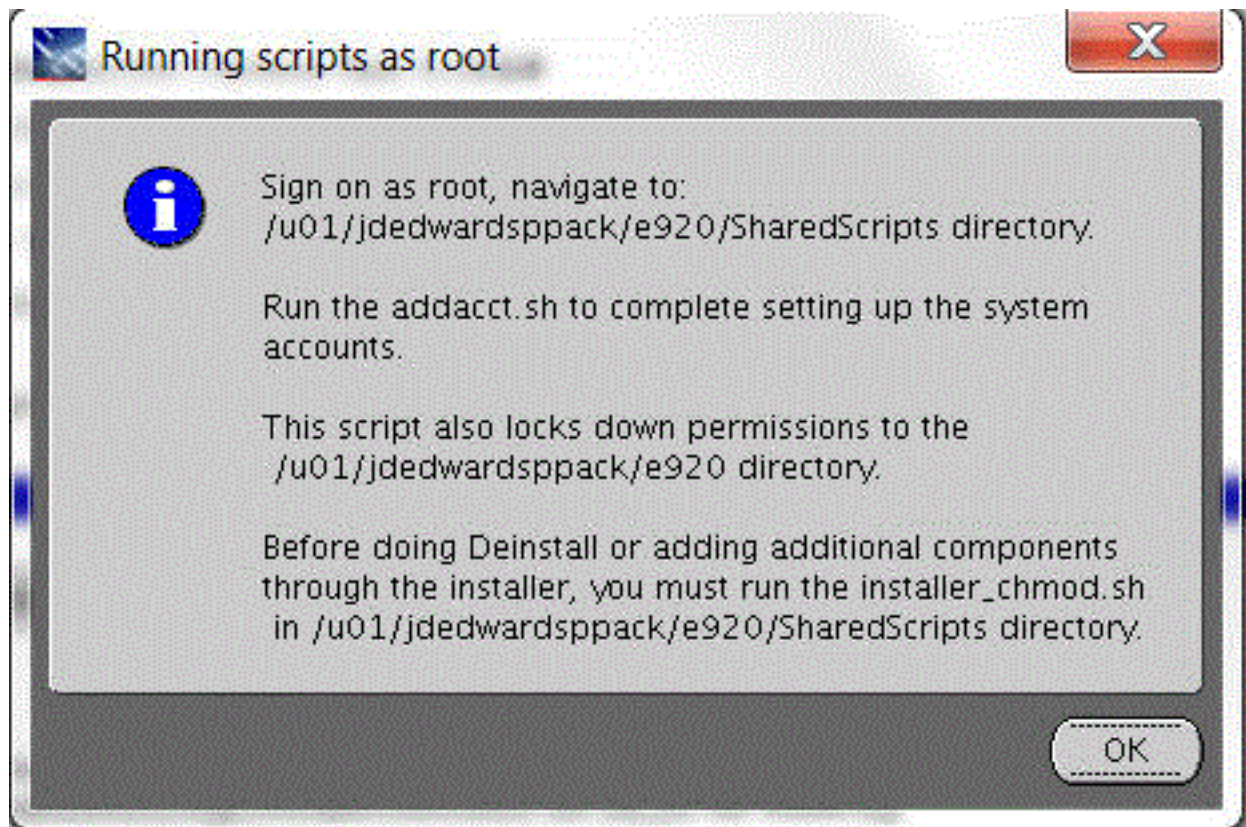

28. On **Running scripts as root**, the dialog instructs you to perform these actions outside the installer:

- a. Sign on as root.
- b. Navigate to the `sharedScripts` subdirectory of the JD Edwards install directory. For example:

```
/u01/jdedwardspack/e920/SharedScripts
```

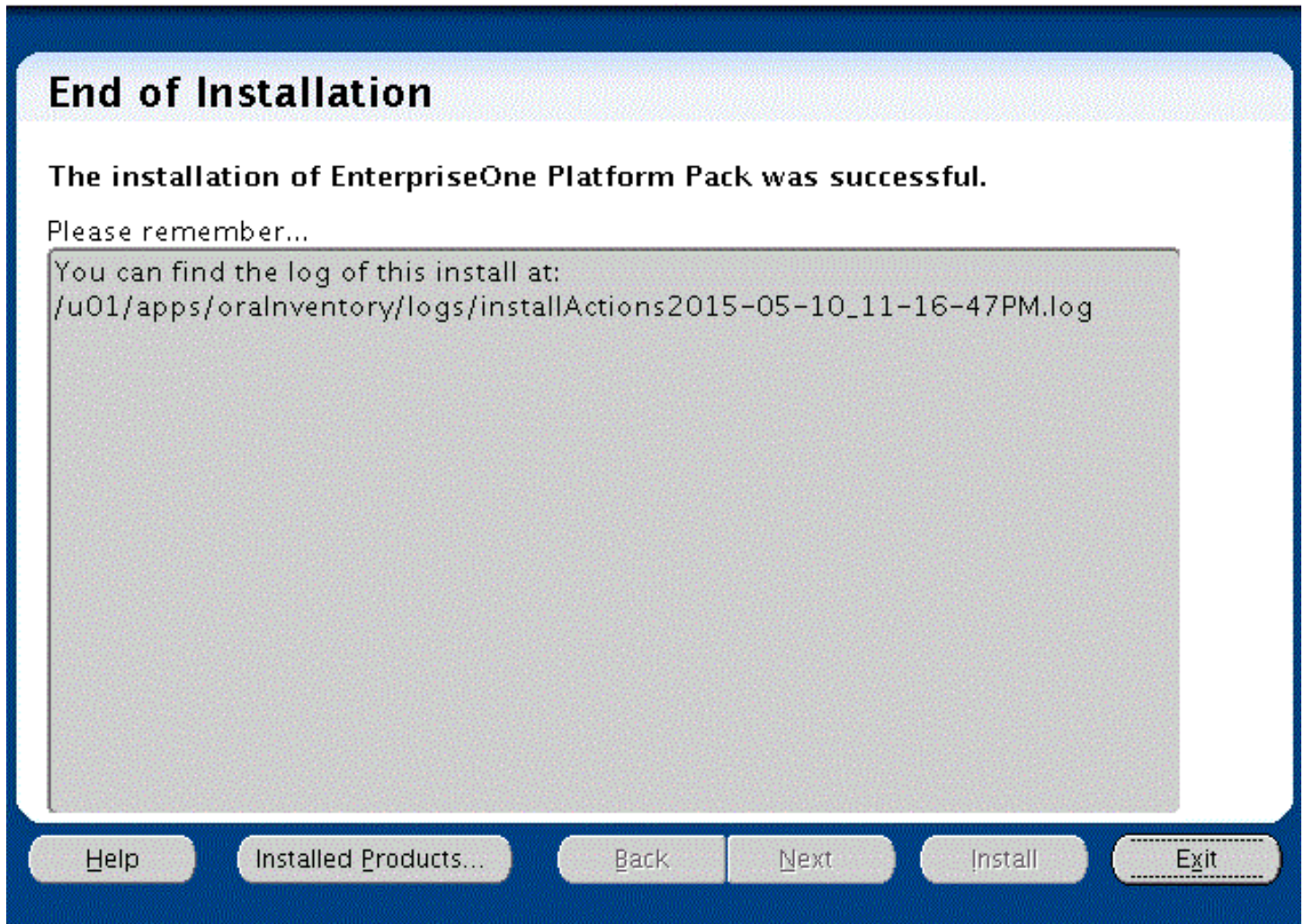
- c. Run this script to complete setting up the system accounts:

```
addacct.sh
```

This script also locks down permissions to this directory:

```
/u01/jdedwardspack/e920
```

- d. When the scripts have completed successfully, click the **OK** button to exit the dialog and return to the OUI Platform Pack installer **End of Installation** screen.

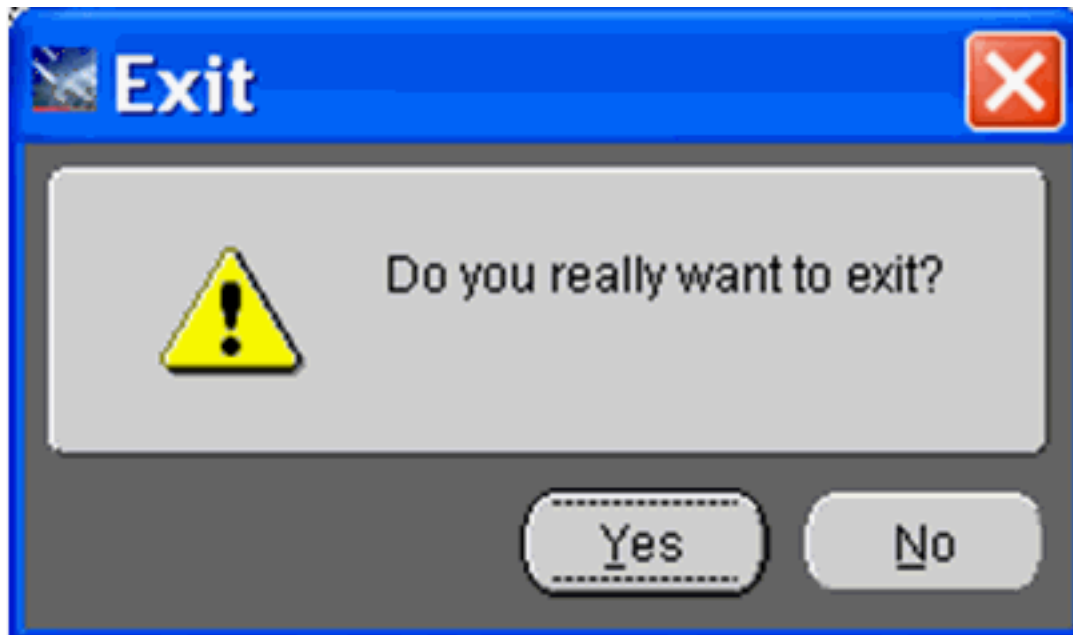

You can verify that the Platform Pack Installer ran properly by viewing the log file. The log file name is specified with the date and stamp when the installer ran. For example:

```
/u01/app/oraInventory/logs/installActions2011-08-16-02-09-38PM.log
```

Manually Running the Database Creation Scripts - UNIX with Oracle

Once the Platform Pack install has successfully completed on your UNIX-based Enterprise Server, the Oracle database creation scripts and dump files are located in the EnterpriseOne install location on the Enterprise Server. For example:

```
/u01/jdedwardspack/e920/ORCL
```

As it runs, the Platform Pack installer edits the script that sets the environment variables. You can review this script for accuracy:

```
ORCL_set.sh
```

Note: If you are manually running the `ORCL_set.sh` script without having it edited by the Platform Pack, you must manually edit it as follows: From:

```
export OVM=~OVM~  
export OVR=~OVR~
```

To:

```
export OVM=NO  
export OVR=NO
```

Depending on whether you are using ASM, you must also edit this line to change the variable `~ASM~` to YES or NO:

```
export ASM=~ASM~
```

To manually run the Oracle database installation scripts:

1. Sign on to the Enterprise Server as the Oracle owner. For example, **oracle**.
2. Change directory to the EnterpriseOne install location. For example:

```
cd /u01/jdedwardsppack/e920
```
3. You can review and change the tablespace scripts if desired. Do not change the tablespace names. The tablespace creation scripts are called:

```
crtabsp_xxx.unx  
crtabsp_xxx.sql
```

where `xxx` is the variable portion of the tablespace name.
4. Navigate to the ORCL folder under the install path. For example:

```
/u01/jdedwards/e920/ORCL
```
5. Verify the settings in the `InstallOracleDatabase.sh` script:

```
export DATABASE_INSTALL_PATH=/u01/jdedwardsppack/e920/ORCL
```
6. Run the `InstallOracleDatabase.sh` script.
7. Check the logs in the logs directory.

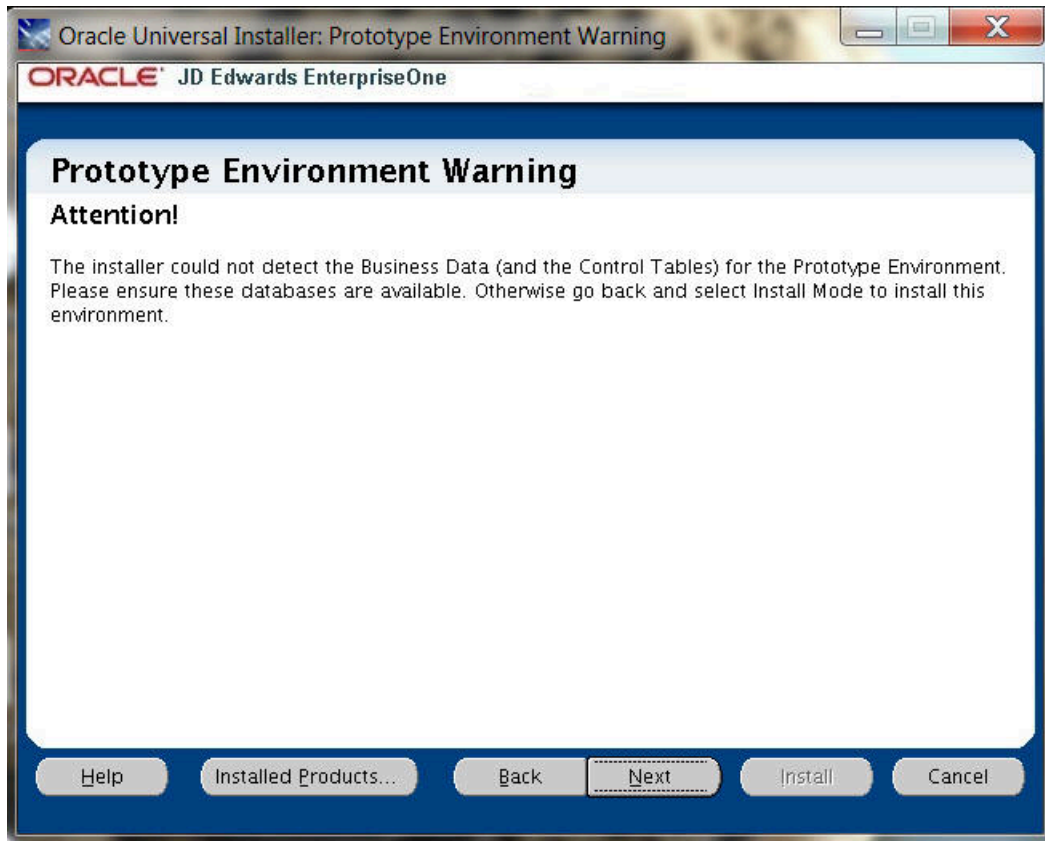
Troubleshooting Platform Pack Installation

This section discusses these potential error or warning conditions and their probable causes and resolutions when running the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* Platform Pack Installer:

- *Warning: Prototype Environment Already Exists*
- *Development Environment Warning*
- *Warning - Database Server Name Does Not Match*
- *Oracle Setup Issues*
- *Verifying Changes to .profile*

Warning: Prototype Environment Already Exists

This Error occurs if you have selected to install the Prototype Database, but the Prototype database already exists:



1. To remedy, your options are:

- If your Install type is Install, you can change it to Upgrade.
- If you are using the Custom install, you can deselect the Prototype Database.
- If you do not need the Prototype database, you can skip the installation of it on this screen and manually drop the database later.

Note: Because this is a warning, and not an error, if you understand the consequences you can click the **Next** button to continue.

2. In order for the installer to proceed or abort, you must choose one of these radio buttons:

- *Stop installation of all products.*

Choose this option if you want to exit the installer in order to make changes and then rerun the installer at a later time.

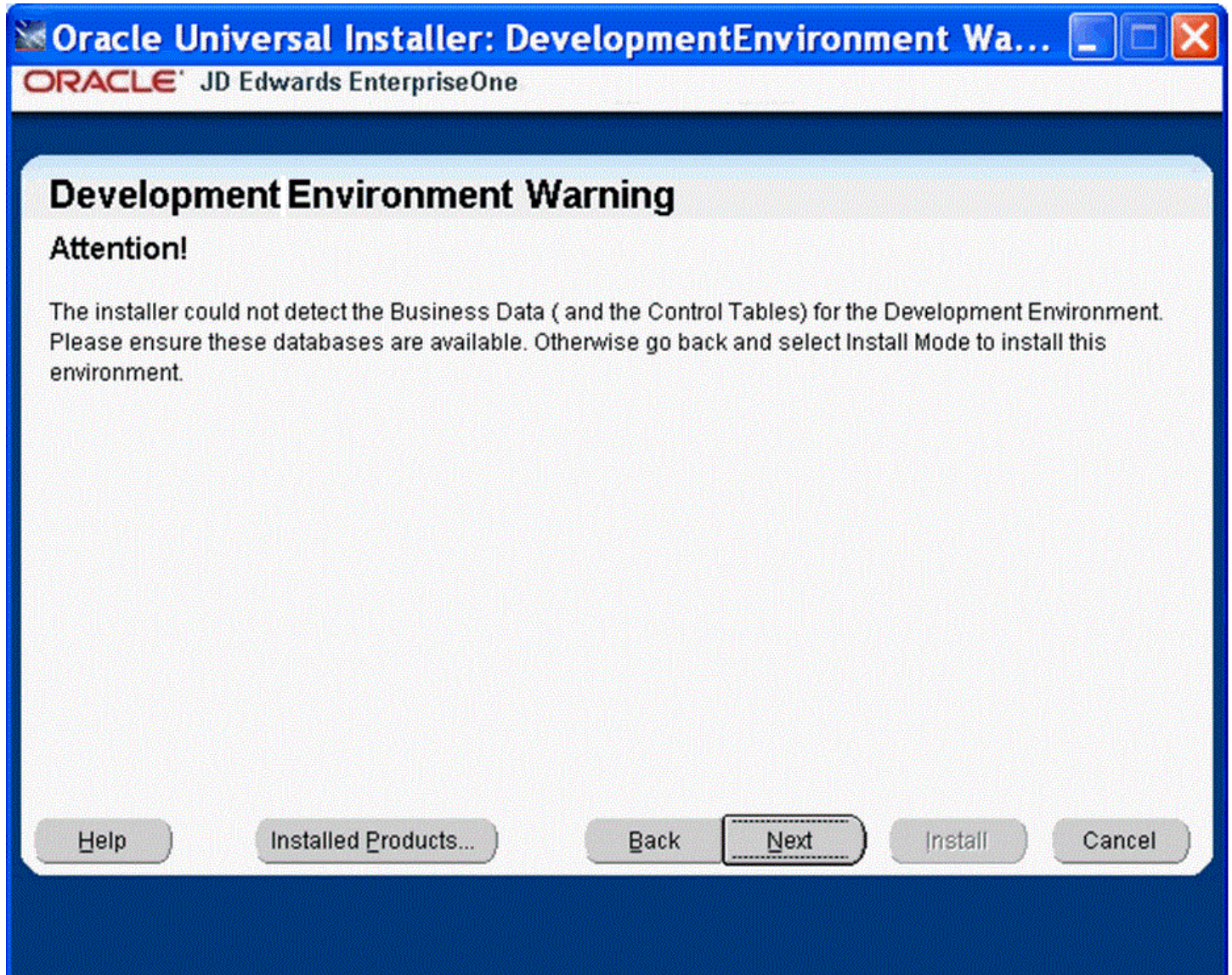
- *Stop the installation of this component only.*

Choose this option if you want to skip the installation of the Prototype database and continue running the installer.

3. Click the **OK** button to close the error dialog.

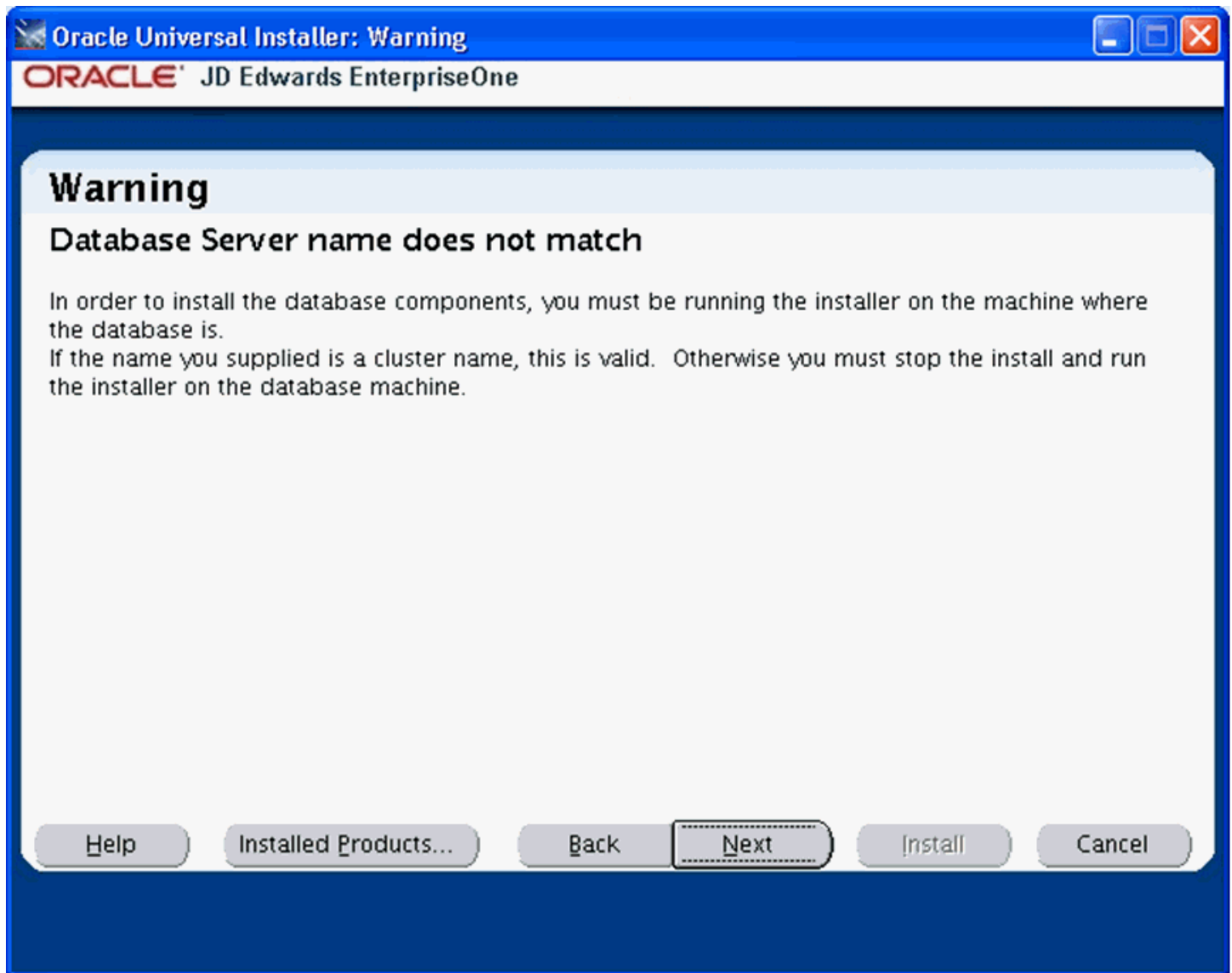
Development Environment Warning

This Warning indicates the installer could not detect Business Data (and the Control Tables) for the Development Environment and you have chosen the Upgrade option. If you do not want the Installer to create the Business Data and Control Tables, you can click on Next and ignore this error. Otherwise go back and change your options to use the Installer in Install and Custom mode to select and install it.



Warning - Database Server Name Does Not Match

The Platform Pack installer displays the following error message if the machine name you specified on Database Options does not match the machine name on which the installer is being run. In order to install the database components, you must run the Platform Pack installer on the machine on which the database resides. Unless the machine name you specified is a known-good cluster name, you must cancel the installation and run the installer on the database machine.



Oracle Setup Issues

After you create the user, if you sign on as the EnterpriseOne services account (*JDE920*) and you see error messages about the Oracle setup, edit `enterpriseone.sh` as follows:

1. Change to the directory where you installed EnterpriseOne.

For example:

```
cd /u02/JDEdwards/ e920
```

2. Locate this subdirectory under the EnterpriseOne installation directory:

```
cd SharedScripts
```

3. Open `enterpriseone.sh` in the editor of your choice.
4. Find the entries for `ORACLE_HOME` and `ORACLE_SID`. Change the `ORACLE_HOME` entry to the HOME for your 32 bit client install. Ensure the `ORACLE_SID` matches the `ORACLE_SID` of your database. See examples below.:

```
ORACLE_HOME=/u01/app/oracle/product/11.2.0/client_1
export ORACLE_HOME
```

```
ORACLE_SID=orcl
export ORACLE_SID
```

5. Immediately after the above line, add these lines:

```
PATH=$PATH:/usr/local/bin
export PATH
```

6. Save your changes and close the `enterpriseone.sh` file.

Note: If you still receive Oracle errors after modifying your `enterpriseone.sh` file as described above, it is likely that the Oracle database software is installed into a location other than the default location. In such a case, your Oracle administrator can provide you with the correct directory to add to the `PATH` variable.

Verifying Changes to .profile

The Platform Pack installer edits the `.profile` for all accounts that were created. You should verify that this edit was done successfully by navigating to the `.profile` for each account that was created, and look for the following:

```
If [ -f /install_location/SharedScripts/enterpriseone.sh ]; then
. /install_location/SharedScripts/enterpriseone.sh
fi
```

where `install_location` is for example:

```
/u01/jdedwards/ E920
```

Note: The `enterpriseone.sh` sets the environment variables and paths for EnterpriseOne, the JRE, Verity, and your database manager.

Rerunning the Platform Pack Installer

You must rerun the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* Platform Pack Installer to support these scenarios:

- You want to install the Enterprise Server and the Database Server on physically different machines.
- You want to add an Enterprise Server environment to the Enterprise Server.
- You want to add a Database Server database to the Database Server.
- You want to reinstall the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* Foundation on the Enterprise Server.
- You want to reinstall the System Database on the Database Server.

When you first ran the Platform Pack installer, to complete the installation you ran the `addacct.sh` script to lock down permissions to this directory:

```
/u01/jdedwardspack/e920
```

Prior to rerunning the Platform Pack installer for any purpose, you must run the `installer_chmod.sh` script to unlock and change permissions to allow the installer to execute. On the machine which you initially installed the Platform Pack:

1. Sign on as the root user.
2. Change directory to the location of the Platform Pack installer. For example:

```
cd /u01/jdedwardspack/e920_1/SharedScripts
```

3. Run the `installer_chmod.sh` script to change permissions so the Platform Pack installer can be re-run:

```
./installer_chmod.sh
```

You should never reinstall any components without first deinstalling the components. If you select to deinstall the mandatory components you must also select to deinstall or have already deinstalled all related optional components. This table lists the mandatory and related optional components:

Server	Mandatory Component	Optional Components
Enterprise Server	<i>JD Edwards EnterpriseOne</i> Foundation	ES Production ES Prototype ES Development ES Pristine
Database Server	System Database	Production Databases Prototype Databases Development Databases Pristine Databases

Enterprise Server

If you are rerunning the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* Platform Pack Installer in order to add environments, you must specify the same ORACLE_HOME as that which you selected for *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* Foundation during the initial installation of the Platform Pack.

Database Server

If you are rerunning the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* Platform Pack Installer in order to add databases, you must specify the same ORACLE_HOME as that which you selected for System Database during the initial installation of the Platform Pack.

Installing the Latest Tools Release to the Enterprise Server

Note: Ensure that the requisite JDK on the Enterprise Server meets the version requirements as specified in Oracle Certifications. If you need to upgrade the JDK, you should do so before you use Server Manager to deploy the new Tools Release. If an upgraded JDK version is applied on the target machine, it must be manually copied to the `.. \system\jre` folder on the Enterprise Server for use by the Tools Release for JD Edwards EnterpriseOne.

CAUTION: The Tools Release level must match what was installed on the Deployment Server. For instructions on installing the tools release on the Deployment Server, refer to the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Deployment Server Reference Guide for UNIX*.

CAUTION: The Tools Release level must match what was installed on the Deployment Server. For instructions on installing the tools release on the Deployment Server, refer to the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Deployment Server Reference Guide for UNIX*.

To install the latest Tools Release:

1. From the Update Center home page, download the latest Tools Release (for example, 9.2.1.0) and Tools Release documentation.
2. Using Server Manager, install the Tools Release to the Enterprise Server.

Working with Database Security

In order to maximize your database security, you should change the passwords on all table owners created during the Platform Pack installation; these are created with the user and password equal to the same value. Such a user and password relationship could expose you to worms and viruses aimed at gaining access to your database. Consult with your DBA for advice on changing passwords to meet the security requirements of your database installation.

The Installation Workbench assumes that the table owner 's password is the same as the table owner, unless it finds this override in the `jde.ini` file on the Deployment Server. Once the database passwords have been changed, you will need to add this section to the `jde.ini` file:

```
[DSPWD]
Datasource_owner=new_password
```

For example, if you changed the passwords for `PRODDTA` and `PRODCTL` to `alaska5` and `nevada6` your section would look like this:

```
[DSPWD]
PRODDTA=alaska5
PRODCTL=nevada6
```

The Installation Workbench assumes that the database user is JDE and that the password is the same, unless it finds this override in the `jde.ini` file on the Deployment Server. As a security precaution, you should also change the password on the JDE user and add an override in the `[DSPWD]` section of the `jde.ini` file. Once the database passwords have been changed, you will need to add this section to the `jde.ini` file:

```
[DSPWD]
JDE=new_password
```

For example, if you are changing the JDE user's password to `apples`, your section would look like this:

```
[DSPWD]
JDE=apples
```

Note: You must also logon to JDEPLAN using the changed password, otherwise database connections will fail. Using the above example of a changed password, you would logon using these credentials: User = JDE Password = apples Environment = JDEPLAN

CAUTION: The Installation Workbench can only process passwords equal to or less than 10 characters in length. Therefore, you cannot use passwords greater than 10 characters even if your RDBMS allows it.

After you change the `[DSPWD]` section of the `jde.ini` file, logon to OneWorld in the JDEPLAN environment on the Deployment Server with the new password in the correct case.

Whenever you change the password on your database, as recommended for security purposes, you must also ensure that your security settings in the Enterprise Server `jde.ini` file match that of your database. For applicable instructions, refer to the chapter entitled: *Performing Post Installation and Upgrade Tasks* in the section entitled: *Working With Signon Security and Table Creation Security*.

You should secure the `jde.ini` file on the Deployment Server to prevent unauthorized access. You can use Site Key to encrypt sensitive data in the `.ini` files on your Enterprise Server. For details, refer to the section of this guide entitled: *Generate a Site Key*.

CAUTION: As a best security practice, you should delete the `[DSPWD]` section once the install or upgrade is complete.

6 Working with Installation Planner for an Install

Understanding Installation Planner

Installation Planner is a *Release 9.2* application that runs on the Deployment Server. It is a system administration tool that guides you through the process of configuring the machines on which you will run *Release 9.2*.

Installation Planner guides you through setting up:

- *Language Information*
- *Location Information*
- *Deployment Server Information*
- *Enterprise Server Information*
- *Information*
- *Data Source Information*
- *Environment Information*

Language Information

Installation Planner enables you to create a plan for installing an alternate language or multiple languages as you create your master plan.

- You should follow the system prompts to choose which languages will be installed for each environment.
- For initial installations, you can complete your master plan and install languages later by creating a language-only plan. Refer to Chapter 15, "Creating a Language-Only Installation Plan" for more information about setting up an alternate language after the master plan.

Location Information

Locations are user-defined groups of machines, databases, and environments. The use of multiple locations is recommended for configurations across a wide area network (WAN).

Two types of locations exist: base locations and remote locations. Each installation plan can have only one base location. It is the central point for planning and executing the deployment process. The base location does not have a parent location and does not use a location code. You can have any number of tiered locations; each has a parent location and a location code.

To set up locations for installation plans, you must provide the installation program with the location, location description, location code (if there is a secondary location), and parent location (if there is a secondary location).

The location code is a three-character alphanumeric code that you specify. This location code is used as part of the name of the data sources for secondary locations in the plan. Locations are stored in the Deployment Locations Definition table (F9654).

See Also

Refer to Chapter 13, "Creating a Remote Installation Plan" for information about setting up remote locations.

Deployment Server Information

To set up the plan information for the Deployment Server, you must provide the installation program with the machine name and the directory share name. This information populates the Release Master (F00945) and Path Code (F00942) tables, and stores additional Deployment Server information in the Machine Master (F9650) and Machine Detail (F9651) tables.

Note: If you installed JD EnterpriseOne files to a remote Deployment Server, the deployment server name is the remote machine name by default.

Enterprise Server Information

To set up the plan for the Enterprise Server, you must provide Installation Planner with the name of the Enterprise Server, its platform type, and the database it uses. Installation Planner populates the F9650 and F9651 Enterprise Server tables and defines the data sources for the Enterprise Server. The Data Source information is stored in the Data Source Master table (F98611).

If you want to use cluster software, additional issues must be considered before installing *Release 9.2*. Refer to the section *Release 9.2 on a Cluster* in *Server and Workstation Administration* for more information before attempting the installation. The process also involves setting up multiple Server Map data sources for the Enterprise Server. This is required because Server Map data sources are specific to each Enterprise Server, so you must create one for each server.

Information

To set up the plan for the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne HTML Web Server*, you must provide Installation Planner with the name of the *HTML Web Server* machine, its platform type, and other information. Installation Planner populates the F9650 and F9651 HTML Web Server tables.

Data Source Information

When you run Installation Planner, these data sources are set up once and shared across all environments:

- **Server Map**

Server Map data sources are specific to each Enterprise Server, so you must create one for each server.

- **Data Dictionary**

This is the data source for the *Release 9.2* Data Dictionary tables. It is identified by the *Release 9.2* release (for example, *Data Dictionary - 920*).

- **Object Librarian**

This is the data source for the Object Librarian tables. It is identified by the *Release 9.2* release (for example, *Object Librarian - 920*).

- **System**

The data source for the System tables. It is identified by the *Release 9.2* release (for example, *System - 920*).

You must also set up these data sources for each environment:

- **Control Tables**

This is the data source for the Control Tables. You can have multiples (for example, Control Tables - Prod, Control Tables - Test, Control Tables - PS920, and Control Tables - CRP).

- **Central Objects**

The data source for the Central Objects specification tables is identified by the type and version number of the software. You can have multiple sets of Central Objects specifications (for example, *Central Objects - PD920* , *Central Objects - PS920* , *Central Objects - DV920* , and *Central Objects - PY920*). However, you can have only one Central Objects data source for each path code.

- **Business Data**

This is the data source for the Business Data tables. You can have multiple sets of Business Data data sources (for example, Business Data - CRP, Business Data - PROD, Business Data - TEST, and *Business Data - PS920*).

- **Versions**

The data source for the Versions List table (F983051). You can have multiple sets of versions tables (for example, *Versions - PD920* , *Versions - PS920* , *Versions - DV920* , and *Versions - PY920*). However, you can have only one Versions data source for each path code.

Environment Information

Installation Planner enables you to select default environments for your installation that are predefined, or you can choose to define them manually. Likewise, Installation Planner enables data load using default data load options, or you can choose to define them manually and override the default data load options.

Working with Software Requirements

The goal of the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Release 9.2* Installation is to include the most current tools releases and updates at the time the installation image is mastered. However, subsequent to that time it is possible that critical fixes

may become necessary and available. You should check Section 1.3.1, "Accessing Certifications" to verify if any such *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Release 9.2* Installation fixes are required.

Reviewing Installation Planner Processing Options

Processing options control how Installation Planner responds as you set up plans and options you see as you work through the custom planner. If processing options are not set up correctly, you will not see the appropriate options as you work through the planner. You set up these processing options to control business function mapping.

You should review the default processing options for the Installation Planner application prerequisite to create the plan. First-time users can set up the processing options to step through the planner with informational messages. If you do not want to see these messages, you can turn them off.

Assumptions About Reviewing Installation Planner Processing Options

This table lists the assumptions about reviewing the processing options for the installation planner.

Personnel	Installer
Logon Status	On the Deployment Server, logged on as user JDE with the database password for user JDE, in the Planner environment.
Prerequisites	The Deployment Server must be installed.
Concurrent Tasks	The Platform Pack installer can be running.

Accessing Processing Options

To access processing options, you must first log on to *Release 9.2* and specify your installation plan type.

1. Log on to *Release 9.2* as user JDE with the database password for user JDE.
2. Access the planner environment (*JDEPLAN*).
3. From the System Installation Tools menu (GH961), right-click either Typical Installation Plan or Custom Installation Plan.
4. Choose **Prompt for Values**.

<i>Primary User</i>	The user to whom an email is sent when a package is deployed. The default value for Primary User is listed in the JDE.INI . This is also the UNIX user ID that is used to install <i>Release 9.2</i> on the Enterprise Server. For example, jde920.

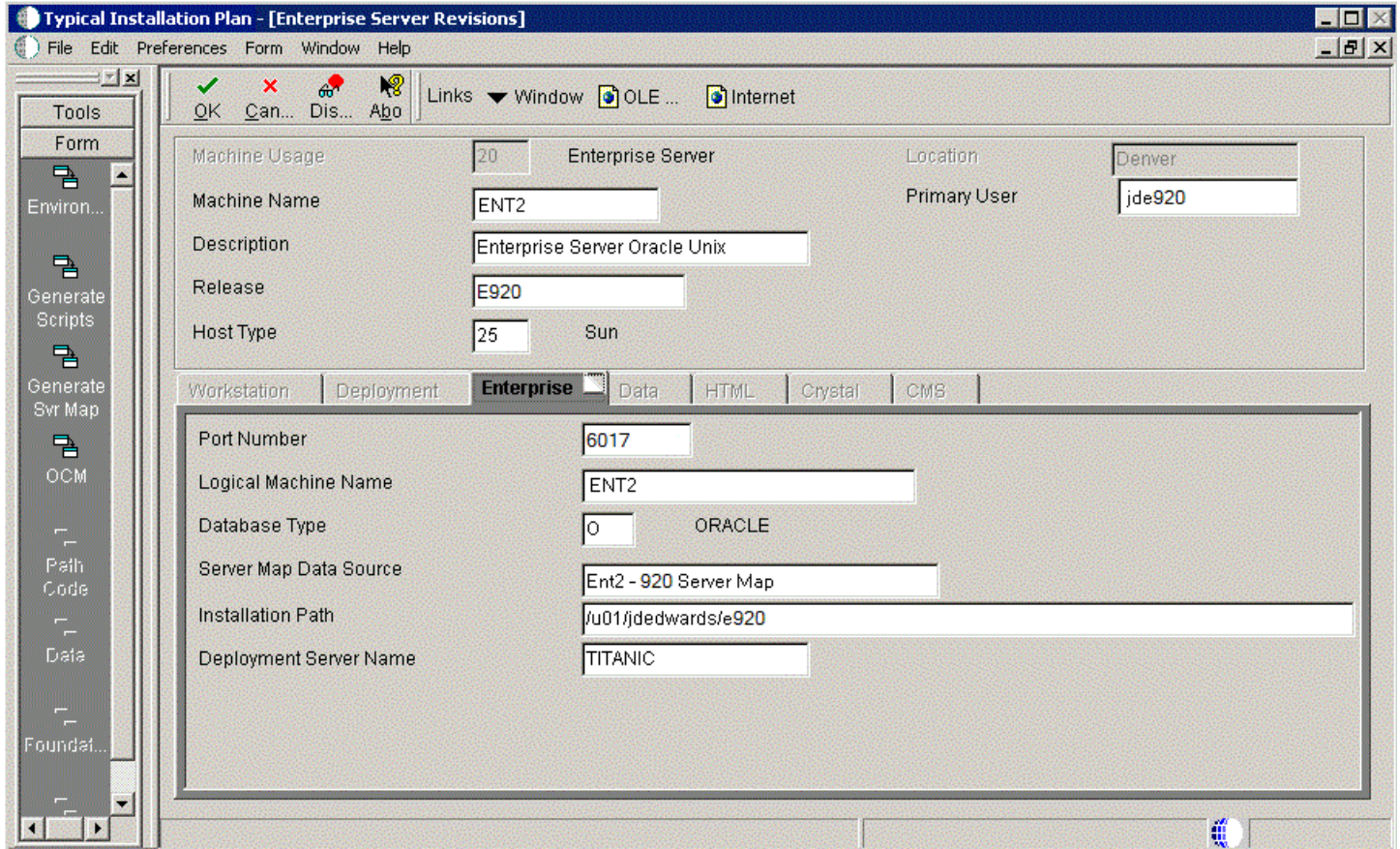

	<p>Because the machine name is used to create the Server Map datasource name, and because the Platform Pack Installer does not restrict you from entering a machine name that results in a datasource name greater than 30 characters; if the machine name for the Enterprise Server is longer than 13 characters, the resulting datasource name will be longer than the allowed 30 characters. For example, if your machine name is 15 characters (A23456789012345), the base datasource name in the server JDE . INI will be: A23456789012345 - 920 Server Map</p> <p>Note: The field in table F98611 is a hard restriction; the field only allows 30 characters. 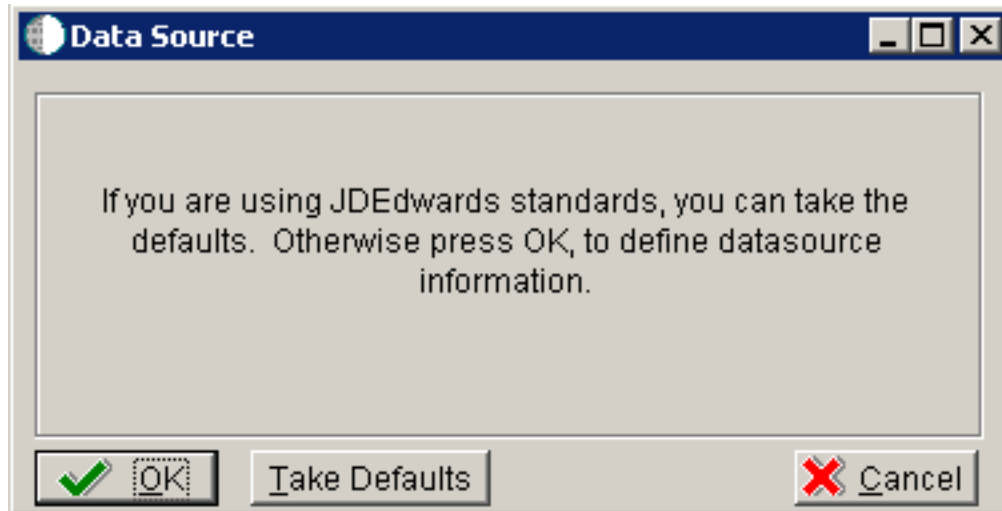

Port Number	The port number value (6017) for this Enterprise Server as supplied from the <code>JDE.INI</code> .
Logical Machine Name	The Installation Planner detects and provides a default value based on the current machine name on which the program is running. The name is case sensitive, should not exceed 15 characters, and should not contain any special characters.
Database Type	Enter the value for your database:
Server Map Data Source	Whenever you enter a host type, the Installation Planner populates this field with a default value: <i>machinename - 920 Server Map</i> where <i>machinename</i> is the name of your machine.

<i>Host Type</i>	The default value of 50 specifies the server type as Intel NT. Select the correct server type.
<i>Location</i>	The location chosen for this plan appears in this field by default.
<i>Primary User</i>	<p>The user to whom an email is sent when a package is deployed. The default for Primary User is listed in the <i>JDE.INI</i> .</p> <p>This is also the UNIX user ID that is used to install <i>Release 9.2</i> on the Enterprise Server. For example, jde920.</p>

2. On the HTML tab, complete these fields:

Understanding a Custom Installation Plan

Note: After installing the Deployment Server, you must define and run the installation plan. You must either define and run a Typical or a Custom Installation Plan -- do not do both.

Note: If you installed JD EnterpriseOne files to a remote Deployment Server, the deployment server name is the remote machine name by default.

Within a custom installation plan, the information you provide on the Installation Planner forms, such as database type and Enterprise Server type, determines the information displayed on the remaining forms. The Installation Planner processing options also determine which choices are available while setting up your plan. For a complete description of the processing options, refer to *Reviewing Installation Planner Processing Options*.

Data Source Considerations

JD Edwards EnterpriseOne configures your *Release 9.2* data sources as completely as possible. However, when you run Installation Planner, you might need to modify some data source information to reflect your system-specific configuration.

Starting Installation Planner

To start Installation Planner from within *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* :

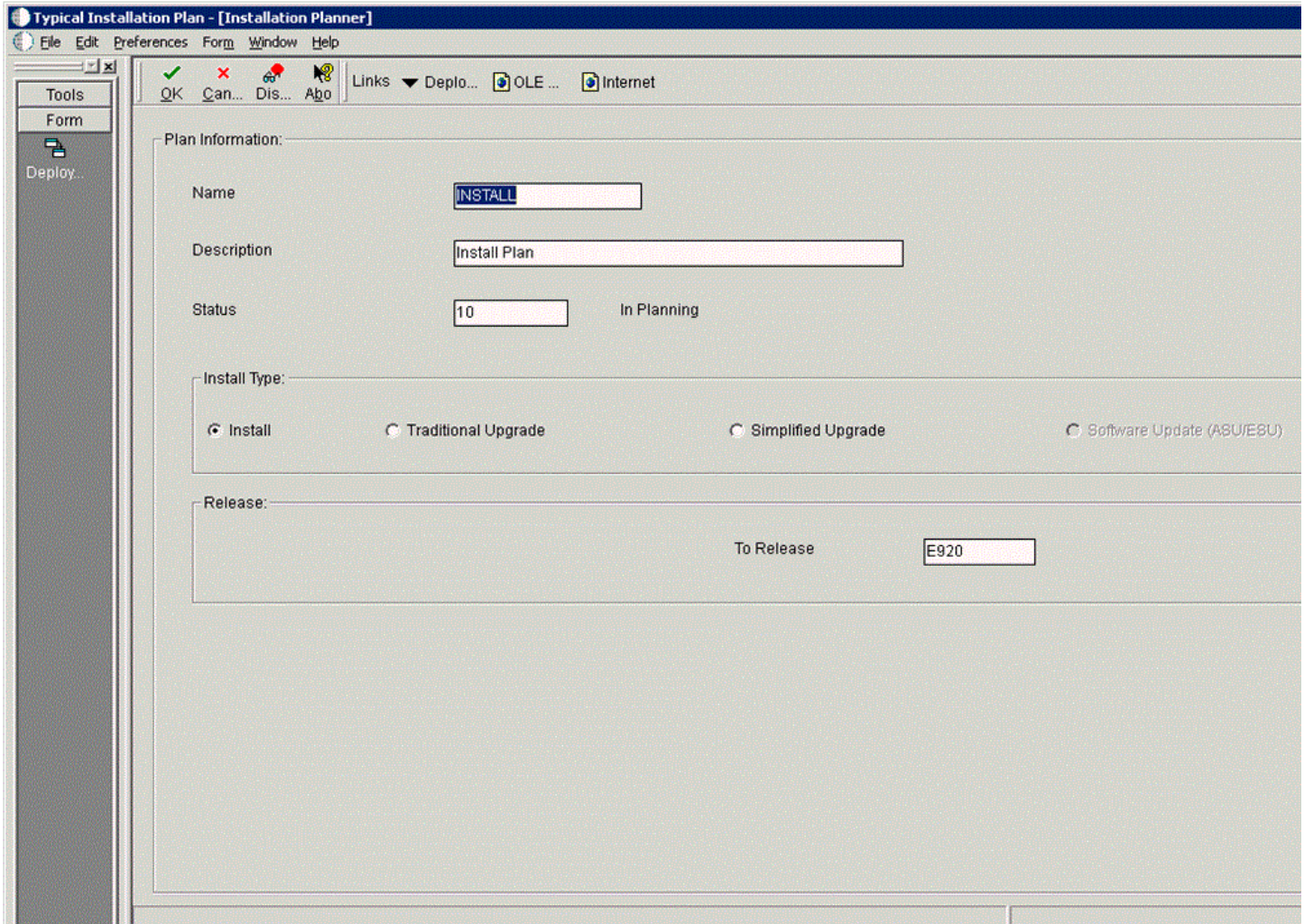
1. Access the System Installation Tools Menu (GH961).
2. On the System Installation Tools menu, double-click Custom Installation Plan.
3. On Work with Installation Plans, click the **Add** button.

Values are: 1- Primary Deployment Server (default value) 0 - Secondary Deployment Server The server share name of the directory to which you installed <i>Release 9.2</i> on your Deployment Server. Verify that the server share name for <i>Release 9.2</i> is: \ <i>E920</i>

4. Click the **OK** button.

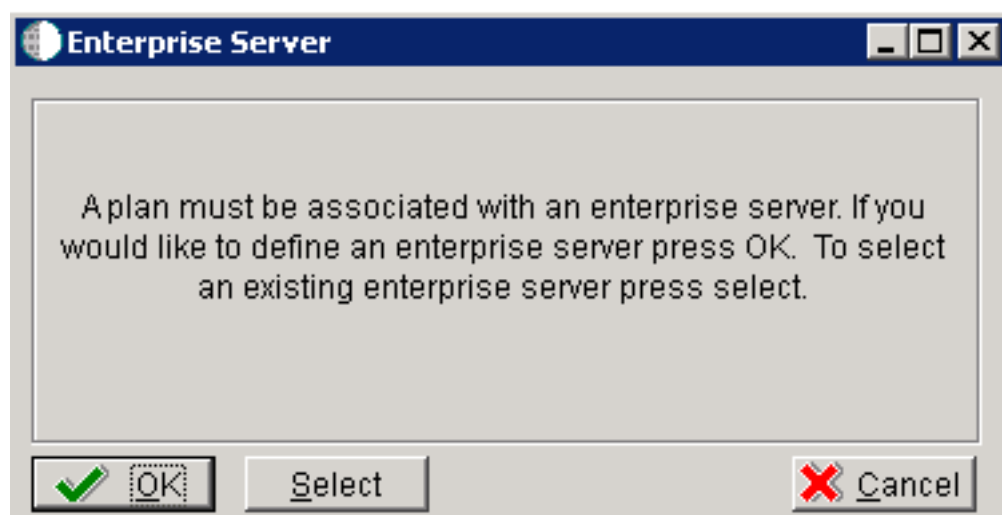
Tip: If you enter invalid information into a tab field, a stop sign symbol appears next to the tab name, such as Deployment Server. For more information about the error, click the stop sign icon in the bottom right-hand corner of the form.



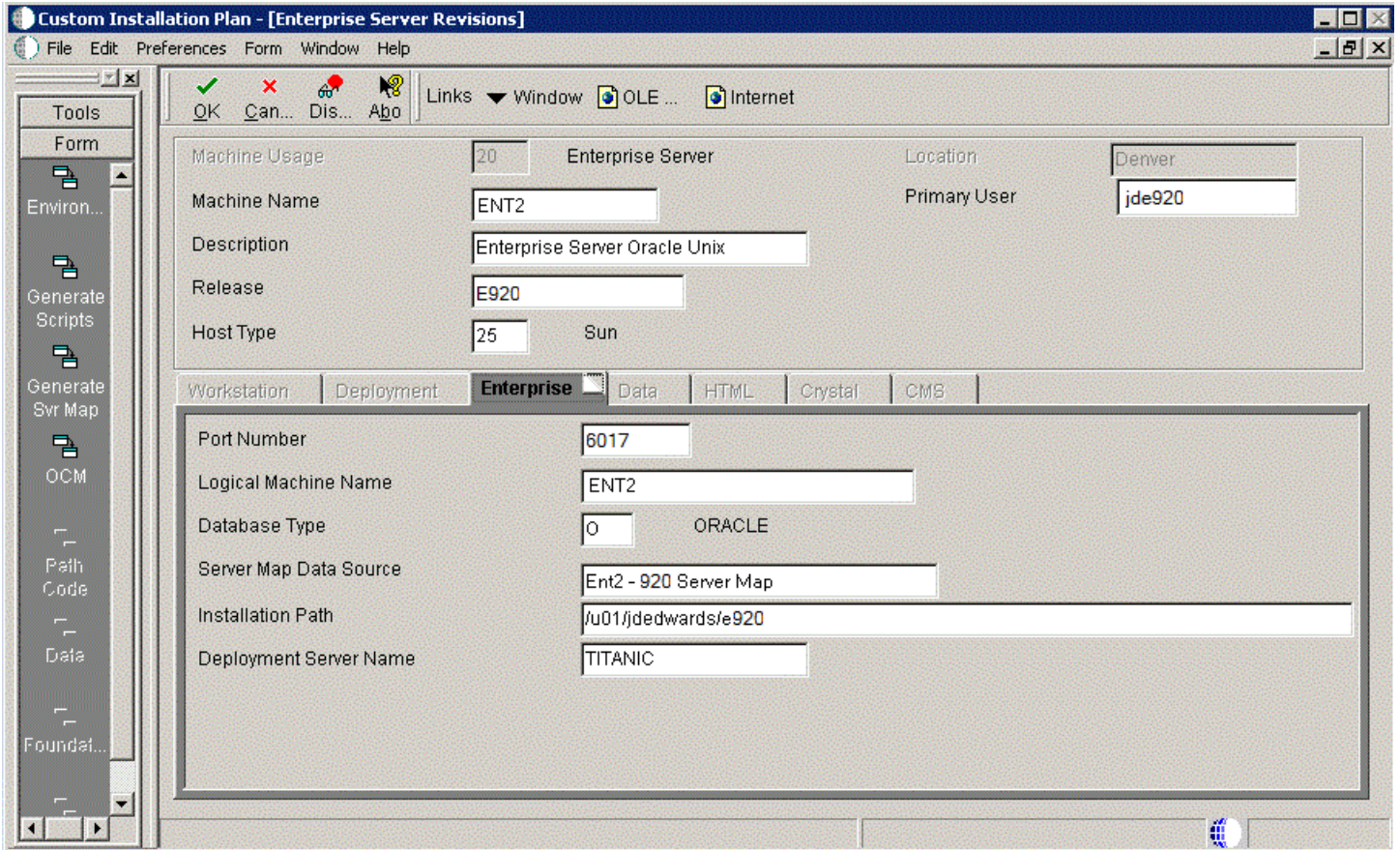

1. On Enterprise Server Revisions, verify or complete these fields:

Field	Description
<i>Machine Name</i>	The name of the primary Enterprise Server. The name is case sensitive and should not contain any special characters.

