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Oracle Enterprise Cloud Native Session Border Controller	Oracle Enterprise Cloud Native Session Border Controller - Network-Wide Concurrent Session Perpetual	Description This license enables several concurrent sessions by Oracle Enterprise Cloud Native Session Border Controller for all protocols combined (SIP).  This license provides access to base Operating System and basic node management functions. The following features are available with the base license:  SIP (Session Initiation Protocol) – Enables all SIP functionality on the Oracle Enterprise Cloud Native SBC.  DOS – Enables Denial of Service protection functionality that protects network infrastructure, including the SBC, by providing signaling and media traffic attack detection and policing, and static and dynamic access control.  IDS (Intrusion Detection) – Allows configuration of traps sent when endpoints are demoted to "denied" status.  Allows configuration of syslog messages to be recorded when endpoints are demoted to "denied" status. Enables dynamic demotion of endpoints based upon CAC (call admission control) failures.  Routing – Enables configuration and use of routing (local policy) parameters for signaling protocols supported. This includes access to configuration elements such as cost, start and end times, days of week, media profiles, and carrier elements.  The following features are included in this license:  ENUM Database support  ENUM Database support  ENUM Database support  LRT (local route table)  Accounting – Allows the creation of call accounting records By collecting the information in flat files that can be pushed via SFTP to an external server.

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# Python License

Python was created in the early 1990s by Guido van Rossum at Stichting Mathematisch Centrum (CWI, see http://www.cwi.nl) in the Netherlands as a successor of a language called ABC. Guido remains Python's principal author, although it includes many contributions from others.

In 1995, Guido continued his work on Python at the Corporation for National Research Initiatives (CNRI, see http://www.cnri.reston.va.us)

in Reston, Virginia where he released several versions of the software.

In May 2000, Guido and the Python core development team moved to BeOpen.com to form the BeOpen PythonLabs team. In October of the same year, the PythonLabs team moved to Digital Creations (now Zope Corporation, see http://www.zope.com). In 2001, the Python Software Foundation (PSF, see http://www.python.org/psf/) was formed, a non-profit organization created specifically to own Python-related Intellectual Property. Zope Corporation is a sponsoring member of the PSF.

All Python releases are Open Source (see <a href="http://www.opensource.org">http://www.opensource.org</a> for the Open Source Definition). Historically, most, but not all, Python releases have also been GPL-compatible; the table below summarizes the various releases.

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(2) According to Richard Stallman, 1.6.1 is not GPL-compatible, because its license has a choice of law clause. According to CNRI, however, Stallman's lawyer has told CNRI's lawyer that 1.6.1 is "not incompatible" with the GPL.