Field	Description
	<p>Because the machine name is used to create the Server Map datasource name, and because the Platform Pack Installer does not restrict you from entering a machine name that results in a datasource name greater than 30 characters; if the machine name for the Enterprise Server is longer than 13 characters, the resulting datasource name will be longer than the allowed 30 characters. For example, if your machine name is 15 characters (A23456789012345), the base datasource name in the server JDE . INI will be:</p> <p>A23456789012345 - 920 Server Map</p> <p>Note: The field in table F98611 is a hard restriction; the field only allows 30 characters. The actual field size cannot be modified or changed.</p> <p>When the Planner runs it truncates the value to 30 characters because that is the restriction in the F98611 table. The Platform Pack does not truncate the value when it builds the JDE . INI for the Enterprise Server. Therefore, any value greater than 30 characters will result in a mismatch between the JDE . INI and the F98611 table. That is, using the previous example, the JDE . INI would have the full length value A23456789012345 - 920 Server Map (which is 32 characters) while the F98611 populated by the Planner would have a value of A23456789012345 - 920 Server M.</p> <p>To remedy, you could do any one of the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Manually modify values in table F98611 to match the truncated value in the JDE . INI file. ○ Ensure that the value is not truncated by limiting the datasource name to 30 characters (this would mean limiting the machine name for the Enterprise Server to 13 characters). ○ Manually truncate the value in the F98611 table (for example, A23456789012345 - 920 Svr Map). <p>In any case, you must ensure that the values for Server Map datasource names in the F98611 table exactly match those in the JDE . INI file on the Enterprise Server.</p> <p>This name is not case-sensitive in the Installation Planner. Therefore, regardless of underlying UNIX operating system considerations, you cannot name multiple Enterprise Servers with the same name but with different cases. For example, you cannot name multiple Enterprise Servers ORACLE and oracle.</p>
<i>Description</i>	Enter a description for the machine.
<i>Release</i>	Enter the release number to which this plan applies, or use the visual assist button to choose one from the list. The default value is <i>E920</i> .
<i>Host Type</i>	<p>Click the visual assist button and choose the type of Enterprise Server you are adding to the plan. In this case, a specific UNIX server as listed by the valid Host Type values:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ 25 -- Sun Solaris ○ 30 -- RS6000

Field	Description
	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> o 35 -- Linux
<i>Location</i>	The location chosen for this plan appears by default.
<i>Primary User</i>	<p>The user to whom an email is sent when a package is deployed. The default value for Primary User is jde920.</p> <p>This is also the UNIX user ID that is used to install <i>Release 9.2</i> on the Enterprise Server. For example, jde920.</p>

Note: The case of machine name must also match the network ID for that machine.

- Continuing on Enterprise Server Revisions, select the Enterprise tab, and complete or verify these fields:

Field	Description
<i>Port Number</i>	The port number value (6017) for this Enterprise Server appears by default from the <code>JDE.INI</code> .
<i>Logical Machine Name</i>	The Installation Planner detects and provides a default value based on the current machine name on which the program is running. The name is case sensitive, should not exceed 15 characters, and should not contain any special characters.
<i>Database Type</i>	Enter the value for your database:
<i>Server Map Data Source</i>	<p>Whenever you enter a host type, the Installation Planner populates this field with a default value:</p> <p><code>machinename - 920 Server Map</code></p> <p>where <code>machinename</code> is the name of your machine.</p>
<i>Installation Path</i>	<p>Verify that the default value is the installation directory path to which you want to install <i>Release 9.2</i> on the Enterprise Server. Make sure the value is specific to your version of the release. For example, for <i>Release 9.2</i> the default path is:</p> <p><code>/JDEdwardsPPack/ E920</code></p> <p>You might need to prepend the mount point to the path. For example:</p> <p><code>u01/JDEdwardsPPack/ E920</code></p> <p>Caution: You must change the value that defaults into the <i>Installation Path</i> field as shown in the screen capture above.</p>

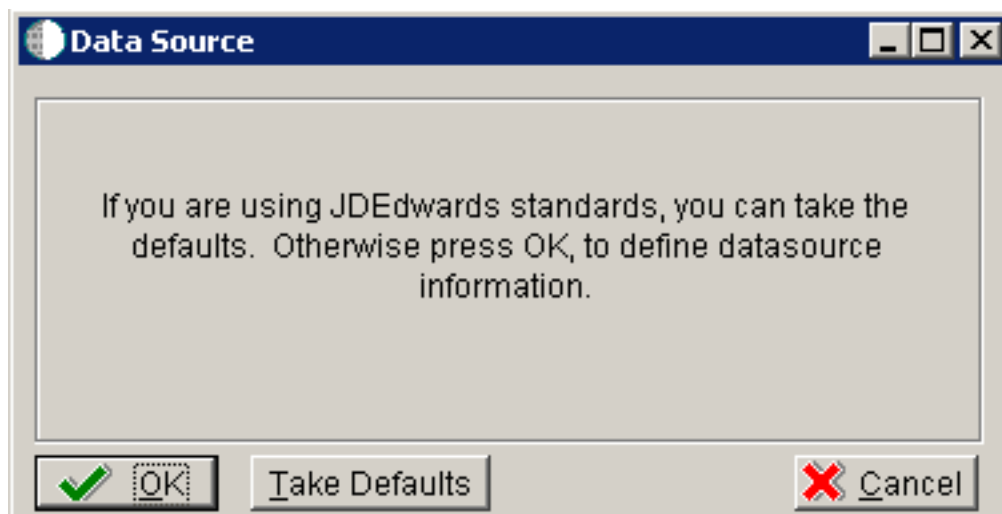

<i>Primary User</i>	<p>The user to whom an email is sent when a package is deployed. The default for Primary User is listed in the <i>JDE.INI</i> .</p> <p>This is also the UNIX user ID that is used to install <i>Release 9.2</i> on the Enterprise Server. For example, jde920.</p>

3. On the HTML tab, complete these fields:

Field	Description
<i>Primary HTML Server</i>	When the system code generates an email message with a web shortcut pointing to a form, the web shortcut generated points to the "Primary" <i>HTML Web Server</i> . Only one of all the <i>HTML Web Server</i> s defined in installation planner can be defined as primary ("1").
<i>Protocol</i>	This is the protocol used by the HTML Web Server. Valid values are <i>http</i> or <i>https</i> .
<i>Server URL</i>	<p>This is the Domain Name System (DNS) host name of the <i>HTML Web Server</i> .</p> <p>The syntax is:</p> <p><code>server_name:port\jde\owhtml</code></p> <p>For example:</p> <p><code>DEVNTA:81\jde\owhtml</code></p>

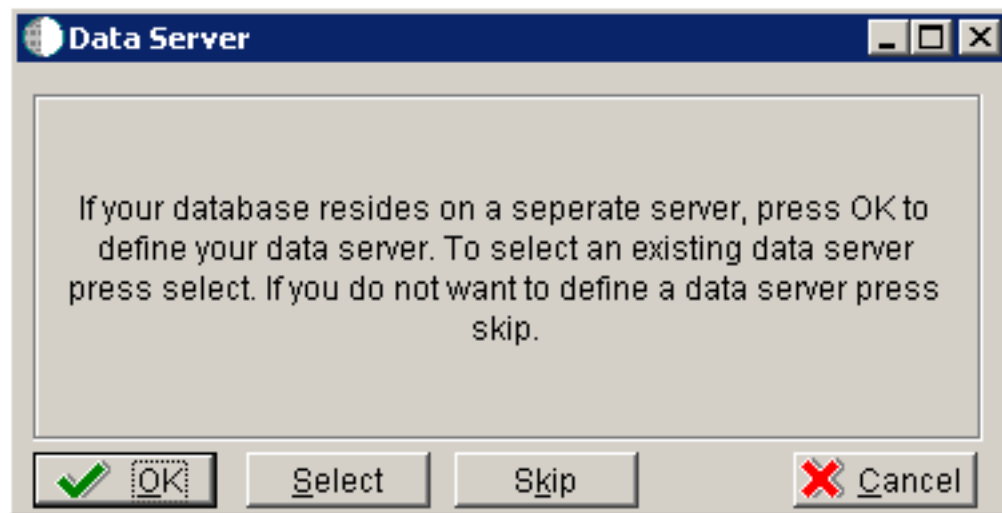
Field	Description
<p><i>Http Port</i></p>	<p>This is the port number the <i>HTML Web Server</i> is listening to.</p> <p>For HTTP, the typical port number is 80.</p> <p>For HTTPS, the typical port number is 443.</p> <p>However, you can choose to implement a <i>HTML Web Server</i> using a different port number.</p>
<p><i>Default Login</i></p>	<p>Defines how shortcuts to a web form are generated by the system code. Values are either a reserved value or an explicit servlet name. Reserved values are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Standard <p>The URL generated will point to a servlet on the Primary <i>HTML Web Server</i> .</p> ○ Redirector <p>The URL generated will point to redirector in the Primary <i>HTML Web Server</i> , and redirector will point to a servlet on another <i>HTML Web Server</i> for load balancing. The servlet name to use is generated by the system.</p> ○ Explicit Servlet Name <p>The user can specify an explicit servlet name in this field. In this case, the redirector functionality cannot be used. The URL generated will point to the specified servlet in the Primary <i>HTML Web Server</i> .</p> <p>Usage of Explicit servlet name is for backward compatibility only. You should not use it unless you have a direct need.</p>
<p><i>Installation Path</i></p>	<p>Enter the installation directory path to which you are installing <i>Release 9.2</i> on your <i>HTML Web Server</i> .Make sure this is specific to your version of the release, and also the platform and application server on which your <i>HTML Web Server</i> is running.</p> <p>For default paths, refer to the applicable platform- and application server-dependent version of the <i>JD Edwards EnterpriseOne HTML Web Server Reference Guide (WebLogic for UNIX or WebSphere for UNIX)</i>. Otherwise, you must obtain this value from the HTML Web Server machine itself, or its administrator.</p>
<p><i>Deployment Server Name</i></p>	<p>Using the visual assist button, choose the name of the Deployment Server to which this HTML Web Server is attached. A Deployment Server name appears in this field by default, but you can change it if necessary.</p>

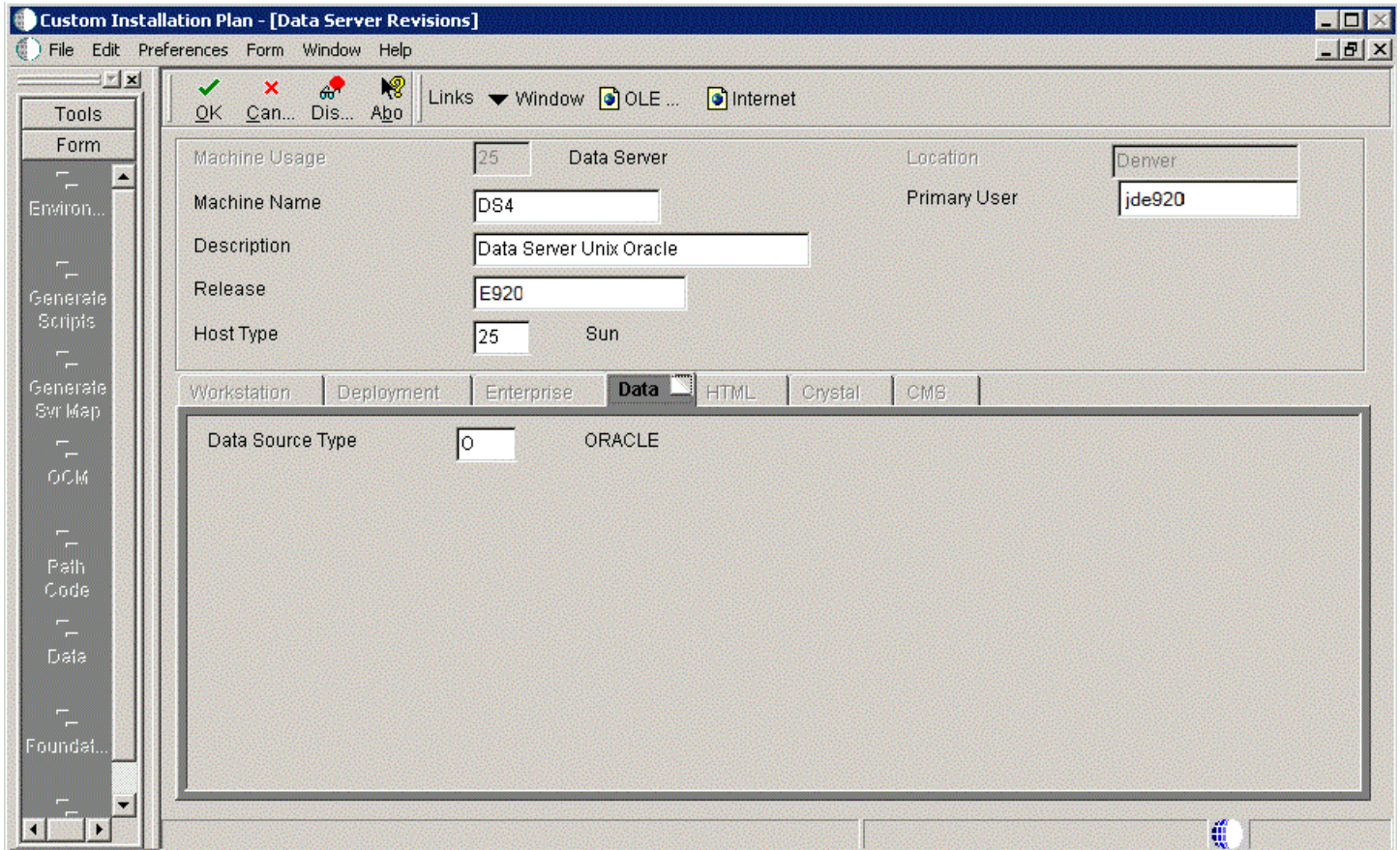

<i>Host Type</i>	<p>Select the type of Database Server that you are adding to the plan. Values are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ 10 — IBM i ○ 25 — Sun Solaris ○ 30 — RS/6000 ○ 35 — Linux ○ 50 — Microsoft Windows (Intel) ○ 80 — Client - Microsoft Windows ○ 90 — Client - Microsoft Windows
<i>Location</i>	The Installation Planner populates this field by default, based on previous selections.
<i>Primary User</i>	<p>The user to whom an email is sent once a package is deployed. The default for Primary User is jde920.</p> <p>This is also the UNIX user ID that is used to install <i>Release 9.2</i> on the Enterprise Server. For example, jde920.</p>

3. On the **Data** tab, complete the following field:

Field	Description
<i>Data Source Type</i>	<p>Choose the type of data source. For example:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ O - Oracle

4. Click the **OK** button.
5. To add another Data Server, click the **Yes** button and repeat steps 1 through 4 to define another Data Server.

Understanding Environment Setup

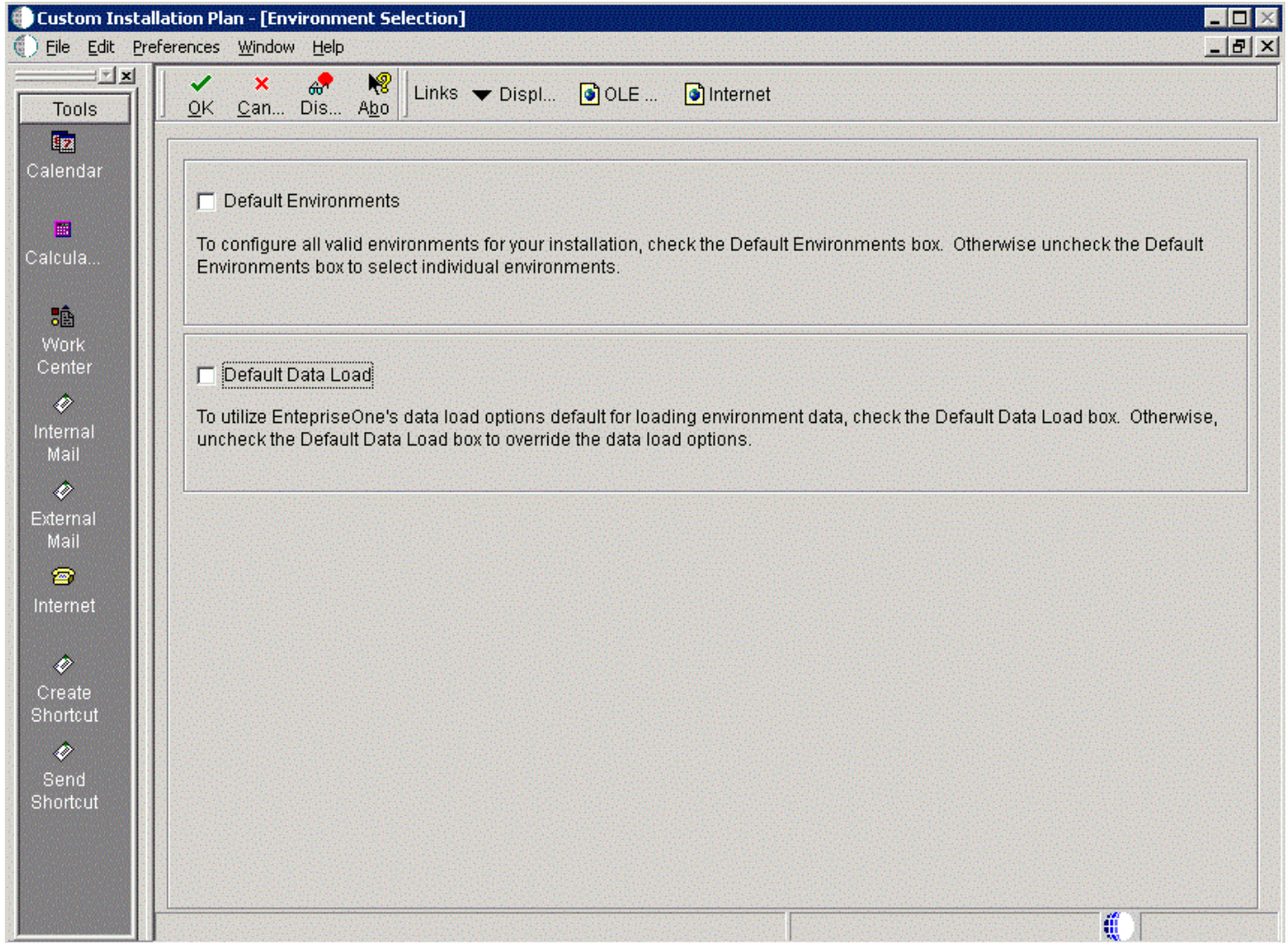
By default, Installation Planner configures your system using values for typical environments. Depending on the options chosen when you set up your plan, *Release 9.2* displays one or more of the following parameters, which you can customize in the following tasks:

- Environments
- Data load options

You can customize any of these parameters by turning off the default option on the **Environment Selection** form. As you move through the plan, Installation Planner displays a customization form for each parameter that you clear.

Setting Up Environments

To set up environments:



1. On Environment Selection, clear the options that you do not want to customize.

Note: Different parameters appear depending on the options that you chose at the beginning of the planning process.

2. Click the **OK** button.

Note: If you selected the default option, which is to include all parameters, skip to *Working with Environment Data Sources*.

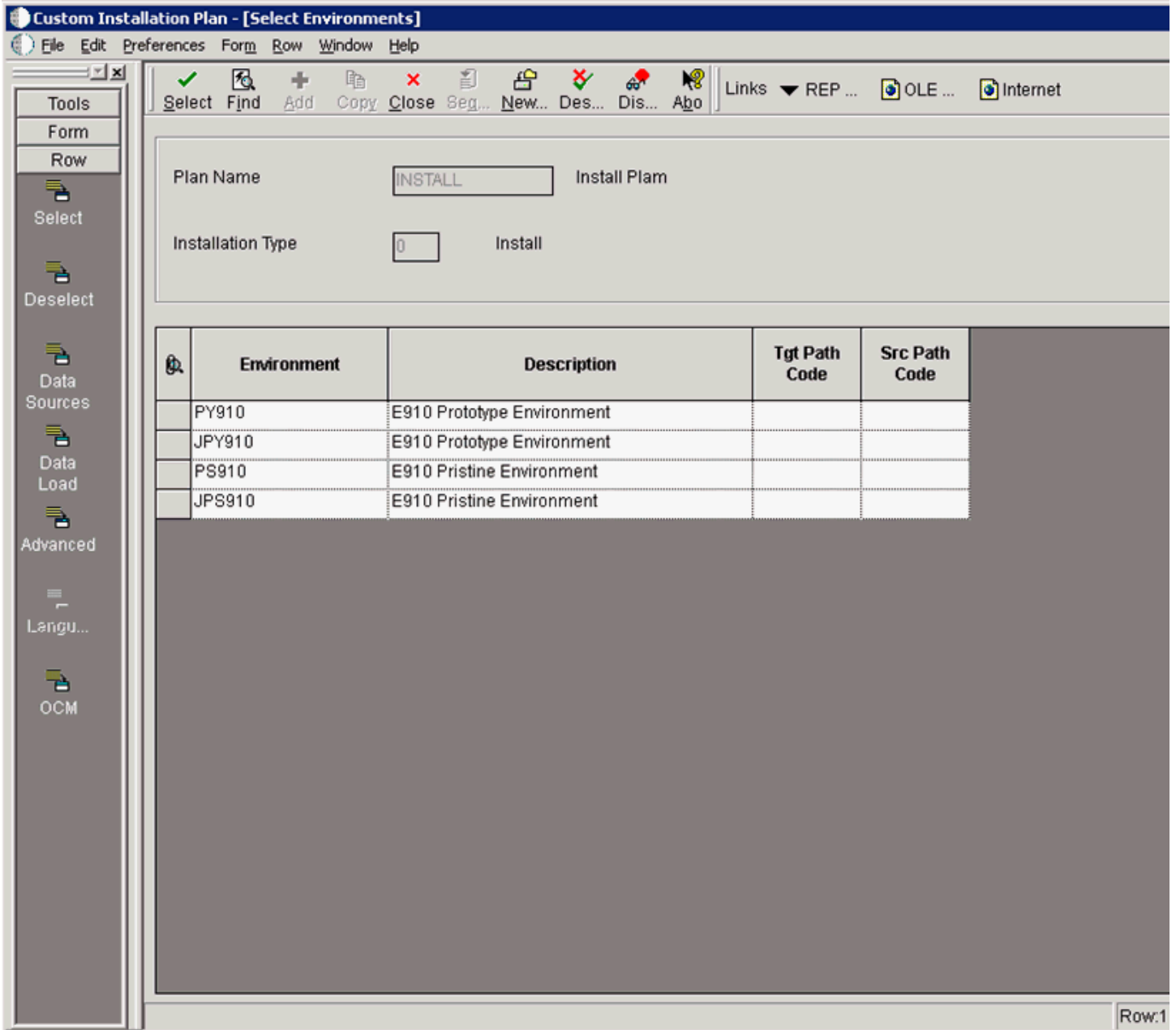

Note: Adding a Custom Environment. Previous releases of JD Edwards EnterpriseOne allowed you to add a custom environment using P98410 to Add or Copy a custom Environment. Selecting an Environment

To select an environment:



1. On Select Environments, double-click the environment that you want to define. Selected environments are indicated with a green check mark in the left-most column of the grid.

Note: The Jxx environments are required for the *HTML Web Server*.

To set up multiple environments, select and define them one at a time.

2. Click the **Close** button to exit the Select Environments screen.

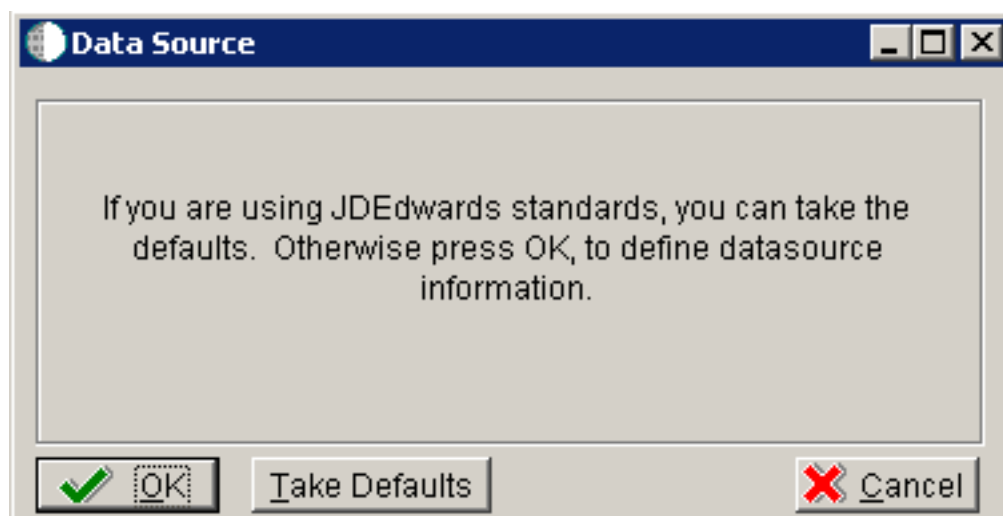

Installation Planner displays a message to let you know that the installation plan has been finalized.



On the Information Prompt that indicates Installation Planner has concluded, click the **OK** button to exit the message box and initiate the Planner Validation Report.

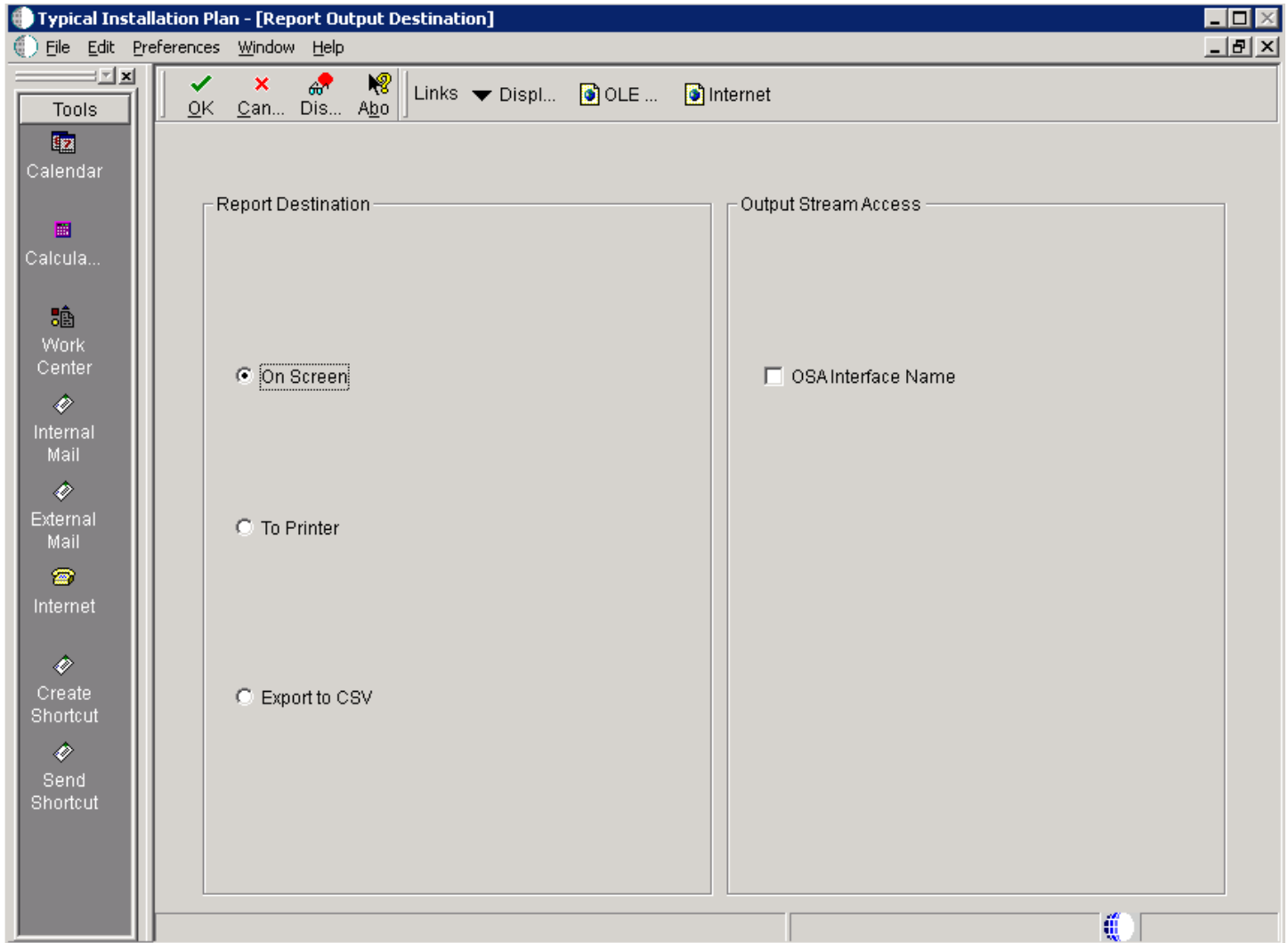

 - o If the processing option default was selected, Planner Validation Report automatically prompts you to run this report.
 - o If the processing option default was not selected, click the **Validate** node on the tree view of your plan to initiate the Planner Validation Report.

When the plan is finalized:

- The status is set to 20, which signals that several adjustments to tables were made according to your plan.
- The OCM is created.
- The *JDE.INI* is modified.
- The following tables are upgraded:
 - o Release Master table (F00945).

 - o Package Plan table (F98404).
 - o Machine Detail table (F9651).
 - o Language table (F984031), if you are installing an alternate language.

Concluding the Planner Validation Report

Deleting Machines from an Installation Plan

As you work through the Installation Planner application, you might find that you need to delete a server or machine that you have created. You can use Installation Planner to delete machines as needed; however, doing so can affect related databases, shared Enterprise Servers and Deployment Servers, and associated records.

To delete machines from an installation plan:

1. In the *Release 9.2* planner environment, enter P9654A in the Fast Path field and press Enter.
2. On Work With Locations and Machines, click the **Find** button.
3. Expand the location.

A list of your locations, machines, or servers appears for the base location in the tree view.

4. Select the location, machine, or server that you want to delete.
5. Click the **Delete** button.
6. To close the application, click the **Close** button.

7 Working With Installation Workbench

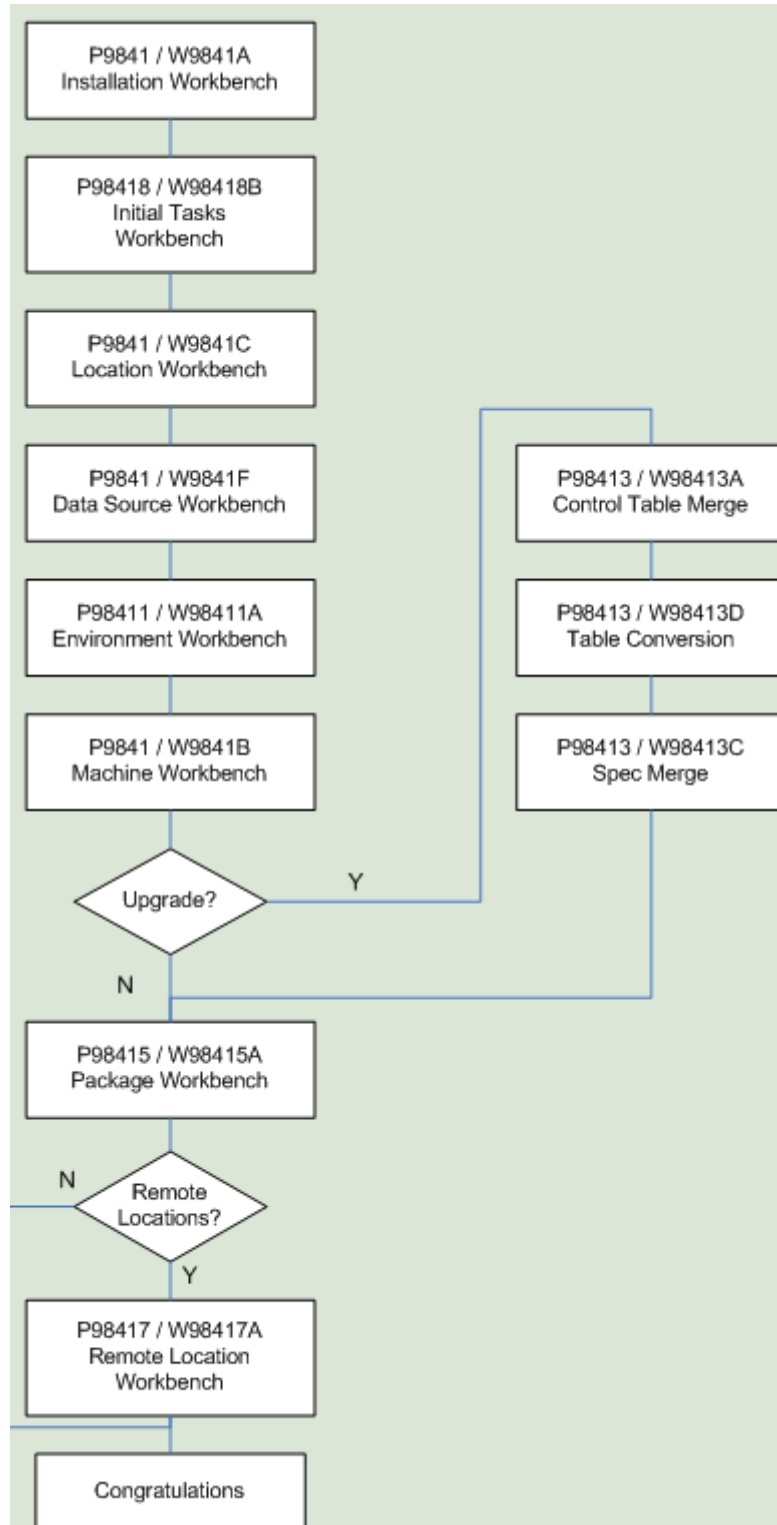
Understanding Workbench Components

After planning the *Release 9.2* installation using Installation Planner, you should run the plan using Installation Workbench. The logic of this program runs specific workbench programs according to the plan you created.

The Installation Workbench is a series of JD Edwards EnterpriseOne applications that are linked together to perform the various tasks of Install, Upgrade and Update of JD Edwards EnterpriseOne on the Deployment Server.

Installation Workbench can be run in attended mode or unattended mode. In attended mode, you start each workbench after the previous workbench completes. In unattended mode (the default value), each workbench runs without user intervention. You can set task breaks before or after any specific workbench to stop the process at any point. If using unattended mode, you must check that each task ran successfully.

The workbenches flow in the order shown in the following diagram.



As listed in this table, Installation Workbench includes the components, some or all of which might be used for your installation, depending on your installation plan:

Installation Workbench Component	Functional Description
Initial Tasks Workbench	When using unattended workbench mode, this workbench runs Release Master after Installation Workbench is started and before Location Workbench begins.
Location Workbench	This workbench copies all locations that are defined in the plan from the F9654 and F984021 tables in the Planner data source to the <i>System - 920</i> data source.
Data Source Workbench	Copies all data sources that are defined in the plan from the F98611 and F986115 tables in the Planner data source to your <i>System - 920</i> data source. It also updates the F98401 table to indicate completion.
Environment Workbench	Checks the Table Conversion Scheduler (F98405) and calls B984052 to load data (R98403), creates the table and index (R98407), and copies the path code (R9800942) if scheduled, and Object Librarian Copy (R98604) if Simplified Upgrade. Updates the status in F98405 to indicate completion (60), and writes a conversion log record to the Table Conversion - History Log table (F984052), then updates the F98403 table to indicate completion.
Machine Workbench	Copies the F9650 and F9651 tables from the Planner data source to the <i>System - 920</i> data source. It then updates the F98402 table to indicate completion and uses the environment information to populate the F986101 and F98611 tables in the Server Map data source. Only valid environments, data sources, and server map tables are created.
Control Table Workbench	Copies the language text from the local database that contains the language text into the control table database and central object database. This workbench runs only for users who are adding an alternate language to their installations.
Package Workbench	Transfers the F9603 and F9631 tables from the Planner data source to the <i>System - 920</i> data source. It then updates the F98404 table to indicate completion.

Verifying the Network Share on the Deployment Server

When you created the plan, this network share was created:

```
\\depsvrname\ E920
```

where `depsvrname` is the name of your Deployment Server.

Because several of the Workbenches update files through the network share, these workbenches will fail if the share is not writeable. Sometimes the security settings on your Deployment Server will prevent the Planner from creating the share as a writeable share.

Use this procedure to ensure that the share is writeable before proceeding:

1. On the Deployment Server, navigate to Start | My Computer | Manage
2. Open Shared Folders.
3. Open Shares.
4. Right click on *E920* and select Properties and then Share Permissions.
5. Select properties then select Share Permissions
6. Make sure that Everyone is set to Full Control, Change, Read permissions.

Note: Even after the Workbenches are complete, you will still need these settings on the Deployment Server's share in order to successfully perform client installs.

Loading Data (Demo Data and Production Data)

While previous versions of *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* used Workbench components to load data, for *Release 9.2* the Platform Pack Installer loads appropriate data into specific environments as follows:

- Demo data to Development and Pristine environments.
- Production data to Production and Prototype environments.

To load demo data in Production or Prototype environments, you must run a UBE (R98403E) to copy the data to those environments.

Note: The "from" (source) environment can be the Planner environment or your Pristine environment.

CAUTION: You should **not** change the record selection on this UBE.

1. Run R98403E using the XJDE0009 version and set the processing options as follows:

Processing Options

Environments | Advanced

R98403E copies each table identified by data selection to the target data source.
If the table already exists in the target data source, data will not be replaced.
If the table format mismatch the table spec.s in the target data source, the table will be re-created.

1. Enter the name of the source environment (the environment of the table to be copied).

2. or Enter the name of the source Data Source (the data source of the table to be copied).

3. Enter the name of the target environment (the environment to copy the table to).

4. or Enter the name of the target Data Source (the data source to copy the table to).

2. On Processing Options 1-4, complete these fields:

o *Option 1*

Enter the name of the source environment, which is the environment of the table to be copied. For example, JDEPLAN.

o *Option 2*

This field must be blank because this UBE is used to copy a mixture of business data and control tables which are specified to environments, not data sources.

o *Option 3*

Enter the name of the target environment, which is the environment to which you wish to copy the table. In this case, you would specify either the Production or Prototype environments. For example, PD 920 .

o *Option 4*

This field must be blank because this UBE is used to copy a mixture of business data and control tables which are specified to environments, not data sources.

- Click OK to continue specifying processing options.

5. Enter a '0' for Proof Mode, enter a '1' to copy the table. The default is Proof Mode.

6. Enter a 'Y' to create all selected tables in target data source, even if they do not exist in source data source. (Default is 'N')

7. Enter a 'Y' to re-create tables that already exist in the target data source. (Default is 'N')

8. Enter a 'Y' to copy data based on table 'CPYD' flag in Object Librarian (F9860). (Default is 'N')

9. Enter a 'Y' to add index(es) after copy data. (Default is 'N')

- On Processing Options 5-9, complete these fields:

Field	Description
Option 5	The recommended value is 1, which copies the table. The default value is 0, Proof Mode.
Option 6	The recommended value is N, which copies tables only if they exist in the source.

Field	Description
	<p>Enter Y to copy tables whether or not they exist in the source data source.</p> <p>The default value is N.</p>
Option 7	<p>The recommended value is Y, which recreates tables that already exist in the target data source.</p> <p>Note: If you do not recreate the tables, you will end up with a mixture of production and demo data in the tables.</p> <p>The default value is N.</p>
Option 8	<p>The recommended value is N, which forces a copy of the data, ignoring the CPYD flag.</p> <p>Note: A value of Y will leave almost all tables empty. That is, a production data load.</p> <p>The default value is N.</p>
Option 9	<p>The recommended value is N, which creates the indexes on the tables before copying the data. This prevents duplicate rows.</p> <p>Note: A value of Y copies the data and then create the indexes.</p> <p>The default value is N.</p>

Creating the Job Queue

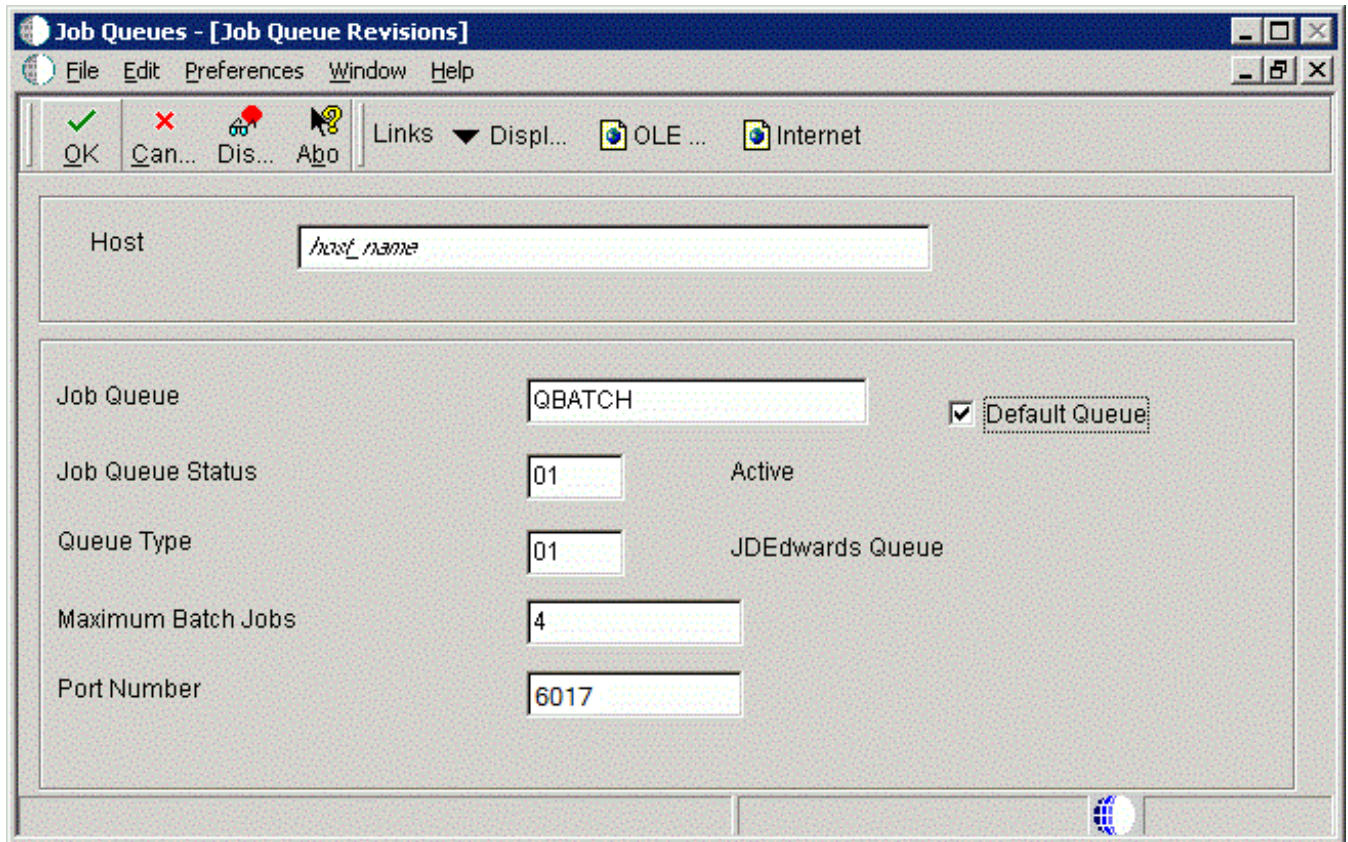
You may set up the job queues before running the Installation Workbench. If you do not, Initial Tasks Workbench will create a default entry for QBATCH with a setting of *maximum=4*.

Note: If running an Install, you can set up the queues at any stage before running a Package Build. If you set up queues after the Installation Workbench, sign onto *DEP920*.

To create the job queue:

1. Enter GH9013 in the Fast Path field and start the Job Queues program (P986130).

2. Click Add.

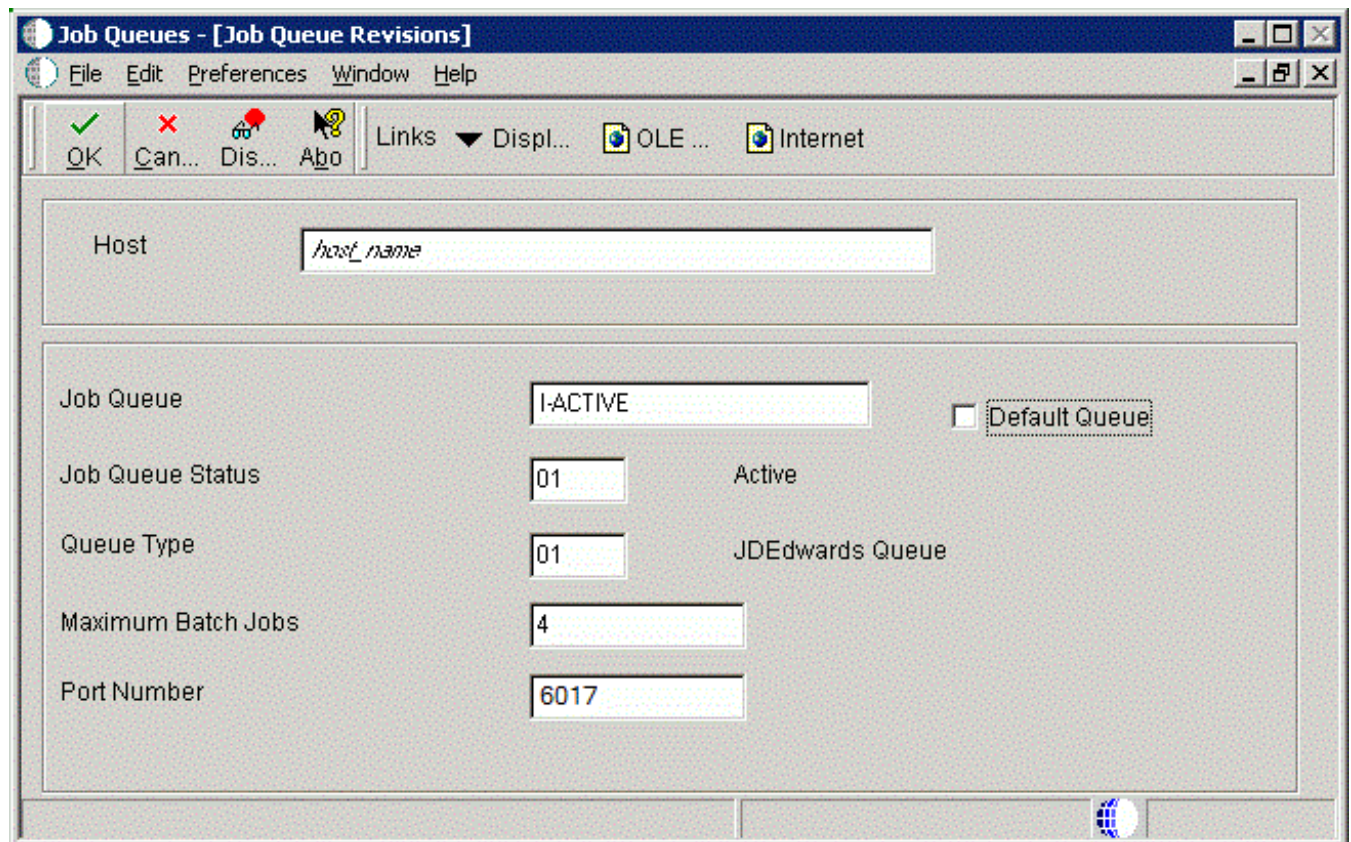


3. On Job Queue Revisions, add a queue by completing these fields:

Field	Description
Host	Enter the Enterprise Server name.
Job Queue	Enter the job queue name.
Default Queue	Turn on this option by clicking the check box.
Job Queue Status	Enter 01 .

Maximum Batch Jobs	Enter a value that equals the number of processors on the Enterprise Server machine.

Working with Unattended Workbench Mode

This section discusses:

Selecting Attended or Unattended Workbench Mode

The workbenches can be run manually (attended workbench mode) or automatically (unattended workbench mode). When running Workbench in unattended mode, start Installation Workbench as described below, and then the status of each workbench is displayed as the workbench begins. Unattended workbench is the default value.

In unattended workbench, if an error is encountered in any of the individual workbenches, the process stops. After fixing the error, unattended workbench resumes where it left off.

To choose the workbench mode:

1. Open the System Installation Tools menu (GH961).
2. Right-click on Installation Workbench.
3. Select Prompt For and then Values.

The Processing Options form appears.

4. In the appropriate processing option field:

For **unattended** workbench mode, enter **1**.

For **attended** workbench mode, enter **0** (zero).

The default value is 1 (**unattended** workbench mode).

5. Click the **OK** button.

Work with Installation Plan appears.

Setting a Task Break in Unattended Workbench Mode

In unattended workbench, you can set task breaks before or after any of the individual workbenches. You can use the task break to verify successful completion of a workbench or for other tasks. For example, set a task break after Table Conversion Workbench to verify that all table conversions completed successfully. An automatic task break occurs after Control Table Workbench, preceding Table Conversion Workbench.

To set a task break in unattended workbench mode:

1. Open the System Installation Tools menu (GH961).
2. Select Advanced Operations.
3. Double-click Work with Task Breaks.

The Work with Task Breaks form appears.

4. Click Find.

A list of the workbenches appears.

5. To set a break before or after a workbench, choose the workbench name, and, on the Row menu, select Break Before or Break After.

You can clear task breaks on the Row menu.

6. On Task Break Revisions, specify the following fields:

- o *email Address (optional)*

Specify (or choose from a list) the address book number of the person who is to be notified when the task break occurs.

- o *Task Break*

Specify (blank) for no task break or 2 for a customer task break. If the field is left blank, then no task break is configured.

- o *Task Break Short Text (required)*

Enter a short text description of the task break.

- o *Optional Detail (optional)*

Enter detailed information about the task break.

7. Click OK.

Task Break Revisions closes, and Work with Task Breaks reappears. Specify any further task breaks.

8. Click Close.

Starting Installation Workbench

CAUTION: Before starting the Installation Workbench, ensure that the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Services are started on the Enterprise Server.

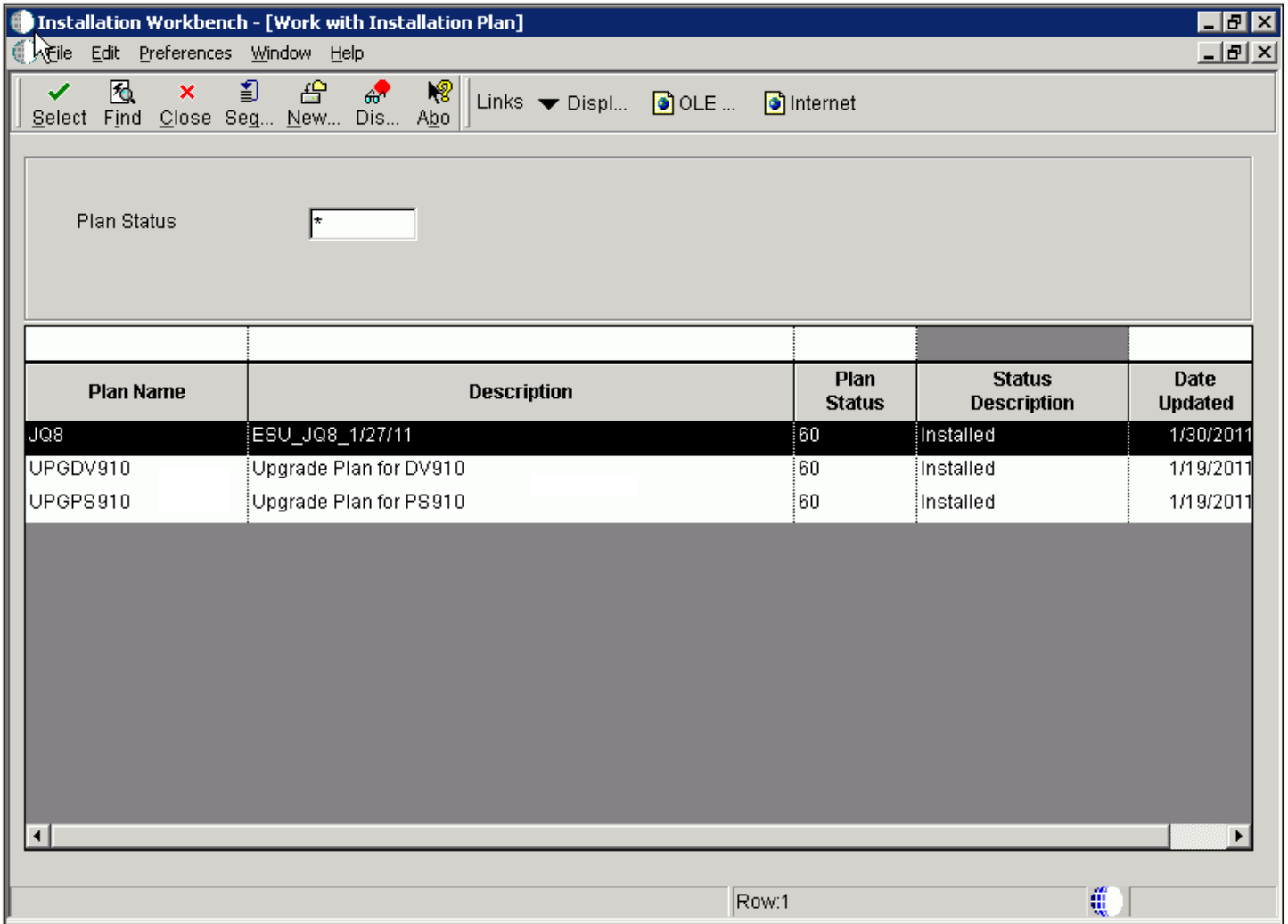
CAUTION: Do not lock the Deployment Server during Installation Workbench processes (for example, with a screen saver password); doing so pauses some processes. Do not run Installation Workbench from a remote access program that simulates a local connection.

To start the Installation Workbench:

1. On your Deployment Server, log in to the Planner environment, which is JDEPLAN.

2. From the System Installation Tools menu (GH961), choose Installation Workbench.

When this application is run the first time, the system downloads all required objects using Just In Time Installation (JIT).



- o If you specified attended workbench mode, use the following procedures, including the Initial Tasks Workbench, to complete the workbenches.

- If you specified unattended workbench mode, the process begins and all workbenches are completed automatically, unless task breaks are set. If you did not set any task breaks, continue with *Working With the Enterprise Server*.
3. On Work with Installation Plan, double-click your plan.

Working With Initial Tasks Workbench

Before the workbench is run, the F00945 table in the System data source is blank because it is no longer populated when a plan is validated. However, after you run the Initial Task Workbench several tables in the System data source are populated including the F00945 table.

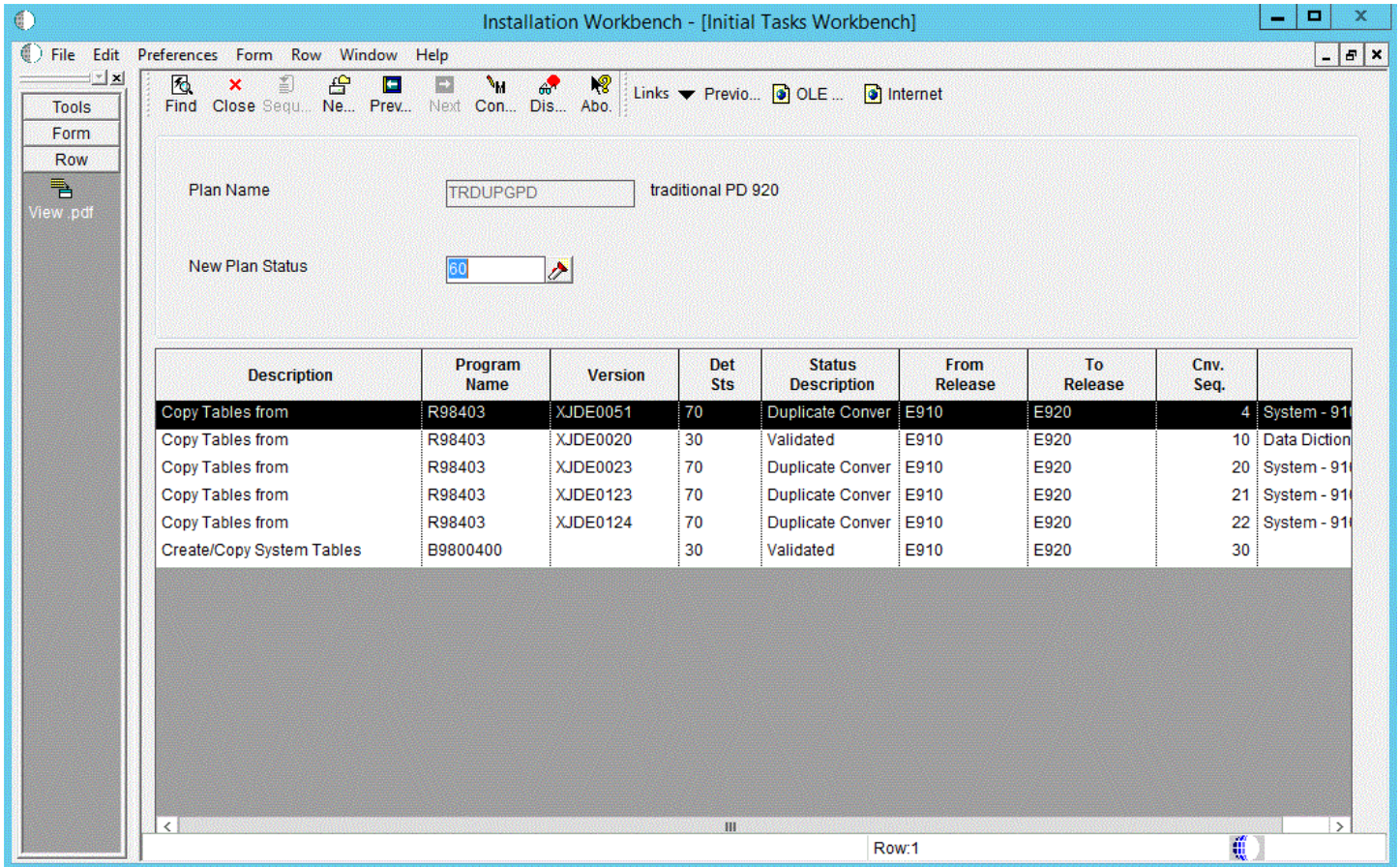
The Initial Tasks Workbench form lets you complete the Release Master task before the individual workbenches begin.

You use this procedure if you are running Workbench in attended mode or if you set a task break before Initial Tasks Workbench.

Changing the Status of Initial Tasks Workbench

You use this procedure if you are running Workbench in attended mode or if you set a task break before Initial Tasks Workbench.

To change the status of Initial Tasks Workbench:



You might want to change the status of one or more of the initial workbench tasks. To change the status of a task, use the following procedure.

1. Enter GH961 in the Fast Path field to open the System Installation Tools menu.
2. Double-click Custom Installation Plan.
3. On Work with Installation Plans, select your installation plan.
4. Select Expand on the Row menu.

The plan components, including the initial tasks, appear.

5. Select the task whose status you want to change.
6. On the Row menu, click Disable, Enable, or Complete (see the table below).

The task status changes.

- o *Disable*

Displays a status of 70 to indicate the task is incomplete, and will not be rerun.

- o *Enable*

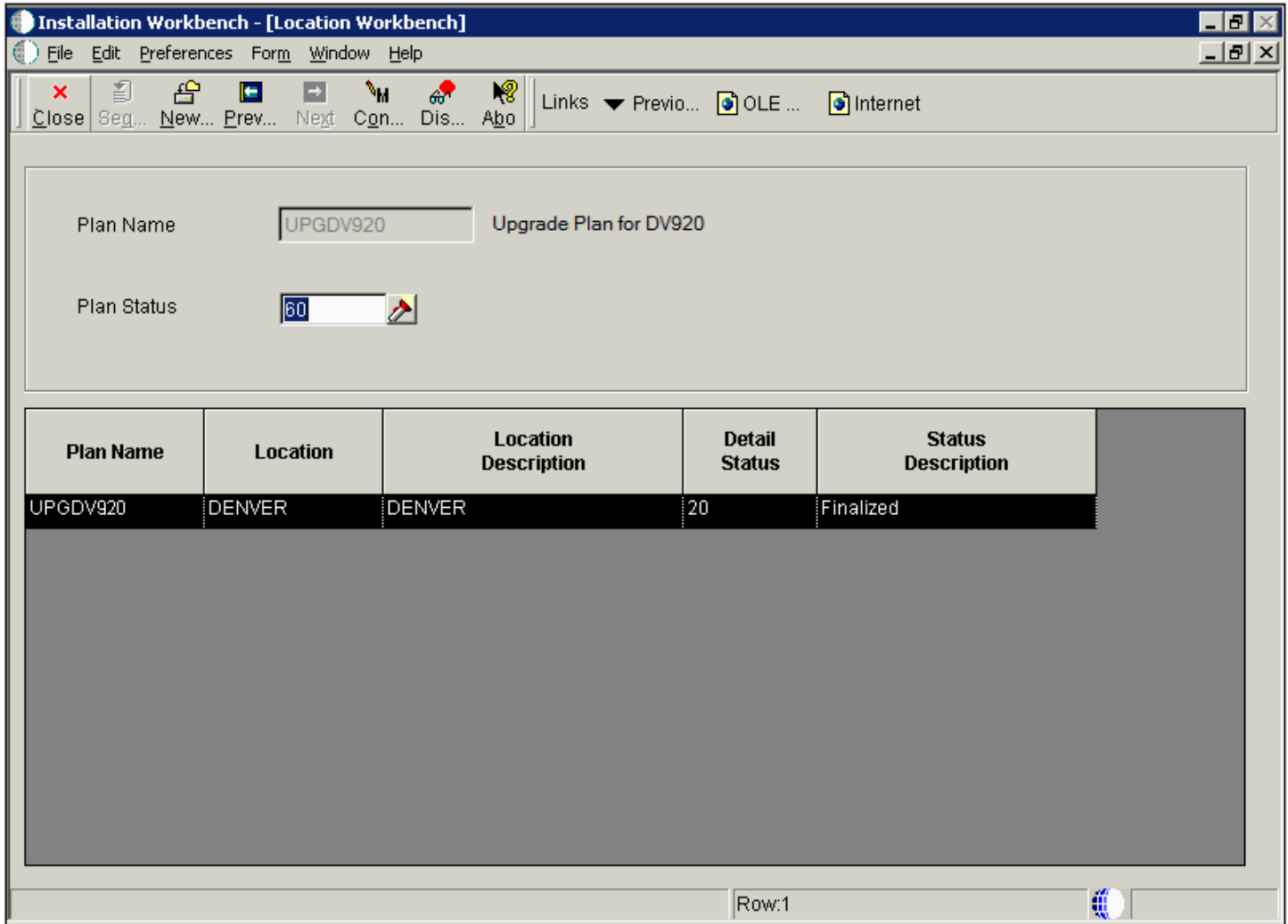
Displays a status of 10 to indicate the task will be rerun.

- o *Complete*

Displays a status of 60 to indicate the task is complete, and will not be rerun.

Configuring Your Locations

Location Workbench copies all locations that are defined in the plan from the F9654 table in the Planner data source to the *System - 920* data source. It also updates the F984021 table. Use this procedure when running Workbench in attended mode or if you set a task break before Location Workbench.

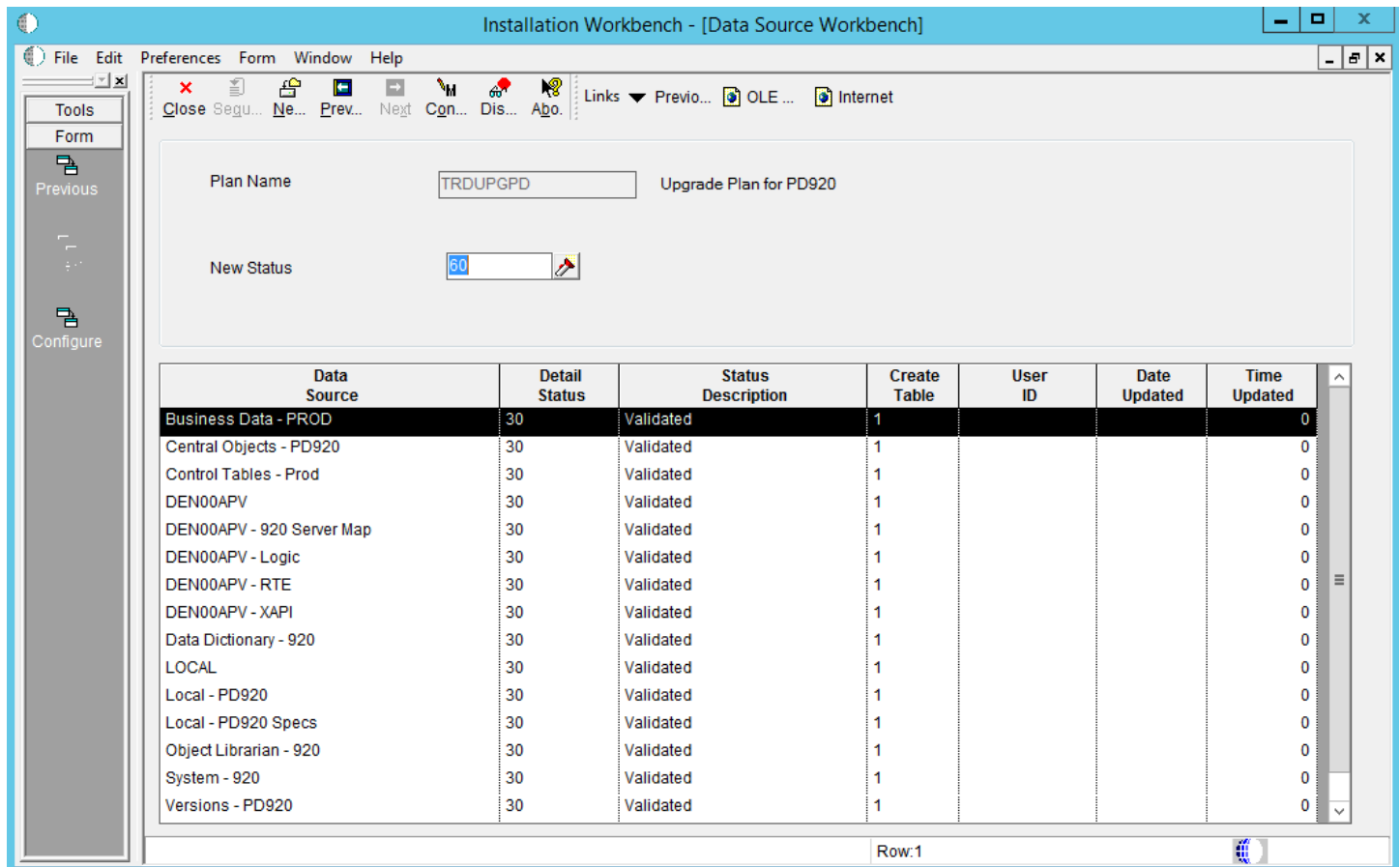


1. On Location Workbench, verify that all of your locations are listed.
2. Select Configure from the Form menu.
Locations are configured, and the Data Source Workbench form appears.
The system updates the Detail Status to 60 and changes the Status Description from Validated to Installed.

Configuring Your Data Sources

Data Source Workbench copies all data sources that are defined in the plan from the F98611 table and the F98615 table in your Planner data source to your *System - 920* data source. It also updates the F98401 table to indicate completion. Use this procedure when running Workbench in attended mode or if you set a task break before Data Source Workbench.

1. On Data Source Workbench, verify that all of your data sources are listed as illustrated in this example.



2. Select Configure from the Form menu.

Your data sources are configured, and the Environment Workbench form appears.

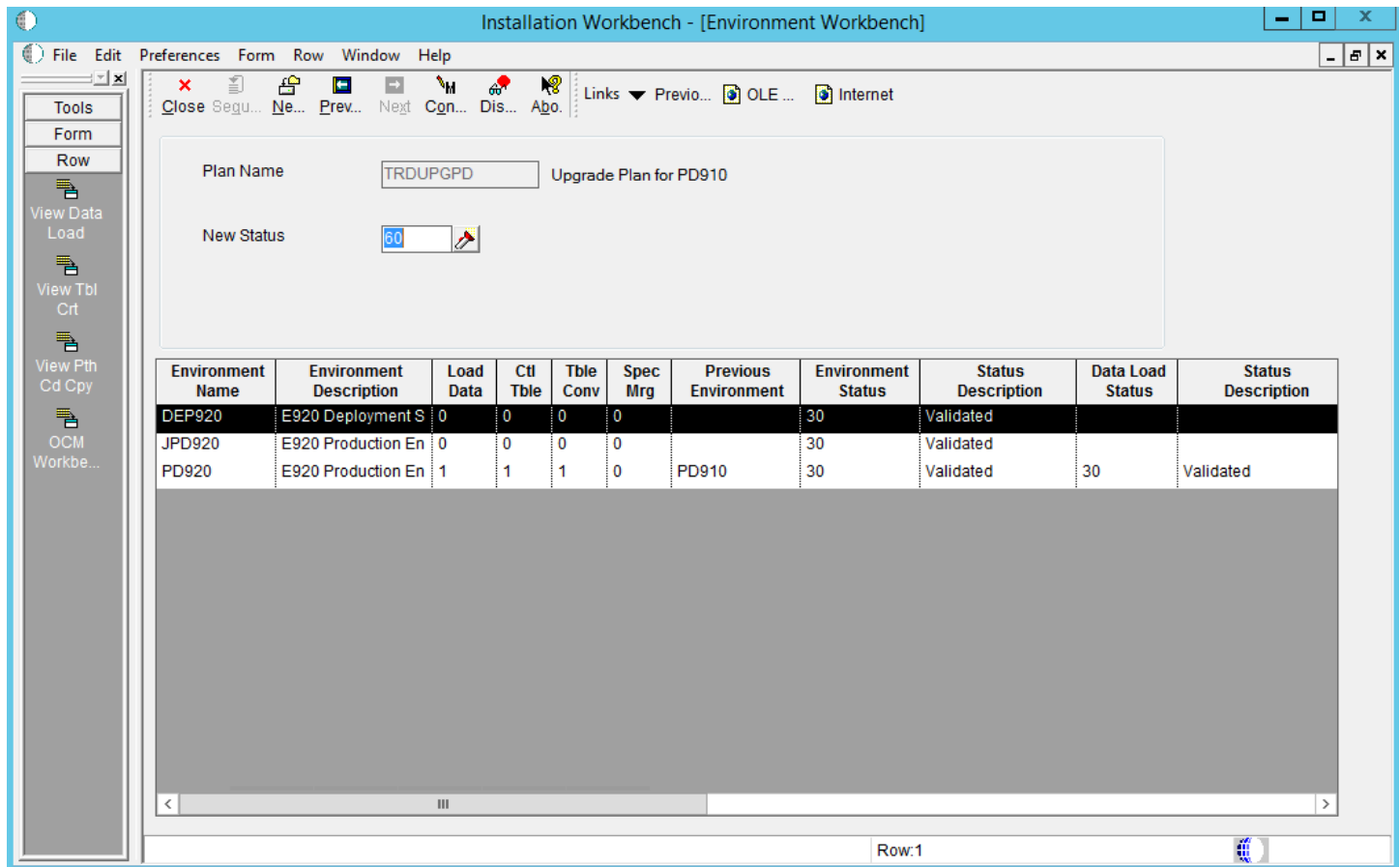
When the system has configured your data sources, it updates Detail Status to 60 and changes the Status Description from Validated to Installed.

Configuring Your Environments

Environment Workbench copies the F0094, F00941, and F00942 tables, as well as the F986101 table for each environment, from your Planner data source to your *System - 920* data source. It then updates the F98403 table to indicate completion. Depending on the plan settings, it also runs a batch application to copy new generic text and to create and populate Object Management Workbench and version tables.

Environment Workbench can run multiple batch applications simultaneously, which enables *Release 9.2* to load multiple environments at the same time. This reduces the amount of time it takes to load environments.

Use this procedure when running Workbench in attended mode or if a task break is set before Environment Workbench.

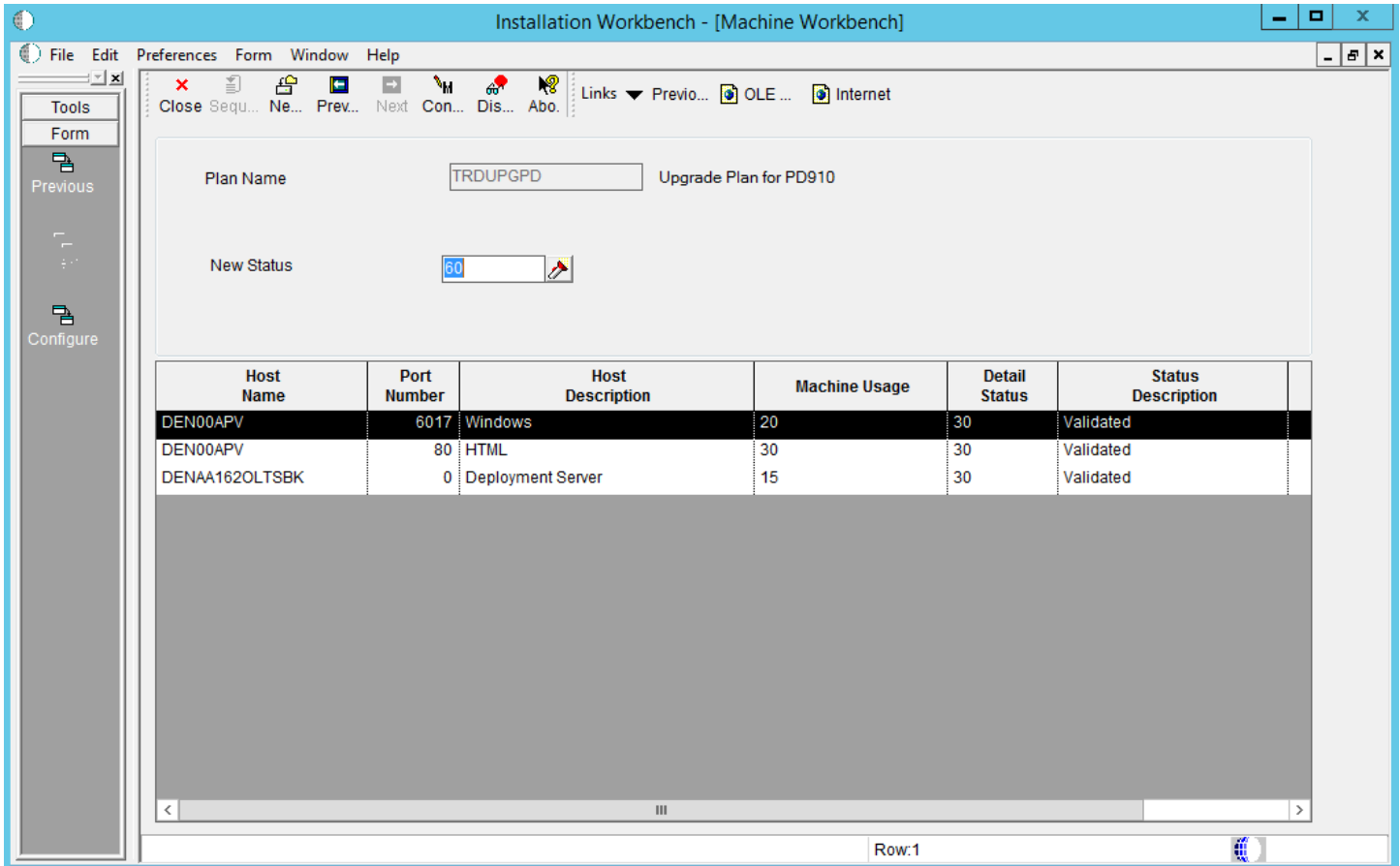


1. On Environment Workbench, review each environment and its associated parameters to make sure the values are correct.
2. After you review the environments, select Configure.
3. When Environment Workbench has completed, verify that the status of each environment has been updated to 60 and that the status description has changed from Validated to Installed.
4. Using Adobe Acrobat, review all XJDE reports, and confirm that all configuration statuses indicate Success.

Using Machine Workbench

Machine Workbench copies the F9650 and F9651 table from the Planner data source to the *System - 920* data source. It then updates the F98402 table to indicate completion and uses the environment information to populate the F986101 and F98611 tables in the Server Map data source.

Note: Only valid environments, data sources, and server map tables are created.



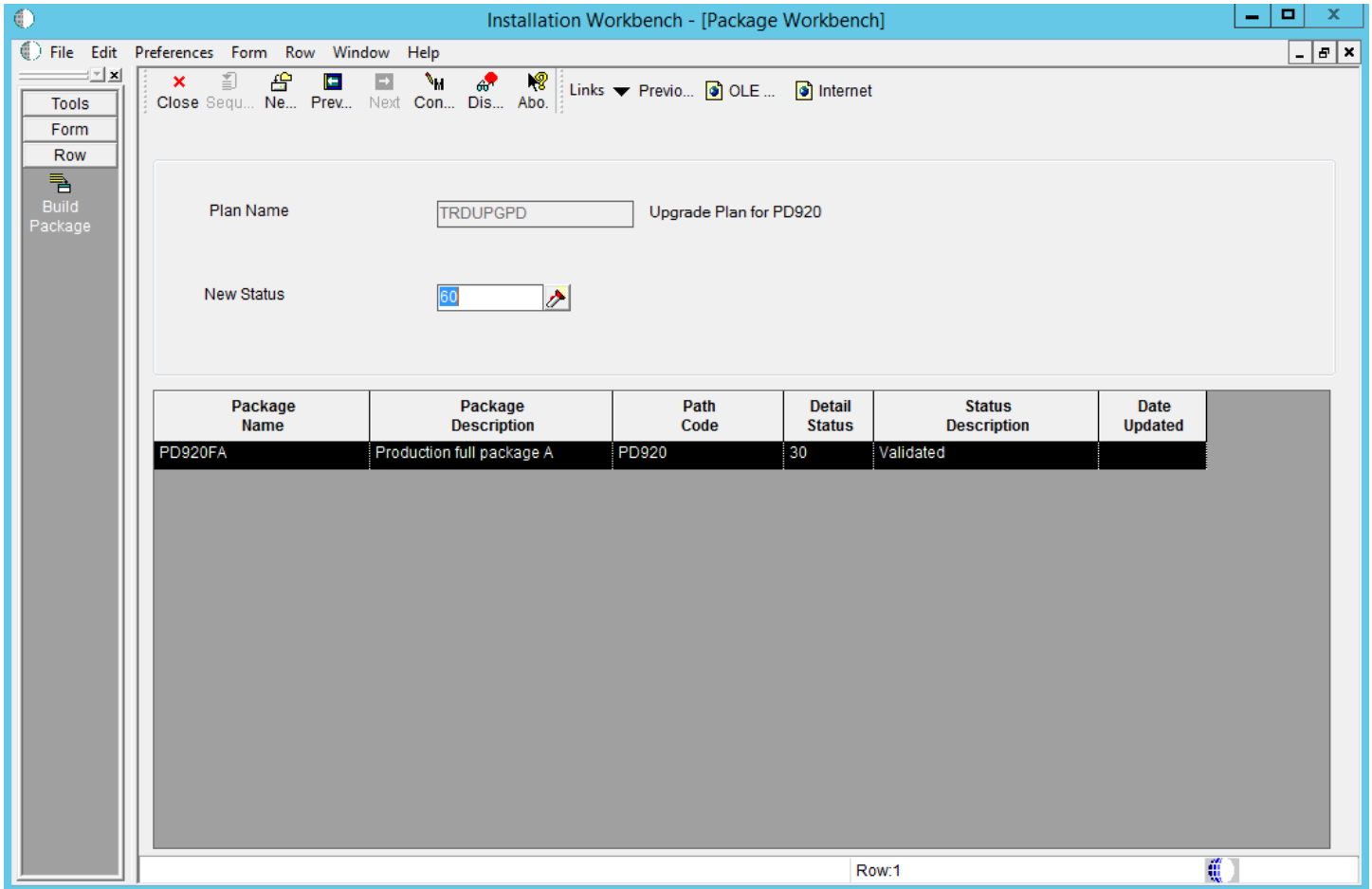
1. On Machine Workbench, review each server and its associated parameters for the correct values.
2. Select Configure from the Form menu.

When the system has configured your servers, it changes the detail status to 60, and Status Description changes from Validated to Installed.

Using the Package Workbench

Package Workbench transfers the F9603 and F9631 tables from the Planner data source to the *System - 920* data source. It then updates the F98404 table to indicate completion.

Use this procedure when running Workbench in attended mode or if a task break is set before Package Workbench. Refer to the [JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Tools Package Management Guide](#) for complete information about building and configuring packages.



1. On Package Workbench, review your packages.
2. Select Configure from the Form menu.

Using Remote Location Workbench

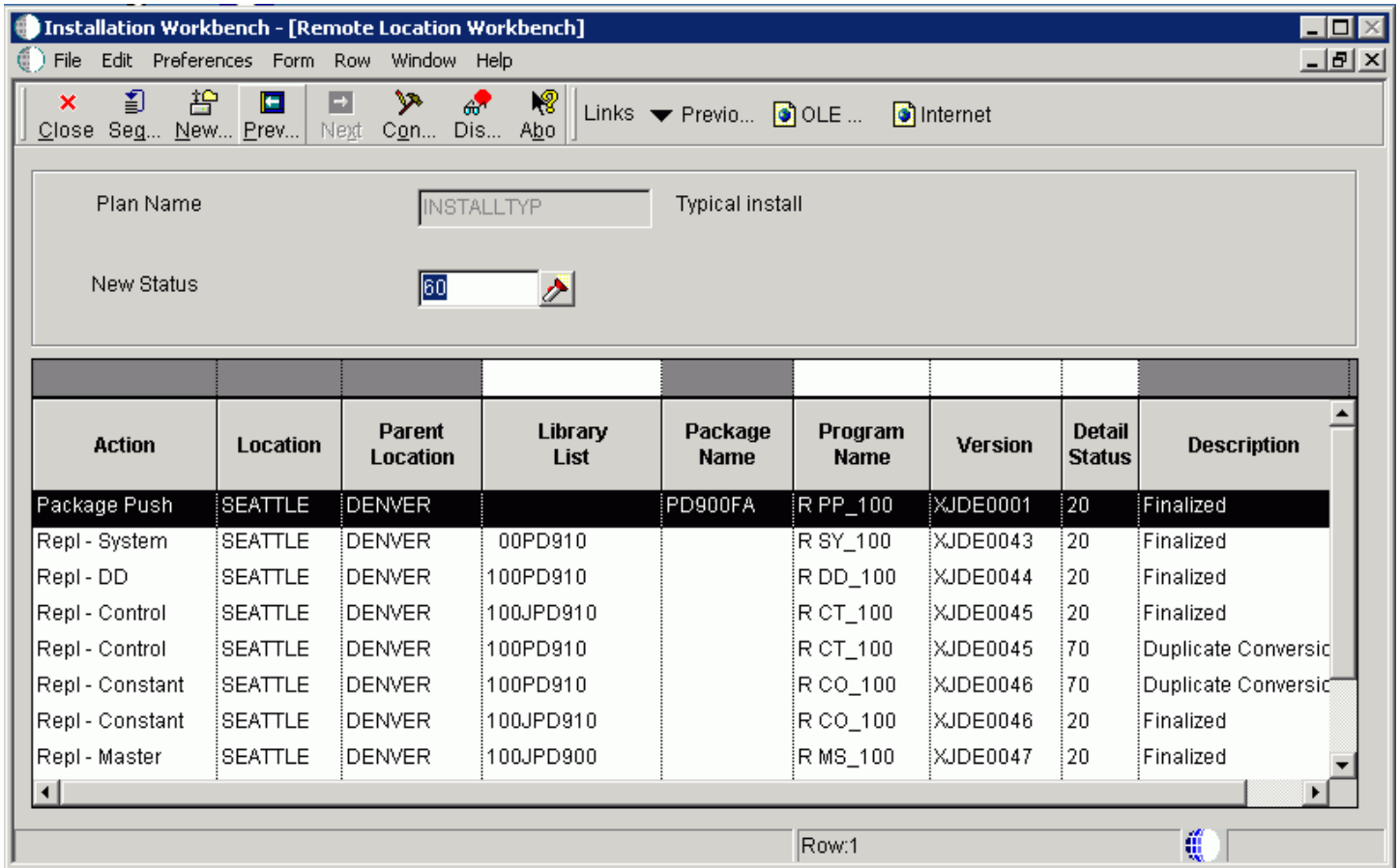
Note: This workbench only appears when Remote Locations have been set up.

Remote Location Workbench loads business (master and constant), control, data dictionary, and system tables from base location to remote location servers, by launching different versions of R98403 (XJDE0043, XJDE0044, XJDE0045, XJDE0046 and XJDE0047). It also pushes delivered packages to primary Deployment Servers at remote locations by launching the multi-tier UBE (R98825C). This workbench is processed only if you opted to install remote locations and chose to load replicated data and push packages.

Use this procedure when running Workbench in attended mode or if a task break is set before Remote Location Workbench.

Configuring Remote Locations

To configure remote locations:



To configure your remote locations:

1. On Remote Location Workbench, *Release 9.2* displays all remote location activities in the detail area.
2. On the Form menu, select Configure to launch the workbench.
3. After all remote location activities are complete, click Next.

Finishing Installation Workbench

To finish the Installation Workbench:

1. From Congratulations, on the Form menu, click Finish.
2. From Work with Installation Plans, click Close.

Note: Post Install Procedures still need to be completed from a client. See *Performing Post Installation and Upgrade Tasks*.

Deploying an Oracle or Partner Business Accelerator Configuration (optional)

If you choose to deploy a Business Accelerator Configuration, this must be done prior to installing any ESUs or Updates other than the Planner Update. The execution of the Q&A portion can be done even before JD Edwards EnterpriseOne has been installed. However, the resulting configuration cannot be deployed until all Installation Workbenches have successfully completed.

You must build a full package after deploying the Business Accelerator in order to see all the changes that the Business Accelerator delivers.

For detailed instructions on downloading and deploying Business Accelerators, see the *Oracle Business Accelerators for JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Installation Guide*, which is available from *My Oracle Support* (<https://support.oracle.com>). From that site, you can locate this document by search for this document ID: 705506.1.

Updating Oracle Database Statistics

You should update database statistics after loading a significant amount of data to your database. Without this step, the database will not use any of the indexes when accessing the data. Depending on the size of your tables, updating statistics may take a while.

To update Oracle database statistics:

1. Start SQL Plus and connect to the instance as SYS or SYSTEM.
2. For each data owner enter this command:

```
execute dbms_utility.analyze_schema (' owner', 'compute');
```

where *owner* is the data owner name in the command. For example, PRODDTA, or DD920 .

8 Working With the Enterprise Server

Installing a 32-bit Database Client

PORTTEST will fail if the Enterprise Server does not have an appropriate 32-bit database client installed. This database client is required in order for JD Edwards EnterpriseOne to communicate with any database (local or remote). Regardless of whether your Enterprise Server is 32-bit or 64-bit, it is important that the database client be 32-bit so that it works properly with JD Edwards EnterpriseOne, which is a 32-bit application.

For Oracle databases, the installation of the database client is the same as that for the Deployment Server, which is described in the chapter of this guide entitled: *Working with the Deployment Server* in the section entitled: *Installing a 32-Bit Oracle Database Client*. For other-than-Oracle databases, the concept is the same and you will need to obtain the appropriate client from your database vendor.

Verifying the Enterprise Server Installation Using PORTTEST

Note: When running PORTTEST after installing the Enterprise Server, the test returns a failure message. This is because it is not able to access the F0902 table at this time, (the format of the F0902 table changes during the Table Conversion Workbench). Ignore any errors relating to accessing the F0902 table, (for example, Select all on table F0902 failed - rcode=0). Once the Workbench tasks are all complete, and the Enterprise Server is configured, rerun PORTTEST.

CAUTION: PORTTEST will fail if the Enterprise Server does not have an appropriate 32-bit database client installed. Refer to the section of this chapter entitled: *Installing a 32-bit Database Client*.

To verify the Enterprise Server installation using PORTTEST:

1. Log on to the UNIX Enterprise Server as `jde920`
2. To verify that *Release 9.2* is installed correctly on the Enterprise Server, enter these commands:

```
cd $SYSTEM/bin32
portttest userid password environment
```

where `userid` is a valid *Release 9.2* user ID, `password` is the user password, and `environment` is the environment you want to verify (for example, *DV920*). Enter this command for each environment.

CAUTION: These parameters are case-sensitive. If your case is incorrect, the command will fail. For example, if your `userid` and `password` are uppercase *JDE*, and your Pristine environment is uppercase *PY920*, you should issue the `PORTTEST` command as such: `PORTTEST JDE JDE PY920`

This program initializes a user and an environment (assuming *Release 9.2* is installed and configured correctly). The program displays messages that indicate the selection of records from a *Release 9.2* table. If it does not, review the `jde_xx.log` file (or `JDE_XX.LOG` file) in the directory path `/$EVRHOME/log`.

Tip: If `PORTTEST` fails to run, refer to *Using the PORTTEST Checklist* for diagnostic assistance.

Starting Network Services on the Enterprise Server

To start the network services on the Enterprise Server:

1. The services are automatically started when you run the `RunOneWorld.sh` startup script. To run the script, change directory and execute as shown in the example below:

```
cd $SYSTEM/bin32
./RunOneWorld.sh
```

Understanding OCM Mappings

JD Edwards EnterpriseOne does not ship Object Configuration Manager (OCM) records for standard environments in *Release 9.2*. They are generated when you finalize an installation plan. OCM is created based on the Data Class for data sources and for a table or GT object. The Data Class is stored on the Data Sources By Environment (F98511), Data Source Master (F98611) and Object Librarian Master (F9860) tables.

Understanding Data Source Setup

Before OCM can be created, you must configure your data sources. Data source configuration and prompting is driven by the data in the F98511 table.

The first set of data sources to be configured is the Enterprise Server data sources. This includes the Server Map data source. Also, logic data sources are automatically configured without prompting. OCM records are not created for the server map data source. UBE, BSFN, RTE, and XAPI mappings are created for the logic data sources.

The next set of data sources to be configured is the shared data sources. This includes System, Data Dictionary, and Object Librarian data sources. The first time these data sources are configured, the shared data source template (F98511.SPILL = *SHARED) is copied and tokens are replaced in the data source name and properties to create the shared data source records (F98511.SPILL = DEFAULT). These defaults are then used to create the data source definition in the F98611 table. If record in the F98611 tables already exists, the defaults from the F98511 table are overridden by the current definition. The user is then optionally prompted to customize the data source.

The last set of data sources is the environment data sources. A set of data sources is configured for each environment. This includes Business Data, Control Tables, Central Objects and Versions.

The environment data source template (F98511.SPILL = *ENV) stores defaults for environment data sources. As data sources are configured for an environment, these records are copied and tokens are replaced in the data source name and properties to create records for the environment (F98511.SPILL = *Environment Name*). These defaults are then used to create the data source definition in the F98611 table. If records in the F98611 table already exists, the defaults from the F98511 table are overridden by the current definition. The user is then optionally prompted to customize the data source.

Given that the standard environments do not always follow the defaults that are specified in the *ENV template, *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* provides preconfigured records for the standard environments. Thus, the *ENV template is only used for custom environments.

Understanding OCM Creation

After your data sources have been defined and the plan is complete, the plan is finalized. OCM is created during finalization.

Understanding Database Data Sources

The process finds the data class for each table or GT object in Object Librarian (F9860.SICLDF). Based on the environment that is being configured and the data class for the object, the data source name is fetched from F98511. If a record is not found, it looks for a record for the data class where environment name is DEFAULT (to determine whether it should be mapped to a shared data source). If a record is not found, no mapping is created and the table is effectively mapped to the default data source. If a record is found and that record is set as the default mapping data source (F98511.SPDFLTMAP), a mapping with object name DEFAULT is created; otherwise the actual object name is used. Mappings are not created for tables in the Planner and Internal data classes.

Understanding Logic Data Sources

The OCM generation algorithm for UBEs and BSFNs are identical to each other, but the output depends on whether the default mapping is LOCAL or an Enterprise Server.

The following table shows the default mappings for UBE and BSFN objects.

UBE or BSFN	Base Environment <i>DV920 , PS920 , PD920 , PY920</i>	HTML Web Server Environment <i>J DV920 , J PS920 , J PD920 , J PY920</i>
UBE	Enterprise Server	Enterprise Server
BSFN	LOCAL	Enterprise Server

The algorithm is:

- If the default is LOCAL, a default mapping to LOCAL is created. Server mappings are created for any object whose Location (labeled Business Function Location for BSFNs and Process Location for UBEs) in Object Management Workbench (OMW) is Server Only (F9860.SIBFLOCN = 3).
- If the default is Enterprise Server, a default mapping to the Enterprise Server is created. LOCAL mappings are created for any object whose Location (labeled Business Function Location for BSFNs and Process Location for UBEs) in OMW is Client Only (F9860.SIBFLOCN = 1).

Understanding Data Classes

The data class is at the center of automatic OCM generation. It categorizes the type of data stored in data sources and tables, for example, in the Business Data data source the data class is **B** while in the System data source the data class is **S**. If you want to split business data into multiple data sources, you need to create a new data class, add a data source to the data source template for that data class (so Installation Planner prompts for the data source) and assign tables and GT objects to that data class. OCM will be created based on this information. You should do these steps before creating your plan.

Creating a New Data Class

You must create a new data class by adding a value to the H96/DU User Defined Code (UDC) for data sources and H96/CL UDC for table and GT objects.

Modifying the Data Source Template

A data source template defines the set of data sources that will be used by an environment, and the default values for the properties of the data source. They are stored in the F98511 table.

The information in this table can be edited using Data Source Templates By Environment (GH9611) program. By understanding this application, you can implement custom environment naming standards and ease the creation of environments.

Typically, you will add records to the template for new environments. The template can be found by filtering on *ENV in the environment field. Installation Planner prompts for this set of data sources whenever a new environment is created. The first time data sources are configured for a new environment, these records are copied and tokens replaced to create records specific to the new environment.

If you want to add a new data source to a standard *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* environment, enter the environment name into the filter field and add a record specifically for that environment.

Records with an environment *LOGIC are for logic and server map data sources. They are set up when selecting an Enterprise Server.

Associating Table Data Classes

A table is associated with a data class using a field on the Object Librarian table (F9860.sicldf). Table data classes can be modified two ways.

- Object Management Workbench (GH902) - Select the table in the left tree view in OMW and click Design. Select the Install\Merge Codes tab and modify the data class value. Click OK. Modifying the data class does not affect existing OCM mappings, it is only used when creating mappings for a new environment.
- Table Data Classes - This application can be used to modify the data class for several tables at once. This should only be used by a *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* administrator. Go to GH9611 and open Table Data Classes. Use the QBE to filter the list of tables in the grid. Select one or more tables whose data class will be changed. Click Select. Type in the new data class value and click OK.

Once these three steps have been taken, planner will prompt for the new data source and create OCM mappings for the new data source whenever an environment is added to a plan and the plan is finalized.

Setting Up a Printer and Default Output Location on the Enterprise Server

This section describes these tasks, which must be performed in the deployment environment:

- *Adding a New Printer*
- *Defining a Default Printer*
- *Defining a Default Output Location (Tools Release 9.2.1)*

You also can print *Release 9.2* reports, modify existing printers, and delete printers. These tasks are described in detail in the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Tools Runtime Administration Guide*. Refer to that document to learn more about setting up a printer to run from the *Release 9.2* Enterprise Server.

Adding a New Printer

Release 9.2 provides a Printer Setup director to help you add printers. Instructions appear on each form of the director to guide you through the printer addition process. This procedure is used in conjunction with the steps that appear on the forms of the Printer Setup director.

To install your first printer:

1. On the Printers menu (GH9013), select Printers (P98616).

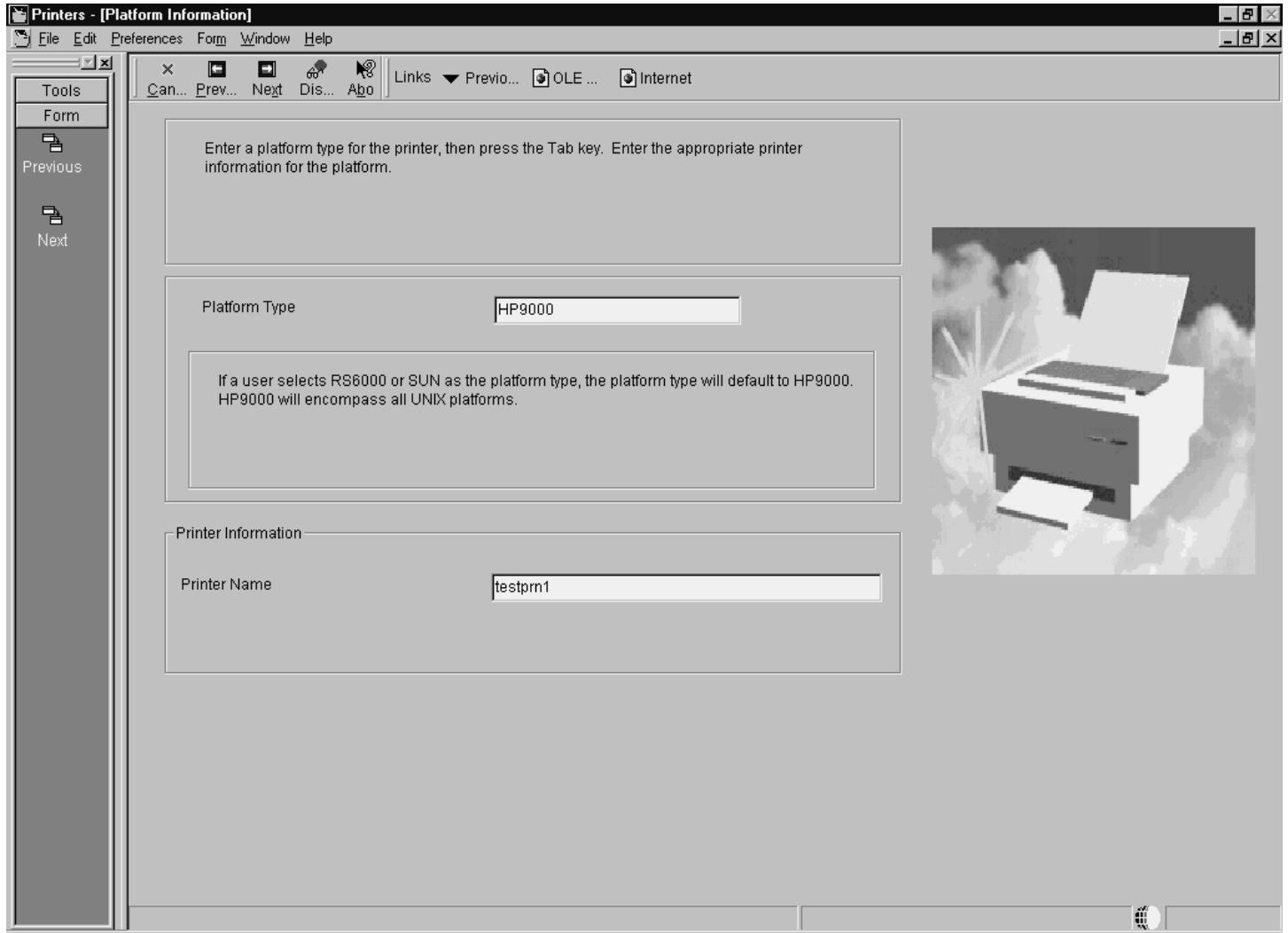
The Printers form appears.

2. On the Printers form, click Add Printer.

The welcome page for the Printer Setup director appears. This page describes the tasks that the director helps you perform.

3. Review the welcome page and click Next.

The Platform Information form appears. The platform type may appear by default, depending on the operating system on which *Release 9.2* is running.



4. On Platform Information, complete these fields:

Field	Description
Platform Type	Enter the platform type on which you are installing or use the visual assist button to select a platform type.
Platform Type	This value is displayed by default as a result of the Platform Type you selected.
Printer Name	Enter the name of the printer. Valid characters are all alpha (A-z), numeric (0-9), and underscore (_).

5. After you complete the requisite fields, click Next to access the Printer Setup form.

Use this form to set information for the printer such as the printer model, physical location of the printer, printer definition language (PDL), and paper types.

6. On the General tab, complete these fields:

- o Printer Model
- o Printer Location

7. On the Details tab, in the box labeled Printer Definition Language, select one of these options:

- o PostScript
- o PCL
- o Line Printer
- o Custom

8. In the Default box, specify one of the Printer Definition Language options as the default value.

You can select multiple PDLs, but only one default PDL. A user can override this default PDL at the time a batch process is submitted.

Choosing PostScript or Printer Command Language (PCL), *Release 9.2* disables the Line Printer option. Choosing Line Printer, *Release 9.2* disables the PostScript and PCL options.

When choosing the Line Printer option, this logic occurs:

- o *Release 9.2* disables the grid at the bottom of the form and any paper types you have chosen are cleared.
- o *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* automatically provides a printer type of *JDE LINE PAPER for the printer.
- o The Fields in the box labeled Line Printers are used to set the paper dimensions and line parameters.

This procedure is explained in later steps in this section.

The custom option uses advanced features of the printers application, which are explained in the later steps in this procedure.

9. On the Details tab, when choosing the PostScript option, the Paper Source box appears and you can change these options:

Field	Description
<i>Max Number of Paper Sources</i>	Enter a numeric value in this field to indicate the number of paper trays this printer has available.
<i>Default Paper Source</i>	Enter a numeric value in this field to indicate which tray number you want <i>Release 9.2</i> to draw paper from as the default tray.

10. On the Details tab, when choosing the Line Printer option, fields appear in a box labeled Line Printers, which you use to set the paper dimensions and line parameters.

Complete these fields:

Field	Description
<i>Characters Per Inch</i>	Enter a value to specify the number of characters in one horizontal inch.
<i>Columns Per Page</i>	Enter a value to specify the number of characters in one line of text in the specified report.
<i>Lines Per Inch</i>	Enter a value to specify the number of lines of text in one vertical inch.
<i>Lines Per Page</i>	Enter a value to specify the number of lines of text on one printed page.
<i>Printer Paper Width</i>	Displays a value that is calculated automatically based on the values entered in the Line Printers box.
<i>Printer Paper Height</i>	Displays a value that is calculated automatically based on the values entered in the Line Printers box.

11. On the Details tab, the Custom option lets you specify a conversion filter to use.

When choosing the Custom option, a field appears beneath the Custom checkbox. Enter the name of the conversion filter you want to use or use the visual assist to select a filter from the Conversion Program Search and Select form.

12. If you do not want to change or add a conversion filter, skip to Step 16 in this task.

To change or add a conversion filter, from the Form menu, select Advanced, and continue with the steps in this procedure. The Advanced option is enabled only when Custom has been chosen.

The Work With Conversion Programs form appears.

13. Either click Add, or highlight one of the filters and click Copy or Select.

The Advanced Conversion Program form appears.

14. Change one or both of these fields:

Field	Description
<i>Conversion Program</i>	If you clicked Add or Copy on the previous form, the Conversion Program field is enabled. Enter the name of the conversion program that you want to add or copy. When making a copy, the Parameter String field is populated with the string that you highlighted on the previous form.
<i>Parameter String</i>	The <i>JD Edwards EnterpriseOne</i> system automatically enters the parameter string in native commands based on the host type from which you are printing and the type of printer (PostScript, PCL, or line).

15. Click OK.

The Work with Conversion Programs form appears.

Click Close.

The Printer Setup form appears.

16. In the grid at the bottom of the Printer Setup form, double-click the row header for each paper type that your printer supports. A checkmark appears in the row header for each paper type that you select.

Note: You can add new paper types as necessary. Instructions are included later in this task.

- 17.** In the Default Type column, enter the numeral 1 in the row for the paper type you want to use as the default.
select only one paper type as the default. A user can override the default paper type when a batch process is submitted.

<i>Output Tray Name</i>	Define the output tray for a given batch print job.





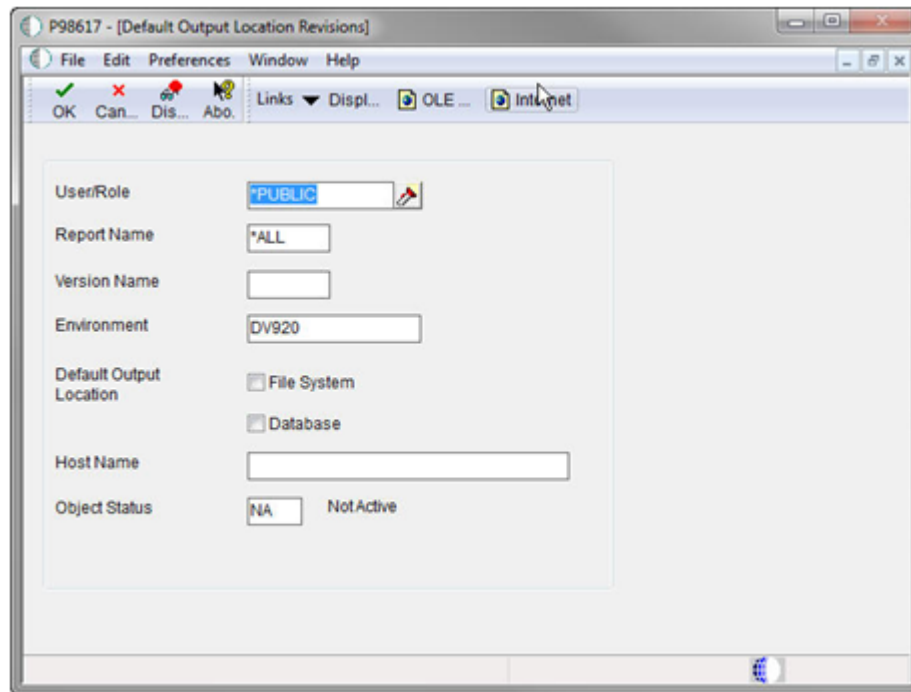

Setting the Link Flag (HP-UX Systems Only)

Note: This section is only applicable to UNIX systems running HP-UX.

In order to avoid Package Build failures, you must modify your `JDE.INI` file as described in this procedure.

To set the link flag on HP-UX systems:

1. Open the `JDE.INI` on your Enterprise Server using an ASCII editor such as `vi`.
2. Update the values of `compilerFlags` setting in the `[BSFN BUILD]` section to change the lower case `+z` switch to an upper case `+Z`. For example:

```
[BSFN BUILD]
CompilerFlags=-Aa +Z -c
```


9 Installing the Development Clients for Developers and System Administrators

Understanding Development Client Installation

Release 9.2 software for Development Clients is first installed on the Deployment Server, and then deployed from the Deployment Server to Development Clients for developers and system administrators.

The Development Clients are Microsoft Windows-based machines. Refer to the Oracle Certifications for specifically-supported versions of Microsoft Windows.

Note: The *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* installation of the Development Client delivers pre-built packages that are ready for use as delivered. In order for the Development Client to reflect the language installed on the Deployment Server, you must perform tasks for both the Enterprise Server and Development Clients, in addition to the procedures to verify and modify the `JDE.INI` on the Development Clients and the `JDE.INI` `jde.ini` on the Enterprise Server.

Preparing for Development Client Installation

To prepare for the installation of *Release 9.2* on Development Clients, you must modify the Development Client `JDE.INI` on the Deployment Server and the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne system administrator must create a user profile for every user before that user can log on to *Release 9.2*. You must also copy the configured `tnsnames.ora` from the `oracle\%11local` directory to the `\client` directory on the Deployment Server, as specified in the next section of this chapter entitled: [Working With Development Client Installation](#)

Note: Refer to the [JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Development Client Installation Guide](#) for additional details on installing the Development Client.

Prerequisites

- Before installing *Release 9.2* on a Development Client used for development, you must install the Microsoft Visual C++ Compiler. The specific version of the compiler is detailed in the Minimum Technical Requirements (MTRs). Refer to the section of this guide entitled: [Accessing Certifications](#). Also refer to the appropriate Microsoft documents for installation information.
- The names of the Deployment Server, Enterprise Server, and the Development Client cannot exceed 15 characters in length.

- **IPv4 Requirement**
The Development Client requires Microsoft Windows IPv4 for connectivity. It cannot function with IPv6. Refer to the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Development Client Installation Guide for Oracle WebLogic Server (WLS) and WebSphere Application Server (WAS) Express* details.

Note: You must have full administrator privileges to install *Release 9.2* on the Microsoft Windows 7-based Development Clients. For details, refer to the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Development Client Installation Guide* on the Oracle Technology Network (OTN).

During Development Client installation, connectivity is required for:

- Read/write access to this client install directory on the primary Deployment Server in the base location:
`\oneworld`
- Read access to the subdirectories located under this directory:
`\pathcode\package`
For example:
`\\deployment_server_name\ E920 \ PD920 \package`
- Read/write access to this directory on the primary Deployment Server:
`\client`
For example:
`\\deployment_server_name\ E920 \client`

Working With Development Client Installation

The Development Client installation program copies all necessary components of *Release 9.2* to a Development Client. During installation, the installation program verifies that enough disk space exists and, if not, you are prompted to create more space before continuing.

CAUTION: Before starting a *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* Development Client installation, you must close all other applications running on that machine. The installation process may not run correctly if other applications are open.

Creating a Desktop Shortcut

A system administrator can create a shortcut to `InstallManager.exe` from the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* client install directory on the Deployment Server and can deploy the shortcut to the Development Client. For example, the client install directory is typically:

```
\JDEdwards\ E920 \OneWorld Client Install
```

To ensure that the shortcut works correctly, ensure the Start in: field contains the location of the `installmanager.htm` file.

To create a desktop shortcut:

1. To edit the **Start in:** field, in Microsoft Windows Explorer or on the desktop, right-click the shortcut.
2. Click **Properties**, and then click the Shortcut menu.
3. Double-click the *Release 9.2* InstallManager shortcut to start the *Release 9.2* installation manager.
4. Skip to the next task entitled: [Using a Shared Drive](#).

Using a Shared Drive

An installer can connect to the `\JDEdwards\ E920` shared drive on your Deployment Server from Microsoft Windows Explorer.

To use a shared drive:

1. Double-click `InstallManager.exe` to start the *Release 9.2* installation manager.

The `InstallManager.exe` file is located in this folder:

`OneWorld Client Install`

2. On *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Release 9.2* Installation Manager, click the [EnterpriseOne E920 Client](#) link.
3. On Welcome, click the **Next** button.

If you do not have the latest version of Microsoft Internet Explorer the *Release 9.2* Setup Third Party Application form appears. The option to install Internet Explorer is selected. To install this application, click the **Next** button. If you do not want to install these applications at this time, clear the option for one or both of them, and click the **Next** button.

If the latest version of Internet Explorer are already installed, the Third Party Application form is not displayed.

4. On Package Selection, select the package you want to install and click the **Next** button.

Tip: Click the **Filters ON** button to narrow the displayed list of available packages. This can help you find the package you want. Notice that a short description of each package appears below the list.

5. On Setup Type, complete these fields:

Field	Description
<i>Select Setup Type</i>	Select Development or Production objects. You should only select the Development option if you intend to develop <i>Release 9.2</i> applications. Note: Select the Development option only if you intend to develop <i>JD Edwards EnterpriseOne</i> applications.
<i>Install Path</i>	Select the drive and directory in which to install the package. For example, this is the typical path for <i>Release 9.2</i> : <code>c:\ E920</code>

6. To install the package, click the **Finish** button.

InstallManager shows the status of the installation process through a series of forms.

The Congratulations form indicates that the installation finished successfully. InstallManager creates a *Release 9.2* shortcut in the Programs folder of your Start menu and on your desktop.

7. Reboot if necessary.

CAUTION: The *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* Development Client installation process verifies that several of the system DLL files are current. If they are not current, you receive a message to reboot your system. When you reboot, the system updates the DLL files in your Microsoft Windows directories.

Understanding Third-Party Products

A local Oracle Enterprise Edition (OEE) is required for *Release 9.2* Development Clients. The OUI installer for the Development Client installs OEE and the Development client separately. Refer to the *Development Client Installation Guide*.

The use of Microsoft Internet Explorer is optional. Adobe Acrobat Reader 6.0 or greater is strongly recommended to view reports online. Neither the browser or reader applications are delivered with the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Applications Release 9.2* installation.

Microsoft Internet Explorer provides:

- An option for a Web-like menu view within *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Explorer*.
- An option for an Internet connection capability directly from the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Explorer* interface.

Understanding User Profiles and Languages

Note: *Release 9.2* supports group preferences for user profile Development Client configuration and environment assignment.

For user and group profiles, you should use the preloaded users to perform the installation process. The system administrator needs to create a user profile before the user can log on to *Release 9.2*.

All users are assigned a language preference code within the user profile. The language preference code field specifies which language is presented on the applicable form or report. You can set up your users and groups when determining how groups are to be organized and what preferences each group shared to have.

For languages, the *JDE.INI* on the Windows-based Deployment Server are updated automatically. For multiple language usage, both the Enterprise Server and Development Client *JDE.INI jde.ini* need to be modified for the preferred language being installed.

10 Performing Post Installation and Upgrade Tasks

Working With Signon Security and Table Creation Security

For initial installations of *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne*, you must setup system user(s) using the Work With System Users (P980001) program to populate the F98OWPU table. You must set up system users before you can add and associate a *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* user to a system user using EnterpriseOne Security (P98OWSEC).

CAUTION: If you attempt to add a user with the P98OWSEC program before you add the system user through the P980001 program, the system may add an invalid record to the F98OWPU table. You might have to delete the invalid record from F98OWPU using the SQL Query tool. You must perform security setup signed on to *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* from a deployed client. If you perform the steps signed on to the deployment server, you will not be updating the correct security tables for your *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* system.

Note: For details on Table Creation Security, refer to the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Security Administration Guide* in the section entitled: *Managing Data Source Security*.

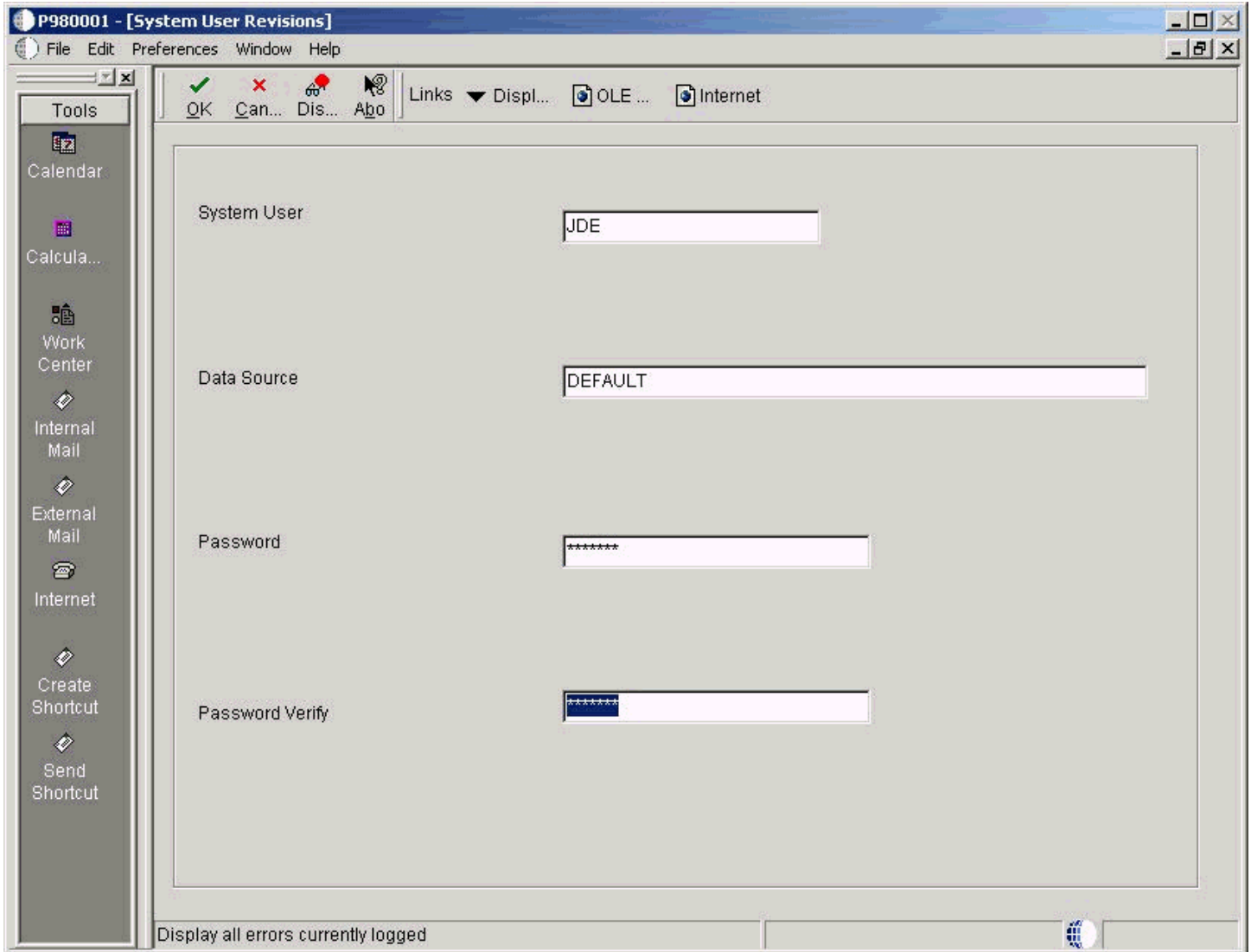

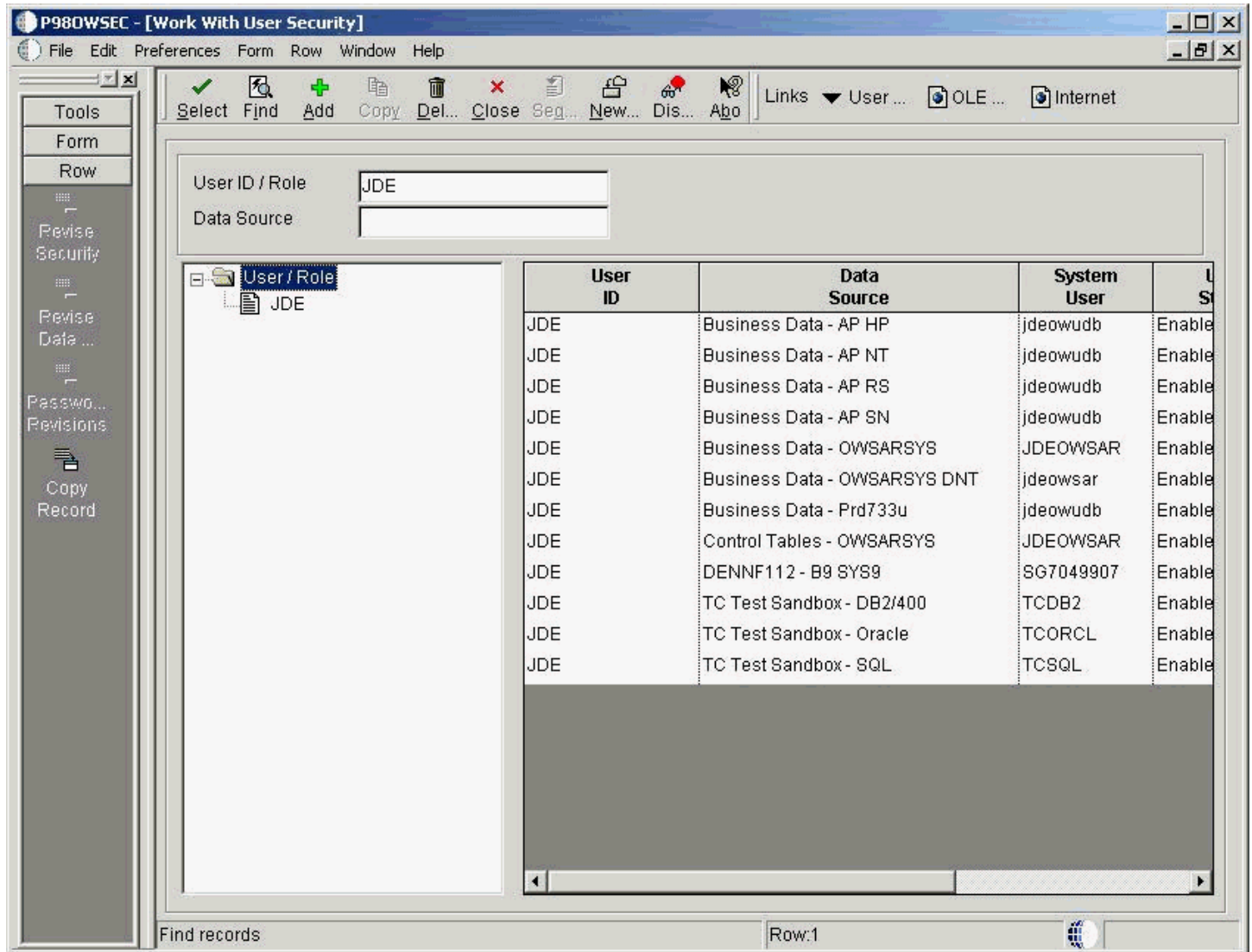

Adding a Security Override for Running Package Build

If you are running with security server turned on, you must add a security override so that the package build process can create the metadata repository tables in Central Objects. Adding a security override must be done by a security administrator. To add a security override, you must first add a system user for the Central Objects data source owner, and then add an override for the EnterpriseOne user who will run the package build.

Refer to the [JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Tools Package Management Guide](#) in the appendix entitled: [Appendix A, Adding a Security Override for Package Build](#) for further details on setting up security overrides for package build.

Enabling Server-Side Signon Security

Ensure the `JDE.INI` on the Enterprise Server has these settings to support signon security:

```
[SECURITY]
SecurityServer=server_name
User=JDE
Password=JDE
Default Role=*ALL
DefaultEnvironment=
                                PD920
```

```
DataSource=
                                System - 920
```

History=0

After you modify the `JDE.INI` on the Enterprise Server, you must restart the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* Services so the settings can take effect.

CAUTION: If you have changed the database password for the JDE user, the password you specify on Enterprise Server in `JDE.INI` must be the new password.

Enabling Client-Side Signon Security

Locate the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* client `JDE.INI` that is deployed from the Deployment Server. Typically the file can be found at the following location:

```
x:\JDEdwards\  
  E920  
  \OneWorld Client Install\Misc\JDE.INI
```

where x: is the drive on which *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* is installed.

Ensure that *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* client `JDE.INI` has these settings:

```
[SECURITY]  
SecurityServer=server_name  
DataSource=  
                System - 920  
  
DefaultEnvironment=  
                DV920  
  
Default Role=*ALL  
Row Security=NO_DEFAULT
```

Setting Up Single Sign-on

You must set up *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* Single Signon Security using the procedures described in *Setting Up JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Single Sign-On* of the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Tools Security Administration Guide*.

CAUTION: Using default settings may expose a potential security risk. Thus, it is highly recommended to overwrite the single sign-on settings using the single sign-on configuration applications discussed in *Setting Up JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Single Sign-On* of the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Tools Security Administration Guide*.

Setting Up Microsoft Windows Security on Directories

To set up Microsoft Windows security on the *Release 9.2* directories and files on your Deployment Server. Use these charts to determine what permissions are required for the various types of *Release 9.2* users and perform these tasks to set permissions on the Security tab:

Using the Adobe SVG Viewer on Web Clients

Per the Minimum Technical Requirements (MTRs) for *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* web clients (refer to the section of this guide entitled: *Accessing Certifications*), you must have the Adobe Scalable Vector Graphics (SVG) viewer installed on your web clients in order to use specific *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* applications, such as Demand Flow Manufacturing.

Within such *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* applications, the Graphical Product Synchronization uses the Adobe SVG viewer for displaying the graphics associated with the product synchronization. The *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* application automatically detects the Adobe viewer if it is already installed for the browser. If the viewer is not installed for the

browser, the system displays a link that you can use to install the viewer from the Adobe web site. The URL for this link is:

```
http://www.adobe.com/svg/viewer/install/main.html
```

Note: SVG is a graphics file format and web development language based on XML that enables dynamic creation of high-quality graphics with precise structural and visual control. It is based on standards defined by the World Wide Web Consortium (<http://www.w3.org/TR/SVG/>).

Tip: The installation of the SVG viewer may require administrator authority on your client machine.

Setting Up Solution Explorer

Solution Explorer is the Microsoft Windows-based interface that provides access to *Release 9.2* applications, role-based menus, implementation and configuration options, documentation, and training materials. Solution Explorer is a convenient window into *Release 9.2*.

Users can access Solution Explorer to search and navigate quickly through *Release 9.2* applications. Users also can customize Solution Explorer to create their own tasks and link tasks to other Web-based information.

Setting Up Solution Explorer HTML Documentation Path

When *Release 9.2* is installed, the system automatically stores HTML documentation hierarchically in folders located in a common documentation directory. Using Media Object Queues, Solution Explorer locates these files and displays the associated documentation in its own window whenever a user selects a task.

The file path from Solution Explorer to the HTML documentation files is defined in the F98MOQUE table; it must be configured by accessing the corresponding program, called the Work with Media Object Queues (P98MOQUE) program. When *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* installs the documentation files, it creates an entry in the Media Object Queue table that associates the Queue Name, called ActivEraData, with a generic path to the documentation. For Solution Explorer to link each HTML file with the correct task, you must open this program and change the server name for the directory path associated with the Queue Name ActivEraData. The directory path has this structure:

```
\\Server_Name\ E920 \SolutionExplorder\Data
```

where *Server_Name* is the name of your Deployment Server.

When the queue name ActivEraData is correctly mapped to the main HTML documentation directory, Solution Explorer locates and displays the associated documentation when a user accesses a Task Location or Task View Location. For example, if a task named JDE001234 exists, the path to the HTML file of the summary document for the task is:

```
\\Server_Name\ PY920 \SolutionExplorer\Data\JDE001234\summary.html
```

where *Server_Name* is the name of the Deployment Server

For more information on setting up the documentation path, refer to *Modifying Media Object Queues*.

Setting Up the Home Page for Solution Explorer

The home page is generally the first screen a user sees when logging on to Solution Explorer. This screen can be used to display information that is relevant to end users in the enterprise. It can be an external Web site, an intranet site, or even HTML files stored on any server on the network.

During the installation process, a directory called PortalLite is created when the Deployment Server is installed. This directory resides in this path:

```
x:\base_installation_directory\SolutionExplorer\PortalLite
```

where `x:\base_installation_directory` is the drive and directory where you installed *Release 9.2* on your Deployment Server.

The PortalLite directory includes a set of HTML files that make up the default Home Page. Even though this directory is on the Deployment Server by default, the directory could reside anywhere on the network, such as on a *HTML Web Server* or on a local Development Client.

When the *Release 9.2* client is installed, the system updates the client `JDE.INI` to point to the location of the PortalLite directory. For example, if the name of the Deployment Server is `DepServer1` and the share name is `E920`, the [Explorer] section of the `JDE.INI` is updated as follows:

```
[Explorer]
ExplorerHomeURL="\\DepServer1\
                E920
                \SolutionExplorer\portallite\index.html"
ExplorerStart=INTERNET
```

You can change the above parameters in the `JDE.INI` to display any HTML file or URL as the default Home Page. This table describes these parameters:

[Explorer] Parameter	Description
ExplorerHomeURL=	<p>Defines the URL or filename of the Home Page that is displayed when the user logs on. The default value is:</p> <pre>\\Depserver1\ E920 \SolutionExplorer\portallite\index.html</pre>
ExplorerStart=	<p>Defines the Explorer start mode. Values are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> INTERNET <p>This is the default value. When you start Solution Explorer, the system displays the Internet view first.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> TASK <p>When you start Solution Explorer, the system displays the last task view the user viewed.</p> <p>To display a specific task view, use this syntax:</p> <pre>ExplorerStart=TASK:xx</pre> <p>where <code>xx</code> is the task ID of the task view.</p>

Configuring for Use with Vertex Quantum Tax Applications

This topic describes how to configure *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* to use the Vertex Quantum tax applications. If you do not use these applications with *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne*, skip this section.

Release 9.2 can be used with the following Vertex Quantum tax applications:

- Vertex Quantum for Payroll Tax
- Vertex Quantum for Sales and Use Tax

The Vertex Quantum applications should be installed on your system before starting the configuration tasks.

Note: The Vertex Quantum applications can be used with the Indexed Sequential Access Method (ISAM) database or Oracle database (for either of the Vertex Quantum applications) or the SQL Server database (for Vertex Quantum for Sales and Use Tax). The ISAM database is installed as part of the Vertex Quantum application installation.

Before configuring *Release 9.2* for use with Vertex Quantum applications, install Vertex Quantum for Payroll Tax, Vertex Quantum for Sales and Use Tax, or both on the Enterprise Server. For information about installing the Vertex Quantum applications, refer to the Vertex Quantum administration guides listed above. When installing the Vertex Quantum applications, note the following:

- Note the directory path on the Enterprise Server for the directory in which the Vertex Quantum applications are stored.
This information is needed when copying the Vertex libraries into the *Release 9.2* directory structure.
- For Vertex Quantum for Sales and Use Tax, you can install the ISAM database version of the Vertex Quantum application, or you can use the SQL Server or Oracle database.
- For Vertex Quantum for Payroll Tax, you can install the ISAM database version of the Vertex Quantum application, or you can use the Oracle database.
You cannot use SQL Server with Vertex Quantum for Payroll Tax.
- When using the Vertex ISAM database, note the directory path on the Enterprise Server for the directory or directories in which the Vertex Quantum application databases are created.
This information is needed for establishing *Release 9.2* database connectivity.

Adding Vertex Quantum Directory Information to the Microsoft Windows Server Path

To add the Vertex Quantum application directory information to the Microsoft Windows server path:

1. From the Microsoft Windows Enterprise Server, access the Control Panel.

2. On Control Panel, click the System icon.
3. In System, select the Advanced tab.
4. On the Advanced tab, click the Environment Variables button.
5. In the System Variables window, scroll down until the keyword Path appears in the Variable column.
6. Click Edit to display the current path in the Variable Value field.
7. Search the current path (as shown in the Value field) for the Vertex Quantum application directory.

If the directory does not appear, you must add it to the path, as described in the following step. If the directory appears in the path, skip to step 9 in this task.



8. Place the cursor in the Value field, and use the right arrow to scroll to the end of the field and enter this path: `x:\vertexDirectoryPath\vertex\utils`

where `x:\vertexDirectoryPath` is the drive and path for the directory in which the Vertex Quantum applications are stored.

Note: You might need to include a semicolon to separate this entry from previous entries.

9. Click Set.
The new value is saved.
10. After you finish setting the Environment Variables, repeat this task for User Variables, starting from Step 5 in this task.
11. Click OK and reboot the server.
The new path takes effect.

Configuring the Database Connections for Vertex Quantum Tax Applications

To configure *Release 9.2* database connections to use the Vertex Quantum applications:

1. In the Fast Path field, enter G731 to access Vertex Quantum Tax Processing.
The Vertex Quantum Tax Processing panel appears.
2. Highlight and right-click the Database Connections (P7308) program.
A context menu appears.
3. On the context menu, select Prompt for Values.

The Processing Options dialog appears.

4. On Processing Options, click the Quantum tab and enter the following information:

Option #1: Enter which Vertex Quantum applications are installed:

Value	Action
[blank]	Install both Vertex Quantum tax applications.
1	Install the Vertex Quantum for Sales and Use Tax application.
2	Install the Vertex Quantum for Payroll Tax application.

Option #2: Enter location information for the databases:

Value	Action
[blank]	Define databases for both Vertex Quantum tax applications in the same location.
1	Define databases for the Vertex Quantum for Payroll Tax and Vertex Quantum for Sales and Use Tax applications in separate locations.
2	Define databases for the Vertex Quantum for Payroll Tax and Vertex Quantum for Sales and Use Tax applications in separate locations, and the four databases for the Vertex Quantum for Sales and Use Tax application in separate locations.

Option #3: If processing option #2 is set to 1 or 2 (that is, if the Vertex databases are in separate locations), specify the GeoCode database location information:

Value	Action
[blank]	Define the Vertex Quantum Payroll Tax and Sales and Use Tax applications to use the same GeoCode database.
1	Define each of the Vertex applications to use a separate copy of the GeoCode database, and that the two copies are expected in separate locations.

5. Click OK.

The Vertex Quantum Database Connection panel is displayed. The Database Connection panel contains one or more tabs that correspond to the database connections that must be defined. The displayed tabs are determined by the values you entered in the processing options, in Step 4 of this task.

Note: The GeoCode database is the only Vertex Quantum database that can be shared between the Vertex Quantum Payroll Tax and Sales and Use Tax applications. However, all of the Vertex Quantum databases can be installed in the same location or in different locations.

One or more of the following tabs appears on the Database Connection panel:

Tab	Description
All	All Vertex Quantum application databases for both applications are located on the same server and in the same location.
GeoCode	The same GeoCode database is used by both applications.
GeoCode-Sales and Use	The GeoCode database used by the Sales and Use Tax application is located on this server and location. A separate copy of the GeoCode database, at another location, is used by the Payroll Tax application.
GeoCode-Payroll	The GeoCode database used by the Payroll Tax application is located on this server and location. A separate copy of the GeoCode database, at another location, is used by the Sales and Use Tax application.
Sales and Use	The four databases used by the Sales and Use Tax application are located together, on this server and location.
TDM	The Test Data Management (TDM) database, used by the Sales and Use Tax application, is located on this server and location.
Register	The Register database, used by the Sales and Use Tax application, is located on this server and location.
Rate	The Rate database, used by the Sales and Use Tax application, is located on this server and location.
Payroll	The databases used by the Payroll Tax application are located on this server and location.

6. On the Database Connection panel, select each tab and enter the following information:
- o *Data Source*

For ISAM, enter the directory path to the specified database. The location you enter should be the location on the server used for the database when the Vertex applications were installed, as previously described in this step.

- *Server*

For ISAM, leave this field blank.

- *User ID*

For ISAM, leave this field blank.

- *Password*

For ISAM, leave this field blank.

Note: The P7308 program encrypts the user ID and password and also visibly masks the password field. For additional details, refer to "Encrypting Sensitive Data in EnterpriseOne" in the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Tools Security Administration Guide*.

7. Click OK.

The changes do not take effect until you have logged off of your system and logged back on.

Mapping Objects to the Enterprise Server

Objects that call the Vertex Quantum APIs must execute on the server on which the Vertex Quantum APIs reside. Check that the following *Release 9.2* objects are configured in the system OCM to execute on the server. Do not change the mappings.

For Vertex Quantum for Payroll Tax:

- R07200 (Pre-payroll Driver)
- B0700058

For Vertex Quantum for Sales and Use Tax:

- X00TAX.c (Tax Calculator)
- B7300002 (Validate Quantum GeoCodes)
- B7300004 (Retrieve Quantum GeoCodes)
- B7300012 (Validate Quantum Software Information)
- B0000182
- B0000183

Testing the Vertex Quantum Connection from

Use the following procedures to test the Vertex Quantum connection from *Release 9.2*.

To test the Vertex Quantum for Payroll Tax interface:

1. Access the Payroll Workbench menu (G07BUSP11), and select Pay Cycle Workbench.

The Work with Payroll Cycle Workbench panel appears.

2. Specify pre-payroll information and submit the pre-payroll.

For information about the Payroll Workbench and submitting pre-payroll, see Processing Pre-Payroll in the *Release 9.2 Payroll Implementation Guide*.

3. If no taxes are being calculated, there may be a setup or configuration problem.

Verify the following to make sure setup is correct:

- o UBE R07200 is being executed on the server where the Vertex Quantum for Payroll Tax APIs reside.
- o Correct values are assigned to the `Data Source`, `Server`, `User ID`, and `Password` fields on the Database Connection panel, as specified in *Configuring the Database Connections for Vertex Quantum Tax Applications*.

4. For the Vertex Quantum for Sales and Use Tax interface:

In the Fast Path field, enter P73GEO.

The Retrieve GeoCode panel appears.

5. On the Retrieve GeoCode panel, enter `CO` in the State field and `DENVER` in the City field, and click Find.

The code 060310140 should appear in the grid.

6. If nothing appears in the grid, a setup or configuration problem might exist.

Verify the following to make sure setup is correct:

- o These values are set in the Work with Quantum Constants Revision table, accessed by the Constants application (P7306) on menu G731:

Quantum Active: Y

Canada Country Code: CA

Note: Changes to the Work with Quantum Constants Revision table do not take effect until you have logged off of your system and logged back on.

- o Required *Release 9.2* objects are mapped to the server where the Vertex Quantum for Sales and Use Tax APIs reside.

Also ensure that correct values are assigned to the `Data Source`, `Server`, `User ID`, and `Password` fields on the Database Connection panel. Instructions for both procedures are specified in the section of this chapter entitled *Mapping Objects to the Enterprise Server*

Enabling CRM Functionality

To enable CRM functionality after the installation is complete, you must perform these procedures on the CRM Enterprise Server and the CRM client:

- *Enabling CRM on the CRM Mobile Client*
- *Enabling CRM on the Enterprise Server*

Enabling CRM on the CRM Mobile Client

To enable CRM functionality in *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* and the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* mobile client, make sure that the F99410 table has records that contain the following system codes:

- SY90CA
- CRMMSL
- SY49

On your Enterprise Server, access the P99410 application and complete this procedure to enable CRM functionality:

1. On Work with EnterpriseOne System Control, click Add.
2. On EnterpriseOne System Control Revisions, enter each of these system codes, one at a time, in the Data Item field:
 - 90CA
This code enables CRM functionality in *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne*.
 - MMSL
With SY49, this system code enables CRM functionality in the mobile client.
 - SY49
With CRMMSL, this system code enables CRM functionality in the mobile client.
3. Click Yes.
4. Click OK.
5. Repeat these steps to add each system code.

Enabling CRM on the Enterprise Server

Using an ASCII editor, you must modify the `JDE.INI` `jde.ini` on your Enterprise Server to add this section and setting:

```
[MAILMERGE]  
FileLocation=location
```

where `location` is a temporary location that you specify for the CRM-related mail merge files that are generated on your Enterprise Server, for example:

```
/u01/temp
```

Enabling Verity Enhanced Search Capability

If you are using the enhanced search capability with *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne*, you must download and install the Verity Software from the Oracle Software Cloud Web site at this link:

```

Understanding Media Object Queues

This section discusses these topics:

- Overview
- Modifying Media Object Queues

Overview

Media objects enable the attachment of information to *Release 9.2* applications. Media Object Queues enable you to specify the storage location of media objects to be tracked by reference as opposed to physical network location. This enables easier administration of media locations.

Media object queues provide the system administrator the ability to easily manage the storage of media objects and helps in a *Release 9.2* configuration. Within *Release 9.2*, set up media object queues in order to use images that are outside the domain of the imaging product (for example, scanned images).

Define a media object queue to identify the pointer to the location where the actual image files or Object Linking and Embedding (OLE) objects reside. For OLE objects, the name of the queue must be OLEQUE. The media object queues must reside on a Microsoft Windows-based machine. A valid network-qualified path must exist for this machine. Use the Deployment Server or any other Microsoft Windows-based machine.

If you modify the OLEQUE path, make sure to copy the image files and OLE objects to the new location.

When using the Deployment Server to store media object queues, remember to make the machine available for use daily by *Release 9.2* applications.

Media object queue paths are shipped with generic server names. To enable media object queues at the customer site, enter the Deployment Server name in the media object queue path.

Modifying Media Object Queues

To modify your media object queues:

1. Log into *Release 9.2* as JDE in the *DEP920* environment.
2. From System Administration Tools (GH9011), select Media Object Queues (P98MOQUE).
3. To define the location for a new OLE queue, click Add.
4. Complete these fields:
 - *Name*
Enter a valid value for your queue.
 - *Path*

Generally the queue paths include *server_name* and *queue_name*. Replace *server_name* with the name of the Deployment Server or the location of the media object queue. A valid queue path for a network location might be:

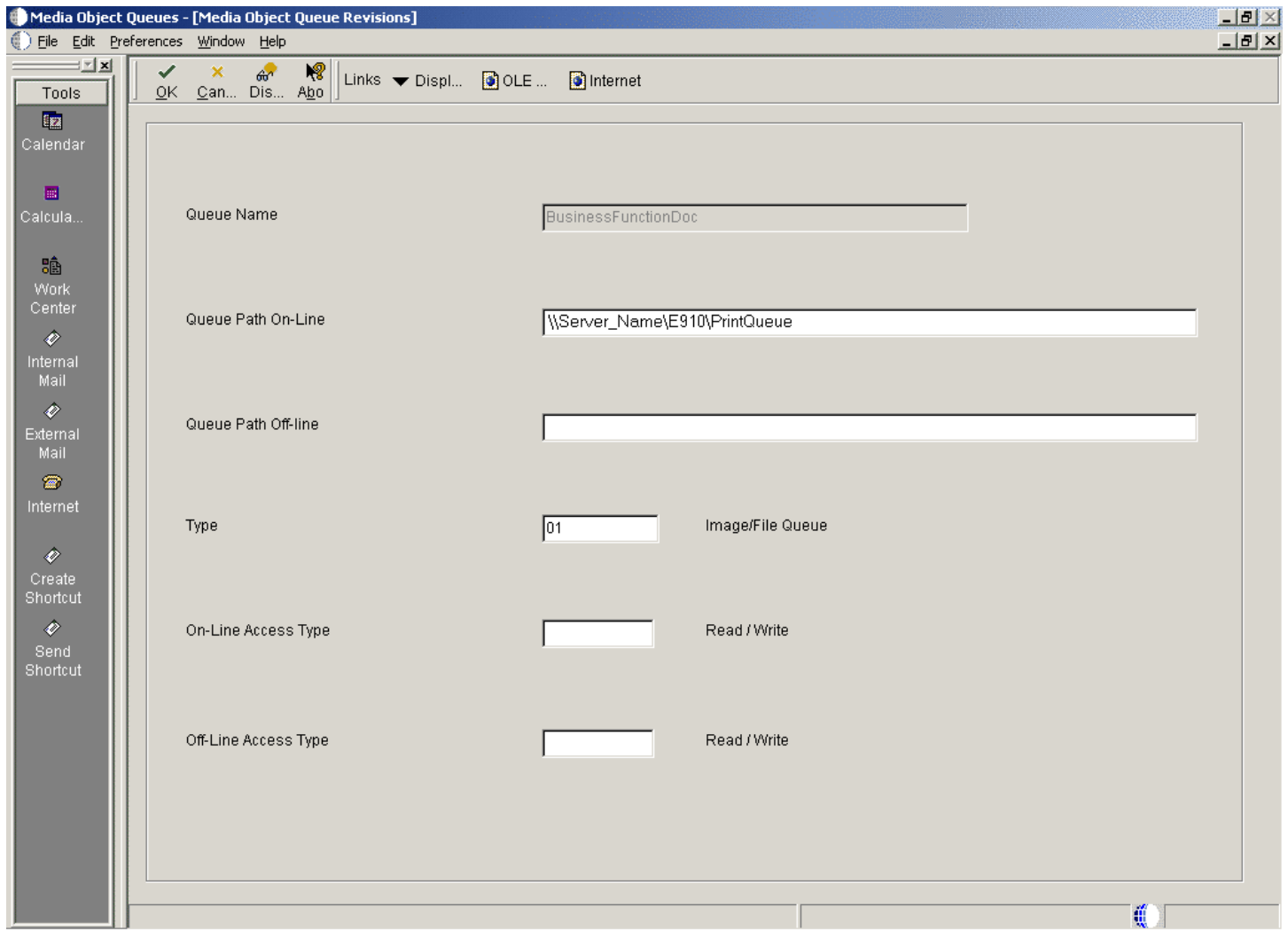
```
\\server_name\ E920 \queue_name
```

where *server_name* is your Deployment Server and *queue_name* is the name of the media object queue.

When using ComposerCBT, the media object queue path does not require `\\` or *server_name*. ComposerCBT is shipped with an *x* for the drive name. To enable the Composer CBT queue, replace the *x* with the drive letter that the Development Client uses to access the server where the media object queues reside. For example: `N:\Mediaobj\ComposerCBT`.

5. To change an existing media object queue, click Find to display a list of queue names and their paths.

6. On Work With Media Object Queues, select the queue name you want to modify.



7. On Media Object Queues, change the information in the Queue Path On-Line field to reflect the new location.
8. Copy the image files and OLE objects to the new location.
9. Exit *Release 9.2* and log back on to enable the changes.

Specifying the Help Location Used by the Web Client and Development Client

Note: The instructions in this section describe the setup of basic help function. For directions on setting up contextual help, refer to the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Tools Runtime Administration Guide* in the section entitled: *Setting Up Help*.

To specify the help location used by the Web Client and Development Client:

1. From System Administration Tools (GH9011), select Media Object Queues (P98MOQUE).
2. To define the location for the Help file that is used by the Web Client, on Media Object Queues, enter **Help** in the Name field and click Find.

7. On Work With Media Object Queues, enter Help* in the QBE for Queue Name and verify the two help queues are added.
8. Exit *Release 9.2* and log back on to enable the changes.

Increasing Decimal Precision of Unaccounted Units Data Items

Decimal precision differences between data items CTSx (CTS1, CTS2, CTS3, and CTS9) and TRQT may result in rounding discrepancies. Therefore, if you use the CTSx data items to store unaccounted units, Oracle recommends that you perform one of the following tasks based on your installation:

- If you are installing JD Edwards EnterpriseOne for the first time, change the display decimal setting for the CTSx data items (2 decimals) in the E920 data dictionary to match the display decimal setting for the TRQT data item (4 decimals).
- If you have an existing installation of JD Edwards EnterpriseOne, run the display decimal conversion UBE (R8931CTSX) and then change the display decimal setting for the CTSx data items (2 decimals) in the E920 data dictionary to match the display decimal setting for the TRQT data item (4 decimals).

11 Building and Testing Packages

Understanding Packages

Building and testing packages provides a method to create a package, to define and build a package, to deploy packages to both servers and Development Clients, and to troubleshoot the packages. These features use a step-by-step director process and include package assembly, package build, and package deployment.

Package build is used to set up a Development Client or server with *Release 9.2* software. Examples scenarios include:

- Setting up a new Development Client
- Deploying custom solutions to all or to selected users
- Creating a new pathcode for development
- Deploying a fix
- Changing the package from a full to a partial package on some Development Clients

There are options to define three different package types, to build and define packages with custom solutions, and to distribute them through two different deployment options. These options are available to a single server, to a Development Client or user, or to selected machines, groups, or individual users. These options can be delivered using just-in-time or scheduled installation methods.

You must define, build, and deploy a custom package in order to include any modifications (changed or added business functions or applications) into a package for deployment to Development Clients (for example, DV920FA or DV920PA).

The system administrator is required to build and test packages at the server level. An installer may complete the process for the Development Clients. These processes can take several hours, depending on the scope of your business. The procedures take place on the Deployment Server in the deployment environment as user JDE. *Release 9.2* installation must be completed on the Enterprise Server before building and testing packages. The time required to build packages to the Development Client varies depending on the database being used.

The package build and assembly process includes many critical tasks that must be successfully completed to install the packages correctly. This section includes a list of known issues associated with the package build, assembly, and deployment process and gives instructions for avoiding them. Before building a package, review these instructions to successfully complete this process.

Obtaining the JDK or JRE

You must have a specific JDK or JRE on the Deployment Server in order to build packages. You can obtain the requisite JDK or JRE from Oracle E-Delivery.

Installing Application Fixes

Before you build packages, you should install all application fixes relevant to your business. Application fixes include maintenance packs, ESU bundles, and individual fixes. You should use Change Assistant to find relevant application fixes for system codes associated with the functionality you are using.

Change Assistant is a java-based tool that centralizes and economizes the process of searching, identifying, downloading, and deploying many types of software fixes such as ESUs and Tools Releases. It is available free of charge for maintenance paying customers, and can be downloaded from the Update Center.

Tests conducted in the Oracle labs on EnterpriseOne have shown that the use of this tool results in a significant reduction in elapsed time as well as a considerable reduction in manual steps - when compared to current search, download, and deploy processes.

For instructions on using Change Assistant, refer to *Using the Change Assistant* in the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Software Update Guide*.

Reviewing Pre-Package Build Issues

Check the following items before building packages in order to minimize errors during package builds. Perform each of the relevant tasks on the machine where the package will be built.

This section discusses:

- *Verifying Available Space in DBMS*
- *Verifying Specific UBEs are Mapped Locally*
- *Verifying the Server-Side Settings*
- *Configuring the Enterprise Server for Simultaneous Builds*
- *Adding a Security Override for Running Package Build*

Verifying Available Space in DBMS

Package Deployment will copy the Central Objects tables in your server database to a new set of Metadata Specifications tables in the same database.

You must verify that there is enough space available in your Oracle tablespaces for this extra copy.

Note the space used by your Central Objects tables and their indexes. The new set of Metadata Specifications tables will use additional space approximately the same size (for a full package) as your current Central Objects tables plus indexes. Those tables are:

- F98306

- F98710
- F98711
- F98712
- F98713
- F98720
- F98740
- F98741
- F98743
- F98745
- F98750
- F98751
- F98752
- F98753
- F98760
- F98761
- F98762

If you do not have enough free space to accommodate these tables, you must increase the size of your tablespaces or drop the metadata specifications tables for old packages no longer in use.

If you do not have enough free space to accommodate these tables, you must increase the size of your tablespaces or drop the metadata specifications tables for old packages no longer in use.

Verifying Specific UBEs are Mapped Locally

To verify that specific UBEs are mapped locally:

1. Open the Object Configuration Manager (OCM).
2. Find each of the following UBEs and make sure each is mapped locally and is active: R9621, R9622, R98825C, and R98825D.

Verifying the Server-Side Settings

To verify the `JDE.INI` settings on the Enterprise Server:

1. Open the `JDE.INI` on the Enterprise Server.
2. Verify that the BuildArea setting in the [BSFN BUILD] section points to the PACKAGES directory on the Enterprise Server.

For example:

```
/JDEdwards/ e920 /packages
```

Verify that the following LinkFlags settings are correct:

- Ensure that the path to the system\bin32 directory on the Enterprise Server is valid.
- Ensure that LinkFlags references the path where *Release 9.2* is installed.

Configuring the Enterprise Server for Simultaneous Builds

To ensure that simultaneous builds run properly on your Enterprise Server.

1. Open the *JDE.INI* on the Enterprise Server.
2. In the [BSFN BUILD] section, change the SimultaneousBuilds setting to 5 or less (the default is zero, which enables unlimited builds)

Note: On the UNIX Enterprise Server, the number of simultaneous builds should not exceed the number of compiler licenses.

Adding a Security Override for Running Package Build

The Package Build process creates tables due to the requirement for metadata. Therefore, you must manually set up security overrides for any user who will be doing the package build. For details on adding a security override for running packages, refer to the chapter in this guide entitled: *Performing Post Installation and Upgrade Tasks* in the section entitled: *Working With Signon Security and Table Creation Security* in the subsection entitled: *Adding a Security Override for Running Package Build*.

Reviewing Troubleshooting Tips

The following troubleshooting tips are designed to help avoid known issues with the package build, assembly, and deployment process. Review these tips when working through the process.

- When naming your packages, do *not* use these names:
 - CLIENT
 - SERVER
- Verify the assemble and build processes completed.
After entering the package information on both the Assembly and Build forms, click the End icon to save the information.
- Verify setting on the package definition screen.
When selecting servers on the Build Definition form, ensure that a check mark appears next to each server selected. If no check mark appears, highlight the server in the grid and click Select.
- Recompress the parent packages.

After building an update package that updates the parent package, you must recompress the parent package. This step does not occur automatically.

- Verify the location of server packages.

When building an update server package, the specified parent package must be stored under the package directory on the server. If the parent package is not under the package directory, the update package does not build.

Building an Alternate Language Package

A package represents a copy of the central objects at a point in time. It contains replicated objects that *Release 9.2* reads at run-time. If custom modifications or text overrides have been made at the time that a software upgrade is performed or to deploy development changes, including a specific language, to a local Development Client, build a package, and specify which language or languages to include in that package. This action involves the following considerations:

- *Package Build Considerations*
- *Package Deployment Considerations*

Package Build Considerations

Before beginning to build a language package, verify that the language installation is complete. To build the language package, first define the package. Building the package can take several hours, depending on the size of the package and the number of languages used. This task is completed on the Deployment Server, logged on as user JDE in *DEP920*.

To include language specifications in your package, specify the language in the package definition. The package build process then uses the language preference code. This code is specified as a parameter when building the package. It uses the relational database tables to build the form design aid text and report design aid text specifications. A language package can be a full, update, or partial package.

CAUTION: When building the client package with translated processing option text, run the build using Microsoft Windows with the system locale set to the appropriate language. If the system locale on the operating system does not match the installed language, the translated text in processing options (POTEXT) will be corrupted.

Building server packages that include languages other than English requires that the LocalCodeSet value of the *Release 9.2* client matches the LocalCodeSet value of the *JDE.INI* on the Enterprise Server. If the LocalCodeSet value on the local client differs from the one specified on the Enterprise Server, the server package build fails and errors are logged in the *JDE.LOG* on the Enterprise Server.

Package Deployment Considerations

A translated package cannot be deployed to a Development Client if the appropriate character set is not installed on that Development Client. For example, if creating a package containing Japanese text, the Development Client must be loaded with Japanese Microsoft Windows to view the Japanese data correctly.

CAUTION: To transfer translated objects to a server, complete the server package installation procedures. Define each object you have modified for languages. Therefore, track the objects you changed to include them in a package.

Note: To move all objects, call Global Customer Support for assistance.

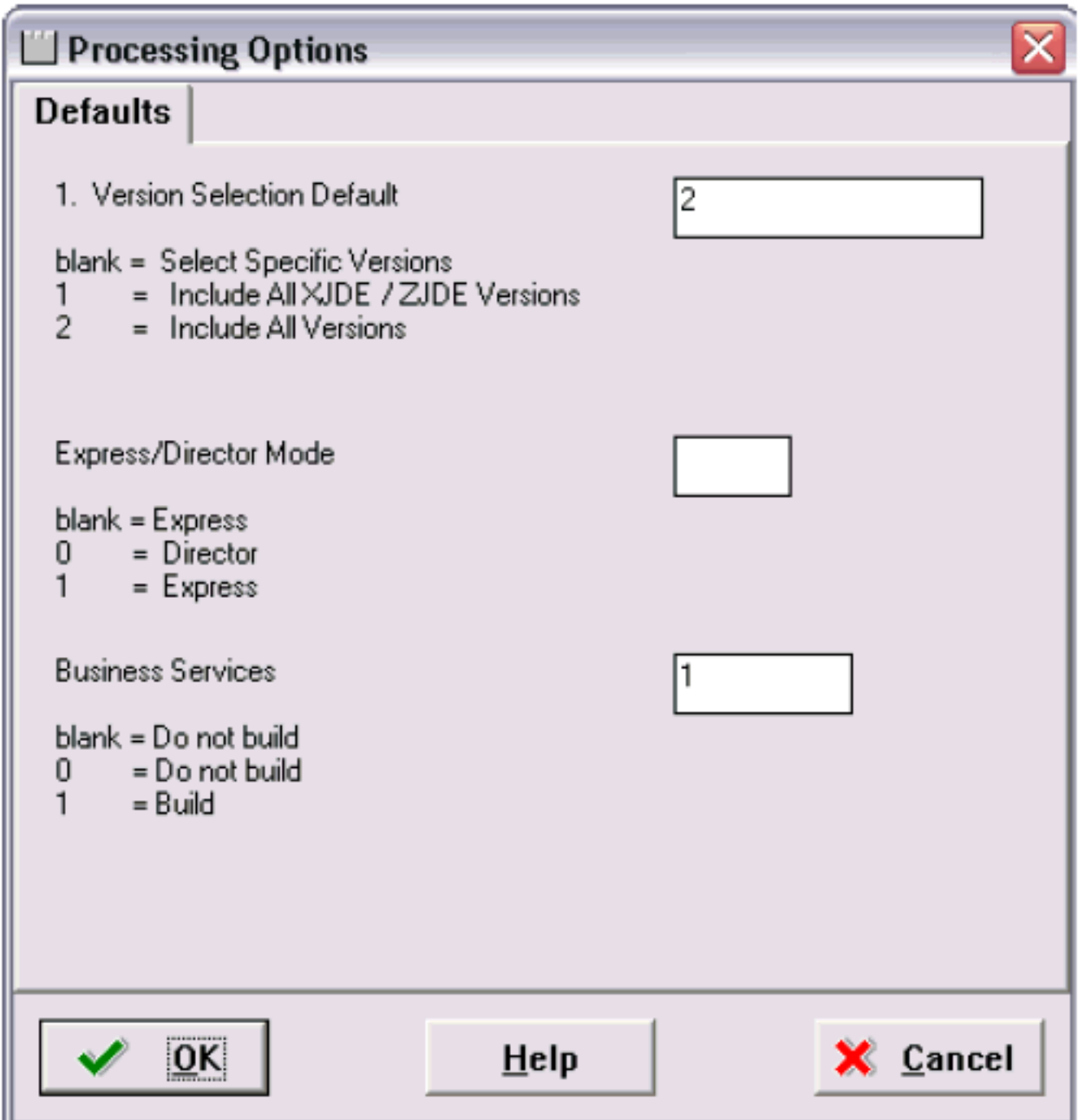

Assembling a Package that Contains Published Business Services

To assemble a Business Services package:

1. Navigate to the processing options for Package Assembly from to the Package and Deployment Tools menu by right-clicking the Package Assembly application (P9601), and selecting prompt for values.



2. Set the processing option entitled Business Services to a value of 1.

Note: This processing option is blank by default.

3. Click OK.

12 Troubleshooting

Using the PORTTEST Checklist

If the PORTTEST program fails to run, use this checklist to diagnose the problem before calling Global Customer Support. Please have the answers to these questions as well as copies of error messages, your Enterprise Server, and any error logs, such as JDE.log or JDE_xx.log.

PORTTEST may fail if replication, security server, or transaction processing have been installed incorrectly. If problems occur after the installation of one or more of these services, check the setup of those services for incorrect parameters.

PORTTEST will also fail if the Enterprise Server does not have an appropriate 32-bit database client installed. Refer to the chapter of this guide entitled: *Working With the Enterprise Server* in the section entitled: *Installing a 32-bit Database Client*.

Additionally, if PORTTEST reports warnings that indicate data dictionary or company constants are invalid, it may be because the F0010 table is empty. As is true with the full *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* installation, this is a normal condition in Pristine and Production environments.

If you answered no to any of these questions, your batch application might not run. If you answered yes to all the questions, submit a batch application now.

If your batch application does not run correctly, turn on error logging and resubmit the batch. This log helps Global Customer Support diagnose the exact problem.

Resolving Data Errors

If you are receiving data warnings against the F0010 table in the Pristine or Production environments, the table might be empty. This is how it is delivered. You can ignore these warnings, load demo data, or load your own data.

Planner Update Special Instructions

The Electronic Software Update (ESU) for the Planner Update Special Instructions was created with special features that updates the Planner pathcode on the Deployment Server. It includes all fixes for *Release 9.2* installation and upgrade process.

You must run the `specialInstrs.bat` file to copy certain table records from the ESU database to the Planner databases on the Deployment server.

1. On the Deployment server, browse to this directory:

\JDEdwards\ 920 \Planner\Package\JMxxxxxxx\Scripts
```

2. Run the batch file `specialInstrs.bat`. Note any success or failure messages that appear in the command window.

Review the `specialInstrs.log` file that is created in the same directory for details.

13 Creating a Remote Installation Plan

Understanding Remote Installation Plans

Installation Planner is a *Release 9.2* application that runs on the Deployment Server. It is a system administration tool that guides you through the process of configuring the machines on which your company will run *Release 9.2*.

To set up *Release 9.2* for a remote location, create a plan that includes remote locations. Complete the tasks in this section after you create and complete a basic installation plan, and are ready to add the remote locations to the configuration. This section includes information for installing an alternate language.

Before you begin, decide what your replication strategy is for *Release 9.2*. You can use Installation Workbench to copy the system, data dictionary, control, constant and master tables to your remote location. Ongoing replication of the data in these sources must be implemented using third-party software; *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* does not have a built-in replication engine.

The information that you provide on the Installation Planner forms, such as database type and Enterprise Server type, determines the information that the system displays on the remaining forms.

Note: *Installation Planner Considerations.* Depending on which tables you want to replicate, you are prompted for different data source information. For example, if you choose to replicate the control tables, you are asked to define the control tables data source.

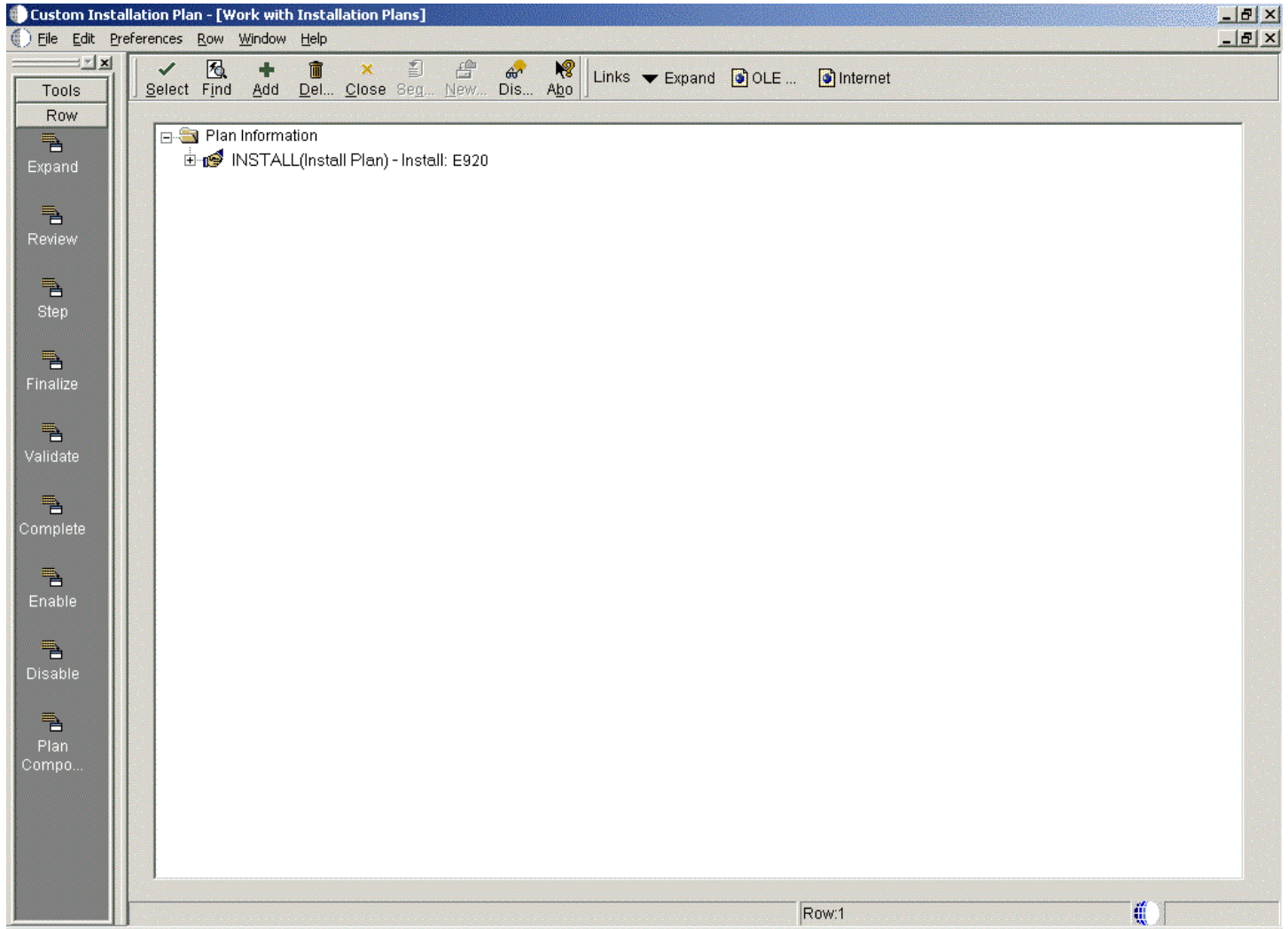
Note: *Data Source Considerations.* *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* provides configured data sources. However, when you run Installation Planner, you might need to modify some data source information to reflect your system-specific configuration. Only data sources that are referenced in the replication forms appear when you create a remote plan.

Starting Installation Planner

To start Installation Planner:

1. Log on to *Release 9.2* as user JDE with the database password for user JDE.
2. Access the planner environment (*JDEPLAN*).

3. From the System Installation Tools menu (GH961), click Custom Installation Plan.

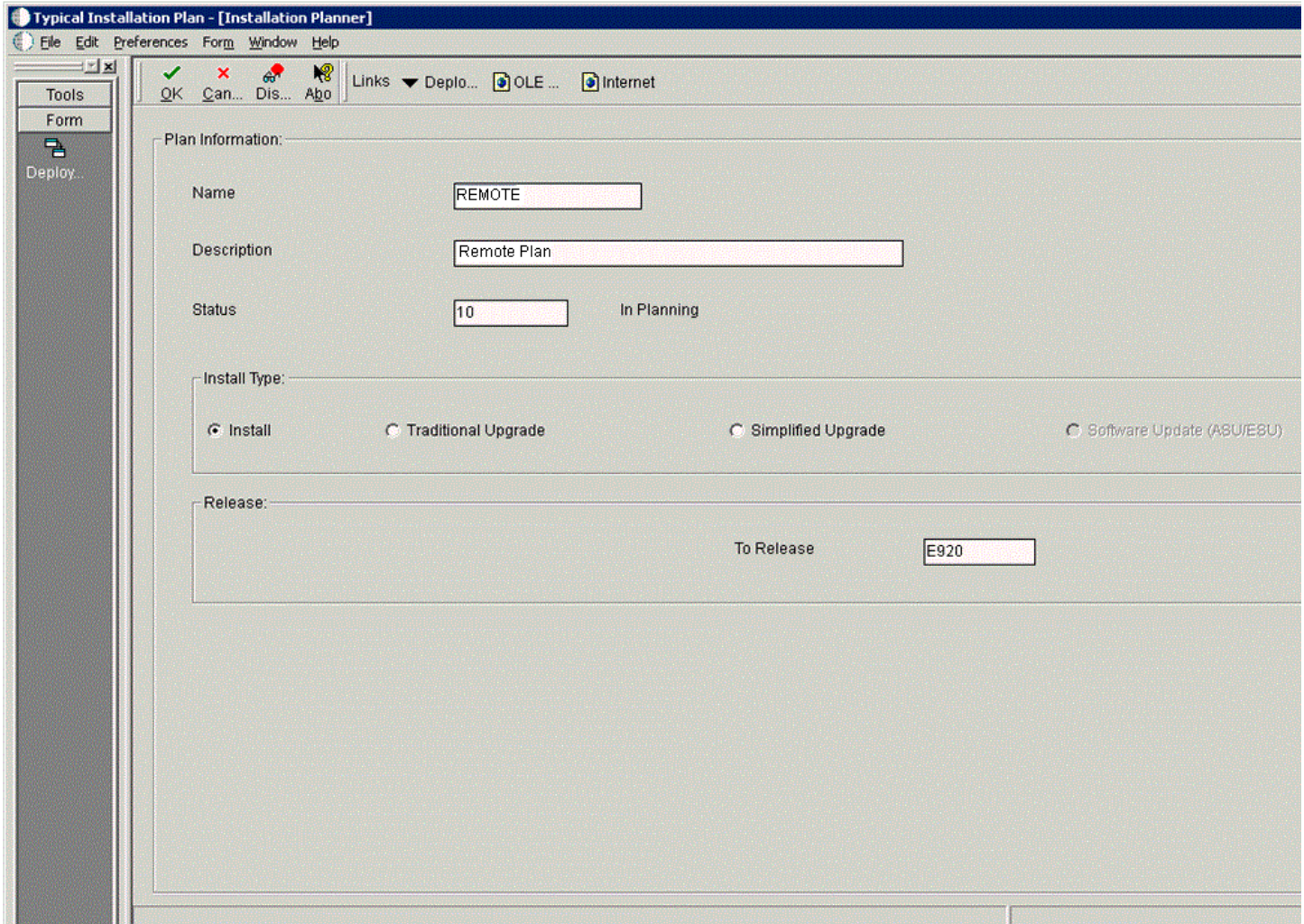

Location Code	For a remote location, enter a 3-character alphanumeric identification code. This 3-character code is used as a prefix for the environments of the remote location, and a suffix is attached for replicated data sources. For example, you might use DAL if the location were Dallas, Texas. In that case, the prototype environment would be named DAL PY920 , and the business data data source would be named Business Data - CRPDAL.
Parent Location	Enter the parent location to which this remote location is attached.

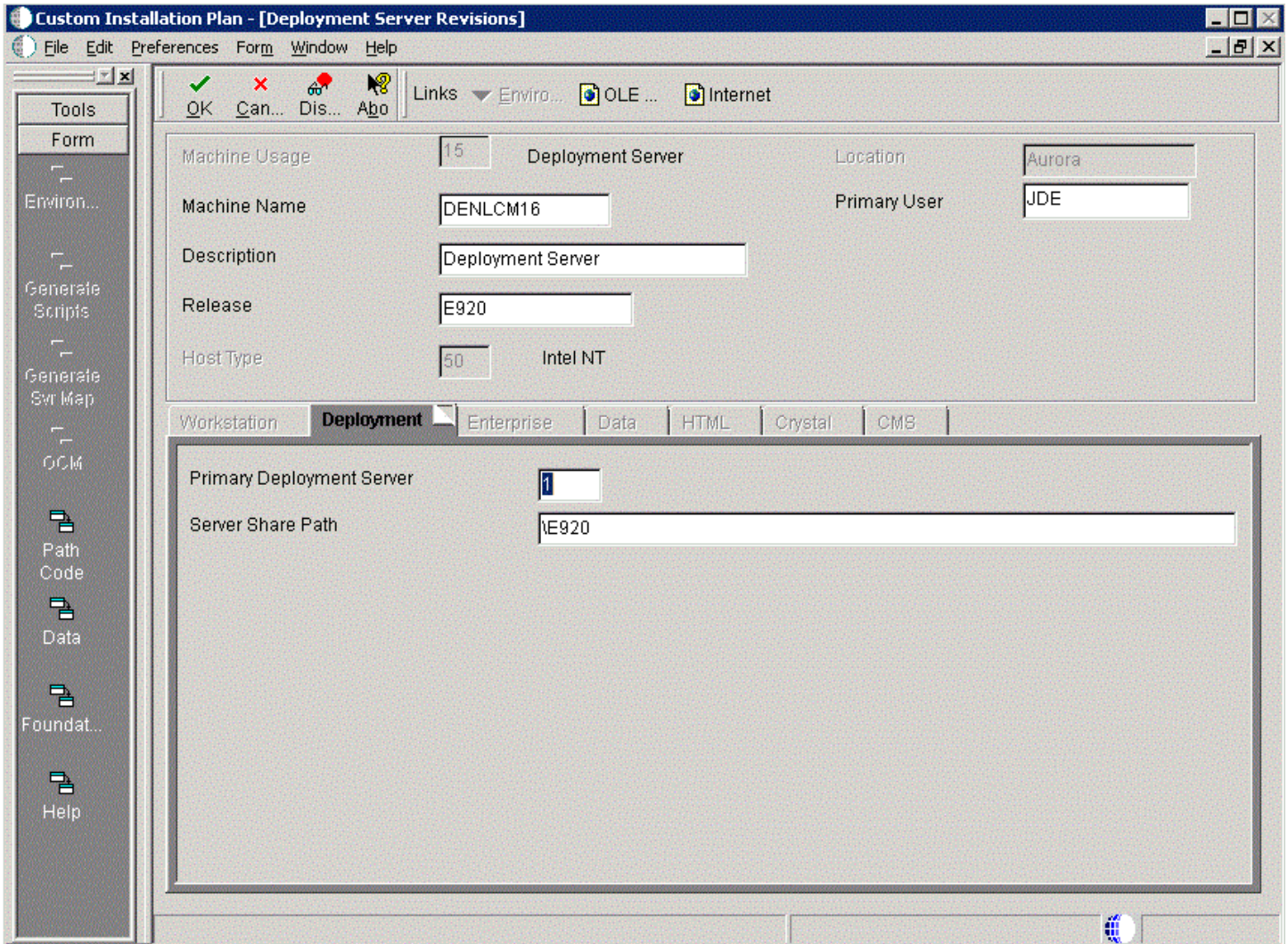
Entering Deployment Server Information

Once a plan location is specified, complete the information for the Deployment Server. You are given the option to enter a new Deployment Server or choose an existing one. For most situations, you will have a tiered Deployment Server for the remote location.

To enter Deployment Server information:



1. At the Installation Planner prompt asking if you want to enter new Deployment Server information, click the **OK** button to add a Deployment Server.



2. On Deployment Server Revisions, complete these fields:

Field	Description
Machine Usage	Displays the default value of 15 to indicate that this is a Deployment Server.
Machine Name	Enter the name of your Deployment Server. The name is case sensitive, should not exceed 15 characters, and should not contain any special characters.
Description	Enter a description of the machine name. This name includes the location with which this Deployment Server is associated, and whether or not it is the primary server.
Release	Enter the <i>Release 9.2</i> release number that you are installing, or use the visual assist button to choose one from the list. For example, <i>E920</i> is the current release.
Host Type	Displays the default value of 50 to indicate that the server type is an Intel NT.
Location	Displays the default location chosen for this plan.
Primary User	Enter the user to whom email is sent when a package is deployed. The default for Primary User is jde920. This is also the UNIX user ID that is used to install <i>Release 9.2</i> on the Enterprise Server. For example, JDE.

3. On the **Deployment** tab, complete these fields:

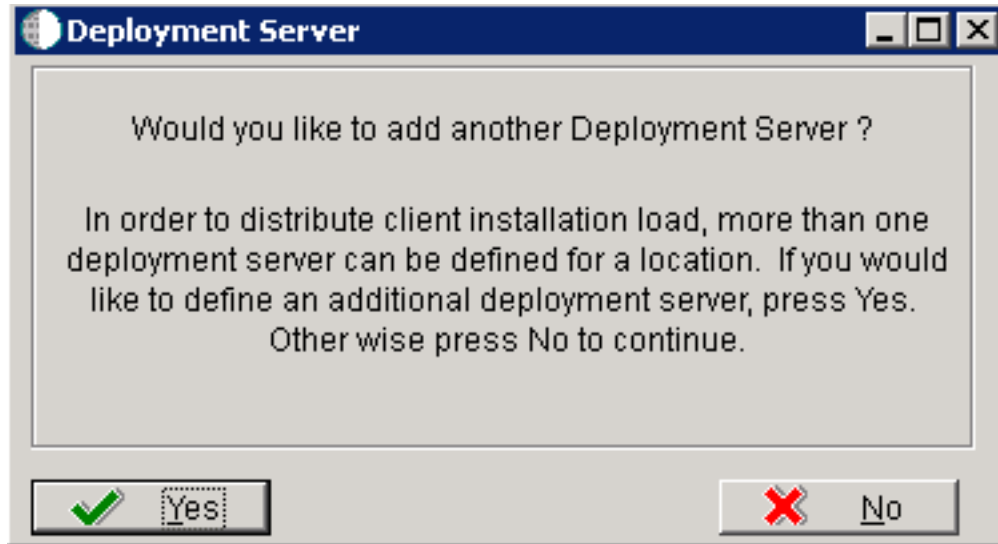
Field	Description
Primary Deployment Server	Enter the hierarchy of the servers. Type 0 (zero) if a primary Deployment Server for the location exists and this is a secondary server. Type 1 if this is the primary Deployment Server for the location.
Server Share Path	Enter the server share path where you installed <i>Release 9.2</i> on your Deployment Server. Make sure that this path is specific to your version of the release. For example, for <i>Release 9.2</i> , the path ends with \ <i>E920</i> .

4. Click the **OK** button.

Tip: If you enter invalid information into a tab field, a stop sign symbol appears next to the tab name, such as Deployment Server. For more information about the error, click the stop sign icon in the bottom right-hand corner of the form.

5. Click OK.

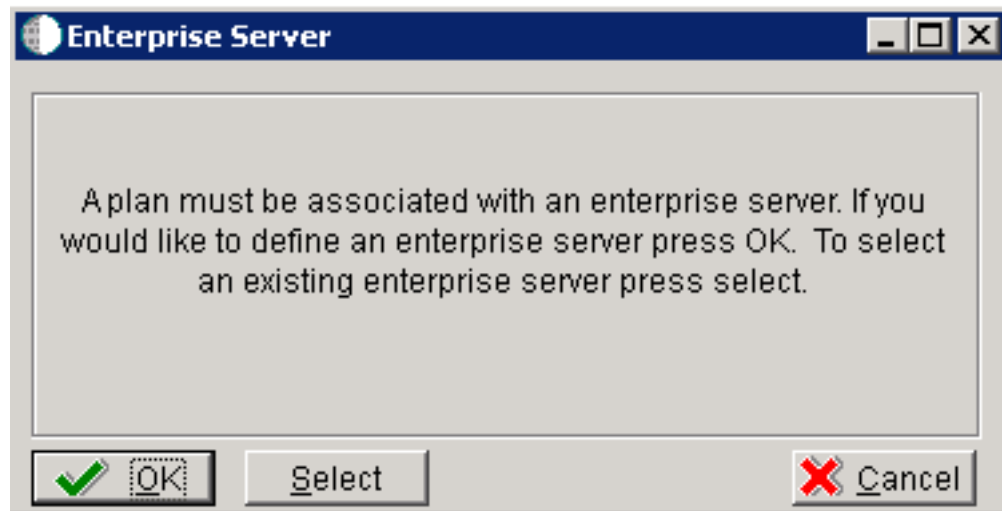

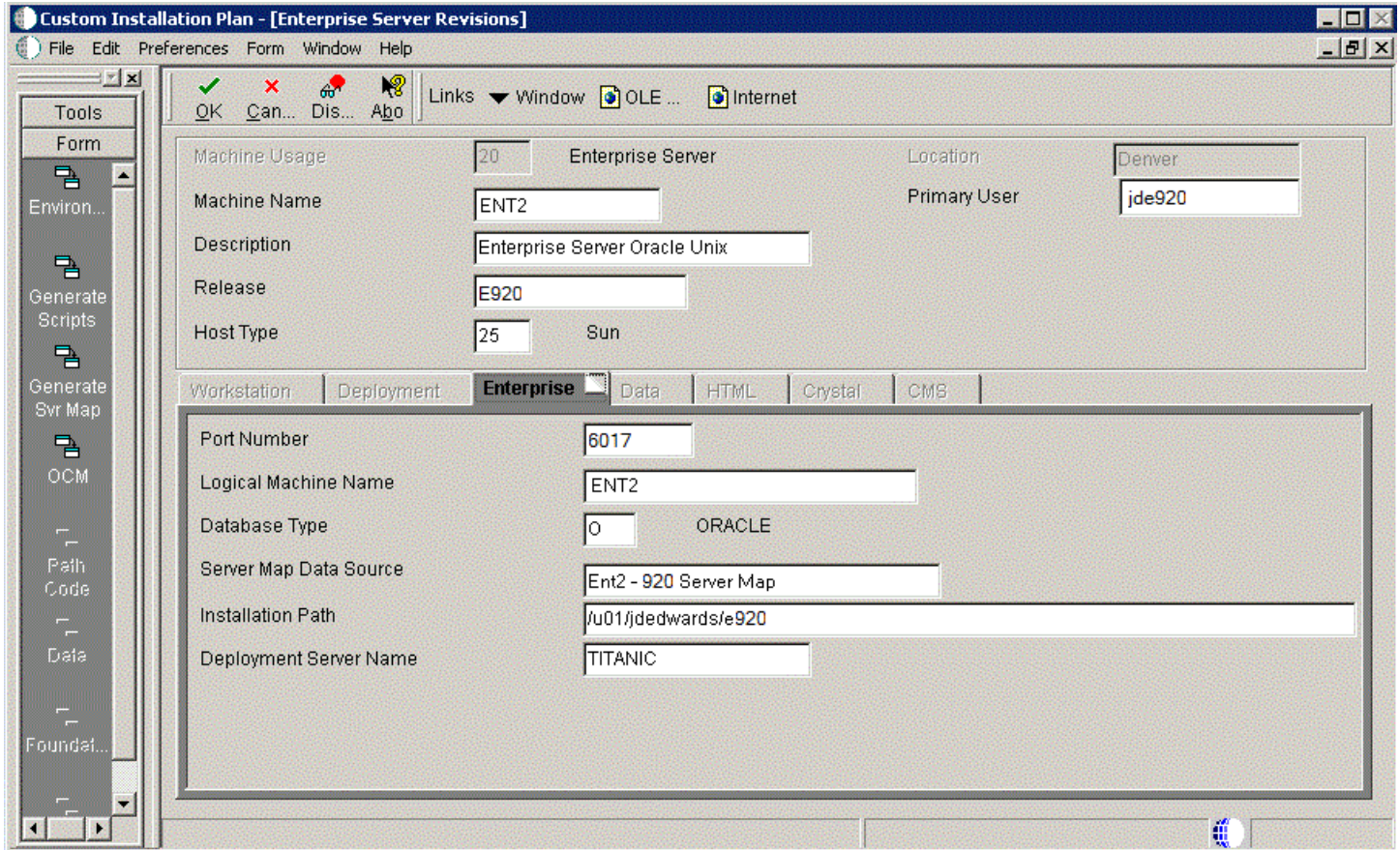

Entering Enterprise Server Information

Note: During the definition of the Enterprise Server, a port number must be defined. While Enterprise Servers running the same release can use the same port number, an Enterprise Server running two different versions of software must use two different port numbers.



On Enterprise Server, click the OK button to define a new Enterprise Server, or click the **Select** button to choose an existing Enterprise Server.



1. On Enterprise Server Revisions, verify or complete these fields:

Field	Description
<i>Machine Name</i>	The name of the primary Enterprise Server. The name is case sensitive and should not contain any special characters.

Field	Description
	<p>Because the machine name is used to create the Server Map datasource name, and because the Platform Pack Installer does not restrict you from entering a machine name that results in a datasource name greater than 30 characters; if the machine name for the Enterprise Server is longer than 13 characters, the resulting datasource name will be longer than the allowed 30 characters. For example, if your machine name is 15 characters (A23456789012345), the base datasource name input into the Planner would be: A23456789012345 - 920 Server Map.</p> <p>Note: The field in table F98611 is a hard restriction; the field only allows 30 characters. The actual field size cannot be modified or changed.</p> <p>When the Planner runs it truncates the value to 30 characters because that is the restriction in the F98611 table. The Platform Pack does not truncate the value when it builds the JDE.INI for the Enterprise Server. Therefore, any value greater than 30 characters will result in a mismatch between the JDE.INI and the F98611 table. That is, using the previous example, the JDE.INI would have the full length value A23456789012345 - 920 Server Map (which is 32 characters) while the F98611 populated by the Planner would have a value of A23456789012345 - 920 Server M.</p> <p>To remedy, you could do any one of the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Manually modify values in table F98611 to match the truncated value in the JDE.INI file. ○ Ensure that the value is not truncated by limiting the datasource name to 30 characters (this would mean limiting the machine name for the Enterprise Server to 13 characters). ○ Manually truncate the value in the F98611 table (for example, A23456789012345 - 920 Svr Map). <p>In any case, you must ensure that the values for Server Map datasource names in the F98611 table exactly match those in the JDE.INI file on the Enterprise Server.</p>
<i>Description</i>	Enter a description for the machine.
<i>Release</i>	Enter the release number to which this plan applies, or use the visual assist button to choose one from the list. The default value is <i>E920</i> .
<i>Host Type</i>	Click the visual assist button and choose the type of Enterprise Server you are adding to the plan. In this case, IBMi.
<i>Location</i>	The location chosen for this plan appears by default.
<i>Primary User</i>	The user to whom an email is sent when a package is deployed. The default value for Primary User is .

Note: The case of machine name must also match the network ID for that machine.

2. Continuing on Enterprise Server Revisions, select the **Enterprise** tab, and complete or verify these fields:

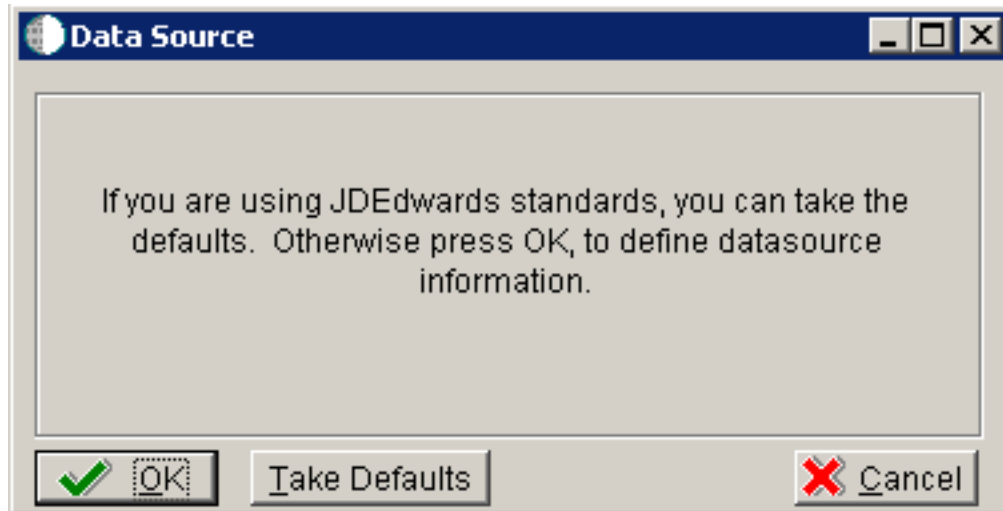
Field	Description
<i>Port Number</i>	The port number value (6017) for this Enterprise Server appears by default from the JDE . INI .
<i>Logical Machine Name</i>	The Installation Planner detects and provides a default value based on the current machine name on which the program is running. The name is case sensitive, should not exceed 15 characters, and should not contain any special characters.
<i>Database Type</i>	Enter the value for your database:
<i>Server Map Data Source</i>	Whenever you enter a host type, the Installation Planner populates this field with a default value: <i>machinename - 920 Server Map</i> where <i>machinename</i> is the name of your machine.
<i>Installation Path</i>	Verify that the default value is the installation directory path to which you want to install <i>Release 9.2</i> on the Enterprise Server. Make sure the value is specific to your version of the release. For example, for <i>Release 9.2</i> the default path is: Caution: You must change the value that defaults into the <i>Installation Path</i> field as shown in the screen capture above.
<i>Deployment Server Name</i>	Using the visual assist button, choose the name of the Deployment Server to which this Enterprise Server is attached. A Deployment Server name appears in this field by default, but it can be changed if necessary.

Note: If you change the port number to a value other than 6017, you must also change this setting in both the Enterprise Server and Development Client **JDE . INI** file.

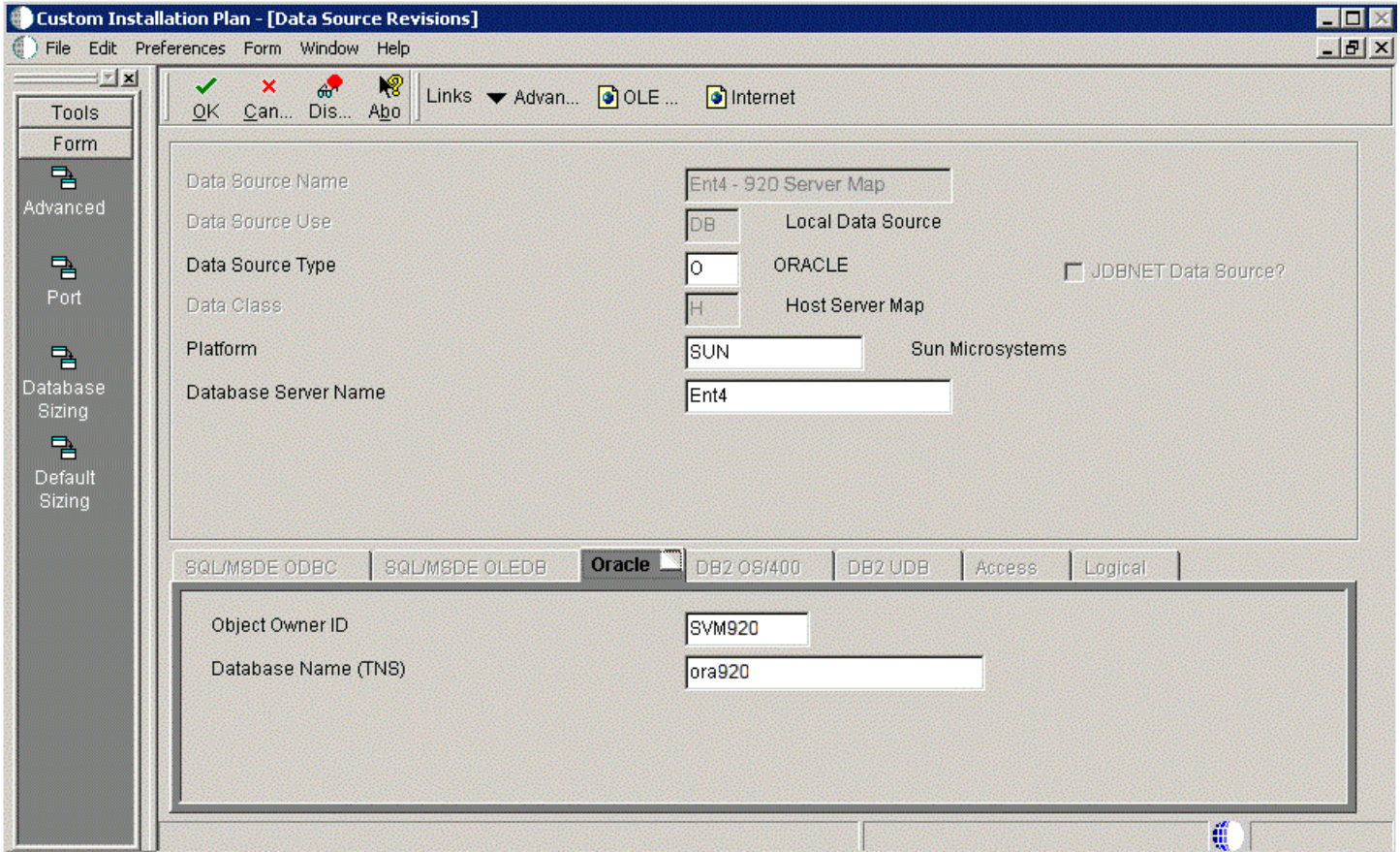

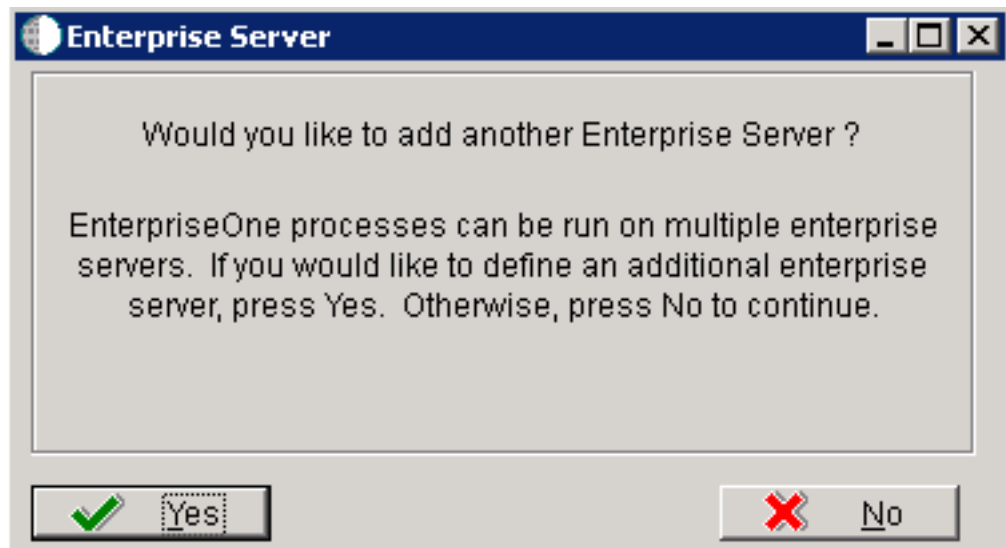

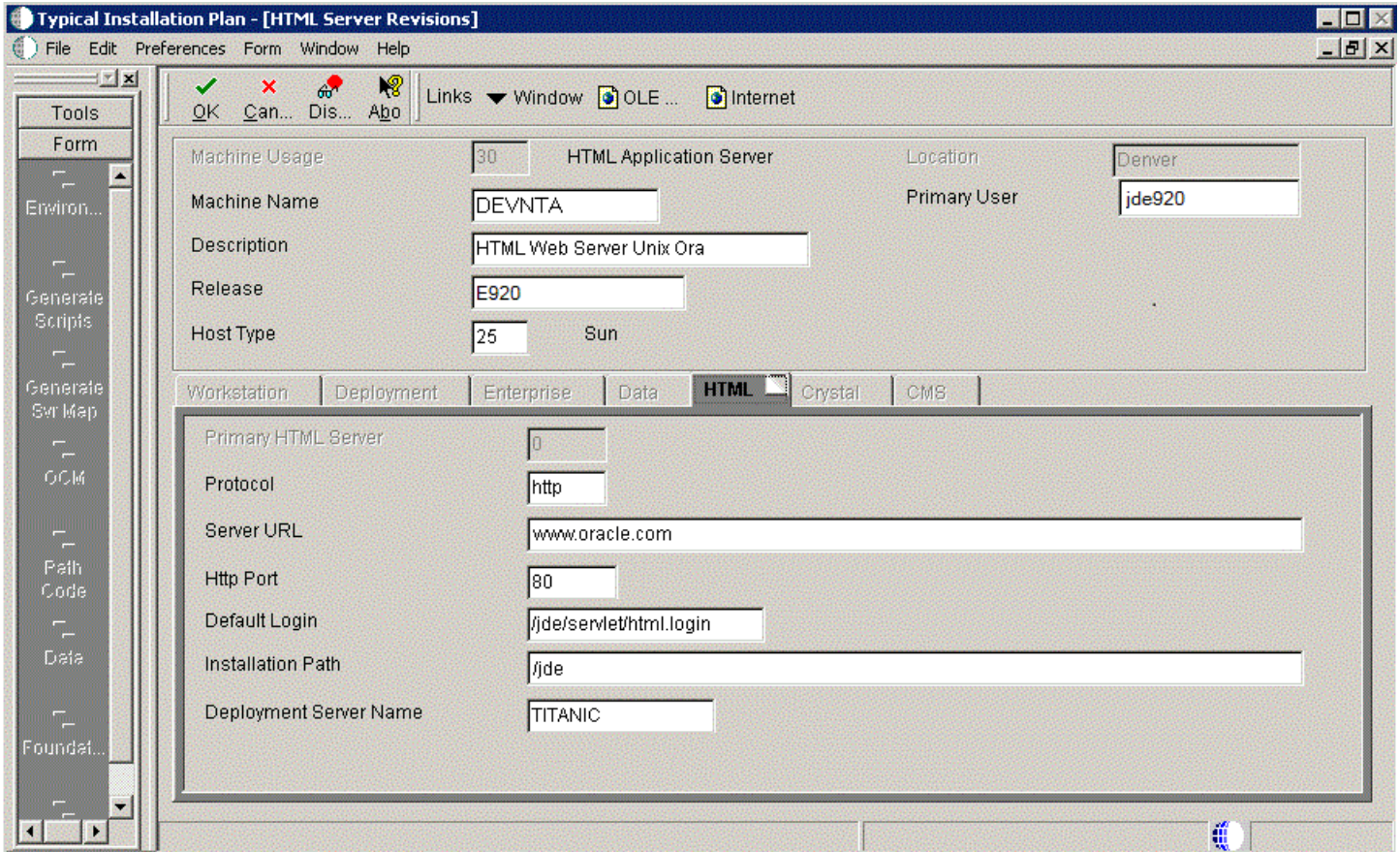
CAUTION: The *HTML Web Server* is mandatory for the majority of *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* applications because the end-user applications are only accessible through a web interface.

If you choose **Select**, you are presented with the Machine Search table, from which you can make your selection.

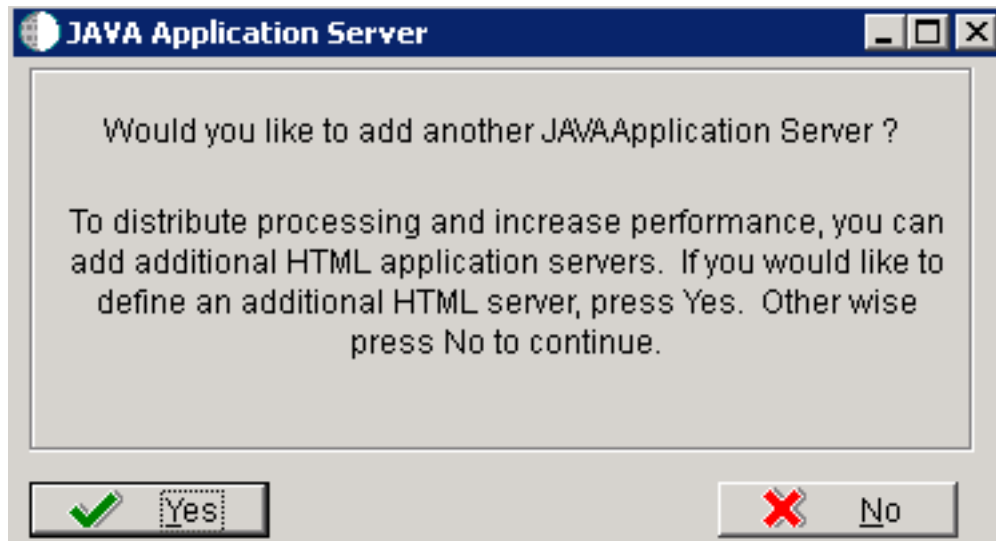

Therefore, regardless of underlying UNIX operating system considerations, you cannot name multiple <i>HTML Web Server</i> s with the same name but with different cases. For example, you cannot name multiple <i>HTML Web Server</i> s ORACLE and oracle.</p>
<i>Description</i>	Enter a description of the <i>HTML Web Server</i> machine.
<i>Release</i>	Enter <i>E920</i> to indicate the release number that you are installing.
<i>Host Type</i>	The default value of 50 specifies the server type as Intel NT. Select the correct server type.
<i>Location</i>	The location chosen for this plan appears in this field by default.
<i>Primary User</i>	<p>The user to whom an email is sent when a package is deployed. The default for Primary User is listed in the <i>JDE.INI</i> .</p> <p>This is also the UNIX user ID that is used to install <i>Release 9.2</i> on the Enterprise Server. For example, jde920.</p>

3. On the **HTML** tab, complete these fields:

Field	Description
<i>Primary HTML Server</i>	When the system code generates an email message with a web shortcut pointing to a form, the web shortcut generated points to the "Primary" <i>HTML Web Server</i> . Only one of all the <i>HTML Web Server</i> s defined in installation planner can be defined as primary ("1").
<i>Protocol</i>	This is the protocol used by the HTML Web Server. Valid values are <i>http</i> or <i>https</i> .
<i>Server URL</i>	<p>This is the Domain Name System (DNS) host name of the <i>HTML Web Server</i> .</p> <p>The syntax is:</p> <p><code>server_name:port\jde\owhtml</code></p> <p>For example:</p> <p><code>DEVNTA:81\jde\owhtml</code></p>

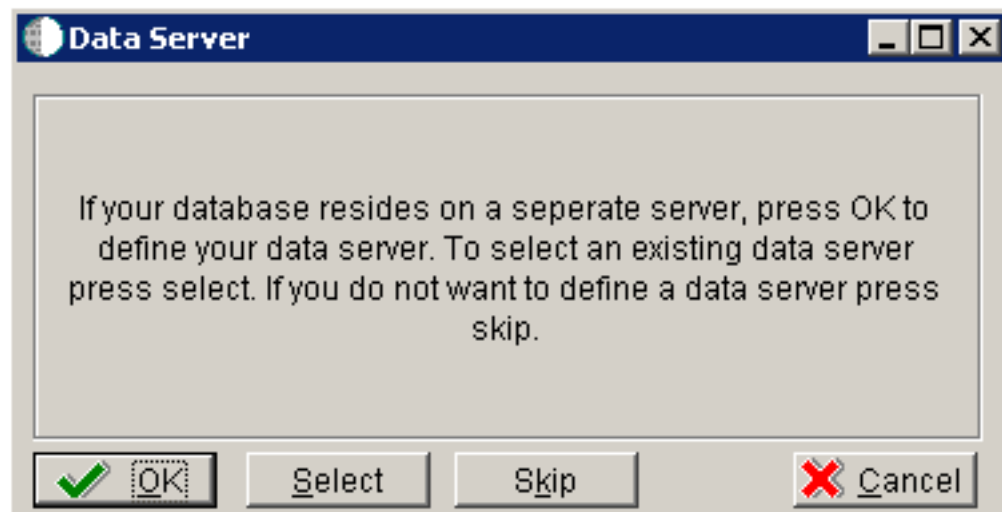
Field	Description
<i>Http Port</i>	<p>This is the port number the <i>HTML Web Server</i> is listening to.</p> <p>For HTTP, the typical port number is 80.</p> <p>For HTTPS, the typical port number is 443.</p> <p>However, you can choose to implement a <i>HTML Web Server</i> using a different port number.</p>
<i>Default Login</i>	<p>Defines how shortcuts to a web form are generated by the system code. Values are either a reserved value or an explicit servlet name. Reserved values are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ <i>Standard</i> The URL generated will point to a servlet on the Primary <i>HTML Web Server</i> . ○ <i>Redirector</i> The URL generated will point to redirector in the Primary <i>HTML Web Server</i> , and redirector will point to a servlet on another <i>HTML Web Server</i> for load balancing. The servlet name to use is generated by the system. ○ <i>Explicit Servlet Name</i> The user can specify an explicit servlet name in this field. In this case, the redirector functionality cannot be used. <i>Installation Path</i>	<p>Enter the installation directory path to which you are installing <i>Release 9.2</i> on your <i>HTML Server</i> .Make sure this is specific to your version of the release, and also the platform and application server on which your <i>HTML Web Server</i> is running.</p> <p>For default paths, refer to the applicable platform- and application server-dependent version of the <i>JD Edwards EnterpriseOne HTML Web Server Reference Guide</i> (<i>JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Transaction Server Reference Guide</i> , <i>JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Transaction Server Guide for UNIX using Oracle WebLogic Server</i> , <i>JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Transaction Server Reference Guide for Microsoft Windows using WebSphere</i> , <i>JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Transaction Server Reference Guide</i> , <i>JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Transaction Server Reference Guide for IBM i using WebSphere</i> . Otherwise, you must obtain this value from the <i>HTML Web Server</i> machine itself, or its administrator.</p>
<i>Deployment Server Name</i>	<p>Using the visual assist button, choose the name of the Deployment Server to which this <i>HTML Web Server</i> is attached. A Deployment Server name appears in this field by default, but you can change it if necessary.</p>

4. Click the **OK** button.



5. To add another *HTML Web Server* , click the **Yes** button and repeat steps 1 through 4 to define another *HTML Web Server* .

Assumptions about Adding a Server to an Existing Installation Plan

This table outlines assumptions for adding a server to an existing Installation Plan phase as a whole.

Personnel	Installer
Logon Status	On the Deployment Server, logged on as user JDE with the database password for user JDE, in the planner environment.
Prerequisites	Verify that the Deployment Server is installed and the <i>Release 9.2</i> directory is shared.

Personnel	Installer
	In order to run EnterpriseOne on an additional server, you must deploy JD Edwards EnterpriseOne to the server using either: <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Server Manager• Platform Pack installer
Concurrent Tasks	None.

Starting Installation Planner

CAUTION: In order to run EnterpriseOne on an additional server, you must deploy JD Edwards EnterpriseOne to the server using either:

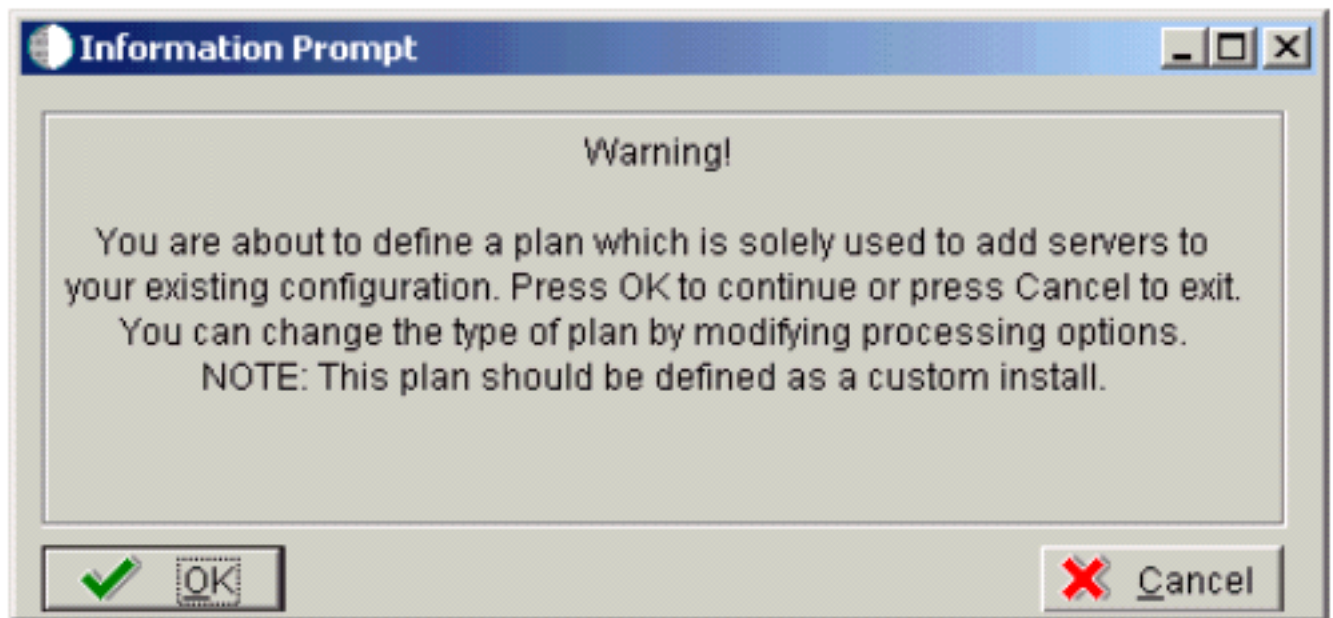
- Server Manager
- Platform Pack installer

Begin your installation plan by logging on to *Release 9.2* and starting Installation Planner.

To start the Installation Planner:

1. Log on to *Release 9.2* as user JDE with the database password for user JDE.
2. Access the planner environment (*JDEPLAN*).
3. From the System Installation Tools menu (GH961), double-click Add-on Servers Plan.
4. On Work with Installation Plans, click Add.

Release 9.2 displays the following warning:



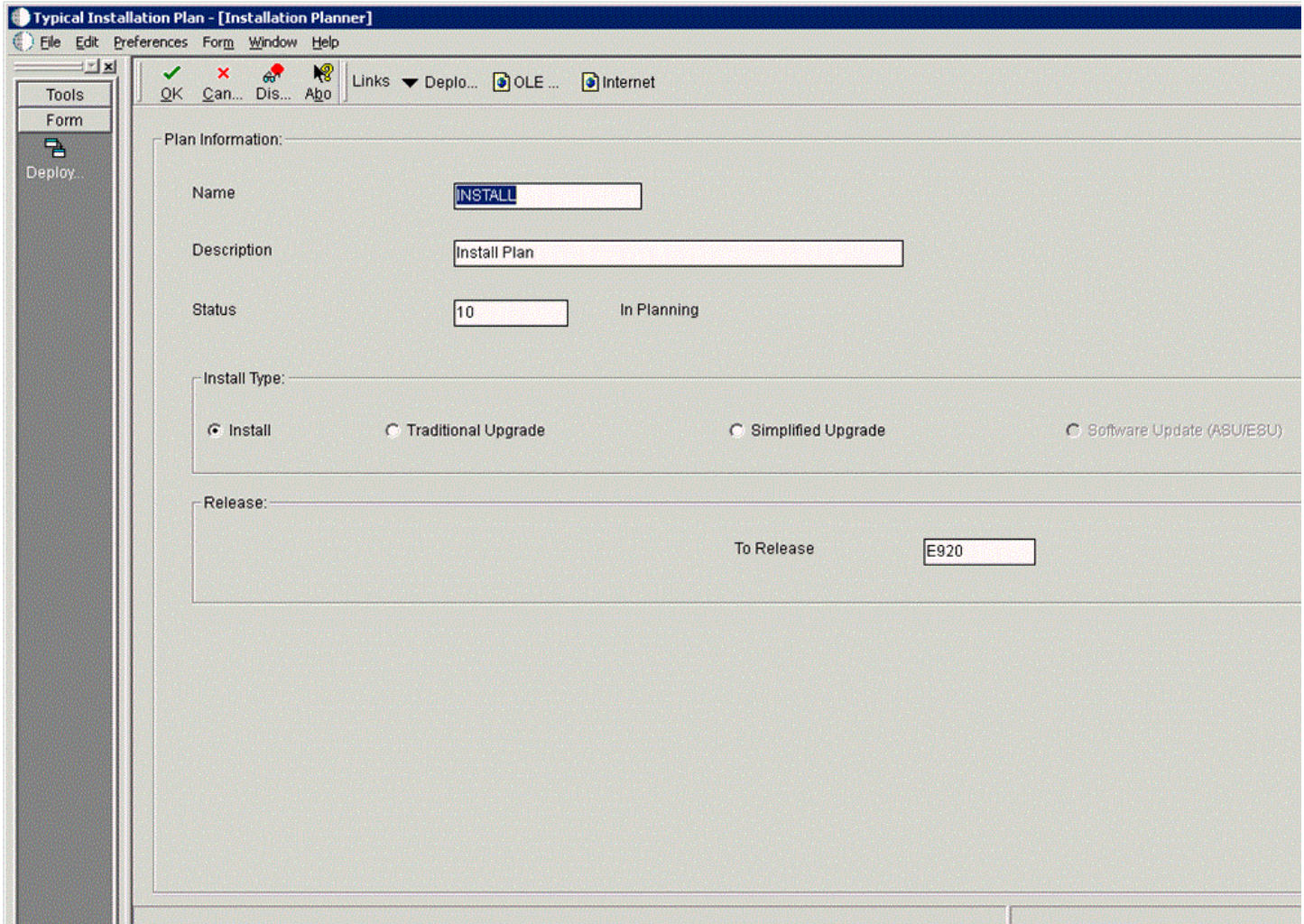
5. Click OK.

The Installation Planner form appears.

Entering a Plan Description

After starting Installation Planner, enter basic plan information, such as plan name and description.

To enter a plan description:



1. On Installation Planner, complete the following fields:

- *Name*
Enter the name of your installation plan.
- *Description*
Enter the description of your installation plan.
- *Status*
Select 10 as the status of your installation plan.
- *To*
Verify that the release number is *E920*.

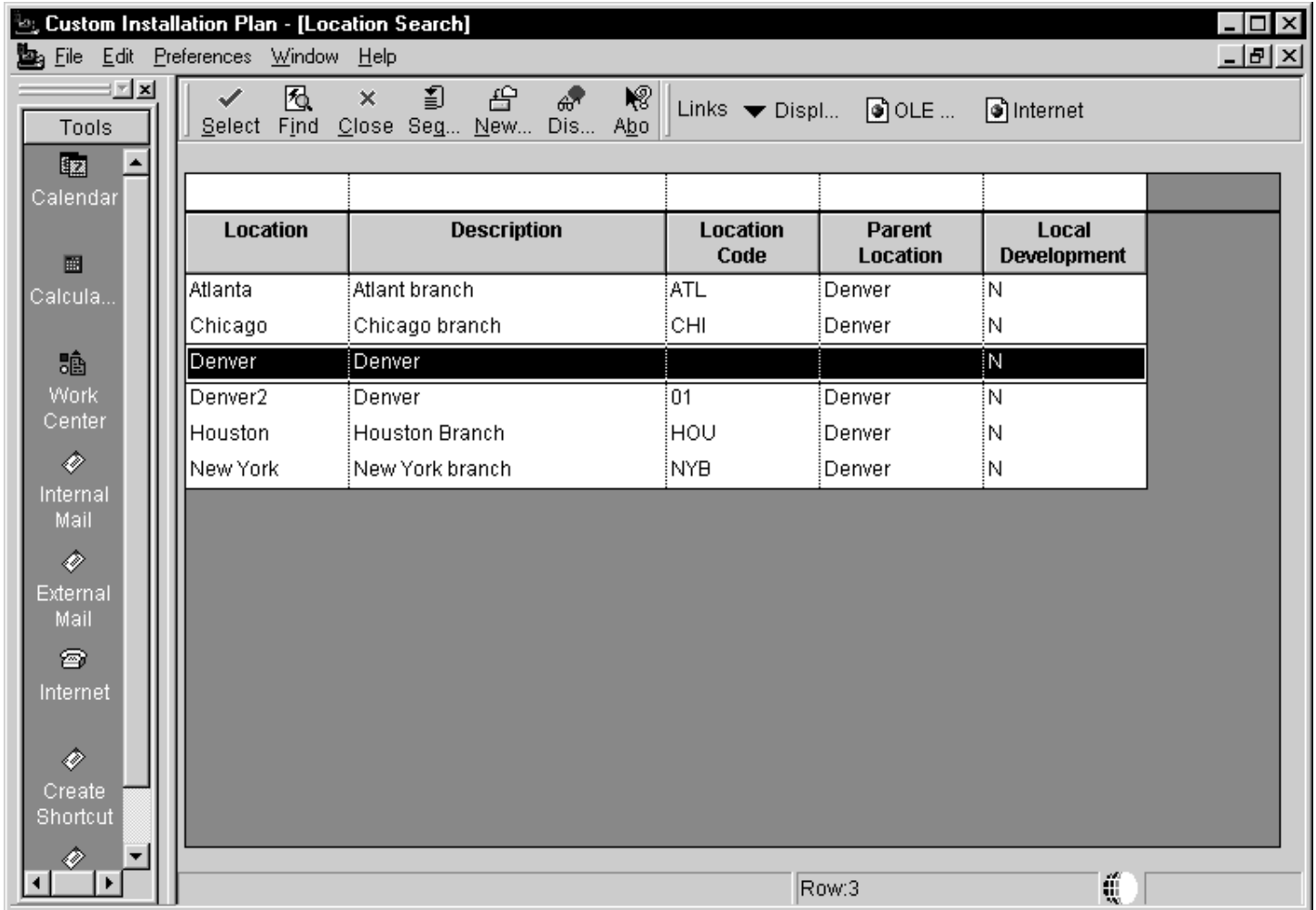
2. Click OK.

The Location Search form appears.

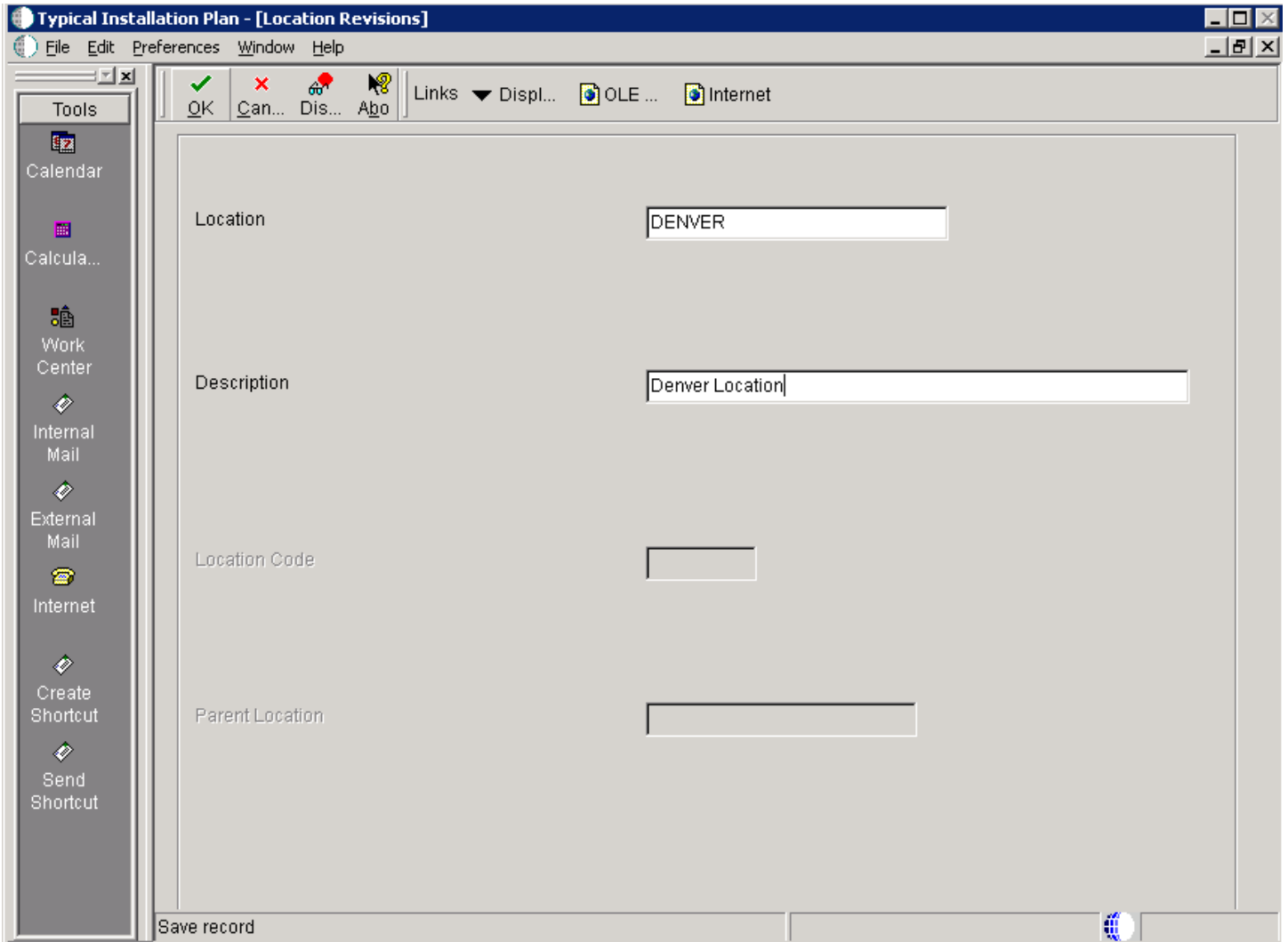
Entering a Plan Location

Once basic plan installation information is entered, you must choose an existing plan location. For most instances, choose the location defined during your base installation.

To enter a plan location:



1. On Location Search, choose a location and click Select.

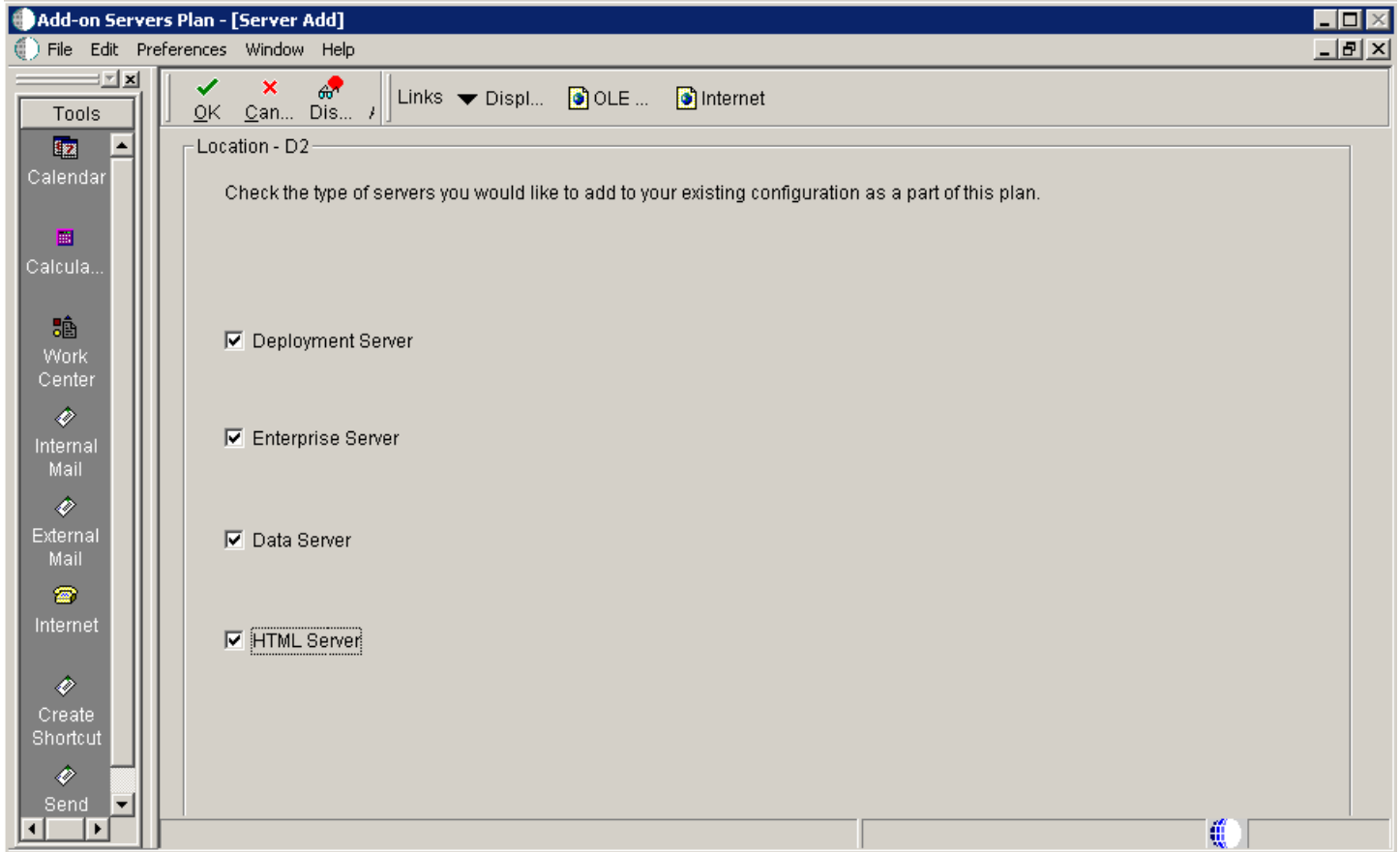


2. On Location Revisions, click OK.

Selecting Additional Server Types

Once a plan location is specified, specify the types of servers you want to add to your installation plan.

To select additional server types:



1. On Server Add, check the types of servers that you want to add to your configuration.
2. Click OK.

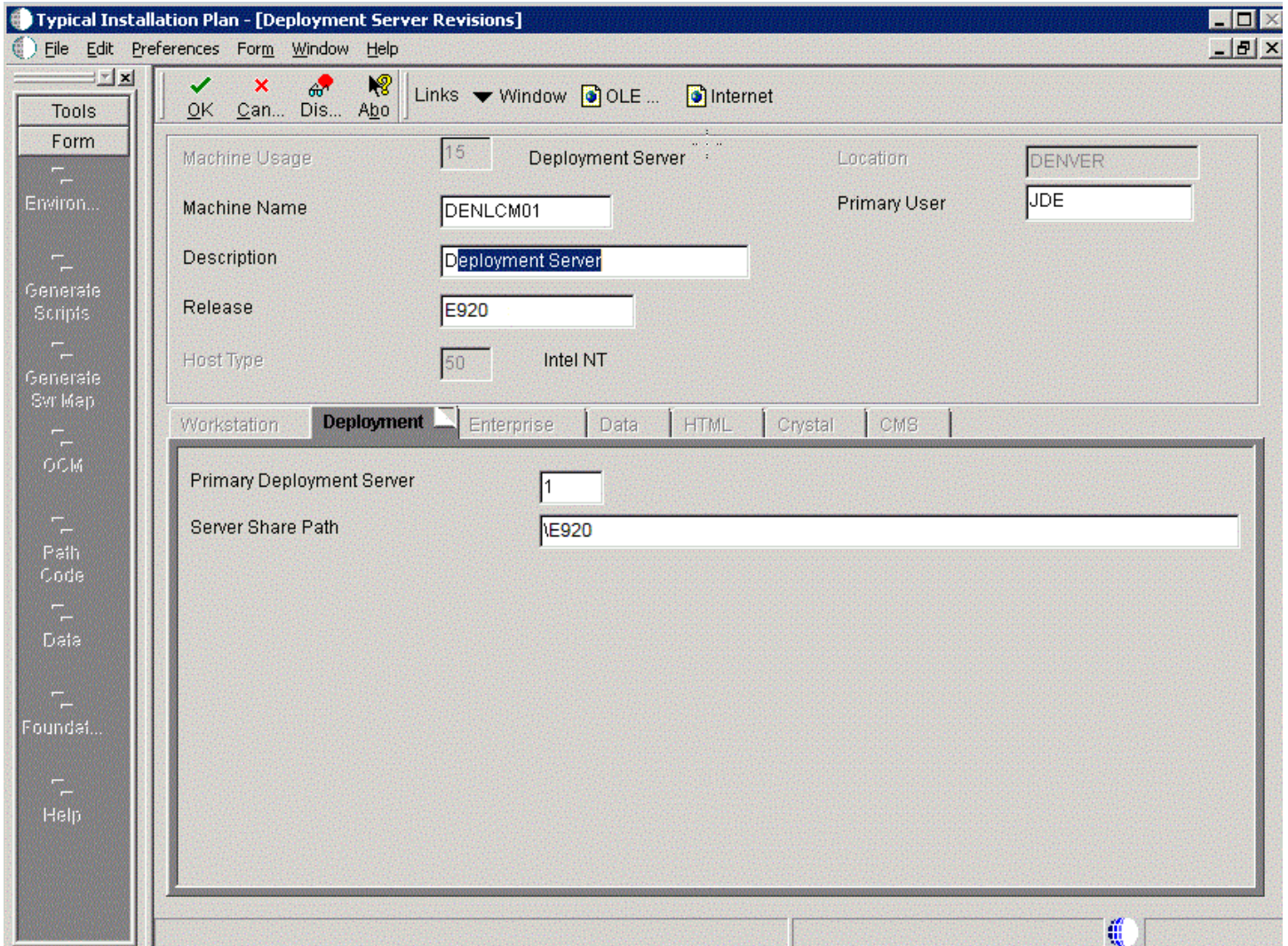
A Server Revisions form appears in the order listed on the Server Add form for each type of server that you chose.

3. Continue with the relevant sections that follow.

Entering Deployment Server Information

When choosing to add an additional Deployment Server to your plan, the Deployment Server Revisions form appears.

To enter Deployment Server information:



1. On Deployment Server Revisions, complete the following fields:

Field	Description
Machine Name	Enter the name of your additional Deployment Server. The name is case sensitive, should not exceed 15 characters, and should not contain any special characters.
Description	Enter a description of the machine.
Release	Enter <i>E920</i> .
Location	Displays the system-provided default value chosen for this plan.
Primary User	This identifies the user to whom email is sent when a package is deployed. The default for Primary User is The default value for Primary User. This is also the UNIX user ID that is used to install <i>Release 9.2</i> on the Enterprise Server. For example, JDE.

2. On the Deployment tab, verify or complete the following fields:

Field	Description
Primary Deployment Server	This field indicates the hierarchy of the servers. The default value for a secondary Deployment Server is 0 .
Server Share Path	Enter the server share path where you installed <i>Release 9.2</i> on your Deployment Server. Verify that this path matches your version of the release; for example, for <i>Release 9.2</i> , the server share path is \ <i>E920</i> .

3. Click OK.

Tip: If you enter invalid information into a tab field, a stop sign icon appears next to the tab name, such as Deployment Server. For more information about the error, click on the stop sign icon in the bottom right-hand corner of the form.

4. You are prompted to add another Deployment Server.
- To add another Deployment Server, click Yes.
Repeat Entering Deployment Server Information.
 - To continue with the additional server plan, click No.

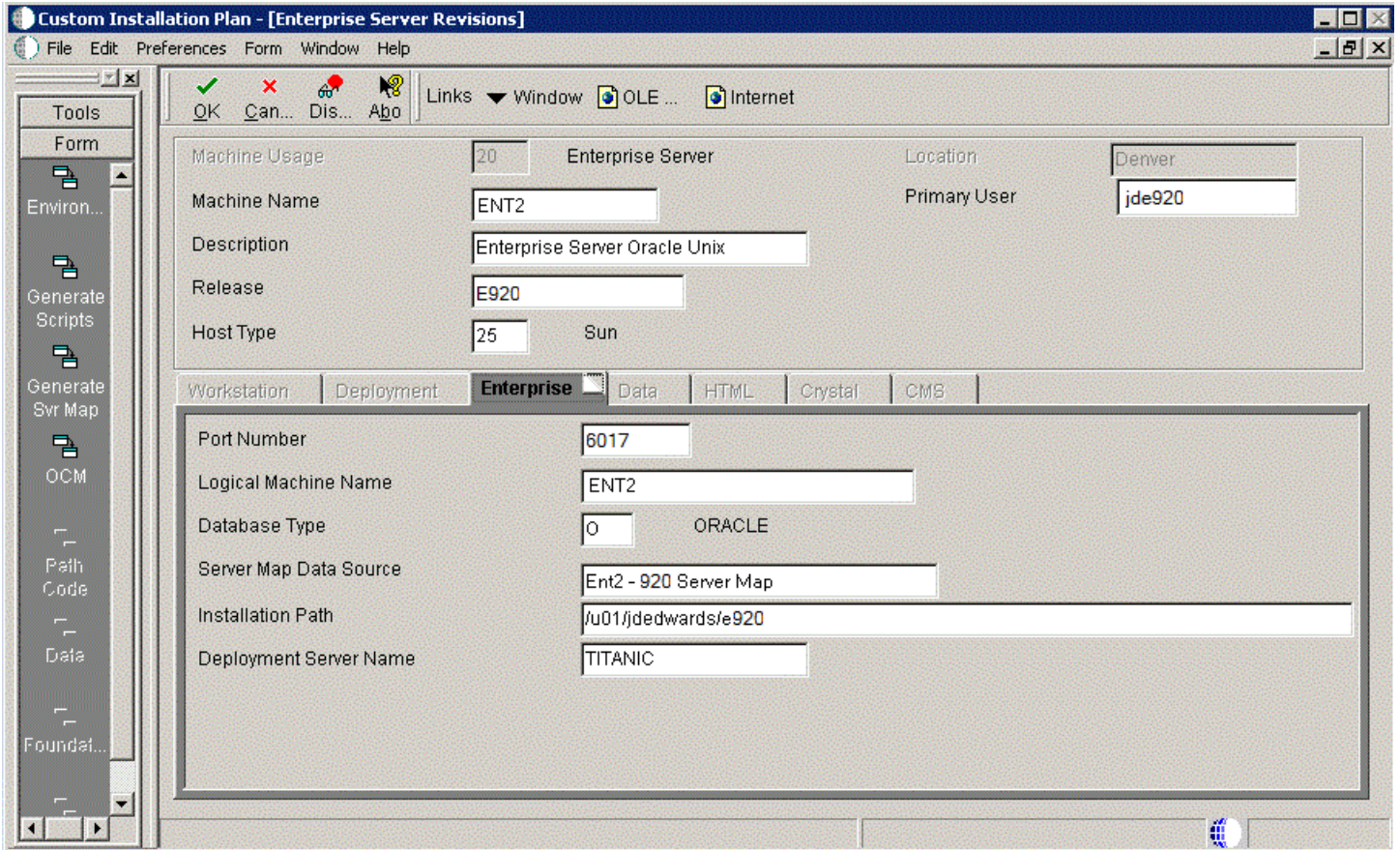
Specifying an Enterprise Server

Entering Enterprise Server Information

To enter the base information for the Enterprise Server that you use in this plan:



1. On Enterprise Server Revisions, complete or verify the following fields:

Field	Description
Machine Usage	Displays the default value of 20 to indicate that this is an Enterprise Server.

Field	Description
Machine Name	<p>This name is not case-sensitive in the Installation Planner. Therefore, regardless of underlying UNIX operating system considerations, you cannot name multiple Database Servers with the same name but with different cases. For example, you cannot name multiple Database Servers ORACLE and oracle.</p> <p>When using cluster software, use the cluster name, not the machine name. Use the cluster name as the server name when installing <i>Release 9.2</i>. One copy of <i>Release 9.2</i> will run and be shared by both nodes.</p> <p>The name of the primary Enterprise Server. The name is case sensitive and should not contain any special characters.</p> <p>Because the machine name is used to create the Server Map datasource name, and because the Platform Pack Installer does not restrict you from entering a machine name that results in a datasource name greater than 30 characters; if the machine name for the Enterprise Server is longer than 13 characters, the resulting datasource name will be longer than the allowed 30 characters. For example, if your machine name is 15 characters (A23456789012345), the base datasource name input into the Planner would be: A23456789012345 - 920 Server Map.</p> <p>Note: The field in table F98611 is a hard restriction; the field only allows 30 characters. The actual field size cannot be modified or changed.</p> <p>When the Planner runs it truncates the value to 30 characters because that is the restriction in the F98611 table. The Platform Pack does not truncate the value when it builds the JDE.INI for the Enterprise Server. Therefore, any value greater than 30 characters will result in a mismatch between the JDE.INI and the F98611 table. That is, using the previous example, the JDE.INI would have the full length value A23456789012345 - 920 Server Map (which is 32 characters) while the F98611 populated by the Planner would have a value of A23456789012345 - 920 Server M.</p> <p>To remedy, you could do any one of the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Manually modify values in table F98611 to match the truncated value in the JDE.INI file. ○ Ensure that the value is not truncated by limiting the datasource name to 30 characters (this would mean limiting the machine name for the Enterprise Server to 13 characters). ○ Manually truncate the value in the F98611 table (for example, A23456789012345 - 920 Svr Map). <p>In any case, you must ensure that the values for Server Map datasource names in the F98611 table exactly match those in the JDE.INI file on the Enterprise Server.</p>
Description	Enter a description of the machine.
Release	Enter the release number to which this plan applies, or use the visual assist button to choose one from the list, such as <i>E920</i> .

Field	Description
Host Type	Click the visual assist button and choose the type of Enterprise Server that you are adding to the plan, such as RS\6000 or Sun Solaris.
Location	Enter the default location chosen for this plan.
Primary User	Enter the user to whom email is sent when a package is deployed. The default for Primary User is jde920. This is also the UNIX user ID that is used to install <i>Release 9.2</i> on the Enterprise Server, such as <i>JDE</i> .

2. On the Enterprise tab, complete these fields:

Field	Description
Port Number	Displays the default value for this field, which is supplied the <i>JDE.INI</i> . Change the port number for this Enterprise Server to a unique value, for example, <i>6017</i> .
Logical Machine Name	Displays the system-supplied default value when you enter the host type. The name is case sensitive, should not exceed 15 characters, and should not contain any special characters.
Database Type	Enter the type of database that you want to use for data sources on the Enterprise Server. Value is:
Server Map Data Source	Displays the system-supplied default value when you enter the host type.
Installation Path	Verify that the default value is the installation directory path to which you want to install <i>Release 9.2</i> on the Enterprise Server. Make sure the value is specific to your version of the release. For example, for <i>Release 9.2</i> the default path is: <i>/JDEdwardsPPack/ E920</i> You might need to prepend the mount point to the path. For example: <i>u01/JDEdwardsPPack/ E920</i>
Deployment Server Name	Using the visual assist button, choose the name of the Deployment Server to which this Enterprise Server is attached. The system provides a default value for this field, but you can change it.

3. Click OK.

A message box appears prompting you to enter custom data sources or take the default data sources. Proceed to *Entering Shared Data Source Information*.

Entering Enterprise Server Data Source Information

After specifying Enterprise Server information, enter the data source information for the Enterprise Server you will use in this plan.

Specifying Custom or Default Data Source Information

You are prompted to enter custom data sources or take the default data sources for the Enterprise Server you just added. Choose one of the following options:

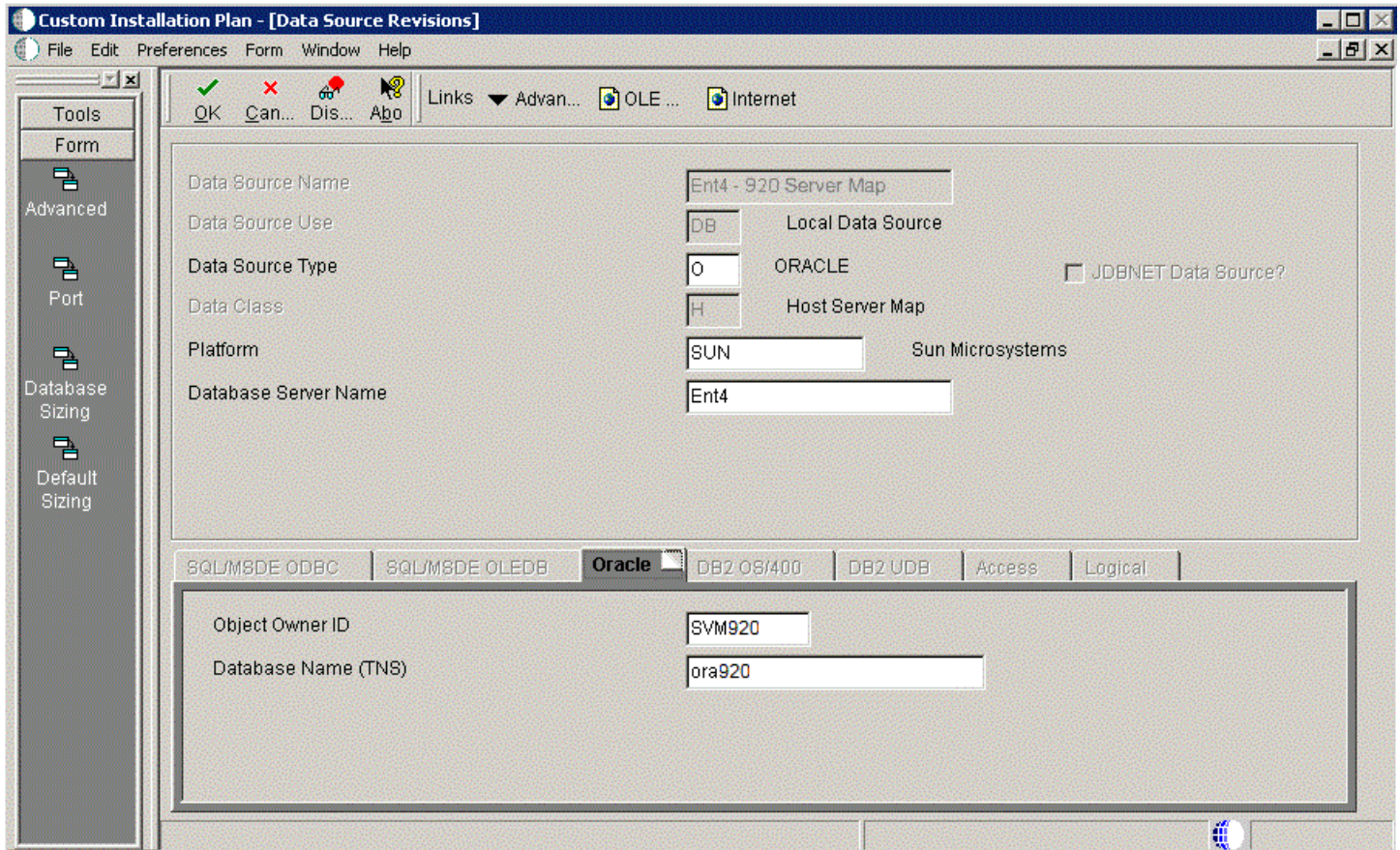
- To enter custom data sources, click **OK**.
Skip to *Verifying Custom Server Map Data Source Information*.
- To accept default data sources, click **Take Defaults**.

This option limits your customization choices.

Note: The following screen that prompts you to enter the Oracle connect string is only displayed if you choose Take Defaults. That is, if you choose to define your own data source, you will be prompted to enter the oracle connect string on a different screen.

Verifying Custom Server Map Data Source Information

To verify custom Server Map data source information:



1. On Data Source Revisions, verify your Server Map data source information.

Tip: Default data sources are configured as completely as possible. However, when you run Installation Planner, you might need to modify some data source information to reflect your system-specific configuration.

2. Click OK.

Adding another Enterprise Server

On the prompt to add another Enterprise Server, choose one of the following options:

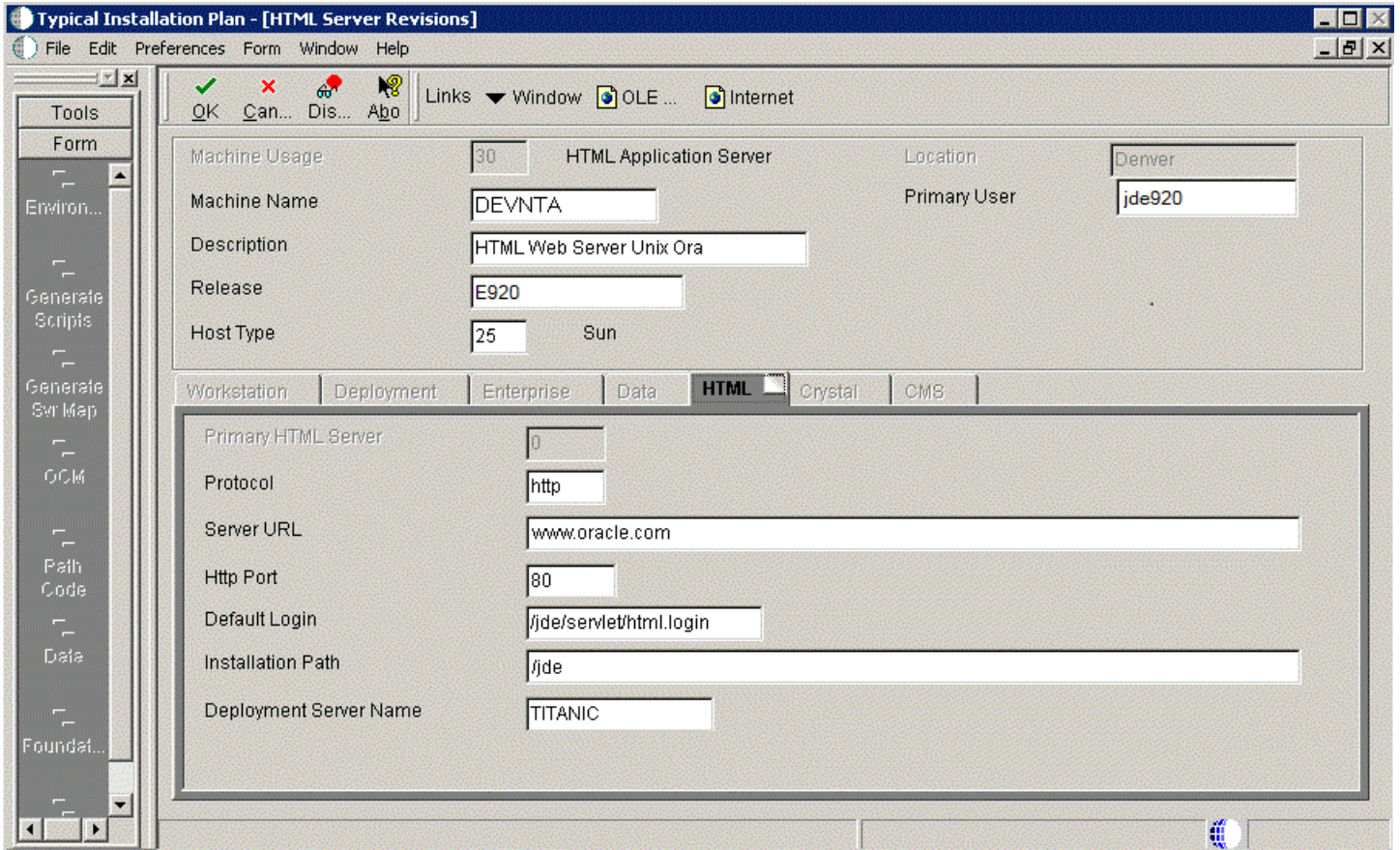
- To add another Enterprise Server, click Yes.
Repeat processes, starting with *Entering Enterprise Server Information*.
- To continue with Installation Planner setup, click No.
The Machine\Server Types form appears.

Entering HTML Web Server Information

To enter HTML Web Server information:



1. On the HTML Application Server dialog, click OK to continue entering HTML Web Server information, or click Select to select an existing HTML Web Server.



2. On HTML Server Revisions, complete these fields:

Field	Description
<i>Machine Usage</i>	The default value of 30 indicates that this is a HTML Web Server.

Field	Description
<i>Machine Name</i>	<p>Enter the name of your HTML Web Server. The name is case sensitive, should not exceed 15 characters, and should not contain any special characters.</p> <p>This name is not case-sensitive in the Installation Planner. Therefore, regardless of underlying UNIX operating system considerations, you cannot name multiple HTML Web Servers with the same name but with different cases. For example, you cannot name multiple HTML Web Servers ORACLE and oracle.</p>
<i>Description</i>	Enter a description of the HTML Web Server machine.
<i>Release</i>	Enter <i>E920</i> to indicate the release number that you are installing.
<i>Host Type</i>	The default value of 50 specifies the server type as Intel NT. Select the correct server type.
<i>Location</i>	The location chosen for this plan appears in this field by default.
<i>Primary User</i>	The user to whom an email is sent when a package is deployed. The default for Primary User is listed in the .

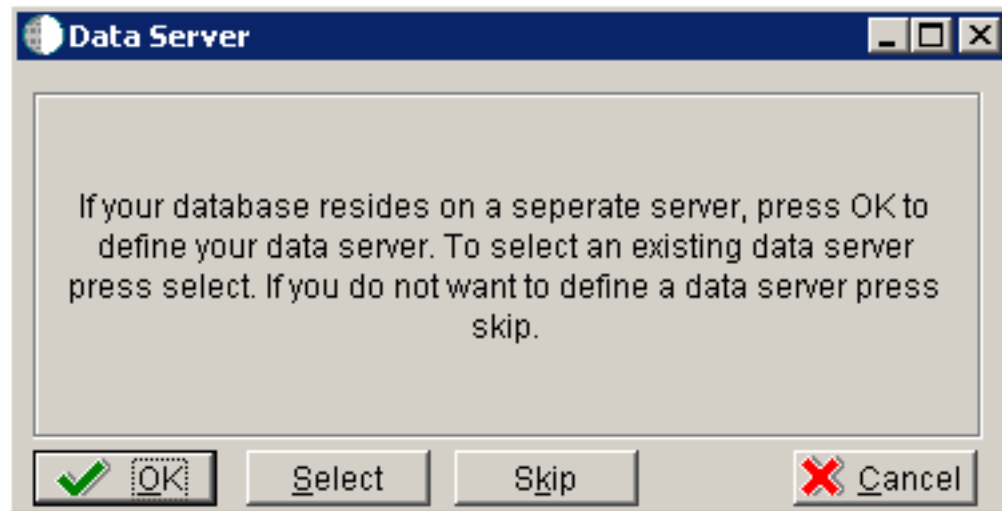
3. On the HTML tab, complete these fields:

Field	Description
<i>Primary HTML Server</i>	When the system code generates an email message with a web shortcut pointing to a form, the web shortcut generated points to the "Primary" HTML Web Server. Only one of all the HTML Web Servers defined in installation planner can be defined as primary ("1").
<i>Protocol</i>	This is the protocol used by the HTML Web Server. Valid values are http or https .
<i>Server URL</i>	<p>This is the Domain Name System (DNS) host name of the HTML Web Server.</p> <p>For example: www.oracle.com</p>
<i>HTTP Port</i>	<p>This is the port number the HTML Web Server is listening to.</p> <p>For HTTP, the typical port number is 80.</p> <p>For HTTPS, the typical port number is 443.</p> <p>Note: You can choose to implement a HTML Web Server using a different port number.</p>

Field	Description
<i>JDENET Listen Port</i>	<p>This is the port on which the JDENET communications protocol communicates with the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Enterprise Server. The value is dependent on the release of JD Edwards EnterpriseOne.</p> <p>For JD Edwards EnterpriseOne <i>Release 9.2</i> , the value is <i>6017</i> .</p>
<i>Default Login</i>	<p>Defines how shortcuts to a web form are generated by the system code. Values are either a reserved value or an explicit servlet name. Reserved values are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Standard <p>The URL generated will point to a servlet on the Primary HTML Web Server.</p> ○ Redirector <p>The URL generated will point to redirector in the Primary HTML Web Server, and redirector will point to a servlet on another HTML Web Server for load balancing. The servlet name to use is generated by the system.</p> ○ Explicit Servlet Name <p>The user can specify an explicit servlet name in this field. In this case, the redirector functionality cannot be used. The URL generated will point to the specified servlet in the Primary HTML Web Server.</p> <p>Usage of Explicit servlet name is for backward compatibility only. You should not use it unless you have a direct need.</p>
<i>Installation Path</i>	<p>Enter the installation directory path to which you are installing <i>Release 9.2</i> on your HTML Web Server. Make sure this is specific to your version of the release, and also the platform and application server on which your HTML Web Server is running.</p> <p>For default paths, refer to the applicable platform- and application server-dependent version of the <i>JD Edwards EnterpriseOne HTML Web Server Reference Guide</i> (<i>JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Transaction Server Reference Guide</i> , <i>JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Transaction Server Guide for UNIX using Oracle WebLogic Server</i> , <i>JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Transaction Server Reference Guide for Microsoft Windows using WebSphere</i> , <i>JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Transaction Server Reference Guide</i> , <i>JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Transaction Server Reference Guide for IBM i using WebSphere</i> . Otherwise, you must obtain this value from the HTML Web Server machine itself, or its administrator.</p>

4. Click OK.
5. To add another HTML Web Server, click Yes and repeat steps 1 through 4 to define another HTML Web Server.

Entering Data Server Information



1. On Data Server, choose one of these options:

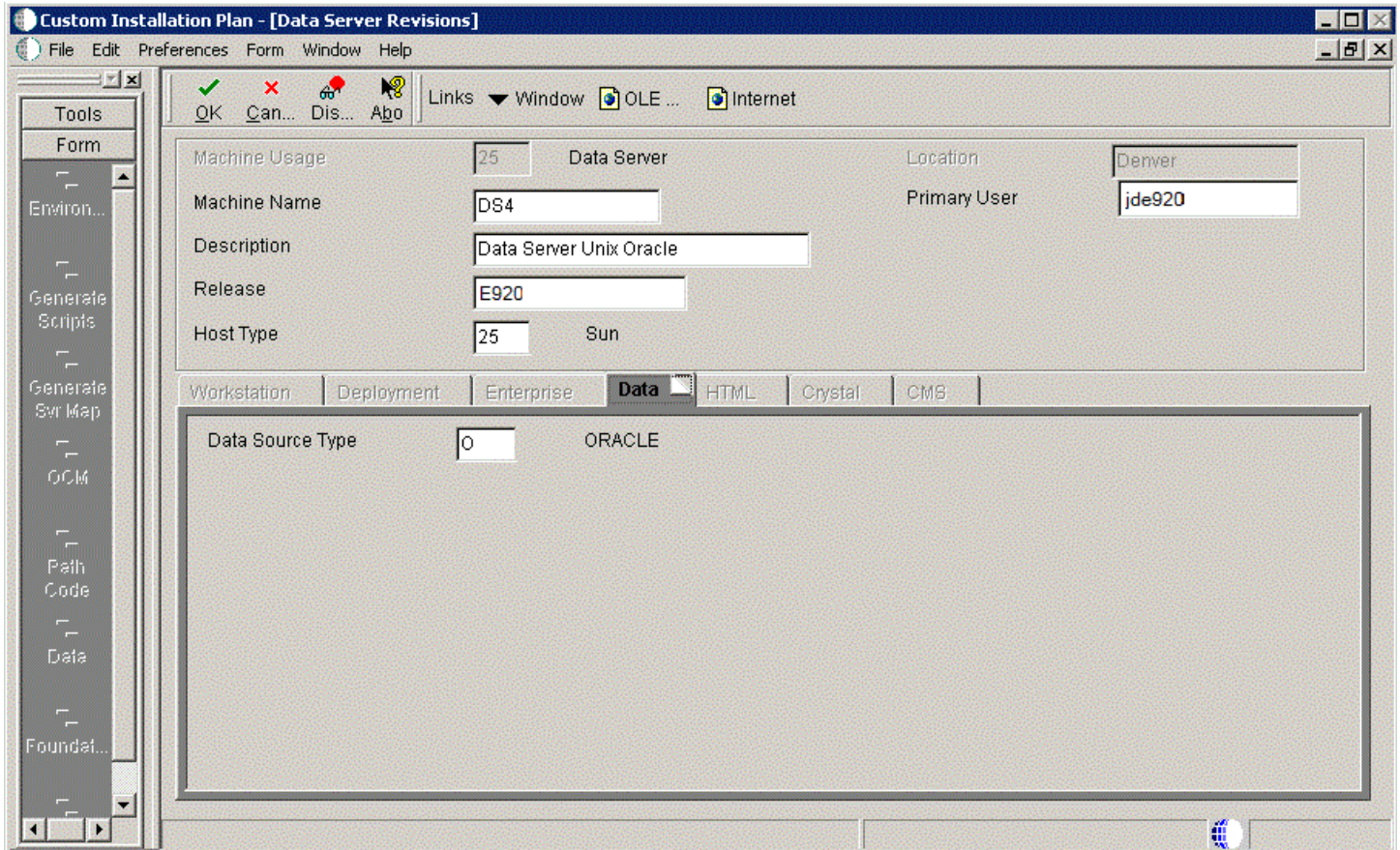

<i>Machine Name</i>	<p>Enter the name of your Database Server. The name is case sensitive, should not exceed 15 characters, and should not contain any special characters.</p> <p>This name is not case-sensitive in the Installation Planner. Therefore, regardless of underlying UNIX operating system considerations, you cannot name multiple Database Servers with the same name but with different cases. For example, you cannot name multiple Database Servers ORACLE and oracle.</p>
<i>Description</i>	Enter a description of the Database Server machine.
<i>Release</i>	Enter the release number you are installing, for example, <i>E920</i> .
<i>Host Type</i>	<p>Select the type of Database Server that you are adding to the plan. Values are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ 10 — IBM i ○ 25 — Sun Solaris ○ 30 — RS\6000 ○ 35 — Linux ○ 50 — Microsoft Windows (Intel) ○ 80 — Client - Microsoft Windows ○ 90 — Client - Microsoft Windows
<i>Location</i>	The Installation Planner populates this field by default, based on previous selections.
<i>Primary User</i>	<p>The user to whom an email is sent once a package is deployed. The default for Primary User is jde920.</p> <p>This is also the UNIX user ID that is used to install <i>Release 9.2</i> on the Enterprise Server. For example, JDE.</p>

3. On the **Data** tab, complete the following field:

Field	Description
<i>Data Source Type</i>	<p>Choose the type of data source. For example:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ 0 - Oracle

4. Click OK.
5. To add another Data Server, click Yes and repeat steps 1 through 4 to define another Data Server.

6. On Data Source, click OK to continue entering unique shared data source information, or click Take Defaults to select the default data for the shared data sources.
7. On Location, select Yes to add another location, or click No to continue with Installation Planner.

Setting Up Environments

By default, *Release 9.2* configures your system using values for typical environments. Depending on the options chosen when you set up your plan, *Release 9.2* displays one or more of the following parameters, which you can customize in these tasks:

- Environments
- Data load options
- Languages

You can customize any of these parameters by turning off the default option on the Environment Selection form. As you move through the plan, *Release 9.2* displays a customization form for each parameter that you turn off.



1. On Environment Selection, clear the options for those parameters that you want to customize.

Note: The parameters that are available vary depending on the options that you selected at the beginning of the planning process.

2. Click OK.

Note: If you selected the default option for all parameters, skip to *Setting Up Environment Data Sources*.

Use the following tasks to customize each of the parameters listed above. *Release 9.2* displays customization forms only for those parameters for which were cleared of the default options. Skip the tasks for those parameters that were selected.

3. Continue with the following relevant tasks:

Verifying the Data Source for Versions

1. On Data Source Revisions, verify the accuracy of the Versions data source.
2. Click OK.

Note: Versions data sources are specific to the pathcode, and the Unicode flag on the Advanced Form must be checked.

Finalizing the Installation Plan

Installation Planner finalizes your installation plan automatically. A message appears to let you know that the installation plan is finalized.

When the plan is finalized:

- The status is set to 20, which signals that several adjustments to tables were made according to your plan.
- Create the OCM.
- Modify the `JDE.INI` .
- The following tables are upgraded:
 - Release Master table (F00945)
 - Path Code Master table (F00942)
 - Package Plan table (F98404)
 - Machine Detail table (F9651)
 - Language table (F984031), if you are installing an alternate language

To finalize the installation plan:

1. Click OK to exit the concluding message box and initiate the Planner Validation Report.
 - If you chose the default processing option, Planner Validation Report automatically prompts you to run this report.
 - If you did not choose the default processing option, on the tree view of your plan, click Validate to initiate the Planner Validation Report.

Concluding the Validation Planner Report

To conclude the validation planner report:

1. On Report Output Destination, choose On Screen or To Printer, and then click OK.
2. Review the report to confirm that all records were validated.
3. After reviewing the report, on the Batch Versions form, click Close.

4. On Work With Installation Plans, click Expand to review the plan that you created.
5. Run Installation Workbench for this installation plan.

Configuring Additional Servers

To configure any additional servers that you have added:

1. Create the tablespace (*SVM920*) for the Server Map data source.
2. Set up owner (*JDE920*) on additional Enterprise Servers.
3. After configuring your database and server, use Installation Workbench to allocate and configure software and resources.

When using the Installation Workbench for adding servers, the Table Conversion and the Specification Merge workbenches do not appear because they are not needed.

4. When adding a server plan for a *HTML Web Server* , using the P9654A program, you must add all environments prefixed with J to the Enterprise Server and generate a Server Map data source.

15 Creating a Language-Only Installation Plan

Understanding Language-Only Installation Plans

To make the language-only installation as easy and quick as possible, you should use the procedures in this chapter when installing an alternate language or multiple languages for the first time. These tasks will help you organize the pre-installation preparation required for a language-only installation:

- Install alternate languages at the same time that you install *Release 9.2*, or after completing a working installation.
- Implement a language-only plan only for installations in which a language has not been previously installed.

It is important that you complete all tasks in this chapter to achieve a successful language installation.

Reviewing Requirements for a Language Installation

To review the basic requirements for performing a language installation:

1. Review the language installation process.

2. Review the disk space requirements.

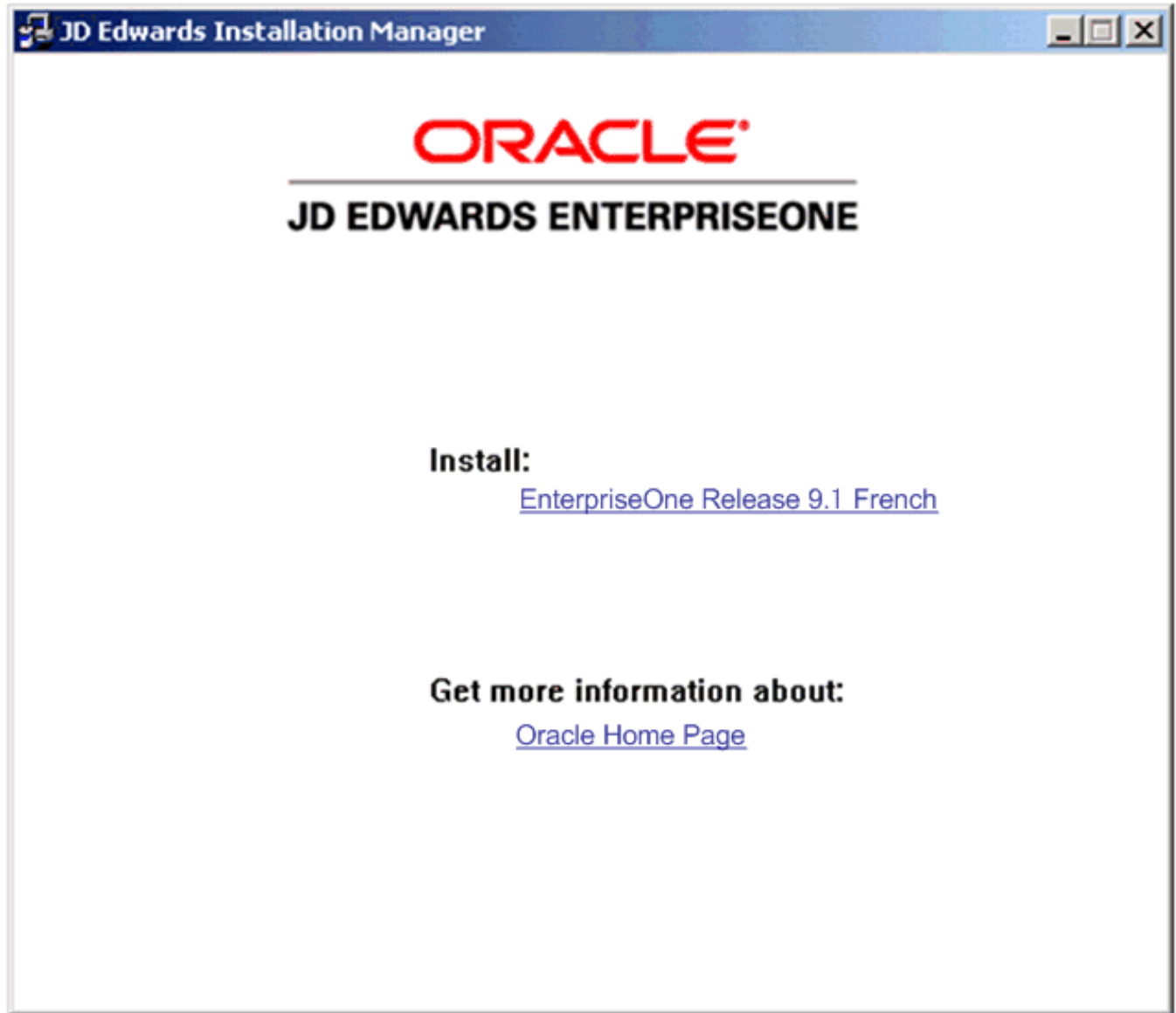

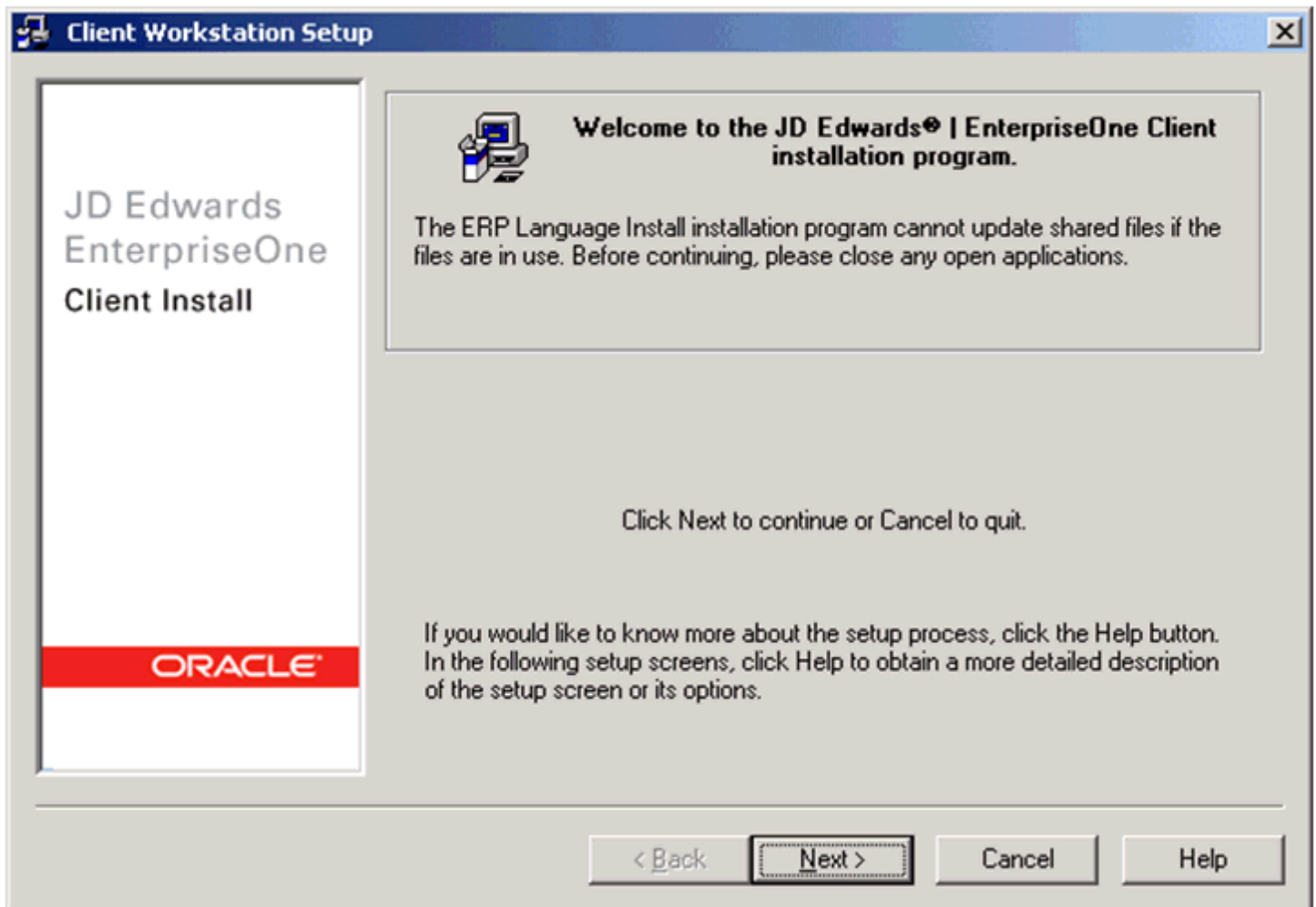

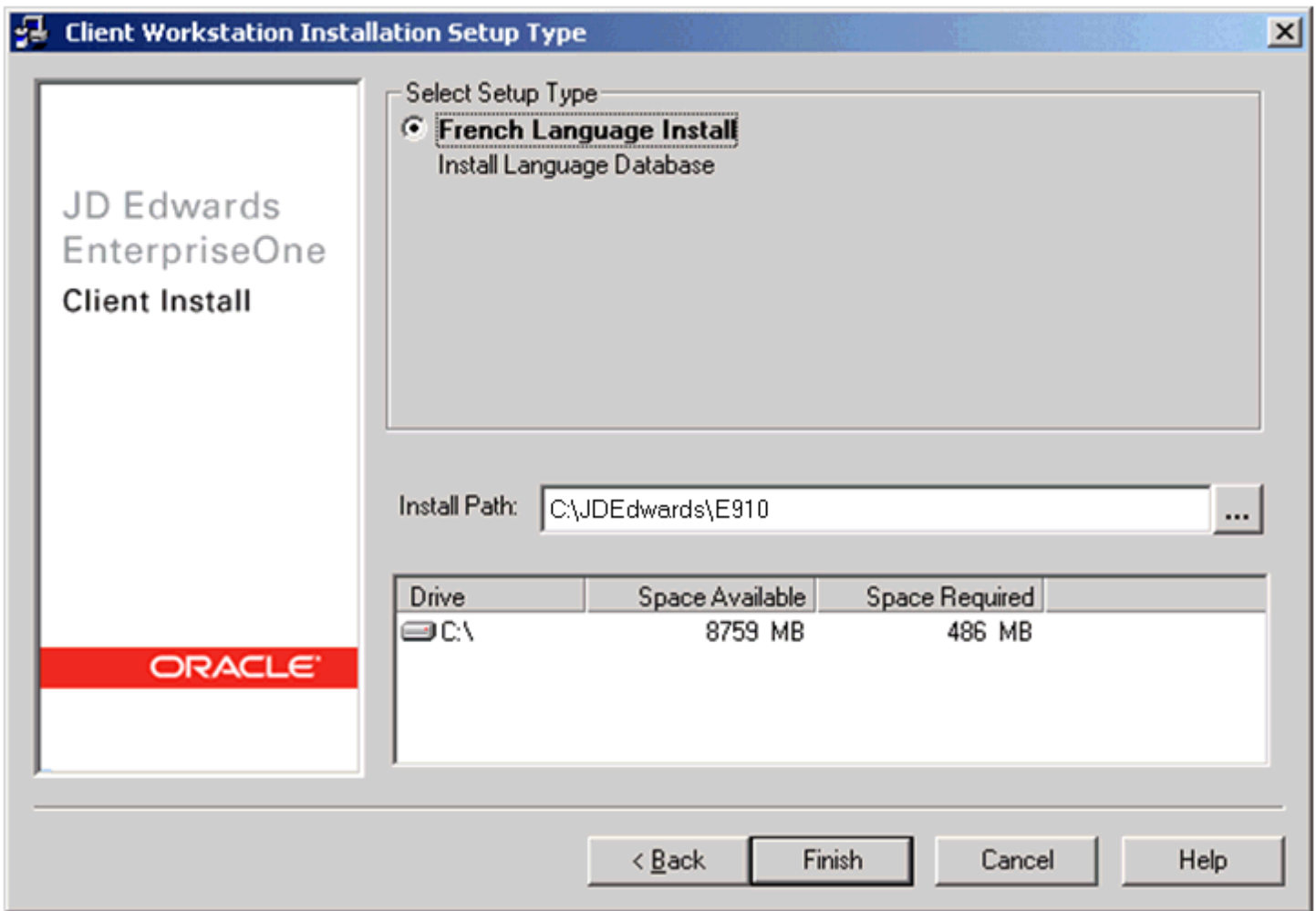


2. On JD Edwards Installation Manager, click the link for the language that you want to install.

3. On the Welcome screen, click Next.

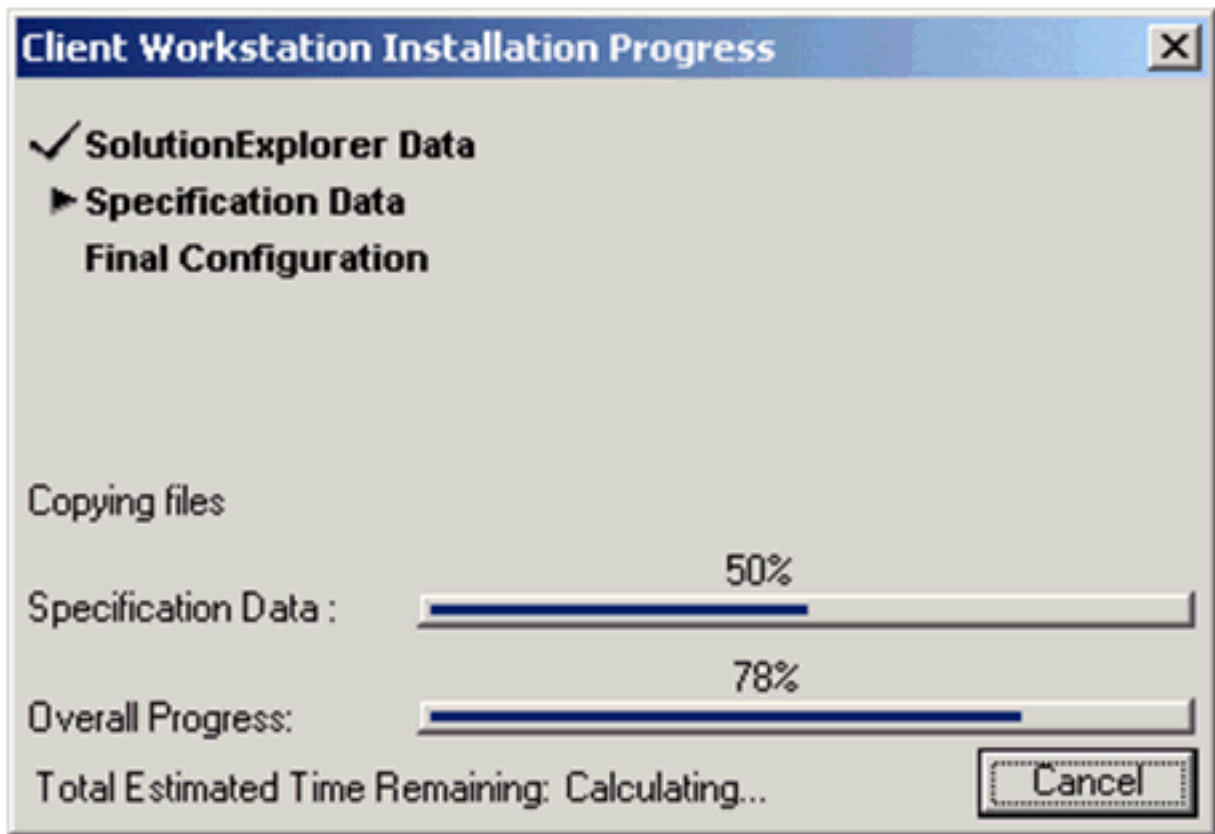


4. On Installation Setup Type, complete these fields:

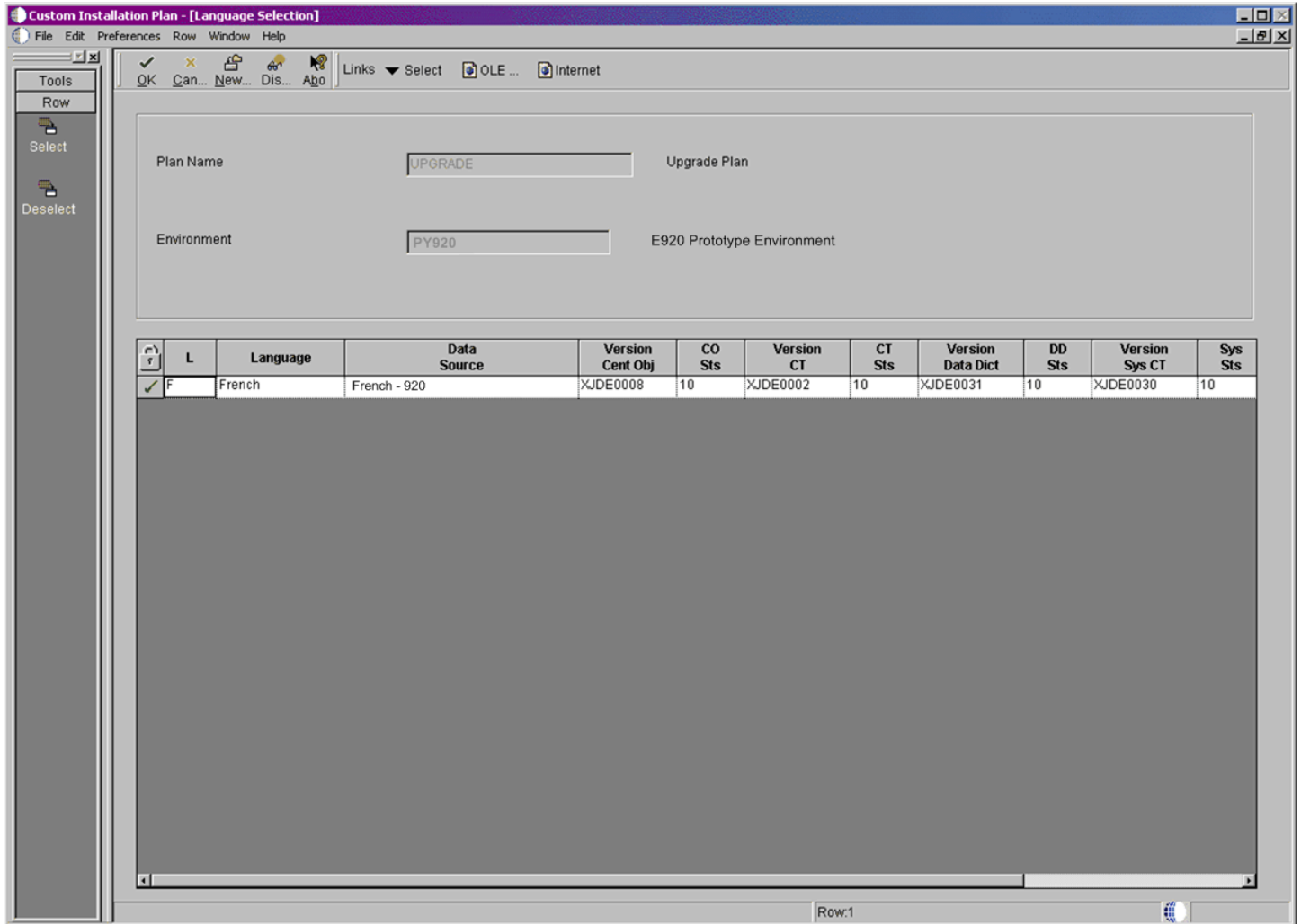


Choose the environment for which you wish to install a language.

1. On Language Selection, to set up a language for the selected environment, choose the appropriate language.

2. From the Row menu, click Select.
3. Repeat the above steps until all your languages have been selected.

Running Installation Workbench

After you create the language-only plan, you must run it through a series of workbenches in order to load the language tables to the appropriate data sources. The language installation process is the same for every database.

To run the Installation Workbench:

1. Go to *Working With Installation Workbench*.
2. Complete the procedures for Control Table Workbench and Specification Table Merge Workbenches.
The control tables, data dictionary, and central objects will be loaded by the Control Table Workbench and the Specification Table Merge Workbench.

Verifying Enterprise Server Requirements

To verify Enterprise Server requirements:

1. Verify that the Enterprise Server hardware and software meet all requirements.
2. Verify that the Enterprise Server disk space meets all requirements.
3. Verify that the *JDE.INI* settings for local code set and code page values are set for your preferred language. These values are found in the National Language Support tables in *Language Process Overview*.

Verifying Development Client Requirements

To verify Development Client requirements:

1. Verify that the Development Client hardware and software meet all requirements.
2. Install the appropriate language character set to a Development Client.
3. Complete the step to verify the *JDE.INI* settings on the Deployment Server for Interactive Runtime, Install, and Network Queues.
4. Complete the tasks in *Installing the Development Clients for Developers and System Administrators*.
5. Verify that the group and user profiles are set up properly.

Completing the Language Installation

Once you have verified that the Enterprise Server and Development Client hardware and software meet your language install requirements, you can complete the installation.

See the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Tools Package Management Guide* for more information about how to transfer language specifications to the Enterprise Server.

Building and Deploying Alternate Language Packages

Once you have concluded the installation, it is time to build and deploy the alternate language packages. See *Package Build* in the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Tools Package Management Guide* for the details of including a language or creating language-only packages.

16 Installing Languages Using Change Assistant on JD Edwards EnterpriseOne

Understanding Language Installs through Change Assistant

The latest version of Change Assistant can be used to install languages on JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Release 9.2. You can use Change Assistant to automate these language installation processes:

- Extract and Install Package
- Update Planner Database
- Build, Run and Complete Installation Plan
- Launch full package build

If you decide to apply languages using Change Assistant, you can use the procedures in this chapter and skip the preceding chapter of this guide entitled: *Creating a Language-Only Installation Plan*.

Naming Convention for Installation Plans and Package Builds

The naming convention for installations plans and package builds is:

`<Pathcode><PackageType><DateString><X>`

where:

- `<Pathcode>` is the first two characters of the path code, like DV, PY, PS, PD
- Valid values for `<PackageType>` are: **F** (Full Package) or **U** (Update Package)
- Valid values for `<DateString>` are in this syntax: **YYMMDD**
- **<X>** is an optional character to distinguish duplicate names

To avoid naming conflicts, when the package name is defined by the System, the package name will be: PSFYMMDD1, where 1 (X) is incremented to the next available number. After this value reaches 9, the process logs this error:

Cannot find next available package for today: MMDDYYYY

Note: This process automatically defines a full package for the selected path code. It derives the Foundation, Language, and Server(s) information from the currently deployed package for this path code. If the system cannot find a deployed package in this path code, it writes this error in the log: **Cannot find deployed package for <Path Code>**.

To recover from this condition, you have three (3) options:

1. Wait and let the system launch the automatic package build for the Language Install Batch on another day.
2. Delete the package name in both JDEPLAN and DEP920 environment, then resubmit the Language Install Batch with package build.
3. Manually build and launch the package.

Working with Reports

During the installation, upgrade, and cumulative update processes, *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* creates reports that show detailed information about the plan and summarize the status of the environment builds. During upgrades and cumulative updates, additional reports summarize the status of tables merges.

Installation Planner Validation Report (R9840B)

Note: This report is used by installation, upgrade, and cumulative update customers.

All processes use version XJDE0001 of this report.

The Installation Planner Validation report summarizes the status of the installation plan and verifies that the plan information is correct before you run the Installation Workbench

Setting Processing Options

The Extra Info tab contains these options:

Review the main body of the report to verify that each data source, machine, and package build in the plan was created successfully. To verify, each detail line should have the value *Record Validated* in the far right column.

The report includes the status of the following record types:

- Data sources (listed by database type)
- Environments
- Path codes
- Object Configuration Manager (OCM)
- Machines
- Table conversions
- Control table merges
- Specification table merges
- Packages

A summary should appear at the end of the report verifying that all records were validated and the plan status was updated to 30.

Environment Database Creation Report (R98403)

Release 9.2 creates an Environment Database Creation report for each environment that is part of your plan. For each environment, you can choose to load either production or demonstration data.

Users performing installations and upgrades should run version XJDE0001.

Users performing cumulative updates should run version XJDE0004.

The environment database creation copies the System data source (previous release) to the *System - 920* data source. The System data source is release specific. The report is read and errors are processed in the same way as they are for the regular Environment Database Creation.

Errors and How to Resolve Them

A report occasionally lists a status of Failure for tables that are created successfully. These failures are generally due to problems creating indices and are not critical for the successful installation of the software.

Reports frequently list a status of No Action for tables the system created successfully. This status is accompanied by source and target data source warnings for these tables to explain why no action was taken. These warnings are normal

and you can ignore them. The most common reasons for the warnings are because the source and target data sources are the same or the table was created by a previously installed environment.

When the source and target are the same, the report lists the following warnings:

Source data source warning	Target data source warning
Source Same as Target	Existing table

This commonly occurs when the "copied from" data source is the same as the "target" data source (where the table is mapped), and often occurs for the following tables:

UDC tables	Menu tables
F0004 and F0005	F0082, F00821, F0083, and F0084

If you load multiple environments that share the same mappings (for example, *DV920* and *TS920*), the first environment loaded (*DV920* in this case) lists the tables with a Success status. The second environment (*TS920*) lists any tables already created during the first environment load with a status of No Action and a target data source warning of Existing Table.

The No Action status and Existing Table warning for the second (*TS920*) environment are normal. You can verify that any table with a target data source warning of Existing Table has been created successfully by verifying it was created while loading a previous environment.

Index Recreation (R9698713)

The R9698713 program is run from Batch Versions after an install or upgrade. It compares database indexes versus *Release 9.2* index specifications in F98712 and F98713. If you run the program in Update mode, it recreates incorrect indexes.

Pathcode Copy (R9800942)

Environment Workbench runs the R9800942 program for each custom environment whose path code is to be copied from an existing path code. It copies the directory structure of the existing path code on the Deployment Server. It also copies `package.inf` and records in the package definition tables F9603, F9631, F96021 and F96215, replacing the path code names in those items.

20 Uninstalling the Software

Uninstalling the Software

Note: Regarding the removal of software, Oracle products use the terms "deinstall", "deinstalling", and "deinstallation", which are functionally synonymous with other products who use the terms "uninstall", "uninstalling", and "uninstallation". This document uses "deinstall " and "uninstall" interchangeably. They both mean removing a product from your machine.

Understanding the Uninstallation

The installation and upgrade processes do not automatically remove any *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* databases. You should have a database administrator (DBA) for your relational database management system (RDMS) manually remove any unused databases according to the list of databases and associated components, which are provided in this document.

The uninstallation program restricts you from uninstalling a mandatory component without also removing all associated optional components that were previously installed. The relationship between the mandatory and optional components is shown in this table:

Server	Mandatory Component	Optional Components
Deployment Server	<i>JD Edwards EnterpriseOne</i> Files	Production Environment Prototype Environment Development Environment Pristine Environment
Enterprise Server	<i>JD Edwards EnterpriseOne</i> Foundation	ES Production ES Prototype ES Development ES Pristine

Uninstalling the Software from the Development Clients

You can remove previous *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* installations from Development Clients by running the uninstallation program as described in the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Development Client Installation Guide*. This guide also includes optional manual cleanup instructions in case the uninstall was not fully successful.

Uninstalling the Local OEE from the Deployment Server

To uninstall the local Oracle database:

1. Either export the local database tablespaces or uninstall JD Edwards EnterpriseOne using Start > Programs > Oracle - <Home_Name> > Oracle Installation Products > Universal Installer where <Home_Name> is the name that you gave the installation of EnterpriseOne on the Deployment Server.

2. Locate this file:

```
<Oracle_Home>\deinstall\deinstall.bat
```

3. Right click on the file that you located in Step 2 and select **Run as administrator**, where <Oracle_Home> is the directory where you installed the local Oracle database. For example, your directory might be:

```
c:\Oracle\E1Local
```

4. At the end of the uninstallation, verify that these Oracle_Home directories have been deleted:

```
c:\Oracle\E1Local
```

```
c:\Oracle\oradata\E1Local
```

If these directories still exist, you should attempt to manually delete them.

CAUTION: Prior to any reinstall an Oracle local database on this same machine, the Oracle_Home directory (for example, `c:\Oracle\E1local` or `c:\Oracle\oradata`) must not exist. If you attempt to reinstall the local Oracle database and this directory still exists, it is likely that the new installation will fail.

Tip: You may not be able to delete the Oracle_Home directory (for example, `c:\Oracle\E1local` or `c:\Oracle\oradata`) if a process has it locked. In that case, to determine which process(es) has it locked, run the steps in the section of this guide entitled: *Process Explorer*.

Manual Cleanup of a Uninstalled Oracle Database on the Deployment Server

If the uninstallation of the OEE database fails for some reason, you need to perform the manual steps in this procedure to completely remove the old installation before reinstalling the database.

1. Uninstall the Deployment Server.

Be sure the Deployment Server is uninstalled before attempting to uninstall the database. This should ensure that no EnterpriseOne tablespaces are imported (attached) to the EnterpriseOne database.

2. Delete the following registry keys:

```
\HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE\SOFTWARE\ORACLE\KEY_E1Local
\HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE\SOFTWARE Wow6432Node\ORACLE\KEY_E1Local
\HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE\SYSTEM\CurrentControlSet\services\ (see Keys below)
```

Keys. Delete any keys with names that start with "Oracle" and contain "E1Local".

3. Delete these directories:

```
c:\Oracle\E1Local
c:\Oracle\oradata
```

If you cannot delete the `E1Local` or `oradata` subdirectory because a file in that directory is locked, follow these steps:

- a. Determine which file is locked and which process has the lock on the file. A freeware program called Process Explorer can be helpful in determining this information. You can obtain a free copy of Process Explorer from this web site:

<http://technet.microsoft.com/en-us/sysinternals>

- b. Either kill the locking process with Process Explorer or Microsoft Windows Task Manager or, if the process was started as a Microsoft Windows service, change the Startup Type to Manual and reboot the computer again.
- c. Try again to delete the `E1Local` or `oradata` subdirectory.

4. Remove the 64-bit Oracle inventory entries.

- a. With a text editor (such as Notepad), edit this file:

```
c:\Program Files\Oracle\inventory\ContentsXML\inventory.xml
```

- b. Delete any lines that start with:

```
<HOME NAME="E1Local"
```

- c. Save the file.

5. Remove the entry from the Windows PATH.

- a. Navigate to Control Panel > System.
- b. Click the **Advanced** button for system settings on the left.
- c. Click the **Environment Variables...** button near the bottom.
- d. In the System variables box near the bottom, highlight Path and click the **Edit...** button.
- e. In the Variable value field, delete this value:

```
c:\Oracle\E1Local\bin
```

Note: Be sure to remove the semicolon as well.

- f. Click the **OK** button.

6. Remove the ORACLE_HOME Windows environment variable.

- a. Navigate to Control Panel > System.

- b. Click the **Advanced** button for system settings on the left.
- c. Click the **Environment Variables...** button near the bottom.
- d. In the System variables box near the bottom, highlight **ORACLE_HOME** and click the **Delete** button.
- e. Click the **OK** button.

Using the OUI Installer to Uninstall JD Edwards EnterpriseOne from the Deployment Server

You can use the OUI installer to uninstall JD Edwards EnterpriseOne from the Deployment Server. To uninstall the local database, depending on your local database type, refer to the preceding sections of this guide entitled: *Uninstalling the Local OEE from the Deployment Server*.

To use the OUI installer to uninstall JD Edwards EnterpriseOne from the Deployment Server:

1. Log on to the Deployment Server as a user with Administrator rights.

CAUTION: Ensure that the Administrator account name that you use does not contain any special characters.

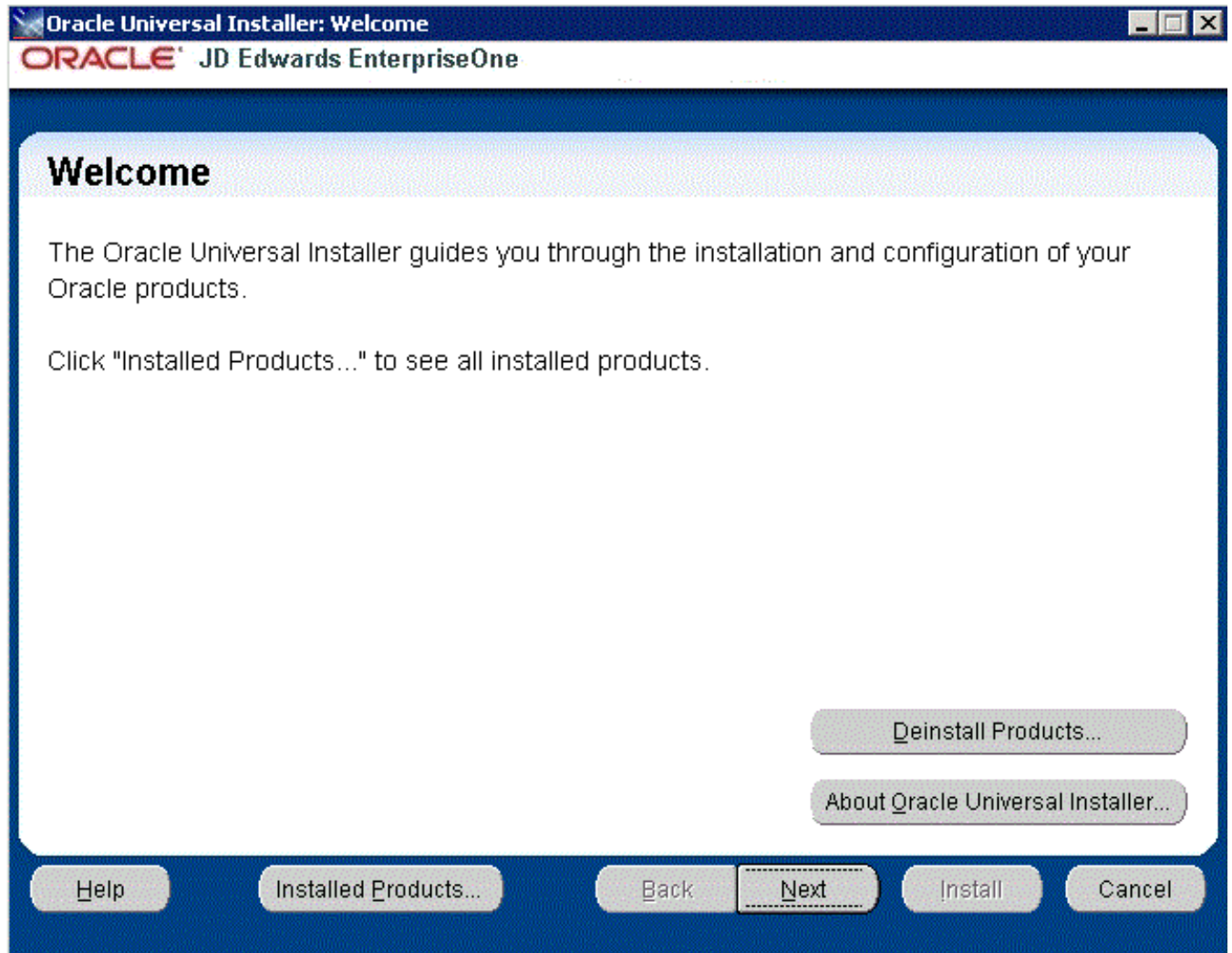
2. If JD Edwards EnterpriseOne is running on the Deployment Server, stop it.

Use Task Manager to verify these processes are stopped:

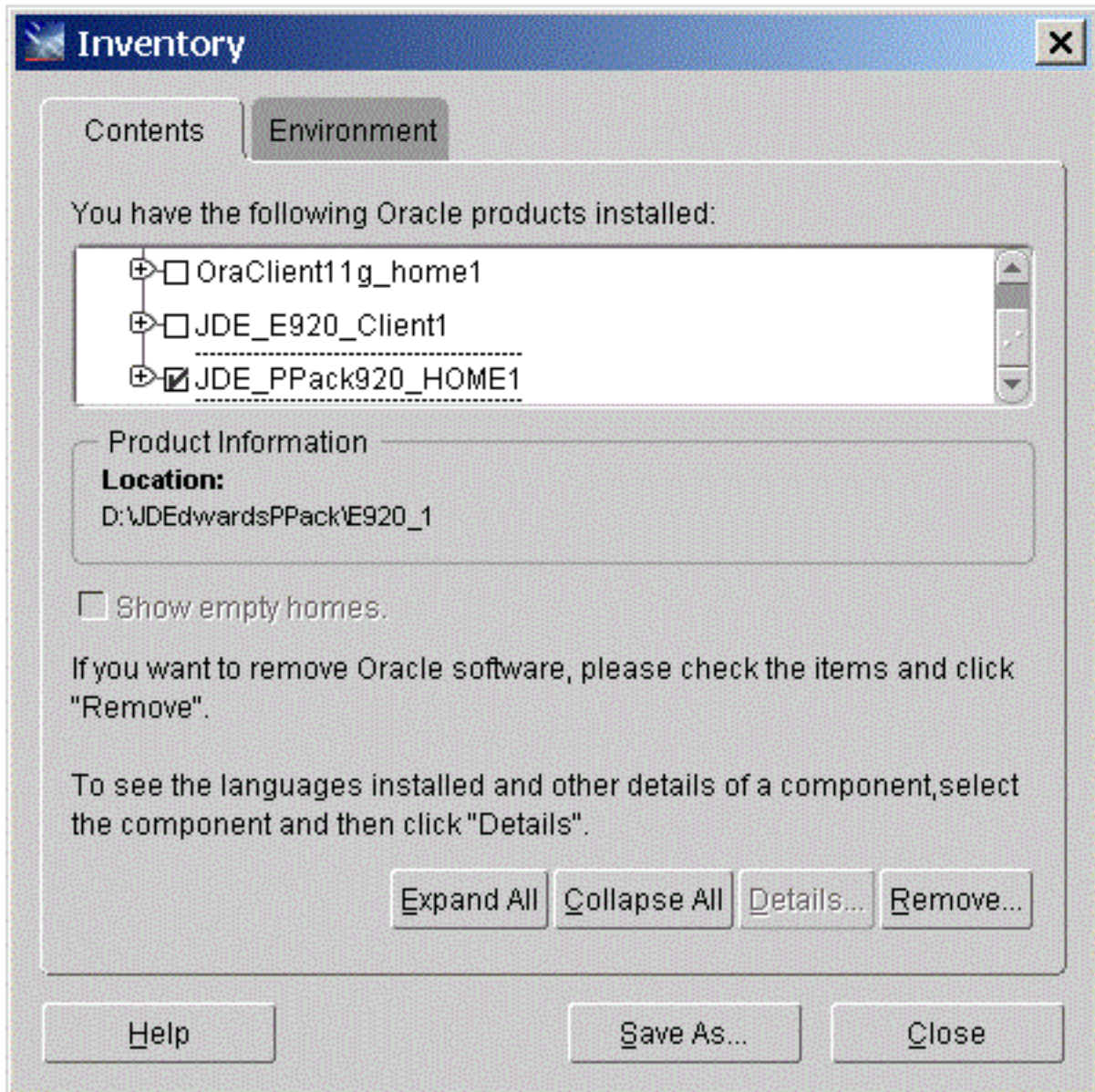
- o `activConsole.exe`
- o `jdenet_n.exe`
- o `java.exe`

If any of these processes are running, either wait for them to finish or kill them via Task Manager.

3. Go to Start > All Programs > Oracle - JDE_DEP920_Home > Oracle Installation Products > Universal Installer.



4. On Oracle Universal Installer: Welcome, select the **Deinstall Products ...** button.

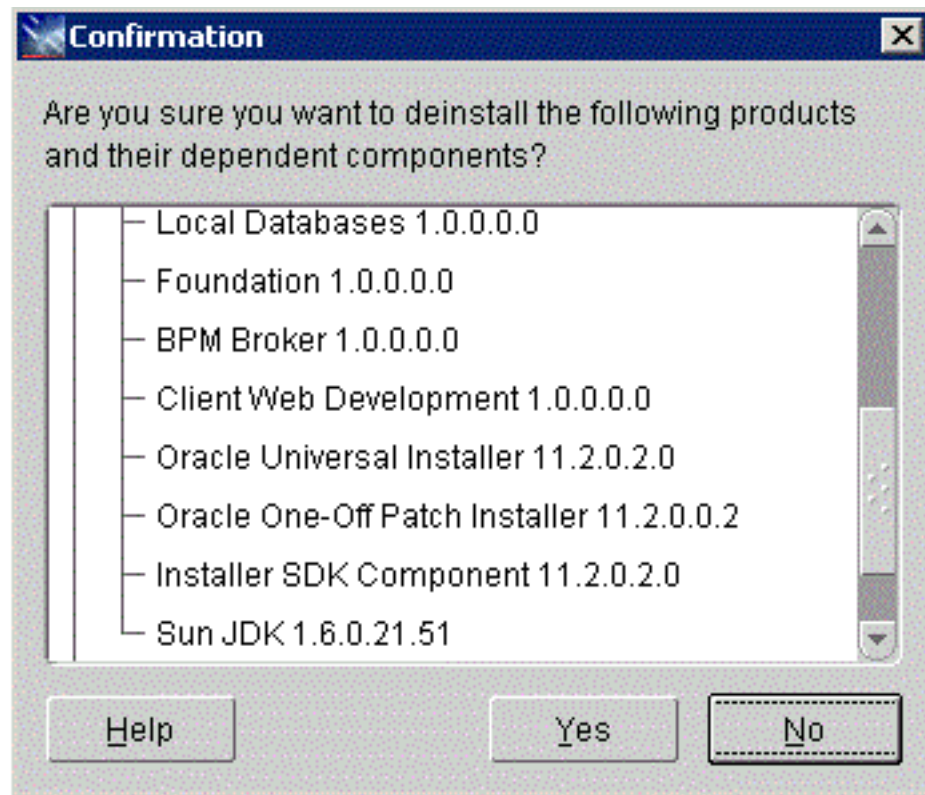


5. On Inventory, with the Contents tab select, put a check mark next to the Oracle Homes for the Deployment Server Home.

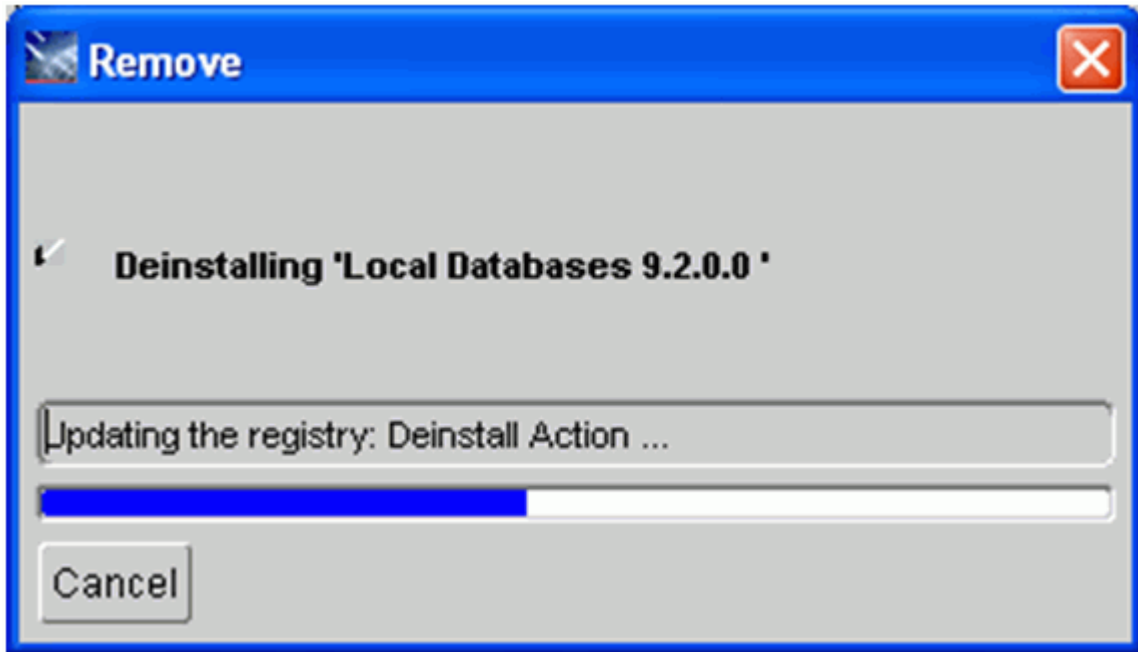
For example, if you followed recommendation in this guide the Oracle Home for your Deployment Server is:

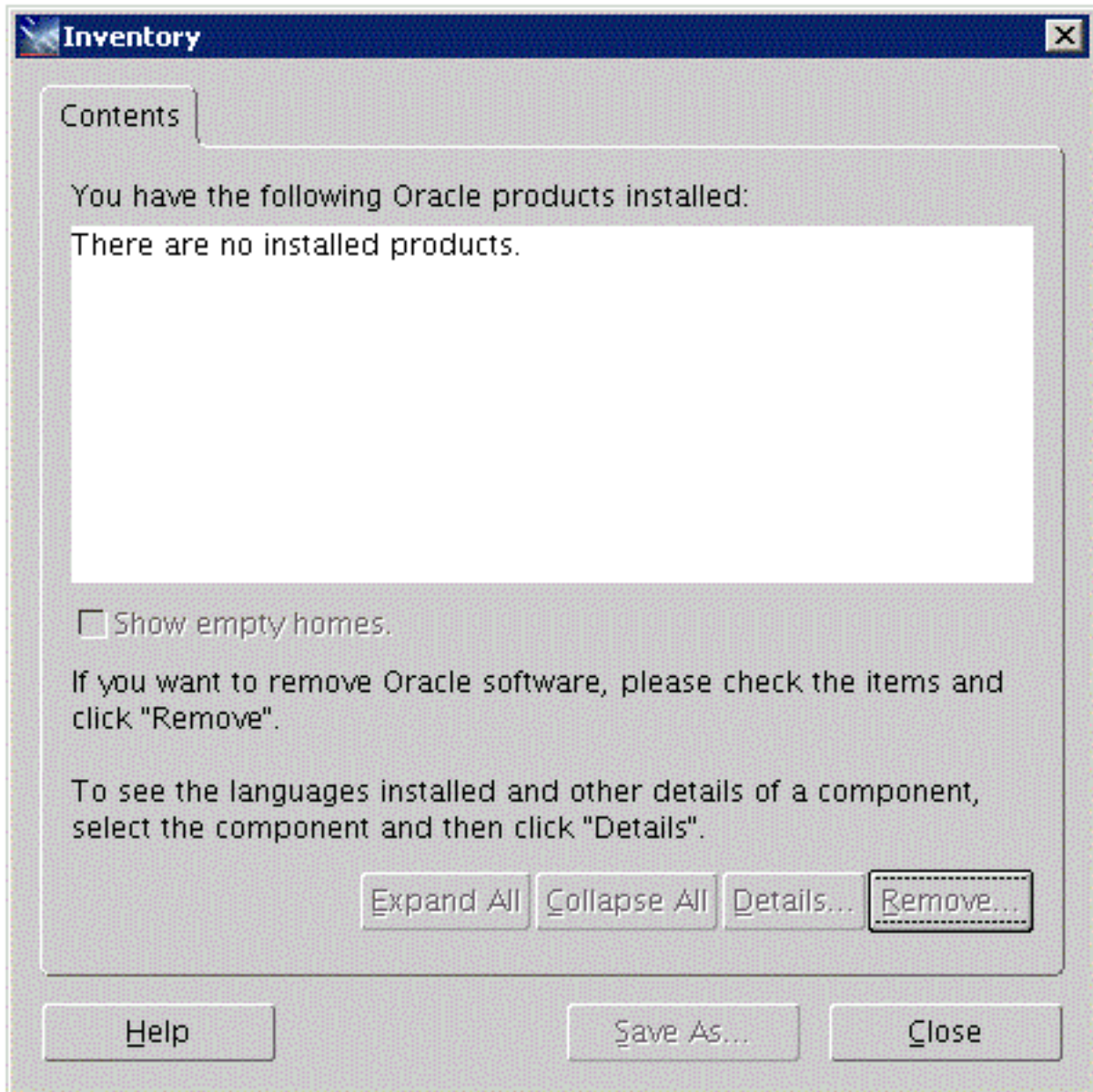
6. Select the **Remove** button.



7. On Confirmation, verify that you want to uninstall the listed components and their dependent components and if so, select the **Yes** button.

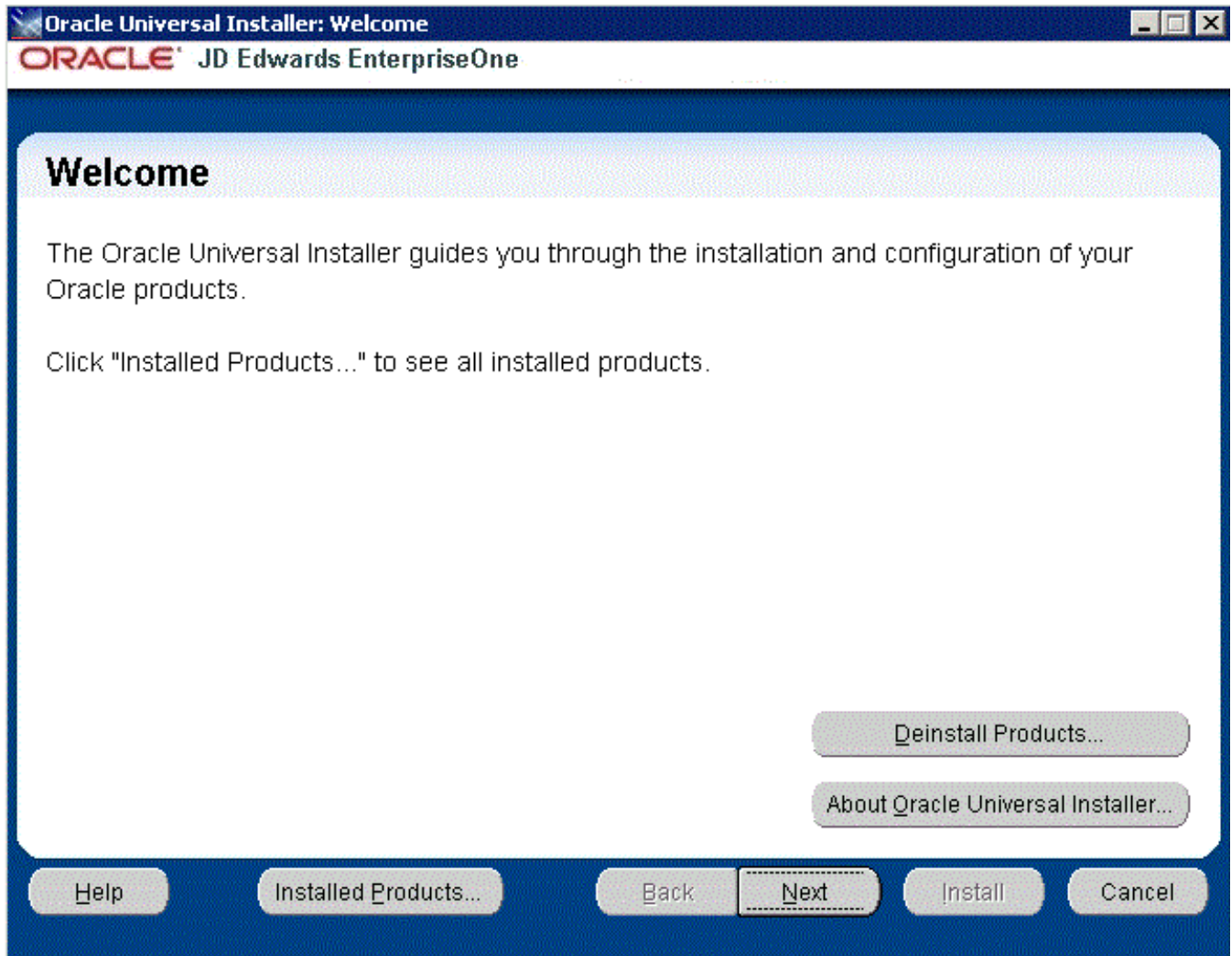


The Remove dialog indicates the progress of the uninstall action.

10. On Oracle Universal Installer: Welcome, select the **Cancel** button to exit the Oracle Universal Installer.

Dropping Oracle Tablespaces and Indexes

This section lists the Oracle tablespaces and indexes that must be manually dropped by a DBA. This is the list of databases that were created by the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne Tools Release 9.2* Installation of the Platform Pack on your Enterprise or Database Server for your *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* installation, or from a previous *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* installation.

By design, these database components are not automatically removed by the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* uninstallation program. You should have a DBA for your RDBMS manually remove any unused items specifically listed in the table below.

Note: When removing Oracle, you must drop the tablespace first and then drop the indexes.

Tip: The *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* installer delivers sample scripts which you can use as examples of how to drop the tablespaces. You should examine and edit these to suit your needs with the understanding that they have not been delivered 'ready to run'. You should pay attention to environment variables and arguments the scripts are expecting. Your DBA may prefer to drop the tablespaces themselves instead of using scripts. Sample drop scripts are located in the ORCL directory under the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* installation directory (*E920*): `callDrop.sh`, `RunDropOracleDB.sh`, `drop_db.bat`. You should also be aware that when you run the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* uninstaller, the directory structure containing sample drop scripts is deleted.

The database users are not automatically removed by the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* uninstallation program. You should have a DBA for your RDBMS manually remove any unused items listed in the table below.

Uninstalling the Platform Pack

You should always use the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* OUI-based installation program to remove *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne*. If you manually remove the software, the uninstallation cannot be guaranteed to be complete and, as a result, subsequent reinstallation of *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* may be hindered.

When you first ran the Platform Pack installer, to complete the installation you ran the `addacct.sh` script to lock down permissions to this directory:

```
/u01/jdedwardspack/e920
```

Prior to rerunning the Platform Pack installer for any purpose, you must run the `installer_chmod.sh` script to unlock and change permissions to allow the installer to execute. On the machine which you initially installed the Platform Pack:

1. Sign on as the root user.
2. Change directory to the location of the Platform Pack installer. For example:

```
cd /u01/jdedwardspack/e920_1/SharedScripts
```

3. Run the `installer_chmod.sh` script to change permissions so the Platform Pack installer can be re-run:

```
./installer_chmod.sh
```

It is also very important you drop your Oracle tablespaces and indexes prior to running the uninstaller, as specified in the warning in the section entitled: *Dropping Oracle Tablespaces and Indexes*. If you do not do this you will lose the `drop.sh` script that was delivered in the installation, because it will be removed by the uninstaller.

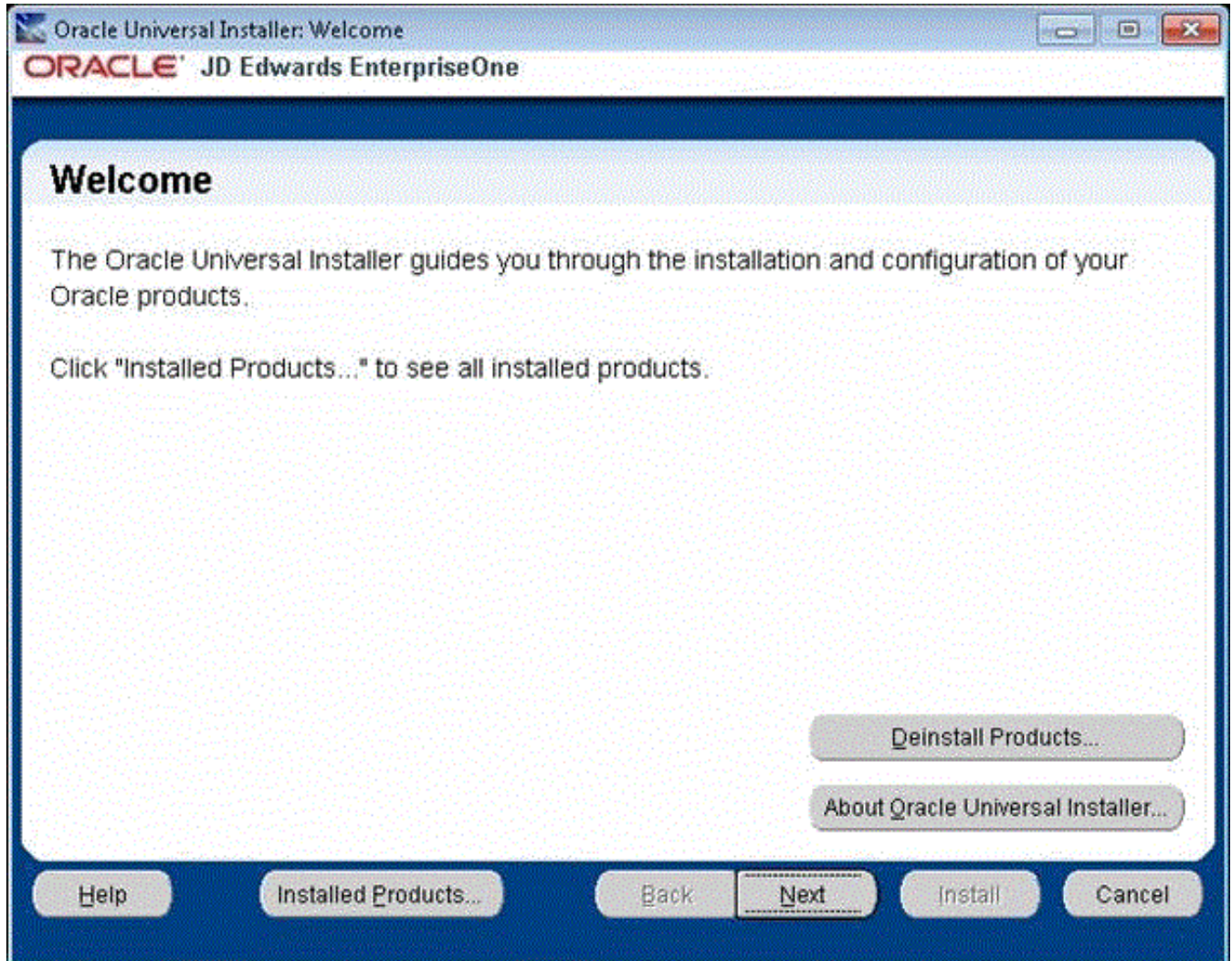
On the machine which you initially installed the Platform Pack:

1. Locate and execute the `runInstall` file under the `/install` subdirectory. Typically the directory structure of the extracted install image is similar to that shown below:

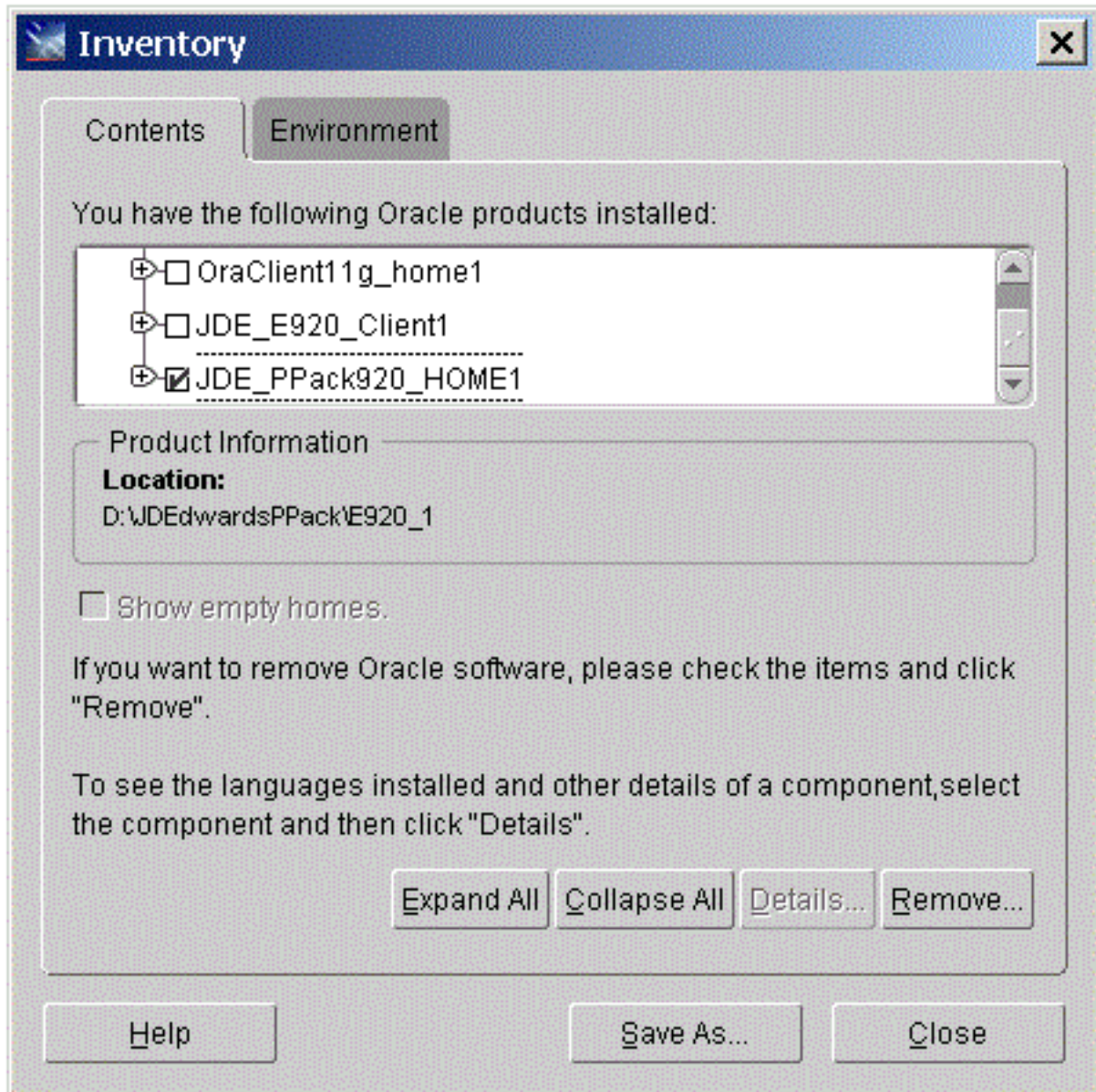

Note: The byte counts in this example will likely not match those of your unzipped files.

CAUTION: You **must** sign on as the Oracle instance owner in order to run the `runInstall` file. You cannot run a OUI installer as root. The installer requires that you are signed on as the Oracle database user, even if you are only installing the Logic portion of the Platform Pack. You must install the Oracle database client software and sign on as the owner of that install when running the Platform Pack. The Installer uses information about this account to configure the `enterpriseone.sh`. If you sign on as any other user, you will see errors during the install and will need to manually configure the database variables in `enterpriseone.sh`.



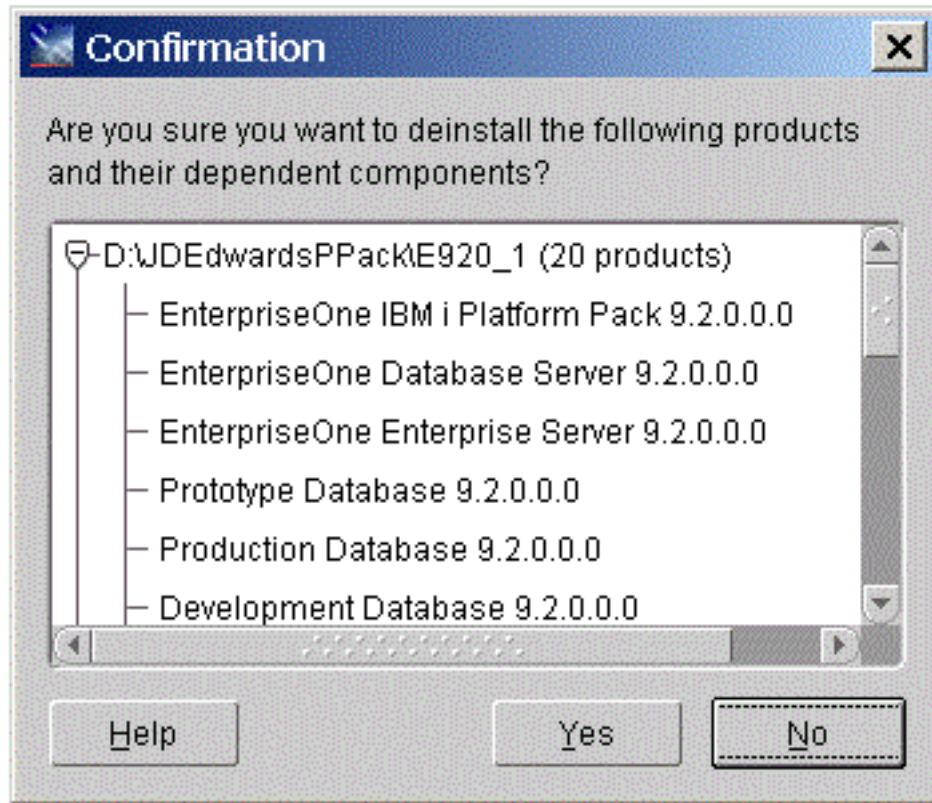

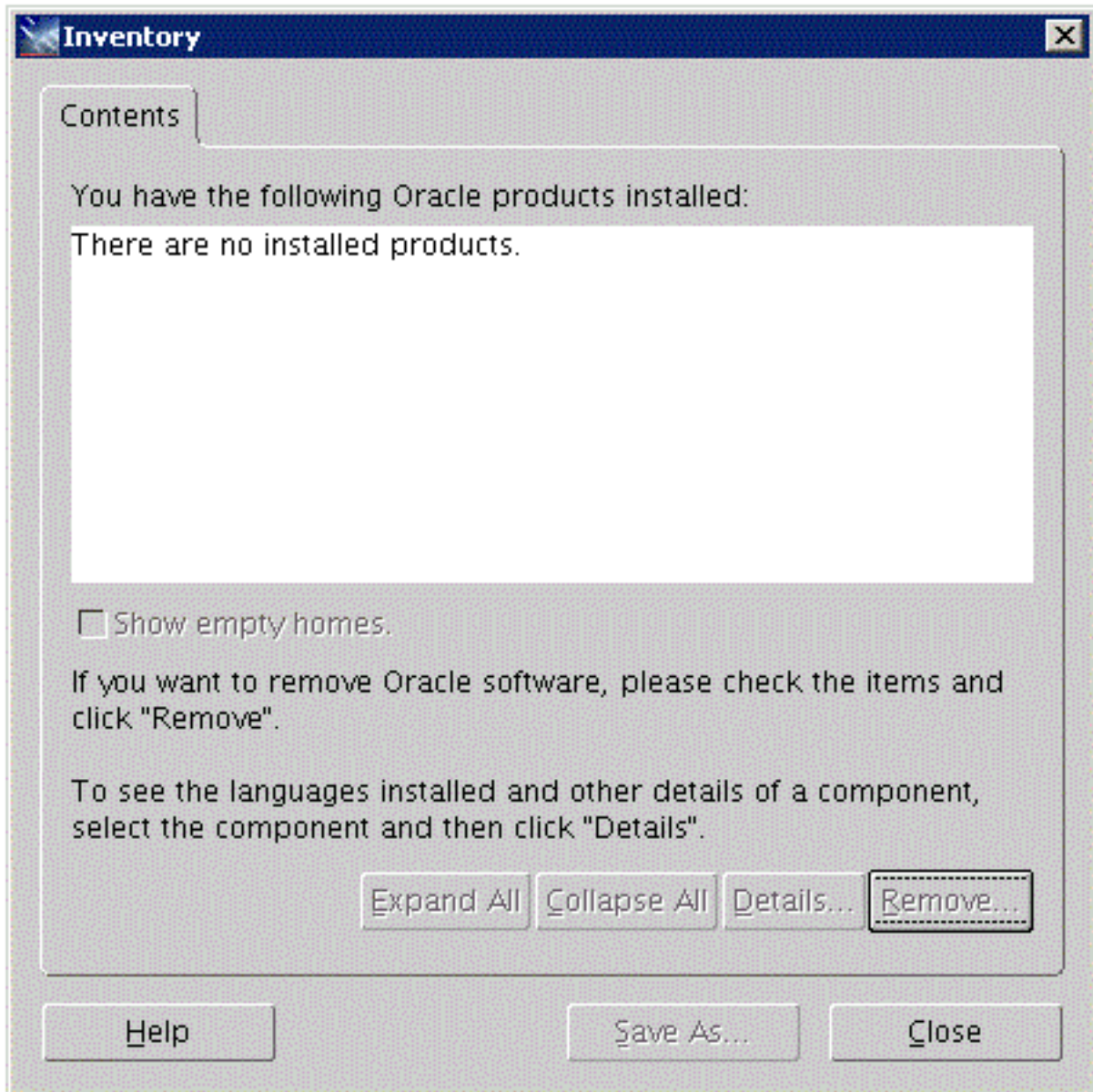

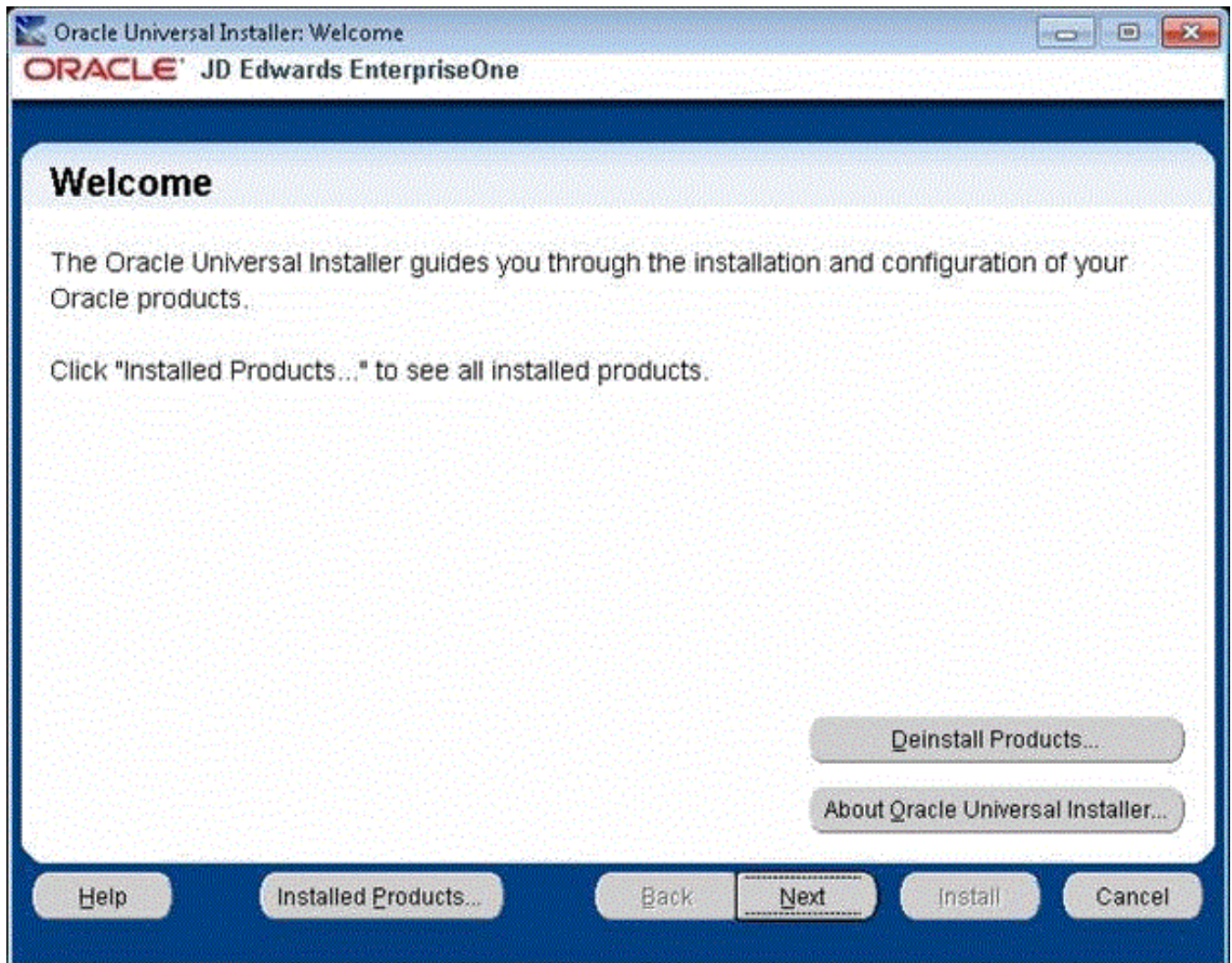

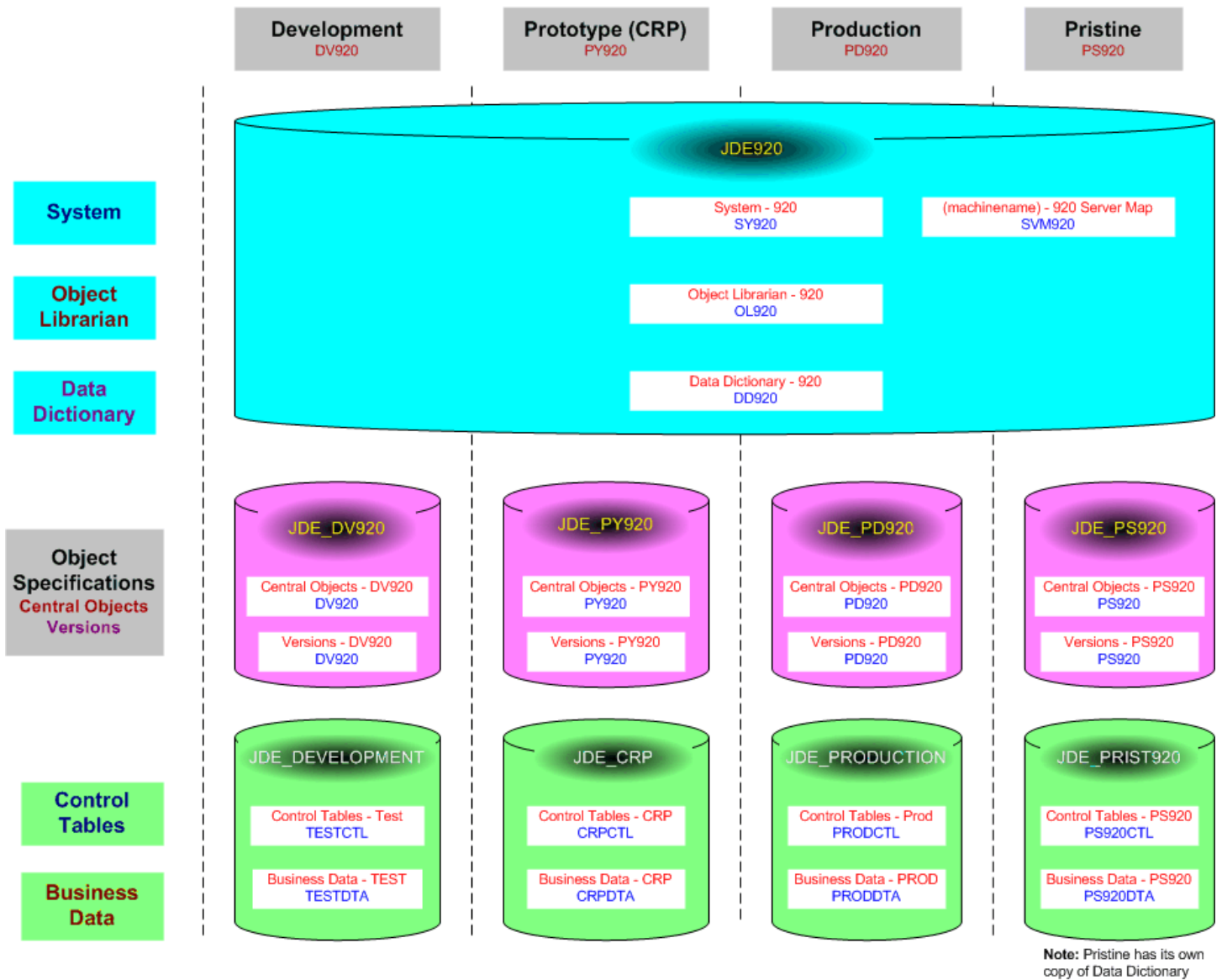

If you are re-installing your Deployment Server, you must ensure that the local Planner tablespaces (Oracle) are not attached. To detach the tablespaces, run these batch files:

```
jdwards\e920\planner\data\detach_planner.bat
```

```
jdwards\e920\planner\data\detach_metadata.bat
```

CAUTION: The shipped `jdbj.ini` file in the following folder contains specifications for each database type: `C:\JDEdwards\E920\system\JAS\webclient.ear\webclient.war\WEB-INF\classes`. You must manually comment out (with a semicolon) every database driver that you are not using. For example, if you are connecting to only Oracle databases, your file would look like this:

```
[JDBj-JDBC DRIVERS]
ORACLE=oracle.jdbc.driver.OracleDriver
;AS400=com.ibm.as400.access.AS400JDBCdriver
;SQLSERVER=com.microsoft.sqlserver.jdbc.SQLServerDriver
;UDB=COM.ibm.db2.jdbc.app.DB2Driver
```

Rebooting the Deployment Server

You must reboot the Deployment Server after installing or deinstalling the local Oracle database.

EnterpriseOne Access to the Local Oracle Database

The Deployment Server Installation Workbench generates and encrypts a password and then changes the local Oracle database "system" and "sys" accounts' passwords to that password. During the rest of the Installation Workbench and at runtime of the Deployment Server, the local Oracle database is accessed via the "system" account and this generated and encrypted password.

This table lists the relationship between the local Oracle database accounts and the password.

System	Generated and encrypted by the Deployment Server installer.
Sys	Generated and encrypted by the Deployment Server installer.

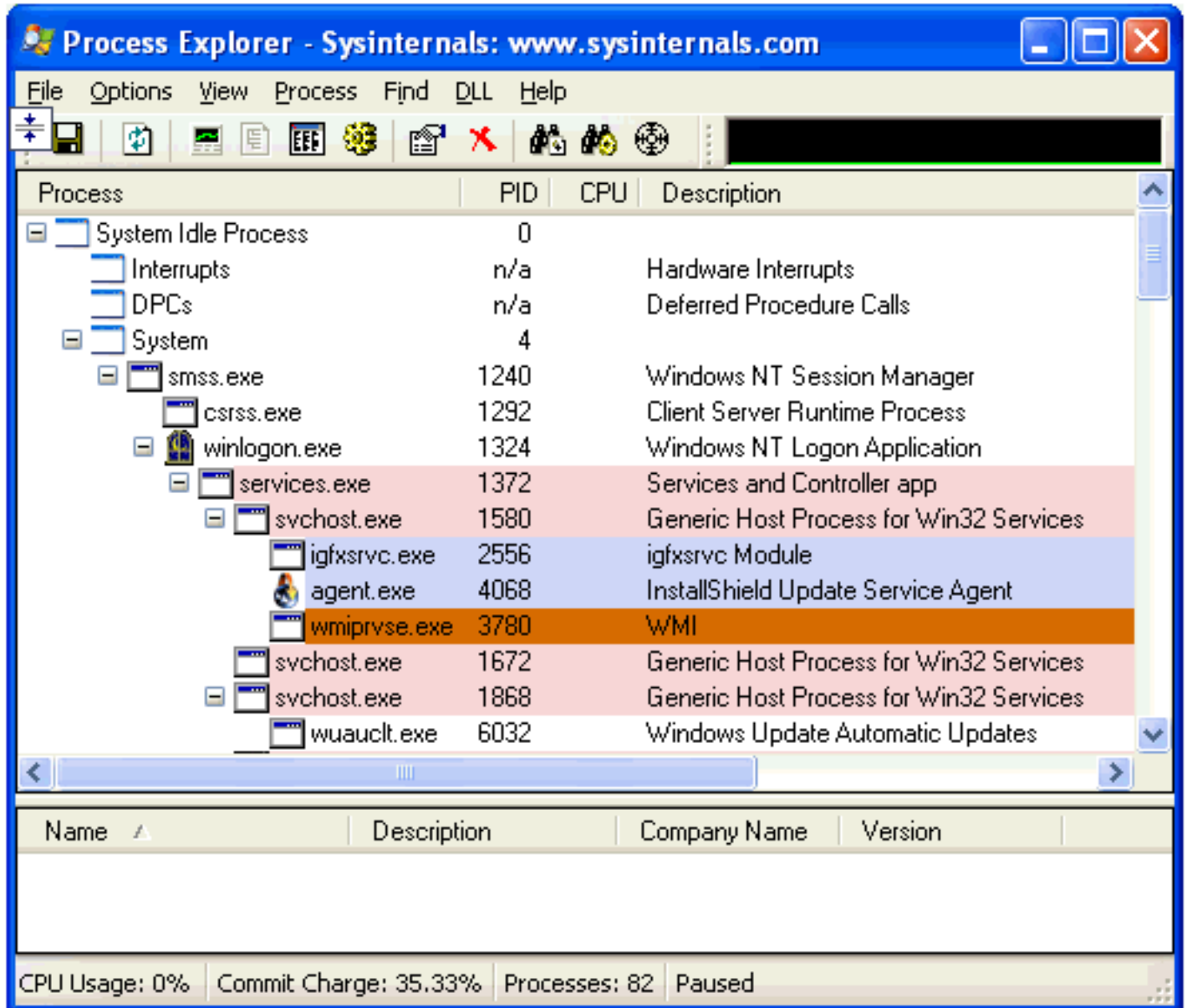

If you cannot delete the directory for the *E1Local* Oracle Home because a process has it locked, you can use Process Explorer to determine which process has it locked, and subsequently kill that process.

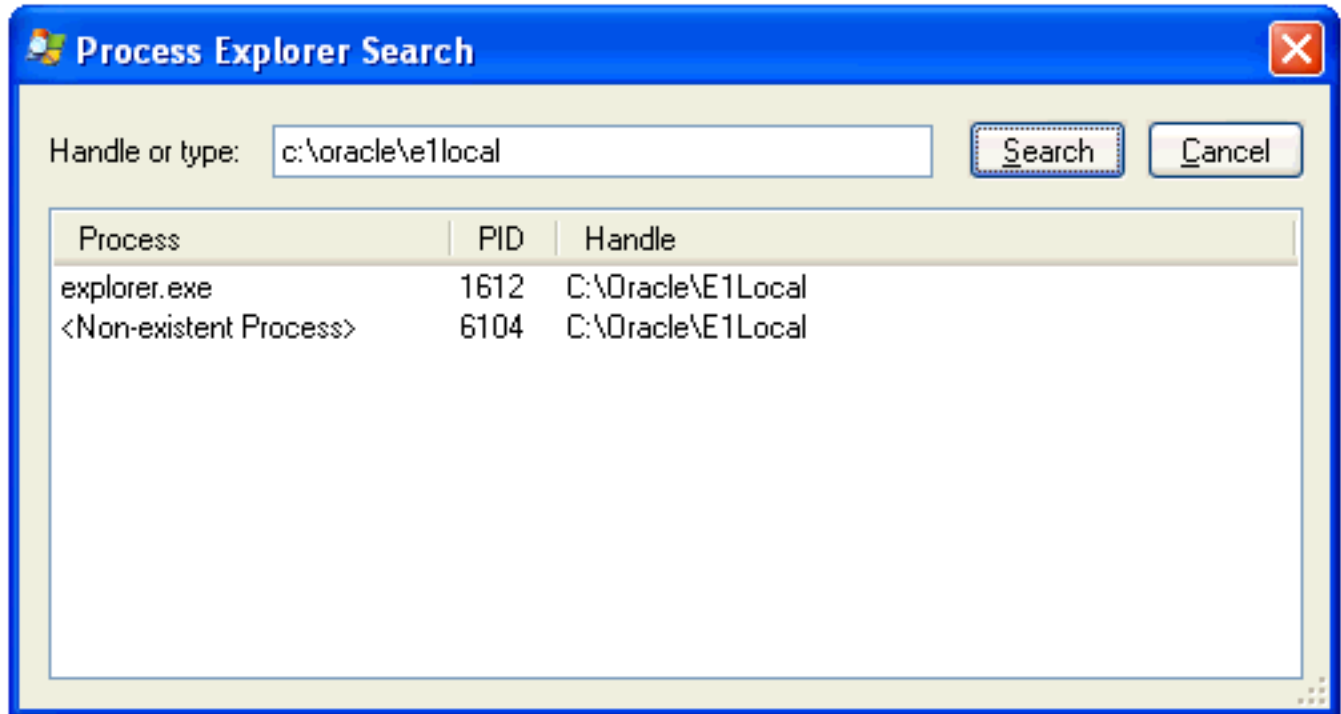

To use Process Explorer:



1. Navigate to Find > Find Handle or DLL....



2. In the **Handle or type** field, enter the full name of the directory that cannot be deleted. For example:

```
c:\oracle\e1local
```

3. Click the Search button.
4. On the search results screen, note the PID(s) (Process IDs) that are associated with the specified directory.
5. Cancel the Process Explorer Search window to return to Process Explorer.
6. Use Process Explorer to kill the identified process(es).

Note: If one or more of the processes is Windows Explorer (`explorer.exe`), killing it may cause the computer to lock up. If that happens, you will need to reboot the Deployment Server machine. The process `oracle.exe` is the local Oracle database engine. If it has a file locked, you can stop the service **OracleServiceE1LOCAL**.

7. If one or more of the processes locks a file in the directory you are trying to delete even after rebooting, you may have to determine which service is automatically starting that process and change the service to manual startup. Then reboot the Deployment Server machine and delete the directory.

Verifying the Local Oracle Database Installation

To verify that the installation of the local Oracle database was successful:

1. Inspect the latest logs in these directories:

```
<E1_install_dir>\InstallLogs
```

```
C:\Program Files\Oracle\Inventory\logs
```

2. Resolve any issues that are identified in the logs.

Deployment Server Installation Problems

You cannot reinstall the local Oracle database using the Deployment Server installer if there are indications that the local Oracle database already exists. The Deployment Server installer will skip the installation of the local Oracle database if either of these conditions is true:

- The local Oracle database service **OracleServiceE1LOCAL** is running.
- This registry key exists:

```
\HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE\SOFTWARE\Wow6432Node\ORACLE\KEY_E1Local
```

Runtime Problems

This section discusses:

- *Jde.log shows ORA-12541: TNS:no listener*
- *User gets a pop-up window prompting for E1Local DB user and password and Jde.log shows OCI0000141 - Error - ORA-01017: invalid username/password; logon denied*
- *tnsnames.ora*

Jde.log shows ORA-12541: TNS:no listener

Verify that the Oracle listener service **OracleE1LocalTNSListener** is running. It is possible that the service may not have started due to slow bootup of the machine.

User gets a pop-up window prompting for E1Local DB user and password and Jde.log shows OCI0000141 - Error - ORA-01017: invalid username/password; logon denied

Verify that the E1Local database system account password is valid. If the following command executes successfully, it means that the password is not encrypted. If so, you must encrypt the password in order to enable database access.

```
SQLPlus.exe system/admin@E1Local
```

where "admin" is the password. This password may have been set to "admin" by one of the EnterpriseOne database scripts, or it may be a plain-text word that someone set by running **ReconfigureDB.exe**.

If the password was decrypted with **ReconfigureDB**, you should re-encrypt it using **ReconfigureDB.exe**. Refer to the sections of this guide entitled: *Understanding the ReconfigureDB.exe Program* and *Encrypting and Decrypting the Password of the Local Database*.

tnsnames.ora

When the Deployment Server installer installs the local Oracle database (**E1Local**), the `\bin` directory is added to the start of the Windows PATH. If you have both the local Oracle database and the Oracle client installed (for example, if you are connecting to an Oracle database on a machine other than the Deployment Server), the local Oracle database version of the executables and `tnsnames.ora` are used. In order to maintain functionality of the Oracle client, you should add the remote database server `tnsnames` entries into the `tnsnames.ora` used by **E1Local**, which is located in this directory:

```
<OEE_installation_path>\network\admin
```

By default, the <OEE_installation_path> is C:\Oracle\E1Local, but the actual value is specified during OEE installation.

Administering the Local Oracle Database Using SQL Plus

The command-prompt program `SQLPlus.exe` and GUI program SQL Developer are provided with the installation of the local Oracle database using the Deployment Server installer. You can use either tool to access the local Oracle database where both the user and default password are the same as the tablespace name. If using SQLPlus, the command to sign into a database is:

```
SQLPlus.exe <user>/<password>@E1Local
```

For example, if the tablespace JDESY920 exists in the E1Local database, use the following to sign in:

```
SQLPlus.exe JDESY920/JDESY920@E1Local
```

Understanding the ReconfigureDB.exe Program

The installation of the Deployment Server delivers a utility called `ReconfigureDB.exe`. This program can be used by a database superuser who for Oracle is the user for the **SYSTEM** and **SYS** accounts, while for SQL Server Express (SSE) it is the user of the **SA** account. Only users of these accounts can encrypt and decrypt the password for the **local database** on the Deployment Server. Throughout this text, the term **local database** refers to the database that is installed directly on the Deployment Server. Depending on the release of EnterpriseOne, the supported database could be Oracle or SQL Server Express as specified in the Certifications for JD Edwards EnterpriseOne (refer to *Accessing Certifications* of this guide).

The **local database** password must be encrypted for JD Edwards EnterpriseOne to run on the Deployment Server. In order to provide security and uniqueness, JD Edwards EnterpriseOne generates this password using a combination of the serial number of the local C drive and a proprietary encryption algorithm. Therefore it is assured that this password will not be the same on different computers.

Tip: With EnterpriseOne Tools Release 9.2.0.0 and later and an Oracle local database, the method of creating the password changed to produce a more complex and secure password. In these notes and the `ReconfigureDB.exe` program, the old method is referred to as using **Legacy** encryption; whereas, the new method uses **Enhanced** encryption. **Important:** Enhanced encryption is applicable only to an Oracle local database when using Tools Release 9.2.0.0 and greater. Legacy encryption is used with an Oracle local database when using Tools Releases prior to 9.2.0.0 or with SQL Server Express (using any supported Tools Release). **Important:** Prior to running JD Edwards EnterpriseOne on the Deployment Server, you must ensure that the password of the superuser of the local database is set to the relevant encryption using `ReconfigureDB.exe`. This is done by selecting a program option appropriate for your database and Tools Release:

- **Enhanced Encryption**

You should use this option with the local Oracle database and Tools Release 9.2.0.0 and greater.

- **Legacy Encryption**

You should use this option with any local database and Tools Releases prior to 9.2.0.0.

You can also use this option with the SQL Server local database with any supported Tools Release.

Note: With Tools Release 9.2.0.0 and greater, the program for changing the password of the superuser of the local database is `ReconfigureDB.exe`. The program allows these password options:

- Plain Text
- Enhanced Encryption
- Legacy Encryption

Prior to Tools Release 9.2.0.0, the comparable program was called `ReconfigureMSDE.exe` and provided only the options for plain text and (Legacy) Encryption.

The `ReconfigureDB.exe` program runs in either interactive or silent mode. If no command-line options are given, the program launches a Graphical User Interface (GUI). If any command-line options are specified, the `ReconfigureDB.exe` program runs silently. In both cases, output from the program is written to this log:

```
C:\ReconfigureDB.log
```

You can determine the functionality and command syntax of the `ReconfigureDB.exe` program by executing the program with either the `/?` or `-H` options. For example:

```
ReconfigureDB.exe /?
```

or

```
ReconfigureDB.exe -H
```

When you execute the command with these options the output is not directed to the console; instead the output is written to this file:

```
c:\ReconfigureDB.log
```

The contents of the `ReconfigureDB.log` file are shown below:

```
ReconfigureDB.exe
```

- 1) Changes the password for the database "superusers" for the LOCAL EnterpriseOne database.
- 2) Can change to or from an encrypted password which is needed for E1 to run. This password is generated based on the C drive's serial number and then encrypted based on E1 proprietary algorithms; hence, this password will not be the same on different computers.
- 3) Can also change to or from user-specified passwords.
- 4) The program works on the following local databases--and ONLY these databases:
 - E1Local
Type: Oracle Enterprise Edition (OEE)
Users: SYSTEM and SYS
 - JDESSELocal
Type: Microsoft SQL Server 2005 Express Edition (SSE)
User: SA

IMPORTANT NOTE: With EnterpriseOne Tools Release 9.2.0.0 and later, the method of creating the password changed to produce a more complex and secure password.

In this program, the old method is referred to as using "Legacy" encryption; whereas, the new method uses "Enhanced" encryption.

```
!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!

SYNTAX

ReconfigureDB [-options] [Old_Password|-E|-L] [New_Password|-E|-L]

LOG FILE

- The log file is C:\ReconfigureDB.log

OPTIONS

- May be preceded by either a slash (/) or hyphen (-).
- May be either upper- or lowercase.
- Include one space before the slash or hyphen.
- The order of the options is important. The old password (or option -E or -L) must come before the new password (or option -E or -L).
- If an old password (or option -E or -L) is given, a new password (or option -E or -L) must be given.
- If no options are provided, a GUI will prompt for the type of database and the passwords.

? or -H - Writes this help to the log file.
- Optional.

-T[ORACLE|SSE] - The database server instance type.
- Optional. If not specified, the default value is ORACLE.

Old_Password|-E|-L - May be one of the following:
1) Old password
2) -E = Indicates that old password was created using the ENHANCED (i.e., more complex) generation algorithm.
3) -L = Indicates that old password was created using the LEGACY (i.e., less complex) generation algorithm.

New_Password|-E|-L - May be one of the following:
1) New password
2) -E = Indicates that new password should be created using the ENHANCED (i.e., more complex) generation algorithm.
3) -L = Indicates that new password should be created using the LEGACY (i.e., less complex) generation algorithm.

EXAMPLE

In this example, the password for the JDESSELocal database SA user will be changed from "MyOldPassword" to a generated password that is then encrypted with the new enhanced method:

```
ReconfigureDB -TSSE MyOldPassword -E
```

Encrypting and Decrypting the Password of the Local Database

When the **local database** is Oracle, *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* uses an encrypted password to connect to **E1Local** through the **SYSTEM** and **SYS** accounts.

When the **local database** is SQL Server Express, JD Edwards EnterpriseOne uses an encrypted password to connect to **JDESSELocal** through the **SA** account.

Some of the administrative database scripts on the Deployment Server decrypt this password before submitting database commands. Upon exit, such programs subsequently then re-encrypt the password. If one of these scripts fails to complete (for example, it is killed or it otherwise fails) before it can encrypt the password again, JD Edwards EnterpriseOne will not be able to connect to the database. You can determine if this is the case by attempting to sign into the local Oracle database using this command:

```
SQLPlus.exe system/admin@E1Local
```

where "admin" is the default password that the scripts use.

If you can sign in, the password must still be decrypted. You must re-encrypt the **SYSTEM**, **SYS**, or **SA** account password using the following steps for EnterpriseOne to operate correctly.

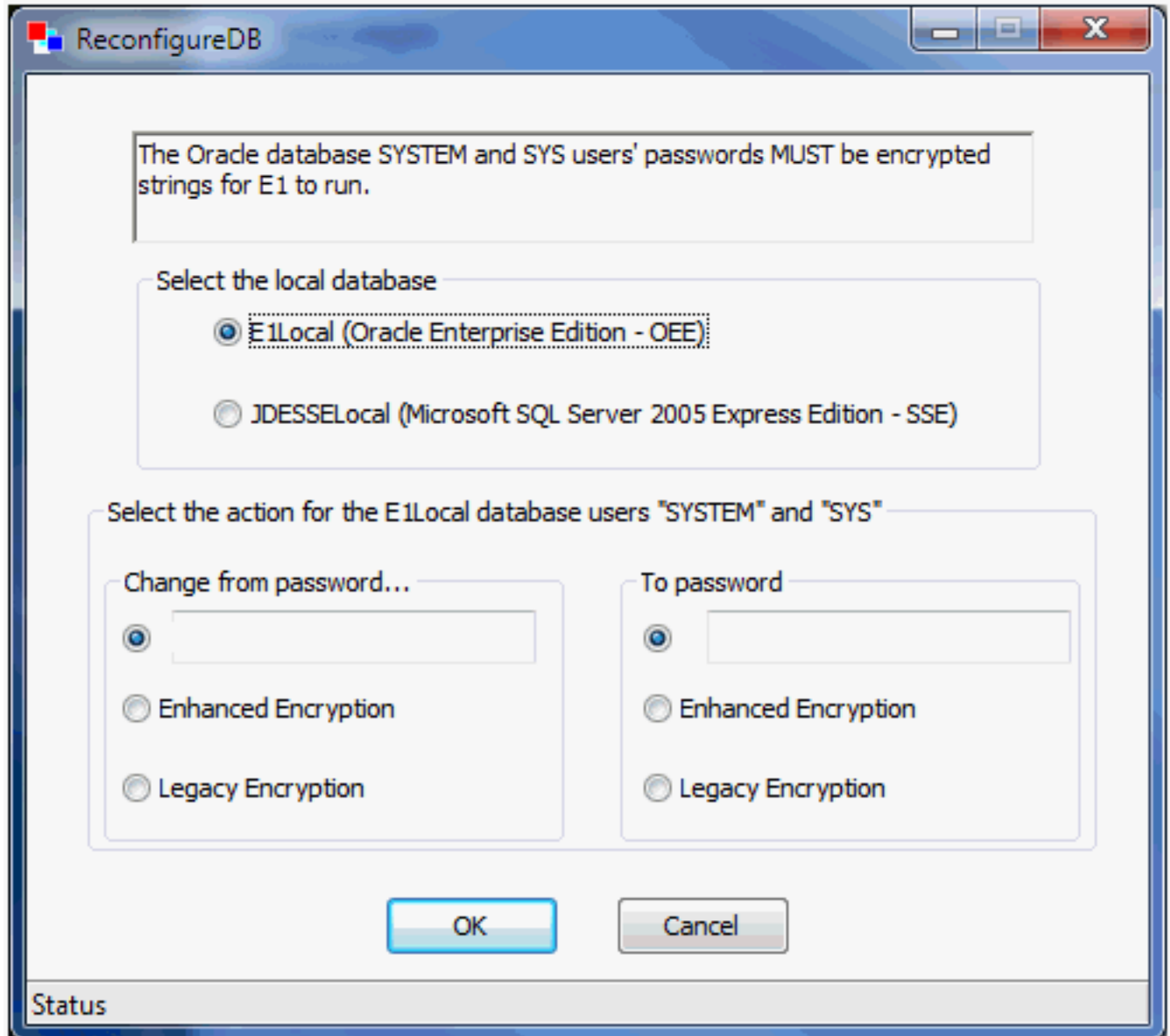
1. Launch the `ReconfigureDB.exe` program located in this directory:

```
<E1_install_dir>\system\bin32\ReconfigureDB.exe
```

Note: You do not have to right click on `ReconfigureDB.exe` and select **Run as administrator**. This is because this version of the program is designed to automatically attempt to start with the elevated permissions. If you are not signed into Windows with an administrative account, you will be prompted to enter the credentials for an administrative account.

If you do not specify any command line options, this program will launch in GUI mode and you can proceed as described in the following steps in this section. Optionally you can use command line options to execute `ReconfigureDB.exe` .

Tip: For details of syntax and command line options for `ReconfigureDB.exe` , refer to the preceding section in this document entitled: *Understanding the ReconfigureDB.exe Program*.



2. On the main ReconfigureDB screen, the **Select the local database section** lists the types of local databases that are currently installed; options for database types that are not installed will be inactive.
 - **E1Local (Oracle Enterprise Edition - OEE)**

This is the only valid option for JD Edwards Applications Release 9.1 (E910) and greater.
 - **JDESSELocal (Microsoft SQL Server 2005 Express Edition - SEE)**

You should choose this if the local database is SSE, which is a valid option in JD Edwards Applications Releases prior to 9.1 (E910).

3. In the **Select the action for the E1Local database users** section, the first column titled **Change from password...** indicates the old password; that is, the **from** password that you want to change. Select one of the available options:

- o **A plain text password**

Specify the password in the input field if you know that it was not generated with one of the two types of encryption. For security purposes, your keystrokes are displayed as asterisks.

- o **Enhanced Encryption**

Click this radio button if the old password was encrypted with the enhanced encryption that is applicable to a local Oracle database and Tools Release 9.2.0.0 or greater. This option uses an enhanced encryption algorithm (relative to prior releases) providing greater security for the local Oracle database.

- o **Legacy Encryption**

Click this radio button if the old password was encrypted with the legacy encryption that is applicable to the local databases which can be either:

- Oracle on Tools Release prior to 9.2.0.0
- SQL Server Express on any supported Tools Release

This option uses an older, less secure encryption algorithm (relative to later releases) providing less security for the local database.

4. The second column titled **To password** indicates the new password; that is, to what you want to change the password. Select one of the available options:

- o **A plain text password**

Use this option if you do not want to use either of the two types of encryption. For security purposes, your keystrokes are displayed as asterisks.

CAUTION: If you select the plain text password option, ensure that you re-encrypt the password before attempting to run JD Edwards EnterpriseOne. If the password is not encrypted with the correct type of encryption, JD Edwards EnterpriseOne will fail because it cannot access the local database.

Note: The password cannot contain any spaces. Spaces at the start or end of the password will be removed.

- o **Enhanced Encryption**

Click this radio button if the new password will be encrypted with the enhanced encryption that is applicable to a local Oracle database and Tools Release 9.2.0.0. The option uses an enhanced encryption algorithm (relative to prior releases) providing greater security for the local Oracle database.

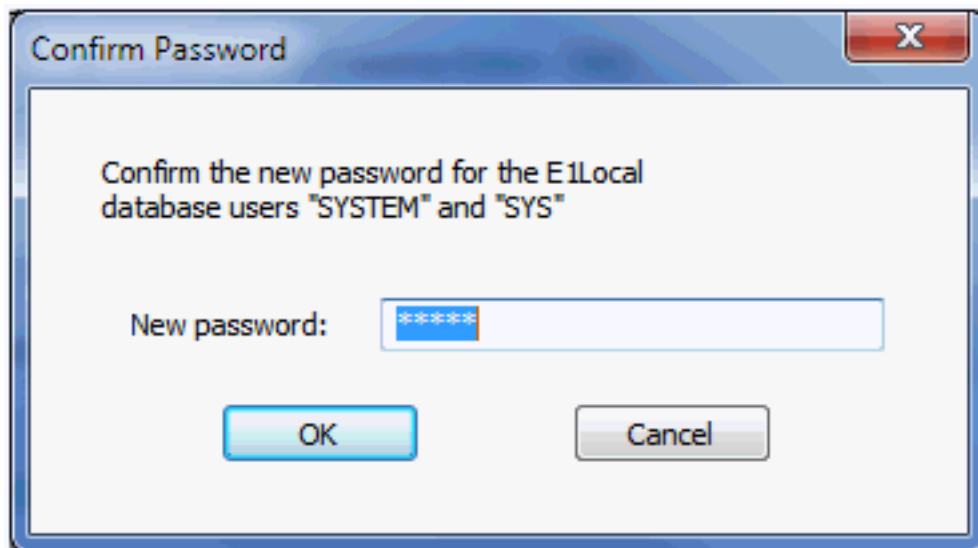
- o **Legacy Encryption**

Click this radio button if the old password will be encrypted with the legacy encryption that is applicable to the local databases which can be either:

- Oracle on Tools Releases prior to 9.2.0.0
- or
- SQL Server Express on any supported Tools Release

This option uses an older, less secure encryption algorithm (relative to later releases) providing less security for the local database.

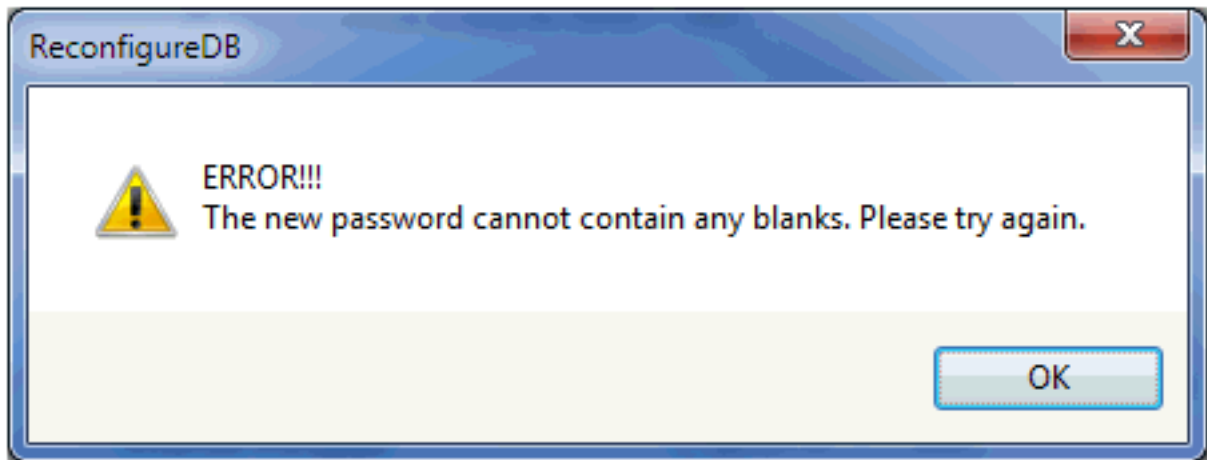
5. Click the **OK** button.



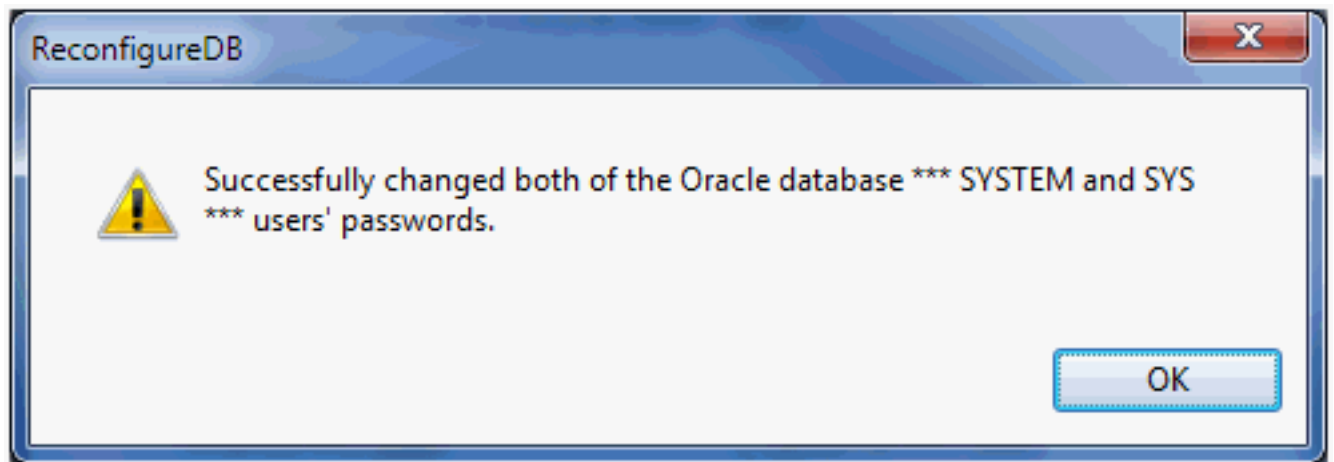
6. On Confirm Password, re-enter the password in the **New password:** field.

This is to confirm the new password for local database users which are **SYSTEM** and **SYS** for an Oracle database and **SA** for an SSE database.

The password value cannot contain a space character (blank). Attempting to do so causes this error to be displayed



7. Click the **OK** button.



A dialog box indicates that the password was successfully changed. Click the **OK** button to exit the dialog.

8. Watch the status bar at the bottom of the dialog for informational messages.

Tip: If changing the password fails, look in this log file for additional information: `c:\ReconfigureDB.log` Also, ensure you are using the correct password as perhaps the password you are trying is not what you thought it was. If neither of the above helps resolve a password failure, attempt to stop and restart these database services: [Oracle Database](#)

- OracleServiceE1LOCAL
- OracleE1LocalTNSListener

SSE Database

- JDESSELOCAL

After the database services are stopped and restarted, you can retry `ReconfigureDB.exe`.

Import and Export Tablespaces to the Local Oracle Database

You can use the *JD Edwards EnterpriseOne* application P96717 to import and export tablespaces *except* the Planner. To import or export the Planner tablespaces, you must use scripts that are delivered with the installation of the Deployment Server. The scripts are located in this directory:

For Planner Databases:

```
<E1_install_dir>\planner\data
```

For local metadata repository database (for example, specs and serialized objects):

```
<E1_install_dir>\planner\spec
```

This section discusses:

- *Import Tablespace Script (attach_planner.bat)*
- *Export Tablespace Script (detach_planner.bat)*

Import Tablespace Script (attach_planner.bat)

To use the import tablespace script:

1. Navigate to the directory `JDEdwards\ E920 \planner\data` and run this script:

```
TestPlannerDBs.bat
```

2. Edit the `attach_planner.bat` file such that any tablespaces that you do not intend to import are commented out. These lines start with:

```
call %DATA_PATH%\IMPORT_TABLESPACE.BAT
```

3. Open a command prompt window by right-clicking on a Command Prompt shortcut and selecting **Run as administrator**.

4. Change directory to the location of the batch files.

5. Run the batch file to import the tablespace using this syntax:

```
attach_planner.bat <database_password> <E1_install_dir>
```

For example:

```
attach_planner.bat default c:\JDEdwards\ E920
```

Note: This import batch file for the local metadata repository is in the spec directory: `attach_metadata.bat`

Export Tablespace Script (detach_planner.bat)

To use the export tablespace script:

1. Edit the `jdedwards\ E920 \planner\data\detach_planner.bat` file such that any tablespaces that you do not intend to import are commented out. These lines start with:

```
call %DATA_PATH%\EXPORT_TABLESPACE.BAT
```

2. Open a command prompt window by right-clicking on a Command Prompt shortcut and selecting **Run as administrator**.
3. Change directory to the location of the batch files.
4. Run the batch file to import the tablespace using this syntax:

```
detach_planner.bat <E1_install_dir>
```

For example:

```
detach_planner.bat c:\JDEdwards\E920
```

Note: This export batch file for the local metadata repository is in the spec directory: `detach_metadata.bat`

Updating the InstallManager.htm File

To install a database or the Development Client onto a Development Client machine, the user runs this program:

```
\\<deployment server name>\<release>\OneWorld Client Install\InstallManager.exe
```

This program displays a Graphical User Interface that provides several options for the user to perform. The options that `InstallManager.exe` displays are read from the file `InstallManager.htm` that resides in the same directory as `InstallManager.exe`.

The JD Edwards EnterpriseOne administrator can edit this file to rename the options or to add new options. Instructions are inside the file.

CAUTION: Although `InstallManager.htm` is in HTML format, it is a restricted HTML that the `InstallManager.exe` can read. Some text file editing programs add extraneous HTML tags that `InstallManager.exe` cannot recognize. The Microsoft Windows program `Notepad.exe` is an example of a program that is known to not add these extra tags, making it safe to use. Before you make any changes to the file, it is good practice to save a copy in case any changes that you make are not recognized by `InstallManager.exe` when it reads it.

Note that the installation path of the Development Client's installer (`setup.exe`) changed with Tools Release 9.1. This means that you will need to change the path of the Development Client's installer in the `InstallManager.htm` when you first install Tools Release 9.1 and greater onto a Deployment Server that has a tools release prior to 9.1 installed.

The following is an example of a line in a pre-9.1 `InstallManager.htm` that creates the link to install the Development Client (this should be on a single line):


```
<a class="sectionItem" id="LaunchLink" link="setup.exe" href="InstallManager.htm">EnterpriseOne Client</a>
```

The Development Client's installer prior to Tools Release 9.1 is called `setup.exe`. It should be in the same directory as `InstallManager.exe` and `InstallManager.htm`. The value of the link in the above line should be a path and executable for the installer. If a relative path is used (for example, the path starts with neither a drive letter followed by a colon nor a backslash), the path is relative to the location of `InstallManager.exe`. If no path is given, `setup.exe` and `InstallManager.exe` are in the same directory.

Here is an example of a similar line for Tools Release 9.1 and greater (this should be on a single line):

```
<a class="sectionItem" id="LaunchLink" link="install\setup.exe" href="InstallManager.htm">EnterpriseOne Client</a>
```

Note the addition of this relative path: `install`. With Tools Release 9.1 and greater, the Development Client's installer (which, is also called `setup.exe`) is now located in a subdirectory called `install` under the path where `InstallManager.exe` resides.

Concurrent Installation Options (Advanced or Expert Users Only)

The diagram in this appendix shows you which processes you can run concurrently in order to reduce the overall time to install. It also serves as a checklist for all the processes that are necessary for a successful installation.

CAUTION: A concurrent installation in the order and detail shown in this diagram requires detailed knowledge and experience with all parts and processes that comprise the JD Edwards EnterpriseOne environment. Not all processes in this diagram are documented in this guide.
